Midland County political conventions produced virtually no fireworks Saturday.

The Republicans adopted 13 resolutions, including an enthusiastically accepted one which supported President Richard Nixon, but the Democratic county convention was characterized more by the resolutions it didn't pass than ones it did.

The busiest segment of the Democratic convention was the Resolutions Committee which defeated a number of proposed resolutions including one supporting Gov. Dolph Briscoe. Instead, it reported out only one resolution, that calling for "a sweeping victory for Democrats in November."

The American party convention had only 12 delegates to show up Saturday, but they nominated Mrs. Ada M. Spivey for county commissioner, Precinct 2, in the event the party gets 36,000 signatures on a statewide petition to gain a place on the November ballot.

British newspapers Saturday that Portuguese troops in Mozambique massacred 113 Africans and buried them in a mass grave.

The charges were made by five missionaries, known as the Pipcus fathers, who ran the Sacred Hearts mission at Inhaminga, about 120 miles north of the port of Beira in the Portuguese colony where a guerrilla war has raged for the last decade.

The missionaries said they closed the mission down in March

Their account of the alleged massacres was contained in a diary published by the Times and the Guardian.

They listed dozens of alleged killings, torture claims and reports of Portuguese troops razing entire villages in operations against guerrillas of the Mozambique Liberation Front ---known as Frelimo - and their sympathizers. They claimed the massacre of the 113 African prisoners took place near Inhaminga last February.

### The Midland College Story

Athletic Director Chester Story is busy laying the ground work for Midland College's first Western Conference season and expects to make announcements on the school's swimming and golf coaches, to go along with the recent appointment of Amarillo High's Roland Ingram as tennis coach, soon.

Those will be the sports in which MC will compete next year with basketball probably following in 1975.

Story would like to see baseball added to the program, but that will be determined by the availability of opposition. Odessa College had to reluctantly abandon the sport, simply because there weren't too many-junior colleges in the area to provide opposition.

"Whatever we do," promises Story, "We'll be striving for athletic excellence." . . .

The swimming team will be in much the same boat . . . er, a tank . . . as the baseball team in regards to opposition, but will find enough competition among four-year schools to fill out a most representative schedule.

Like a lot of folks; we really hadn't given much thought to an athletic program at MC. It was always something way off in the hazy future, but chatting with Story as he recounts preparations under way, of course, brings it all much closer.

"We have Midland people vitally interested in various phases of our program and they are working with us in an effort to bring top athletes to Midland in tennis, golf, swimming and even though it's a while off, basketball," Story explains.

Facilities will be a problem for a while, but makeshift arrangements will be made. For example, MC will use the City of Midland facilities for swimming, paying a rent that that will enable the COM to make improvements.

The golf team will divide its practice rounds between Midland CC, Ranchland Hill and Hogan Park.

"In this way, we can avoid interfering with the normal play at any one course by overcrowding them."

#### Short Stick At Sul Ross

Story comes to Midland after six years as head basketball coach at Sul Ross College. Previously, he coached at Sherman High and is a graduate of Austin College.

He was one of the last scholarship athletes at Austin College and played on the Kangaroos' last team (1960) to make the NAIA tournament in Kansas City, that weeklong basketball marathon that requires a combination of skill and endurance to survive.

At Sul Ross, Story found that it was easier to recruit an athlete from Chicago than West Texas, "Most of our area talent just didn't want to come to Alpine. They'd rather take a chance at playing at one of the bigger schools in the state as a walkon.

As a result, Story's teams had to struggle along without the blue chippers and there came times like the game with Sam Houston State a couple of years ago when the Bearkats were not only the class of the Lone Star Conference, but ranked No. 1 in the nation.

"They had a team that had tremendous jumping ability," relates Story, "In fact, much of their success was de-rived from their ability to knock shots away from the basket. It was out-and-out goal-tending but the officials would go along with it. They might call eight of 20 goal-tending blocks

But Chad, a nation of four million landlocked in the heart of Africa, is a transport nightmare in the best of times. The country, about three

times the size of California, has only 160 miles of paved roads, no railroads and is over 1,200 miles from Lagos, Nigeria, the nearest seaport.

Similar transport problems exist across the drought region but have been compounded by bitter disputes between competing truckers from different countries seeking to cash in on the relief transport bonanza.

The problem arises because most of the countries hit by the dry spell depend on ports of neighboring coastal countries to the south for relief supplies shipped from abroad. Instead of all available trucks

from all countries being put to work getting food, time-con suming compromises must be reached.

Truckers in Cameroon, for example, carry food shipments as far as Garoua in Northern Cameroon where it is then unloaded and later reloaded on trucks from Chad.


