THE AMERICAN NATIONAL NOW IN OPERATION

The Coming Of This Financial Institution Gives Cisco Four Strong Banks, and its First National; Millions Behind It.

The American National Bank opened its doors for business last Monday morning, June 2, and is now doing business in their home on the corner of Avenue E. and Fifth street. The capital stock of the American National is \$100,000.00 with a surplus fund of \$10,000. But this is only the working capital of this institution. The financial worth of those behind this institution runs into the millions, and a perusal of the names of the officers and directors will convince all that the resources are such that makes the American National one of the strongest in middle west Texas. Cisco's banking facilities have always been the strongest, as some of the wealthiest men in the county, men whose integrity is of the highest order, comprise the personnel of the directorates of all the banks of Cisco. Among its stock holders are some of the best known and wealthiest men in Eastland and Stephens county, distributed widely which will make many sections interested in Cisco's greatness. Mass Meeting at City Hall Auditorium Monday Night Attended by Representative Business Men; President Lee Going After Road.

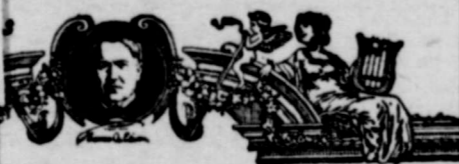

COMBING COUNTRY FOR ANARCHISTS

Washington, June 3.— Department of justice agents and police throughout the country today were hunting the organized band of anarchists who last night launched what they called an attempt to overthrow the government by assassinating with high-explosive bombs government officials and prominent men opposed to the spread of organized lawlessness.

Explosions took place in Washington, Pittsburg, Cleveland, Newtonville, Mass; Boston, Philadelphia, Paterson, N. J., and New York. None of the men for whom the bombs were intended were hurt, but one man, a watchman in New York, was killed, several persons were injured, buildings were wrecked and in Washington one of the plotters himself was blown to pieces when an infernal machine intended for Attorney General A. Mitchell Palmer exploded prematurely. The police have established that the dead anarchist, who was probably an Italian, came to Washington from Philadelphia, and they have reason to believe that the nation-wide plot was conceived in and started from that city.

Hope was held out today by federal agents that the perpetrators of the crime must be apprehended. The identity of the anarchist who was killed apparently has been established, and the next step is to determine who were his associates.

The outrages committed last night were believed to be a sequel to the May day bomb plot, when infernal machines were mailed to a score of prominent men over the country.

CISCO SPORTSMEN ARE GOOD LOSERS

MOVING ENGINE STRIKES FIREMAN

Stepped Off Engine to go to Lunch When Run Down by Switching Locomotive; Leg Amputated; Lives in DeLeon.

A deplorable accident occurred in the Katy yards at Cisco last Friday, when a fast moving switch engine struck a Katy fireman as he stepped off the cab of his engine.

The injured man was B. O. Nelson, whose home is at DeLeon, where he has a wife and five children.

Nelson had just stepped off the cab of his engine which was on a siding, to go to his lunch, when a fast moving switch engine on the main line struck him, running over his left leg, and mangleing the limb so badly that amputation was necessary.

Mr. Nelson was given surgical attention by the local surgeon of the M. K. & T. here, and the leg amputated about three inches below the knee, after which he was taken on board the T. & P. Oil Field Special and conveyed to the Katy hospital at Dallas, for further treatment. Reports received here are to the effect that he is recovering rapidly, and will soon be able to be sent to his home. The local surgeon stated that the injured man stood the operation better than any one he ever attended, rallying in a remarkably short time, and pleasantly conversing with those near him, giving an account of the accident which cost him a limb.

Mr. Nelson had been with the Katy for several years, having his run on the local between Stamford and DeLeon. He is 36 years of age.

Dr. Gregory stated that this is the first serious accident which has occurred in his jurisdiction on the Katy road since September, 1914, when the fatal accident in which a man was mangled to death by a train.

GREATER CISCO BEING BUILT BY FAR SEEING MEN

Permanency Characterizes Improvements now Under Way In The Coming Metropolis of Middle West Texas; Cisco's Future Certain.

Building activity in Cisco was never greater than at the present time which is hardly excelled by any town of comparative size in the whole state. Every day something new and bigger, construction enterprise is announced in the course of materialization, and other big things for Cisco can be expected to be announced in the near future, all of which will add to the material prosperity of this city.

This growth is not of the "mushroom" variety, but of substantial and permanent stability, to serve as a monument of the prosperity and progress of those men who are making Cisco by investing their capital in the town which is founded upon the most stable resources of commerce. These men who are making Cisco are not visionaries, but far-seeing, level-headed men of affairs, who knowing the resources surrounding and supporting Cisco, see the certainty of the metropolis of middle-west Texas.

What El Paso is to northern Mexico, New Mexico and Arizona, Cisco will be to the vast area this side of the great American desert. Her trade territory, logically is almost limitless; abounding in the richest agricultural and mineral resources; her cattle and live stock industry, all of which when augmented by better transportation facilities, will make her the largest city west of Fort Worth, save the possible exception of El Paso.

Progress in Construction.

The many new structures, paving and other improvements now under way are of the most substantial character. No hurriedly constructed affairs; but builded with an eye single to stability and permanency. The best building material are going into these improvements, and the "high cost of building material", which is delaying construction as an after-war re-construction measure in many places, does not apply to Cisco. These handicaps are mere trifles here, for these improvements are needed now and the men who are returning home after fighting the country's battles need the work.

The many improvements previously noted in Cisco's progress are well under way. The paving of Avenue E is progressing nicely; the new home of the Cisco Banking Co., bank one of the handsomest buildings in Texas is well on its way and its five stories of modern office space will relieve to some extent the demand for adequate quarters for those badly in need of office room in which to transact their increasing volume of business.

The Judia-Lauderdale opera house building of three stories is assuming that symmetrical form conceived by its designer in his architectural fancy, whose imposing three floors will make it one of the ornaments of Cisco's show places.

A New Half Brick Block

There are many other buildings in course of construction—both business houses and dwellings—all of the same character of permanency, but less pretentious than those above mentioned, now in course of construction or completion. In this latter class can be mentioned the Williams and Scott buildings on Sixth street and the Katy tracks. This will be a solid half block when complete. Gomer S. Williams, one of the original Cisco boosters has practically completed a modern building on his property there. The Round-Up is informed that it was built as an investment by its owner, who sees the possibilities of the Greater Cisco, and her future. While this information furnished this paper is to the effect that it will likely be occupied as a garage for the present, but it is an ideal location and perfectly appointed for the home of a large wholesale business for which it will doubtless be ultimately used.

It is situated on one of the streets in the pavement district, and besides the alley which will also be paved, it has ample railroad frontage to make

CISCO WILL BE THE CENTER OF DISTRIBUTION

Millions to be Invested Here In The Near Future—Humble People Buys Acreage—Warehouses to be Erected Soon.

That Cisco is destined to become the great distributing point of middle West Texas is only doubted by those who fail to read the signs of progress everywhere manifest. Right at this moment capital, seeing the facilities here to distribute their products, are seeking locations in Cisco. It is no extravagant prediction to say that within the near future the prosperity of Cisco will be greater than ever in its history. Even the most confirmed pessimist will be forced to admit this when the facts now known are fully revealed.

Humble People Buys Site

The Humble Oil and Refining Co. will make Cisco their general distributing point for their large volume of products. For this purpose a deal was recently closed for 31 85-100 acres near the city limits, situated on the Katy tracks, as the site for their warehouses and for the purpose of handling the Humble products. This land was purchased from Capt. Judia, Dr. Oldham and Charley Hartman. The price paid was \$500 per acre, the deeds and checks have been passed and the title is now in the Humble Oil and Refining Company.

The company's engineer is now on the ground clearing off the land and getting ready for the erection of the necessary buildings which will be required. The engineer stated that as soon as the land was ready work would be commenced on the warehouses and cottages for the employees.

This is not a dream, but a reality. Just one of the many plums coming to Cisco. Mr. M. Kleberg, of the Fort Worth offices, was in the city last week and closed up the transaction. He stated the Humble people would make Cisco the principal distributing point of this section. Here will be established their depot for supplies, and he intimated it was the plans of his company to later bring a pipe line to Cisco and erect a refinery here. Mr. Kleberg also indicated that the Humble people would subscribe \$100,000 to the stock of the Cisco-Caddo railroad, which is only another plum which will drop during the coming year.

The Humble people, in coming here, will mean the expenditure of a vast sum of money in establishing their supply depot, warehouses and otherwise improving their holdings. It is estimated that this expenditure will be \$1,000,000.00 to \$1,500,000. This is an enterprise that Cisco gives the heartiest welcome, for it is another factor which will work for a greater Cisco.

But there is another good omen in the coming of the Humble Oil and Refining Company to this city. It shows that the big enterprises have designated this place as the logical point of distribution for this vast section of Texas. It is easier to get others when a big concern comes.

Other Big Things In Sight

But this is not all. Already three new enterprises are practically certain. These three will close contracts within the next week or ten house. The ones which are certain houses. The ones which are certain of establishing their headquarters here are the Bovard Supply Company, The Frick-Reid Supply Company, and the Keystone Pipe & Supply Company. The Round-Up has it from most reliable authority that one of these contracts are practically closed at this time, and the others will be in the next week or ten days for the building of warehouses and other buildings.

These new enterprises will spend sums of money running into millions establishing their bases here, thus making Cisco the great distributing point of Middle West Texas.

It is predicted by those on the inside that Cisco's wave of prosperity will not be delayed over sixty days, and within that time it is said that the city's industrial and commercial activity will have reached a point never dreamed of.

TIME TO CALL A HALT ON AUTOMOBILE NOISE

Motor Firing Was Tolerated After Signing of Armistice, but People Now Should Have Some Consideration.

Recently, all over the United States motor drivers have been greatly annoying the public by causing a series of loud explosions from their motor cars. Noise making came into vogue during the celebrations and parades incident to the signing of the armistice, but there is no longer any excuse for it.

The sound is similar to the firing of a gun in the street. In nine cases out of ten, this is purposely done by the driver, who suddenly shuts off his spark and then advances it again.

The next exhaust charge from the engine, being a flame, ignites the gas that was not fired when the spark had no time to escape, instead of the muffler, from which the live gas had no time to escape, instead of inside the engine, where the explosion would give power and the noise then be silenced in the muffler.

This usually happens where battery ignition is manipulated by hand. It is not so easy with magneto ignition, as that is fool proof.

City councils and other law-making bodies should stop this nuisance of sudden explosions, which frighten nervous people, seriously affecting those suffering with mental or heart trouble, and even persons having the strongest nerves.

Many cities are framing ordinances prohibiting unnecessary noises, such as exhaust "cut-outs," blatant horns, clanging bells, shrieking exhaust whistles, and should act at once against this new trick, by passing an ordinance to compel all motor cars to have magneto ignition, and thus prevent this nuisance.

Jacksonville is shipping tomatoes by the carloads. Think how much a carload of tomatoes would bring if sold at Cisco cafe prices—six slices for 20 cents.

Monday last was the coldest day in June since 1894. The temperature here was 50 degrees above zero. In portions of the Panhandle, snow was reported Tuesday morning.

How many patriotic southern people in Cisco knew that Tuesday last was the birthday of the president of the confederate states? Cisco banks observed the day by closing their doors.

The attorney general's department has rendered an opinion that on and after June 18, when the public workers law shall have become operative, it will be a violation of the penal statutes of the state for any person to weigh for hire, or to weigh or measure any produce or commodity, issuing therefor a certificate of weight, except a duly elected or appointed public weigher or deputy. Oh, democracy, how many sins are committed in thy name!

The supreme court of the United States has held valid the increase of railroad and wire rates ordered for intrastate service by the lines of transportation and communication. The court finds that congress conferred upon the president "sweeping control of the railroad and wire systems with supreme and conclusive authority to fix intrastate rates." So there you are.

It was with a becoming spirit of humility that characterized the reception of the peace terms by the Austrian plenipotentiaries. Only a plea that all of the former Austrian-Hungarian empire be forced to share in the burden was made. This is in marked contrast of the characteristic German spirit manifested by the arrangement of Count Brockdorff-Rantau, of the German delegation. Austria was granted fifteen days in which to make her reply.

Have the hens all become bolsheviks? Eggs at cafes are still being served two for 20 cents.

Texas legislature will convene in extra session on June 3. There will be more work for the higher courts to declare their acts null and void.

Texas should be thankful for the able jurists comprising the court of criminal appeals. That tribunal has often shielded the private citizen from the onslaughts of fool legislation, of which there abounds in Texas a plenty.

Latest election returns indicate that not only was women suffrage defeated in the late election, but the home owning amendment also is very close. Texas voters are not foolish about amending the constitution. It is only on prohibition that they are agreed that the organic law needs patching.

The prospect of the repeal of the retail tax promised by congress has not served to lower prices to any appreciable degree. When a purchaser mildly kicks at old H. P. he is informed that he is lucky to get the goods at present prices for the reason the dealer was wise enough to lay in a supply of last year's commodity. From this it can be inferred that the new crop will be dearer still.

Since Texas has been made moral and perfectly good by statutory enactment many projects are being promoted for their entertainment and debauchery in border towns. Mexico and Cuba seem to be the favorite oases for the thirsty and sportive yankee. A corporation is said to be in the course of promotion by Texas McCloud for the establishment of modern Monte Carlo in Juarez and near Havana. Cuban capital is behind the resort for the pearl of the antilles, where McCloud states \$40,000,000 has already been subscribed. The Juarez resort will be financed by New York capital of approximately \$60,000,000. In the meantime Mexico contemplates turning border towns loose that her business men might profit from our legislative morality.

GAS LEAK CAUSES LOSS OF TRUCK

Motor Freightier Boggs and Ignition of gas Burns Valuable Truck of W. W. Dutton; Loss nearly \$1,000.00

A singular and disastrous fire occurred last Monday night between Cisco and Breckenridge, in which a valuable truck loaded with groceries were completely destroyed.

W. W. Dutton of this city, who runs a truck freighter, was conveying several thousand pounds of merchandise from here to Breckenridge. His machine bogged down in the road and after trying to extricate themselves he and his assistant, concluded they could pull out by getting a shovel and spading away the mud. His helper went under the truck to see if this was possible, and struck a match to look over the situation. Here is where the singularity of the disaster comes in. The truck had bogged down over a leaky gas main. When the match was lighted the escaping gas became ignited. The blaze at first was only insignificant, and by the application of quantities of mud this was almost extinguished.

Mr. Dutton stated just as he was in the act of applying a quantity of wet earth to the last jet of the burning gas, business picked up. There was an additional leak; likewise a great combustion. In a second the truck was covered with flames.

The young man accompanying him had his hair and eyebrows singed, and it was with some difficulty that Mr. Dutton succeeded in extricating him from his perilous position.

The disaster occurred about 11:00 o'clock Monday night. The loss is said to be about \$3,727; \$3,200 on the truck, which was only recently purchased and \$527 on the burned merchandise. Wednesday evening the wreck was still burning.

FOURTH-CLASS POST-MASTER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to be held at Cisco, Texas on June 28th, 1919 as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at Scranton and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill any vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$378 for the last fiscal year.

Applicants must have reached their twenty-first birthday on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a State where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at eighteen years, women eighteen years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application blanks, Form 1753, and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at the place of vacancy or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practicable date.

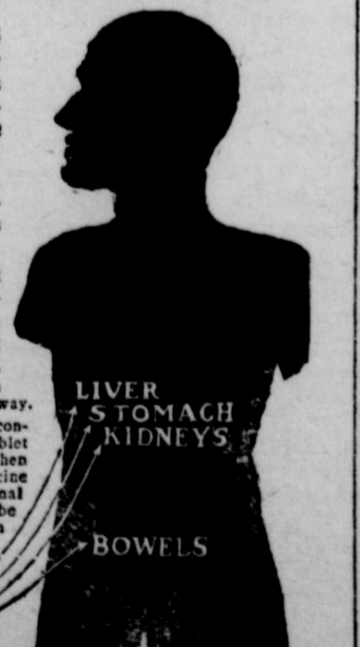

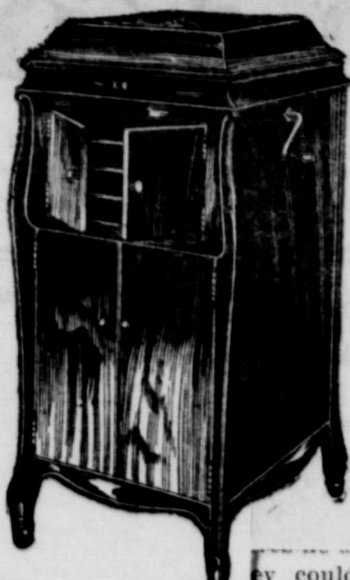

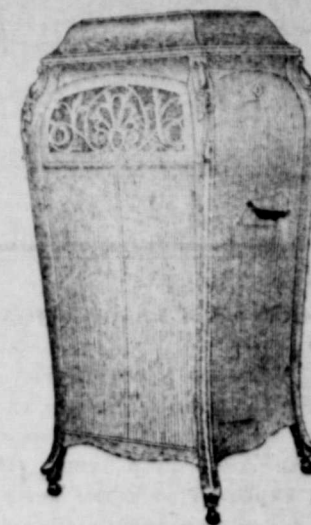

SOLDIERS MAY BE LOCATED IN TEXAS

Secretary Lane and Representative Mondell Plan to Locate Discharged Soldiers in this State—140 to 160 Acres.

Washington, June 5.—Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane has declared he hopes to see thousands of former service men settled on Texas farms two years from now.

"No state will benefit more from soldier settlement than Texas", said Secretary Lane. "It has thousands of acres of rich land that would make a living for hundreds of the best men in the country—the men who have returned with the American colors from 'victory on foreign battlefields, or those just as noble young men who were in American camps waiting to go across and the soldiers of the sea."

Inquiries continue to come from Texas to the interior department concerning the settlement plan.

Congressman Mondell, Republican floor leader, said that under his bill settlers' land settlements will probably be made in all states except perhaps a very few in the Mississippi valley.

C. S. Ucker of Baltimore, vice president of the Southern Settlement & Development Organization, estimates there are 200,000,000 acres of land suitable for agricultural development in the South, chiefly in the coastal plants area extending from Virginia to Texas (inclusive).

Lands around Houston, Beaumont, Waco, Fort Worth and such communities would be in less than 160-acre units and in West Texas and the Panhandle in 160-acre and larger units, depending on the locality.

The Ace Medal represents total W. S. S. sales of \$250. A bronze palm represents an additional \$100, a silver palm an additional \$1,000 and a gold palm an additional \$5,000 in War Savings Stamps sold. "I'd like to see every Boy Scout in the District wearing gold palms on his medal ribbon by the end of the year," said Frank M. Smith, Federal District Director of the War Loan Organization. "What one boy has done others can do. One of the best War Savings Societies in the District is in the Boy Scout Troop at Tallulah, La. There ought to be a Savings Society in every troop."

Fraternal Orders Strong For Saving

Fraternal orders should take an active interest in the 1919 Savings Campaign in the opinion of Pat M. Neff of Waco, Grand Chancellor of the Texas Grand Lodge, Knights of Pythias. Another enthusiast over the Savings Campaign is J. W. Chancellor of Bowie, Grand Master of the Texas Grand Lodge, Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

"In the Savings Campaign," Mr. Neff said recently, "the Government has placed the stamp of its approval on the fraternal idea. War Savings Societies are not lodges, strictly speaking, but they are next thing to it. Many of the most successful Savings Societies are in the lodges and the Knights of Pythias are doing their share."

OTTO KINSEY IS NOT OVER FOND OF ARMY

Drew an Unlucky Number by Being Transferred from National Army Division into the Regular Army; Must Wait for a Volunteer.

Otto Kinsey, one of the Cisco boys now with the American army of occupation in Germany, is not foolish about the land of the Hun, and is pining for the American Goddess awaiting outside of New York harbor.

But he bids his folk to look for him after he wires of his arrival in New York.

Otto writes his father, W. A. Kinsey, under date of May 18th, from Montabour, Germany, in part as follows:

"Dear Father: Haven't written you in about a week or more, or has it been longer? Time drags off so slowly over here that a week seems like a month to me.

"Everything is O. K. with me, and I am in the best of health, and up to two or three days ago in the best of spirits. But it begins to look like I am destined to have to stay here indefinitely, or until I can be replaced by some volunteer. It isn't strange that there is not many volunteering for foreign service.

"Had it not been for the action of a colonel I would have been on my way to the States this week with my old division.

"When I was discharged from the hospital last fall, the colonel there instead of sending me back to my old division, sent me to the first national division. I didn't desire the change, but a soldier's desires are given little consideration, so I had to stand for it without a word.

"Later, after the armistice was signed, general headquarters issued an order to transfer all men back to their organizations upon their request. I heard of this order and went to the captain and asked for a transfer to my former organization, the 315th signal division. He told me he knew of no such order but would look into it. That was practically the last of it. Later, upon my reminder, after I had made a formal written request for a transfer, he told me that he had not approved my request, as he was short of men. I was encouraged to remain with my present organization, with the assurance that this division would sail for the States in June or July.

"All National Army divisions are to be sent home by June 20, leaving only the regulars in the army of occupation. So far as I know no dates are fixed for the sailing of the regulars. You can see my situation. I am a national army man in a regular division, with my old organization already back in the states. My case is not an exceptional one by any means, for at least half of the regular army is made up of drafted men, and men who volunteered for the period of emergency.

"There is a law, I believe, that provides that a drafted soldier must be discharged within four months after peace is signed. Peace isn't signed yet, but there are over two million drafted men who have been discharged, or who are eligible for discharge, while those of us who have been unwillingly placed in the regular army are still 'doing our bit' and very likely will still be held in service for months to come.

"Don't look for me until you receive a wire from me dated at New York. Then, and then only, you will know that I am at last about to shed my uniform for a suit of civilian clothes.

"If peace is signed this month I shall have hopes of getting back soon. If not my hopes will be deferred until the treaty is signed.



OIL PRODUCTION IN TEXAS IS 27,000,000

New Wells Being Brought In; Cisco Fields Rapidly Becoming Famous For High Grade Petroleum; Big Gasser Brought In.

Rising Star is rejoicing in the bringing in of the Hagan No. 1, about 15 miles of Cisco. This well was brought in last week at a depth of 1,535 feet, and has a capacity of approximately fifty barrels per day. The Hagan 1 is situated on the G. W. Hill farm, and timber is now on the ground for the rig. The Enterprise well on the Reynolds lease near Albany was brought in as a big gasser, flowing 1,000,000 feet of gas, recently. The drillers appear to have struck the shallow oil sand which is producing from 25 to 50 barrels at a depth of 950 feet.

The value of the Texas Crude oil produced in Texas during the first quarter of 1919 is approximately \$27,000,000. A report received here shows the Texas Company has the largest production in the State with the Gulf Production company a close second.

The Julia Davis No. 2 of the Magnolia Petroleum Company in the old district of Eastland county has come in for a big production at the usual depth. It is estimated to be making 700 barrels daily.

The Harris well of the Magnolia further to the south has come in with a flow of 400 barrels.

An oil fields statistician has figured that the present number of producing wells in Eastland County is 190. The present number of dry and abandoned wells in the county is forty-three. This includes the wells drilled in territory not included in the pools. The result shows that 22 per cent of the wells in the county have been failures. For Stephens

County, the number of producing wells is given at seventy, and the number of dry and abandoned wells at fourteen. The percentage of failures therefore, is 20 per cent for Stephens County.

The well with largest initial production in Eastland County was the Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company's Norwood No. 1, with 11,000 barrels a day. This well is now making about 7,800 barrels a day. The largest initial production in Stephens County was the Brazos River Oil Company's Massenbergs No. 1, with 3,552 barrels. This well is now going 2,595 barrels.

Eastland Production Big

Eastland, Texas, June 2.—The Magnolia Petroleum Company's No. 2 Davis came in to day making 4,000 barrels. It is fifteen feet in the pay at 3,442 feet. This is an offset to Sun Company's Lauderdale. It is on the western end of an eighty acre strip out of the Julia Davis tract in the southern part of the York survey, which was recently bought by P. S. Wolfe, cashier of the City National Bank of Eastland. Another well is being drilled on the eastern end.

The Magnolia well on the Oscar Harris tract, four miles east of Eastland, began making oil at the rate of twenty five barrels an hour today at 3,410 feet. It has been gassing for several days.

The Humble Company's No. 1 on the Sue tract, three miles east of Eastland has a showing of oil and gas at 3,380 feet. Ten derricks are going up on this tract.

First pay sand was gone into at 3,370 feet yesterday and oil flowed over the top of the derrick in the Perkins well, Root, Hupp and Duff are drilling four miles northeast of Eastland near Pleasant Grove church. They began drilling in this afternoon.

The Leon Oil Company is on top of the lime and has a showing of oil in well on the Allen tract, a short distance southeast of the Perkins.

The Humble Company's Scott well two and a half miles east of Eastland which came in as a big gasser at 3,439 feet, five days ago, increased its flow of oil today and promises to develop into a good producer.

States Oil Company's well on the M. E. Turner tract, three miles north east of Eastland, which made thirty million feet of gas at 1,348 feet, has been muddied in. It will be drilled deeper with a view of obtaining a permanent supply of gas for Eastland.

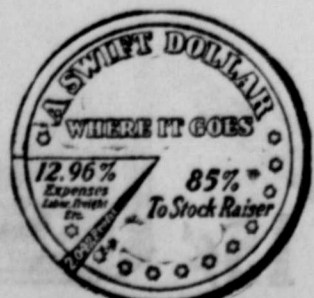

it ideal wholesale location. Nothing transitory, either in the construction of this building as it is absolutely fireproof, the material being monolithic brick and concrete. It is only one story, but has a foundation capable of supporting additional floors should it be required. Its floor space is 6,300 square feet; the front is of plate glass, containing 3,200 square feet. The plans were drawn by Architect C. B. Snodgrass.

This building is in the shape of an L and situated in the hollow of this L is the lot owned by Judge D. K. Scott, who will soon begin the erection of a modern building, thus making this half block fully covered by substantial building, according to the information given the Round-Up. It is said these plans are already drawn and actual work is only a matter of a short time. The Scott building will be similar in construction to the completed Williams building, and if it should be desired, the two can be arranged for a single occupant.
