

THREE HIGH POWERED LIGHTS MADE FOR RUSSIAN GOVERN-MENT SECURED.



He (President Cleveland) was in truth a strong man, who, sufficiently mindful of his limitations in the begining, grew by unexampled and conhad a real desire to serve the country But he was apt to think that he alone could effectively serve it. In one of our spats I remember saying to him, "You seem Mr. President to think that you are the only pebble on the beach—the only honest and brave man in the party-but let me assure you of my own knowledge there are others."

The object of the present campaign. stated by Rev. S. A. "But democratic ideas are growing in Japan, and more temperate treatment of the subject race will come



Meats in Storage Not "Hoarded"

Live stock is a seasonal crop-like cereals and grains.

It is "ripe" and is marketed in larger quantities in certain months. This causes a natural oversupply at one time and a natural shortage at another.



- 7 per cent is lard. This is a normal supply and only four-fifths of a pound per capita, and much of it will have to go to supply Euro-
- 19 per cent is frozen beef and lamb, and miscellaneous meats, part of which is owned by the Government and was intended chiefly for over-seas shipment. If this were all diverted to domestic trade channels it would be only 21/2 lbs. per capita-a 5 days' supply.

From this it will be seen that "meats in storage" represent unfinished goods in process of curing and the working supply necessary to assure the consumer a steady flow of finished

COURT ORDERS ELECTION FOR HICHWAY BONDS

If Bonds Carry Will Be Issued Serially; Call is for \$4,500,000, But Only Propose to Issue \$2,000,000 Now; Election September 27.

Petitions which have been circulated all over the county, and the required signatures secured. were. presented to the commissioners court yesterday. Secretary W. A. Downing of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, and member of the execsection, and placed the petition in the hands of the court. Petitions from other sections of the county were simultaneously presented, and as there was a preponderance of signatures of the legal voting taxpayers of the county, the court was not long in setting the day of the election, which was set for September

The executive committee will at once have maps of the proposed roads made, and these will be placed in the hands of every voter in the county. The routes, which are approximately along the lines laid out in last issue of the Round Up. provides for roads in every section of the county where roads are required.

The call provides that the bonds shall be issued serially, and draw interest at the rate of not exceeding 5 1-2 per cent per annum. While the call is for \$4,500,000, it is not proposed to issue the full amount at this time, but the proposition is to sell only \$2,000,000 immediately. could not be expended now, and the money is needed to complete the sys-

The plans provide that the proceeds of the first bonds sold shall be equitably distributed in the four commissioners' precincts, and begin the work simultaneously in each precinct. With the sale of these bonds. and the money on hand from the sale of previous issues, there will be available \$2,084,000 to start the work of road building in the county.

It is hoped that those who have the authority will not delay the road work, but use the \$84,000 for the purposes for which it was voted, as it must be so expended, and there is no possible good can come from delay. As this \$84,000 must be equally distributed on the east and west road, it could be utilized in putting in first class concrete enlverts, and otherwise preparing this road for permanent work just an soon as the bonds are voted, and the money available.

There is such an imperative d mand for a system of real roads in Eastland county that no trouble is anticipated in securing the necessary two thirds vote which is required to carry the election. People of this county have rolled over the horrible makeshift of roads which have disgraced the county so long, that it is believed all will be eager to embrace the opportunity to put this bond issue over. If the proposition carries, and all seem to be of the impression that it will, it will be the most advance step Eastland county has made since its organization.

ATTACK OF 1916

Railway Employees' Chiefs Appear at Washington With New Threat to Congress.

ASK \$1,000,000,000 MORE PAY.

Also Demand Nationalization of Other Industries, Following Example of Russian Soviets.

Washington.-It is just three years since the four leaders of the railway brotherhoods, having refused arbitration of their demands, sat in the gallery of the United States Senate and held their watches on the Senators while the memorable vote was being taken on the Adamson Law that gave them \$60,000,000 additional wages a year. Now the 350,000 men in the brotherhoods have been toined by more than a million other railroad graphers, clerks, station agents-and the demands are many times what they were three years ago,

A Thousand Million Dollars.

On top of a thousand million dollars of added wages granted by the Government in the past year and a half. the allied workers are asking for anther increase of a thousand million

But more than this, this great body of railroad employees has served an natum on the Government that all the railroads of the country must be taken away from their owners and turned over to the employees to be operated by them on a communistic profit-sharing plan.

The plan is as daring as any conrelved by the Russian Bolshevists, and behind it is the threat of a nation-wide strike, with the leaders of the men sitting in the Senate gallery, watches in hand, counting the vote.

To Tie Up All Transportation.

"We will tie up the railroads so that they will never run again if we do not get what we want," announced one of the labor spokesmen, standing within a stone's throw of the Capitol, and this amazing announcement, like an ultimatum from a leader of the Russian Soviet, was instantly flashed over the telegraph wires to every part of the country.

Since the shell exploded in Washington at the end of July, the fact has leaked out that the brotherhoods are gathering a propaganda fund of \$10,000,000 for an intensive drive on Congress, Three million dollars, it is announced, has already been collected from the members of the unions. This will be used in campaign work in the Congressional districts, with the purpose of enlisting the votes of the members of Congress, or of defeating them for re-election if they do not vote as the brotherhoods dictate. Money will also be lavishly spent, it is stated, in sending speakers throughout the country to stir up the enthusiasm of organized labor for the brotherhood plan of

communistic railroad operation. "Nationalizing" All Industry

"If we don't get what we want out of this Congress we will put this Congress out and put another one in that will give us what we want," is the matter-of-fact announcement of the central propaganda office of the brotherhoods in Washington.

Back of the immediate purpose to gain control of the railroads is an even deeper scheme to gain control of all great industries, taking them from their owners and putting them under the direct management of the organized workers, as has been done in Russia, and as they are attempting to do in Germany and Austria.

The reports of the United States Railroad administration show that the Government, since it took over the roads in December, 1917, has increased railroad wages by considerably more than a thousand million dollars, and about \$500,000,000 a year is being taken out of the National Treasury to meet the deficit caused by the great increase in labor cost.

Big Wage Increases.

The principal advances in wages have been: To shopmen, \$360,000,000; to unskilled labor, \$225,000,000; to the train brotherhoods, \$200,000,000; to clerks, \$125,000,000; to telegraph and station agents, \$100,000,000; to miscellaneous classes, \$110,000,000.

All of these groups are now demanding additional increases of from 30 to 50 per cent. When the Government took control of the roads the average earnings of all railroad workers, including several hundred thousand unskilled workers, was \$1,000 a year. The average is now more than \$1,500 and the new demands would raise it to \$2,000

THE WOMEN OF THE OLD SOUTH.

The following beautiful tribute to the womanhood of the Old South is taken from an address by Dr. R. A. Webb, of Missis-

"I plead for the old order which is passing away; for the old society which is fading; for that womanhood which created the gallantry and crowned the chivalry of the land of the South. I hate to see the woman of the Old South go. She was my mother, my sister, my sweetheart. She had the form which the Grecian chisel traced in marble, and the character which the Roman orator framed in sentences.

She had a face like an opal that had sipped red wine; lipe that had been touched by the brush of a pink dipped in the blood of a rose; hands softer than velvet, smoother than satin, and truer than steel. She had the princely graces of a maiden and the royal yirtues of a matron—the star of her lover, the pride of her husband, the idol of her children, the model of her slaves. The crimson tides which flowed through her veins were full and bounding, nothing languorous nor lackadaiscal, nothing bold or brazen; not a mere mollusk fattening upon the banks of life for the fishery of death.

"The ideas which possessed her mind were forceful and intelligent, never stupid, insipid, and insane. The feelings which throbbed in her heart were queenly and radiant, rich and luxuriant. Her speech was clean as the face of the stream, and her words were like jewels on a purple tray. Refinement and culture, elegance and modesty, charity and kindness, sweetness and courage, piety and devotion waited at the altar where she made the offering of the best that was in her. The tone of her life was as pure as the liquid note of the woodlark's evening song when she charms her mate in the fragrant gloaming. She loved poetry, music, and art, dancing and laughter and song, riding and boating and frolic and play; but pleasure unsoiled its shoe and whitened its lip when it crossed the threshold where she stood. To her womanhood each morning emptied a golden goblet, and each evening hymned a sacred lay.

"She glorified th eland where she lived, the home where she dwelt, the land of poetry and pathos, of suffering and heroism, of chivalry and love, of blooming flowers and leafy woods, of sunny fields and laughing meadows, and singing birds; where the tall pines shook their emerald crests in the angry face of the Northern war storm, where the moss-draped oaks are the symbols of her strength hung with the crepe of defeat. If, as we are told, the Bard of Avon was created by the witchery of the scenery in which he lived, perhaps the charm of the Southland threw a spell upon the daughter of Dixie like a bridal veil falling upon the maid at the marriage altar. But, however, she came she was like an "apple of gold in a picture of silver."

"I hate to see her go, this woman of the Old South, who mothered the sons that followed Lee and Jackson, and who brought back from Appomattox an honor stainless enough even for her lips, a fame like that untracked snow on the Alpine mountain tops. She laid her hands upon the pots and kettles and sang the song of hope and cheer, while his brave hand made wealth out of poverty and built homes out of ashes, and reconstructed society out of chaos. In the haleyon days, before the cannon's broad strokes had trenched the land, she won the brightest star in the Southern sky, in the days of battle and blood she was the inspiration of courage and the angel of mercy, and in the days of defeat and desolation she was the spirit of hope and the helpmate of man.

"Conditions are changing, and men and women are changing with them. But I hate to see her go, the woman of the Old South. Before she is entirely gone, before her presence fades from the earth and the luster of her name be committed to the golden urn of history and story, poetry and song, music and art, morituri salutamus-"We, who are about to salute you," queen of your sex and the glory of your race."

The million dollar libel suit filed by Henry Ford against the Chicago Tribune, came to a close last week, when the jury trying the case rendered a verdict, giving the plaintiff judgment in the sum of six cents. Both sides expressed themselves as pleased with the verdict, which stamps the jury as one without a precedent-both litigants are satisfied. Contrary to what would have been the case, had the case been tried in Texas, the cost is correspondingly light. Under a Michigan law it is said, where there is a nominal verdict under \$50, the successful party cannot recover costs above a like amount. Wonder how much the costs would have been had this case been tried in Texas? Perhaps to remedy such is the court reforms designated by those who have been asking reforms of the courts for years

BRUTAL MAJORITIES BREED CORRUPTION

Good is bound to come through the agitation of a return to democratic principles, now being agitated in Texas, started by ex-Senator Bailey. Even Me-Too Ferguson will work some weal to the common good. The move ment inaugurated by Senator Bailey will serve to put the leaders of the democratic party on notice that the rank and file will not blindly swallow any doctrine that may be prescribed just because it has the democratic label. There be those who will insist on an analysis of the contents of the package before they take it into their political system.

The proposition of those who are suporting Senator Bailey's views is to work within the party. This is the proper spirit. No units in the democratic party of Texas have a better right to the party name than those who think along the lines outlined by the exsenator, for they were the ones who established the party in Texas, and they and those who came after learned in the same school.

But the good will come from the determination of those who are democrats and can tell the reason why. They will work for the elimination of many of the isms that has crept into the party's creed, and because it bears the label, many take it as unadulterated medicine. But there is another angle of party politics in Texas. Me-Too Ferguson has jumped the fence and taken his bunch of mavericks out of the fold. Were it possible that the deflection could be taken seriously it too, would mean much to the purity of politics in Texas. The democratic party has had unlimited sway in this state for such a long period, that corruption in administration affairs is becoming notorious. If Ferguson could muster enough strength to give the party a close call, it would be one of the best things that could happen. Were republicans strong enough to elect a state ticket in the event Ferguson and his crew could approximately evenly divide the party, and elect their ticket one time in Texas, the people could look for an era of cleaner politics in the Lone Star State, and a more economical administration of the state govern-Brutal majorities breed corruption, even among democrats.

The opposition to democracy in Texas has been so insignificant in the past to command no respect, and very little notice. Should there be a breach in the democratic ranks, and the republicans once get in control, it would cause the leaders of the party stop and think somethin gthey have not done in the pasttwenty years. Anything would do, so long as the candidate represented a popular measure, regardless of the fact whether that measure was good democracy, or stood for economical administration.

Of course, should the republicans win their tenure of office would be one term affair, as the democrats then would begin to think, and perfect a reorganization along safe and sane lines of economy, and again put representatives of the people in power. Unfortunately little hope can be expected for the cleansing of the party, and the administration of the state through republican ascendency to power, for Ferguson is a pee wee, and cannot turn the trick.

President Wilson has again vetoed the law repealing daylight saving. His reasons stated that he "reluctantly returned the measure without his approval on account of the pressing need of the country for production by industry, yet recognizing the considerable inconvenience which the daylight saving law subjects the farmers." This new fangled and non-sensical idea has been relegated to the scrap heap, as both branches of congress. has repealed the law, passing it over the President's veto. 

Garbage Must Be Placed In Covered Receptacles

Chief Hitson is going after those who violate the sanitary ordinances, but as all have been very lax in observing the snitary code, it is deemed advisable to give some warning be fore applying the penalties. The following is the warning, and those who fail to comply with the provisions of the ordinance will feel the heavy hand of the law:

"Your attention is hereby called to Article 220 in the Revised ordinance of the city of Cisco requiring the occupants of all buildings within the corporate limits of the city of Cisco, shall at all times, keep in a place convenient for, and accessable to the employe of the city of Cisco, whose duty it is, or shall be made, to gather, remove and dispose of garbage, refuse and trash, a covered receptacle,in which shall be placed and put all garbage, refuse nd empty cans.

Article No. 225. Any person violating any provisions of this chapter shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction there of, shall be punished by fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$50. This ordinance is in effect now,

but after September 1st we are go ing to give this matter very close and strict attention.

DYNAMITERS ATTEMPT TO BLOW UP CAMP

Chief of Police Hittson and Patrollman Stamps Arrest Taylor, Carlise and Williams; Released Under \$1,000 Bail to Grand Jury.

Sunday Mr. McCutcheon, of the construction department of the Cisco Northern Railway company came into town and reported that some parties were molesting the negroes employed in the construction work of his camp, and requested that officers be detailed to apprehend them. A night or two previous some one had fired shots into the house in which some of the employes were sleeping, and Saturday night a stick of dynamite had been thrown into one of the negroe's tents, around which was wrapped a crudely hand printed warning for the negroes to leave camp.

Chief Hittson and Patrollman Stamps were detailed for the job, and Sunday night succeeded in getting a clew to parties implicated, and by some pretty nice detective work had rounded up three of those alleged to be the ring leaders of these would-be toughs, who were arraigned before Judge Taylor, where they were bound over to the grand jury in the sum of \$1,000 each. Their examining trial was set for last Monday, but the defendants waived, and their cases will be investigated at the next regular term of the grand jury.

Chief Hittson says he has the goods on the young toughs, who were seeking some notoriety, evidently, as there was no moral or industrial issue involved, and the negroes are doing work that is badly needed, and which it is impossible to get white men to perform.

Messrs. Hittson and Stamps arrested three whose names are Taylor, Joe Carlisle and Bob Williams. When they are finished with this job of being tough, it is believed they will be content to be law abiding citizens, and will be lucky if

they escape penitentiary sentences.

Heretofore this method of intimidating laborers has been put through, and the perpetrators got away with it, but the officers say it is time to call a halt, and these would-be toughs will be vigorously prosecuted.

The Centenary Commission of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has announced its plan for collecting the \$53,000,000.00 which was pledged: in the recent eight-day drive. The treasurer and the director of the department of finance for the Centenary

"Our slogan is no shrinkage, but an increase," said Colonel Edgerton recently. An Extensive Organization.

The organization through which these pledges will be collected has four centers of responsibility. The first is a general finance commission with headquarters at Nashville, headed by Colonel Edgerton. This commis sion has prepared the standard plan and will direct the entire movement. handing down to the various bodies throughout the church detailed plans for their guidance.

There will also be a conference cab inet in each annual conference of the church, about forty in number. Twenty Thousand Churches.

In each of the 20,000 local churches there will be local cabinets composed of the pastor, the centenary treas urer, the campaign director, the lar leader, the chairman of the minute men, the Sunday school superintendent and the president of the Woman's Micsionary Society. This cabinet will do all the actual work of collecting the individual pledges.

The persons who made subscrip tions will be divided into lists of twenty-five and the lists will be placed in charge of a certain member, of the church cabinet who will collect

One feature of the standard plan is that the local church will be respons sible for collecting the full amount of its subscription. If any subscriber dies or meets with misfertune such as to render it impossible for him to pay his pledge, it will be the duty of the church cabinet to secure another person to take the place of the one thus become delinquent.

It is also proposed that every new member who comes into the church shall also be asked to make a contribution to the Centenary fund.

The Centenary fund of \$35,000,000 will be used for the church in an ex throughout the world. Several million will be spent in the devastated re gions' of France, Belgium, Poland and Russia. Other millions will so to the seven foreign fields codupled by church-Mexico, Brazil, John, Afri China, Japan and Korea. 
