Explosion Occurred About Noon The hour was approximately noon when the disaster occurred. Tom McCullough, the teamster for the the plant, had started to the factory and had just called to Mr. Peebles to come to lunch, as the latter took his lunch with Mr. and Mrs. McCullough. Mrs. McCullough was standing on the front porch of her restdence and saw the plant go up. leaving a huge crater where the factory stood but a few seconds previously. hildren of Scholastic Age Can Be Transferred from One County to Another; Law Passed by Special Legislature.


By an act of the recent called session of the Texas Legislature it is provided that children of scholastic age moving into another school district after the taking of the census in March may be transferred from any county to another in the state Many families with children of school age have moved into Cisco since last March. The parents are therefore asked to call at the office of Anderson & Crawford, in the rear of the Guarantee State Bank building and get their children transferred. Any children who were not enrolled in any district in the state last year, should also call there and be enrolled.

A statement sent out by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction follows:

Austin, Texas, July 26 .- Miss Annie Webb Blanton, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, today called attention to the law passed at the recent session and signed by the Governor, providing for emergency transfers of the state school apportionment of any pupil from any county to any other county of the

This law is intended to provide for the unusual conditions of the oil ections. No applications for transfer of the school apportionment of one child or of children of one familv will be granted. Miss Blanton said. Miss Blanton is sending out the following instructions to county and city superintendents of schools:

"If your section is among those having a large influx of children since the census was taken in March, you should proceed as follows: You should give as wide publicity as possible to the fact that children returning since March can be enrolled, and should require their parents to report all cases at some designated place. The children should then be listed alphabetically with full infor-

But Mr. Green assured his audience that there was no danger. and after a half hour or so the mechanic had 'got up steam' and when the old boat started up the main thoroughfare of the Kaufman county metropolis a mighty cheer arose from the throats of the throngs that lined the streets. Proof positive was before their eyes that the thing would run and go at least twenty miles an hour.

"The triumph at Terrell was such a success that Mr. Green decided to. take his wonder to Dallas and 'drive her all the way.' It was a hazardous undertaking in those days and the success of the first atuomobile trip from Terrell to Dallas was the cause of as much speculation and argument as the United States Navy's air flight across the Atlantic ocean. "So the next day Mr. Green set

out on what is believed to be the most expensive automobile trip in history. It cost him about \$5,000 to come from Terrell to Dallas.

"No sooner had he got out of Terrell than the news of runaways of horses hitched to buggies and wagons began to come back to the people at Terren. And that evening when he reached Dallas a trail of devastation had been left behind that still lingers in the minds of farmers along the road.

"More than \$5,000 worth of suits were filed against Mr. Green as the result of the trip. More than \$5,000 has been paid out in settlements and there are still two or three suits pending in the courts.

"It was a source of much trouble and worry to Mr. Green while .he had it at Terrell. People who desired to go buggy riding in the evening would call the railroad magnate up in the morning and enquire as to whether he intended taking the automobile out that evening. If he did they would stay at home, because they did not want to take a chance of getting hurt in a runaway."







DEAN WOMAN SENTENCED TO TWO YEAR TERM

A sequel to what the police de partment considers one of their best pieces of work, took place in Eastland recently, where the case of Helen Dean, charged with highway robbery, was tried before the district court. The case was given to the jury yesterday afternoon and in the evening they returned a verdict of guilty and sentenced the Dean woman to five years imprisonment.

Irwin Crouch, Helen Dean, John Rayburn and another woman, were all arrested charged with highway robbery when W. C. Carter was assaulted and robbed several week ago. The cases against Rayburn and the other woman were dismissed. The two are being held as witnesses against Crouch and the Dean woman.

The arrest by the police of John Rayburn on July 5, and the brilliant work of officer Tom Haynie in securing a complete statement from the man, was the principal evidence which made possible the conviction of the woman.







He spent Thursday and Friday with his people at their home on the farm and came to town Saturday, where he met his old friends. He takes the situation in a matter-offact way and does not seem to over-elated at the finding of an abundance of wealth on his farm which he had worked two years during the drouth, but carries himself with the cool precision that an American sailor would use during battle. He has announced he will use his wealth for the benefit of Christianity when he is discharged from the navy. He is a Christian preacher.



As shown on the the income account for the year ending Dec. 31, 1918, the total operating revenue was \$27,294,833, an increase of \$4,580,825, and net income after total deductions \$3,706,864, a decrease of \$2,175.093. According to Receiver Wight, the railroad administration has advanced on compensation \$909,250 for use in payment of interest on mortgage bonds; interest and principal on equipment trust obligations and corporate expenses. All interest and dividends to share holders which are regularly paid by the company were paid during the year.

The territory traversed by the Texas & Pacific lines with the exception of that west of Baird, continues to enjoy exceptional prosperity, although handicapped by a shortage of labor, due to war conditions and the epidemic of influenza.

The line west of Abilene has been affected adversely by the continued drought, which has extended over the past two years, resulting in a material loss to the agricultural and livestock interests located in that vicinity. During the latter part of the year, however, the drought was broken by rain and snow, and the outlook for the coming year is more hopeful.

On June 9, 1918, the locomotive shop and a portion of the boiler shop at Marshall, Texas, were destroyed fire of unknown origin. The damage to the building and machinamounted to approximately erv \$250,000. The entire amount of this loss will be borne by the United States railroad administration, as provided in the standard contract. A new shop will be immediately erected and ready for operation during the ensuing year.

Taxes for the year, with the exception of income and those paid on outside properties, were paid by the railroad administration.





FORTY ONE NEW LOCATION MADE **DURING 7 DAYS**

Desdemona Leads in Production During Past Week; Eastland County, Has 307 Drilling Wells and 23 **Rigs** and Locations.

During the past week there have been seventeen completions in 'the Ranger, Desdemona and Stephens county pools, all of which were producing oil wells with the exception of three dry holes completed in the Ranger field. There were no gassers during the week

The Desdemona district led in the number of completions. Seven wells were completed, five of which were producers, while the Ranger field accounted for five completions, two of which were producers. Three of the Ranger wells were dry.

Eastland county, exclusive of that part of the county embraced by the Desdemona pool, has 307 drilling wells and 2333 rigs and locations. Atotal of forty-one new locations have been made in the county the last week.

Stephens county has 288 drilling wells, 219 rigs up and locations, while a total of thirty-one new locations were made the past week. The Desdemona field has 127 wells drilling, 150 rigs and locations and thirty-one new locations were made the past week. A total of 103 new cotions were made in the three fields during the week just past.

In the whole of the North Central Texas territory, exclusive of the Wichita Falls and Burkburnett districts, there are 1,644 wells drilling, rigs up and locations.

Eastland County Gets County Court At Law

The commissioners court has been informed that the legislature has passed a bill establishing a county court at law for Eastland county. This will give Eastland county an additional court, which will clear up much of the congested litigation, as many cases can be tried in the new court over which the present county court has no jurisdiction, and this will relieve the county judge to devote his entire attention to matters pertaining to the commissioners court.


