## COUNTRY CLUB ORGANIZATION PLANS MATURE

### Will Form Club Soon—Project To Cost \$50,000

## LIMITED MEMBERSHIP All Customary Conveniences Are Included In Broad Plans

Plans for an immediate organization of the Cisco Country Club, with a membership limited to 300, have practically matured. At a meeting of interested citizens at the Elks club Tuesday night, it was voted that the club could be organized and opportunity to join will be given within the week.

The club house, grounds, private road and recreation features will cost \$50,000.

The site overlooks Lake Bernie, and is to include every feature of such a location, including an 18-hole golf course. Golf fans who have seen the site say it offers one of the best possibilities in the country.

A committee of 15 has been selected by the original committee, which will be assigned a certain number of member prospects who will be called on for securing applications. It is believed the memberships will be completed within a week. Only 300 members will be admitted. After that, a waiting list will be created, and admission to the club will only be possible in the event of an original member wishing to dispose of his membership interest.

The memberships have been placed at \$200 for residents of Cisco and \$100 for non-residents. Non-residents have all the club privileges, but have no vote, and their membership cannot be transferred. The matter of dues is yet to be fixed.

As soon as the membership has reached a certain point, an organization is to be perfected, and officers elected.

Chas. M. Gibson has drawn up a set of suggestive plans for the club house which are very complete as to facilities provided. In addition to an assembly room, where social functions will be held, provisions are made for billiard rooms, dressing rooms, kitchen, lounge rooms, shower baths and club requirements. The building proposed is of the bungalow type and is to be built of native stone, which will be picked up on the club site. The interior of the assembly room will be left in the natural stone.

The site selected for the country club overlooks Lake Bernie and is a natural location for a recreation ground. On a high hill the great lake spreads out, with a background of hills in every direction. To the rear of the proposed club is a rolling piece of ground that is ideal for golf. The promoters of the club propose to lay out a course of nine holes at least. It is possible an 18-hole course will be built. Tennis courts are also proposed.

With the close proximity of the Dothan road, a highway into the club grounds can be built at very small expense and the paved road Eastland county will be within half a mile of the club site. Part of the program of the club is to build a private road into the grounds and up to the club site.

The plans so far call for a club house that will cost about \$25,000. Furnishing will be additional. Nor does this include the cost of the road and the recreation features. A boat house with splendid boats, and a lodge for the ground keeper and housekeeper are also to be features. Complete, the investment will be close to \$50,000.

## HOLCOMB TO BUILD \$100,000 STRUCTURE

### Owners of Sixth and Main Site Said To Be Planning Building Of An Elaborate Character

According to J. M. Williamson, mayor, Cowan Holcomb and his mother, Mrs. M. E. Holcomb, have announced their final intentions of building a three-story building at Sixth and Main, to cost \$100,000.

The building would be an elaborate affair with foundation to accommodate eight or ten stories, according to the mayor, as demanded by business.

The Holcombs, it is said, were undecided for a time as to the amount to be expended on the building. The old Holcomb building is being torn down but it is not known how soon work will begin on the new structure.

## BIG DEPARTMENT STORE WOULD LOCATE IN CISCO

A big department store would locate in Cisco according to W. A. Downing, secretary of the chamber of commerce if suitable location can be obtained.

Downing says the department store firm has branches over the southwest and that an attempt will be made to induce local men to build for the purpose Cisco branch. The branch would require two floors of a building, with ample floor space.

## Cisco Bank Deposits Smash Records With Three Million Total

All records for bank deposit totals in the history of Cisco were smashed late this week when statements made public by the four banks at the call of the state comptroller revealed that deposits total \$3,178,257.69.

Aside from adding another laurel to the record of Cisco in civic advancement the bank deposit total keeps the city in the forefront with all other cities of the oil district. The largest total bank deposits formerly recorded by the four Cisco banks was last fall with an approximate \$2,500,000.

## JUDIA SELLS HOME FOR ELK CLUB SITE

### Downtown Lot Sold For \$17,500 to Elks Who Plan Clubhouse Home to Cost \$100,000

Among the several deals consummated this week by G. H. Judia, extensive owner of local property, was the sale of his residence property at Fifth and Avenue E to the Cisco Elks' lodge for the consideration of \$17,500.

On this site, considered one of the most valuable in the city, the Elks propose to build a three-story home for their members, to cost between \$75,000 and \$100,000, according to officers of the lodge.

Elks feel they could not obtain a better site for the clubhouse, since the Judia residence is located practically at the edge of the business district and is convenient to both railroads. The site is held in trust for the Elks by B. S. Huey, Walter Ray and W. E. Morris and the Elks are already laying plans for the clubhouse.

The lot purchased by the Elks measures 115 by 125 feet and although the Elks plan to rent out the lower floor in storerooms the two upper floors will be equipped in every detail to provide the most up-to-date and modern club accommodations.

During the week Judia bought the half interest in the Judia building held by J. A. Lauderdale and is now full owner of the structure. The attempt of Tom Harrell of Eastland to buy a half interest in the Judia theater is said to have failed.

In view of the recent transactions and near transactions it is interesting to note that Judia is said to have offered his entire holdings in Cisco for \$5,000, a year ago. He now holds 100 acres south of the city for a sale price of \$50,000 and has disposed of considerable other property at a profit.

## May Round Out 25th Year of Continuous Service To Rebekahs

Mrs. J. D. Alexander of this city, for the past 24 years secretary of the state assembly of Rebekahs, will in all probability fill the office for the 1920-1921 term and round out a quarter of century of service to the Rebekahs it was indicated this week.

Aside from being a Cisco pioneer and prominent here Mrs. Alexander is one of Texas influential and prominent women and for the past 24 years every charter for a Rebekah lodge in the state has been issued from this city, by virtue of which, Cisco has been well advertised.

When Mrs. Alexander first assumed the office there were 2,200 members in Rebekah lodge of Texas. At one time however the membership had mounted to 22,000 in 480 different chapters but now hovers close to the 18,000 mark.

In addition to her Rebekah duties Mrs. Alexander is a charter member of the American Anthropological society, member and past president of the Texas Women's Press Association, member of the Dramatic Mirror club of New York and a member of the American Pen Women of Washington, D. C.

## JUDIA PLANS BUILDING MODERN PLEASURE PARK

G. H. Judia announces he is to build in the near future in the Southside addition, a recreation park, at a cost of approximately \$50,000, to cover an entire city block.

It is the plan at present to include in the park, a natatorium, dance pavilion and skating rink and provide other forms of amusement for Cisco citizens. The natatorium, it is said, is to be modeled to a certain degree after "The Cascade" at Dallas. Judia plans to have his park ready for patronage by spring.

## DEMOCRATS ARE ENLISTING FOR HARD CAMPAIGN

### G. Fisk, Chairman For Eastland County, Warns Party.

## WOMEN TO HAVE VOTE Ask True Blue Democrats to Stand Pat Against Attacks

That the democratic party considers a vote in the coming election worth at least \$1.75, the poll tax, because of the premium on votes in face of the recent party split and opposition from various quarters, is evidenced not only by the Eastland county democrats' newspapers throughout the state are calling loudly upon democrats for prompt compliance with the poll tax regulations and the democrats of this county are not deaf to the warnings.

The democrats of the county are actively organizing for the approaching campaign, their strength is being maintained for what is considered by some as one of the most important elections in the history of the country and indications are that despite the national split of the party, democrats of Eastland county will stand together in what threatens to develop a crisis for their faith.

In an appeal for loyalty in the cause, G. Fisk, chairman of the democratic party of Eastland county, requests that all democrats pay their poll taxes and arm themselves with receipt for same that the entire democratic strength of the county be prepared for the coming elections at which he calls attention to the fact, so many important officials are to be elected to office.

As assistants in the work of organizing the county for the approaching campaign Fisk has appointed the following: Cisco, Mrs. J. H. Garner and R. W. Mancill; Eastland, Mrs. H. P. Breiford and C. B. Frost; Ranger, Mrs. M. H. Smith and Howard Gholson; Gorman, Mrs. E. W. Kimble and W. O. Russell; Rising Star, Mrs. D. E. Jones and F. W. Roberts; Carbon, Mrs. W. C. Gorman and William Stubbfield; Scanton, Mrs. W. B. Morton and W. E. Bradshaw; Dothan, Mrs. Jack Pippin and G. L. Huestis; Nimrod, Mrs. C. W. Hoek and W. N. Compton; Romney, W. L. Brogdon.

County Chairman Fisk has requested in a general letter sent to democrats throughout the county that those selected as assistants call public meetings in the near future for the purpose of organizing their respective districts. The special purpose of preparations for organizations is to form the "true blue" democrats in solid ranks against the attacks of other parties and split members of the democratic party.

Fisk calls attention in his letter to the fact that women will be allowed the vote in the primaries of July but the ladies will be required to have a poll tax receipt and exemption certificate to partake in conventions and elections, according to rulings of the attorney general of Texas. According to Fisk the right of women to vote is to be challenged during the state campaign in July and for this reason it is especially desired that they be equipped with poll tax receipts.

Although women will not be allowed to vote in November, for candidates for president and vice-president, they may take part in June, when delegates are selected to nominate the democratic candidates.

## SCHOOL HEAD ENTERS COUNTY OFFICE RACE

### Udala Howard, County Superintendent of Schools, Announces Candidacy For Re-election to Office.

In a letter received this week by The Round-Up, Udala Howard, county superintendent of schools, announces her candidacy for re-election.

Miss Howard states that in her first term of office she has attempted, by her work, to show appreciation of her support in the first campaign and states that if re-elected she feels she will be better fitted, by experience, to render efficient service in her capacity and promises to put forth the utmost endeavor in this direction.

No candidate has been announced in opposition to Miss Howard.

## Purse And Contents Worth \$700, Lost A Year Ago, Is Found

A small purse containing jewels said to be worth \$700 was lost last July or August in Cisco. The loss was reported in the Round-Up at that time, but for some reason or other no one seems to remember the loser or the date of the loss.

## STRATA AT DAMSITE IS FOUND ADEQUATE

### Tests With Diamond Core Bit Convince Officials That Selected Site Will Serve Purpose

That the site selected for the dam planned by the city at Lake Bernie pending success of the \$500,000 bond election on February 22, will prove entirely adequate for the purpose without the expensive grouting process was the conclusion reached at the end of the first sounding experiment, concluded early this week, although engineers have not finally passed upon the location.

The strata at the damsite was tested to a depth of 50 feet with a diamond core bit, a revolving instrument with diamond teeth that cuts through the hardest of mineral material.

After passing through seven feet of soil the bit then passed through six feet of hard lime rock. After the hard lime three feet of soft lime was encountered and thence down to 41 feet a gray sandstone was the formation. After the sandstone came two feet of flint and the last seven feet was compact soapstone.

None of the formation was found to be porous in nature and Pater Douchett, of Chicago who operated the bit, and city officials, concluded that any and all of the formation will completely resist the water pressure to result from the impounding reservoir.

Mayor Williamson stated the dam foundation will probably be set on the hard limestone. The dam is planned to rise 125 feet high and the lake, a mile wide in places will be nearly two miles long and cover nearly 1,000 acres. The absence of a pronounced "fault" in the strata at the damsite removes one of the original cares incident to such a project according to officials who say a number of additional tests are yet to be made.

## WOMEN WILL VOTE IN NEXT ELECTION

### With Ratification of Federal Amendment Texas Women Will Have First Chance to Vote for President

In notice being sent broadcast throughout the state the Texas League of Women Voters comments in part as follows on the possible opportunities of women with the vote in the coming elections and appeal to the women of Texas to pay the poll tax early and get into politics:

The women of Texas will have, in all probability, their first opportunity to vote for president in 1920. That is, those of them who will pay their poll tax and enfranchise themselves. Ratification of the federal amendment is entirely probable—almost certain; and with the ratification will come full suffrage.

This will be a most important election year. A new president, a new governor and many new state and county officials are to be chosen and a most important constitutional amendment is to be voted upon in November; in all of which the women, as citizens, have a deep interest.

The test of the sentiment of the women of the state comes this month. Last year there was no payment for the privilege of voting; this year there must be. The opponents of equal suffrage have asserted that the women will not pay their money to vote. The poll tax was originally adopted for the purpose of keeping down a certain percentage of what was deemed an undesirable vote; and the antis placed the women's vote in that same category.

## CHAMBER REJECTS AIR SERVICE PLAN

### Scheme to Furnish Cisco and Eastland With Airplane Service Turned Down by Director Board

A proposition whereby Eastland and Cisco would benefit by a fast schedule inter-city airplane service carrying either freight or passengers, made to representatives of the two cities by an ex-army captain of the air service, was rejected by the directors of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce at their regular meeting Tuesday night at the city hall.

The aviator proposed to install and operate the service for the company to be incorporated at \$10,000, Eastland and Cisco each to subscribe \$5,000. He proposed to maintain one plane at each city; Eastland men raised that city's quota in 30 minutes, it is said.

The principal reason directors of the chamber of commerce rejected the proposal is due to the fact the same man attempted some time ago to organize a million dollar corporation here and the directors evidenced a lack of faith in the business.

## ELKS MEET FRIDAY NIGHT FOR IMPORTANT BUSINESS

One of the most important meetings of the local Elks lodge in its history is scheduled for Friday night, according to Exalted Ruler N. F. Payne. A matter of vital concern to the organization is to be discussed and the men who have been active in the organization of the lodge are urging a full attendance.

## SUSPICIONED I. W. W. ARE ARRESTED HERE

### Martin Powell, I. W. W. Organizer and Edward Hooper Taken to Abilene As Government Prisoner

Any attempt that may have been brewing for an invasion into that portion of the oil fields adjacent to Cisco, I. W. W. organizer, was nipped in the bud this week when Martin Powell and Edward Hooper, held here for the past week, were taken to Abilene where they were confined as federal prisoners.

Powell, identified as an I. W. W. organizer by his card according to Chief Hinton of the police department, was fined \$50 and costs in the municipal court on a charge of vagrancy and disturbing the peace. He was arrested near the Texas and Pacific station while cursing loudly in public at the high price he alleged were charged him for a meal. Powell's official I. W. W. number, according to his card, is 188577.

Hooper, a Bohemian, refused to admit affiliation with the Industrial Workers of the World. He was being held for investigation on a charge of vagrancy and upon close questioning by a representative of the U. S. department of justice branch at Fort Worth, admitted being a fugitive from justice.

Local officers believe Hooper has escaped from a federal prison and although he refused to tell his story he promised to "spill the beans" regarding his past upon arrival in Abilene. Officers believe the visit of Powell, at least, signified an attempt at invasion of Cisco by the I. W. W.

## CISCO BANK RAISES STOCK 200 PER CENT

### Stockholders of Cisco Banking Company Vote Unanimously Increase From \$50,000 to \$150,000.

At the annual meeting of stockholders in the Cisco Banking Company, held Tuesday night in the Cisco Banking Company building, it was unanimously voted to increase the capital stock of the bank from \$50,000 to \$150,000 because of the great demand of increased business.

Officials of the bank feel that this is one of the most optimistic predictions for the future of Cisco in history of the city, since the vote was a testimonial of faith of the stockholders in the city's future.

The stockholders elected as officers for the ensuing year: R. Q. Lee, president; P. C. O'Laughlin and B. W. Patterson as vice-presidents; G. D. Ward as cashier, and J. W. Mancill as assistant cashier. R. Q. Lee, G. D. Ward, J. W. Mancill, P. C. O'Laughlin, W. B. Patterson, J. A. Lauderdale and R. W. Mancill were elected to the board of directors.

The statement of the past year's work, rendered by the officers, showed that the bank had done a successful business in 1919.

## Bank Deposits Slump At Christmas But Now Total Usual 3 Million

Cisco, of late, has been modestly brooding around three million dollars in the vaults of the city banks. But a curious thing happened along about Yuletide which has set economic "sharks" thinking. The deposits began to drop down until there were only two and a half million dollars left on the 31st of December last.

Some say it was due to a settlement of annual accounts, some say it was an indication of an unusually generous Christmas. Whether this was followed by a New Year's resolution or not will probably never be known. But one day this week the three million had returned to the fold. Where they have been in the interim bankers would like to know.

## TWENTY BIRTHS AND SIX DEATHS DURING DECEMBER

During the month of December there were 20 births and six deaths in Eastland county, according to the records of the county clerk's office at Eastland. Nineteen marriage licenses were issued during the week ending January 16, one of which was issued to E. D. Dodge and Miss C. M. Oden, of Cisco.

## DEPUTY TAX COLLECTOR TO MAKE FINAL VISIT

According to an announcement by Tom Harrell of Eastland, county tax collector, a deputy collector will be in Cisco January 22, 23 and 24 for the purpose of collecting county taxes. He will make his headquarters at the American National Bank. It is said the visit of the deputy will give Ciscoans their last chance to pay county taxes.

## FIRST ENGINE FOR NEW ROAD ARRIVES HERE

### Cisco & Northeastern, No. 1, Oil Burner, Has Arrived

## TO HELP BUILD ROAD When Line Is Completed To Leeray Engine To Pull Passengers

What is considered to be the most pronounced indication of possible early operation of the Cisco & Northeastern railroad made its appearance early this week in the form of the first engine for the new road, C. & N. E. No. 1, which arrived from the Schenectady, New York, branch of the American Locomotive Works.

The new engine, an oil burner, is to be put to work at once. According to R. Q. Lee, president of the road, it will be used to help with construction of the road to Leeray. When the line is completed to Leeray the engine will be transferred to passenger duty and the road will then be in operation.

Equipment for the first passenger train for the road will be borrowed from the Texas and Pacific according to President Lee, who says he has made arrangements with T. & P. officials for the necessary cars until C. & N. E. equipment arrives. Officials of the local road have informed J. Q. Frickett, engineer who is to be at the throttle of the first locomotive on its first run, to report for duty at once.

## INSPECT TRAFFIC FOR TEXAS FIELDS

### H. F. Holden, Working Under Hines' Says Conditions Will Bear Remedy in Some Places

Working directly under supervision of Walker D. Hines, director general of the railroad administration, H. F. Holden, general traffic manager for the Kansas City Southern railroad, arrived in Cisco Thursday afternoon on his tour of investigation of traffic conditions in Texas oil fields.

Holden was received by a delegation consisting of Mayor Williamson, President Morris and Secretary Walter Downing of the chamber of commerce, William Hastings of the local tank works and representatives of the Round-Up. When the railroad visitor inquired as to railroad service for Cisco several of the party produced bills of lading and enumerated some grievances to the surprise of Holden who stated he was under the impression that Cisco was obtaining good service.

Holden would make no statement other than "it is a very busy district" and when asked if judging from what he had seen would not conditions bear remedying replied that they will "at some places." Holden left Cisco in his special car at 4:50 Thursday afternoon. He was assigned to the tour by Director Hines after W. G. McAdoe had departed from Wichita Falls, the railroad service to the oil district.

**MASS MEETING IN DALLAS TO BENEFIT COTTON GROWER**

Dallas—A mass meeting in the interest of cotton growers will be held in Dallas at the city hall auditorium on January 27 under the call of the Texas division of the American Cotton Association. It is the purpose of the meeting to perfect the Texas organization, which has been working under a temporary directorate formed by the board of directors.

**TEXAS COMPANY WILL  
BUILD STORAGE HERE**

G. N. Scott, Head of Producing De-  
partment, on Periodical Visit, Tells  
of Cisco Plans of Texas Firm.

"A year and a half ago we picked  
Cisco for our producing department  
division headquarters of our North  
Central Texas division, because we be-  
lieved it afforded the best location in  
this north central Texas district in  
every sense of the word, and we have  
had no occasion to regret our selec-  
tion."

That in substance was the result of  
an interview granted by G. N. Scott,  
general manager of the producing de-  
partment of The Texas Company, with  
offices in Houston, to a representative  
of the Round-Up.

Mr. Scott made the statement that  
his company does not contemplate any  
reduction in its extensive drilling and  
producing operations in this north cen-  
tral Texas division, but that it will no  
doubt continue to function on the same  
extensive but nevertheless conserva-  
tive basis that it has in the past sev-  
eral months.

Some months ago The Texas Com-  
pany acquired a tract of land near the  
western city limits of Cisco between  
the Katy and T. & P. tracks, its in-  
tention being to use this property for  
its warehouses, machinery repair shops  
and for storage purposes generally.

The company now is about to start  
the construction of one warehouse,  
with pipe racks and other storage  
facilities on this property, and will  
have spurs from both the Katy and  
T. & P., and this work should be com-  
pleted within the next two or three  
months. Later on additional ware-  
houses and machine shops will un-  
doubtedly be built and these facilities  
will be used as a center of distribution  
for its machinery equipment and sup-  
plies used in this division.

When questioned concerning the  
possibilities of oil and gas production  
in the field adjacent to Cisco, Mr.  
Scott stated in substance that there  
had not been sufficient development in  
this immediate territory to prove it up  
as either productive or non-productive  
and that only time can tell as to what  
there may be expected.

Scott and J. C. McCue, who is as-  
sistant general manager of the produc-  
ing department of The Texas Company,  
and A. C. Hunter, their secretary, are  
visiting division headquarters here on  
one of their periodical trips.

**Another Census Enumerator**  
Cisco has finally obtained another  
census enumerator for the purpose of  
counting the city's population since  
Mrs. E. E. Keane has agreed to be re-  
sponsible for the east side of the city.

**Says Law is Old Fashioned.**

Personally I would not applaud the  
violation of any law that means harm  
to an individual or a community. Per-  
sonally, I favor law enforcement, but  
it used to be law that if one failed to  
dot an 'i' or cross a 't' it violated such  
important instruments as deeds or  
mortgages or contracts, yet the courts  
of the country have long since seen  
the error of such decisions, and while  
statutes were written that made such  
omissions technical violations, they now  
have a new rule.

We have lived to see the time when  
men sent to the gallows were saved or  
hanged on the simple technical omis-  
sion of a word or a letter. But these  
are progressive days, and the rule of  
reason has been written by our courts.

I do not know how long ago it was  
that these Sunday closing laws were  
written, but I am told they were put  
on the statutes in Texas about the same  
time public officials were obliged to  
swear they had never fought a duel  
before they could take their official  
jobs. And who would not laugh in the  
presence of a court making a man  
swear that he had never fought a duel,  
before admitting him to serve as coun-  
ty superintendent of schools or register  
of deeds.

Yet there are some in this progres-  
sive day and age who insist that because  
a Sunday law is on the statute books  
it should be enforced to the letter in  
Cisco. It is a mooted question, of  
course, and I presume that when a  
man is in Rome he should do as Rome  
does. But I rather resent legislation  
that was designed to make a man go to  
church. And that is the only reason I  
can see for such a law. The law is so  
unpopular in nearly every city in the  
state of Texas that it is non-enforceable.  
Only recently, a bunch of preachers  
called on the county officials of Tarrant  
county and told them they wanted the  
theaters closed there on Sunday and the  
officials promptly told them that it  
wasn't public policy. This is true in  
Dallas, in Waco, San Antonio, Houston,  
Galveston and every other large point  
in the state. It is only in the rural  
communities where minority rules and  
blue laws prevail.

Personally I have no fight on the  
churches. It is my humble opinion  
that in a city of 12,000 population,  
where they are only able to attract an  
attendance gross in all the churches of  
less than 1,000 average each Sunday,  
they have something fundamentally  
wrong inside their own house, and it  
must first be put in order. But I do  
not believe they can legislate people  
into attending.

Is it possible that the preachers fear  
competition? They seem to be the  
chief mourners everywhere over the  
Sunday closing.

There are some ten or twelve thous-  
and people in Cisco who do not attend  
church. Isn't it possible they prefer  
some other place to spend Sunday?  
Have they no voice in the affairs of  
the community?

It seems to me that since the progress  
of cities of the state of Texas has reach-  
ed a point where they can set aside  
an obnoxious law by common consent,  
Cisco should catch step with the pro-  
gression. Or is this to be a jay town?

I like Cisco, but I don't like the Sun-  
day closing law, nor do many hundreds  
who I find attending the only theater  
here that has had the nerve to give  
the people what they want. Signed: A

**Cisco and the Sunday Law.**

On the seventh page of last week's  
Round-Up appeared an article under the  
caption, "Sunday Closing Law  
Gains Unpopularity". The article is  
unsigned, which would indicate that it  
is the product of the editor or some one  
who speaks officially for the editorial  
policy of the paper.

As a subscriber to the Round-Up,  
both weekly and daily, I am writing to  
say a few things in utmost good will  
toward all and ill will toward none.

In the article under review the writer  
uses the following words: "It is the  
public that makes the laws." Then  
the contention is set out that the public  
wants the Sunday law broken with the  
assumption that, therefore the Sunday  
laws have really been repealed, and that  
it is the proper thing to do to go on  
in disregard of said laws. This is  
strange language to be used by one so  
well informed as is the editor of the  
Round-Up. Surely the editor knows  
that it is the legislature and not the  
populace, that makes the law. He  
knows, also, that where a law is made  
by the legislature it cannot be repeal-  
ed except by the legislature. Even the  
supreme court of the state or of the  
United States cannot set it aside unless  
it be found in contravention of the or-  
ganic law.

Now the editor not only knows this,  
but he knows that the Sunday laws  
have been passed upon again and again  
by the courts, from the trial courts on  
up through the higher and highest  
courts, and that they have won out  
completely as being constitutional and  
in harmony with public policy. So,

when any man advocates the violation  
of the Sunday laws, he thereby sets  
himself up against the legislature,  
against the trial courts, the appellate  
courts, against the highest courts of  
the land, and against public policy.

I do not charge that all who advocate  
the violation of Sunday laws are bolshe-  
vists and anarchists, but I do say that  
every anarchist and bolshevist favors  
the violation of the three laws, and I  
do say that whoever wilfully and mal-  
iciously violates the Sunday laws, there-  
by lines himself up with bolshevists  
and anarchists.

Now, it is not a fact that the people  
of Cisco are law-breakers or that they  
want the law violated—I resent the in-  
sultation. It has been only a short  
time since an audience of three thou-  
sand persons declared by unanimous  
vote, at a great gathering on the corner  
of Avenue E and Seventh street, that  
they were opposed to Sunday shows  
and other forms of Sabbath violation.

sell, barter, or permit his place of busi-

open for the purpose of traffic or public

amusement on Sunday, shall be fined  
not less than twenty nor more than  
fifty dollars. The term place of amuse-  
ment, shall be construed to mean circus-  
es, theaters, variety theaters and such  
other amusements as are exhibited and  
for which an admission fee is charged."  
—Article No. 302, Penal Code of Texas.  
For some of these offenses the penalty  
may be increased for repetition of the

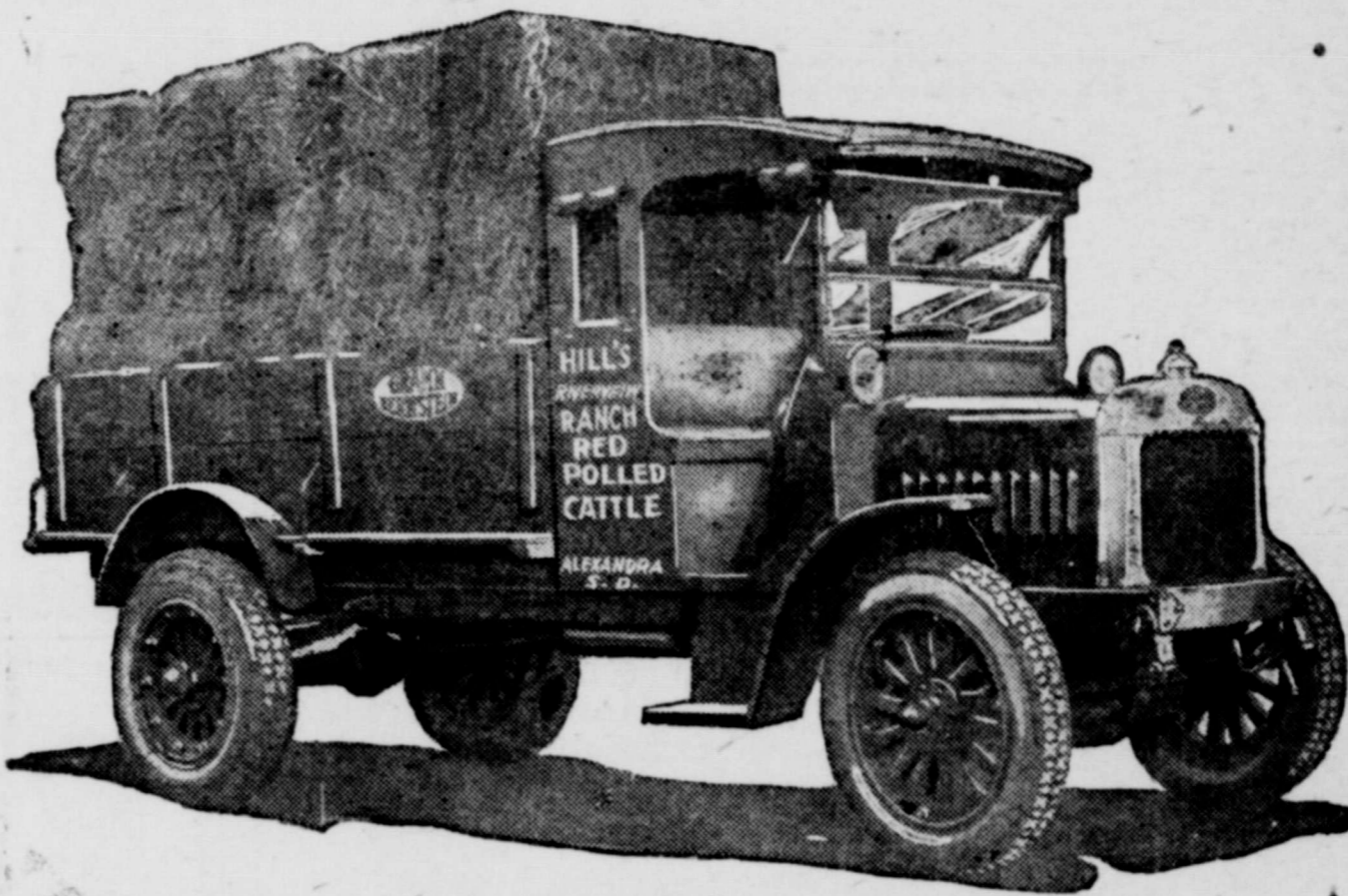

### INSURANCE FIGURES PROVE SATISFACTORY

Mayor Williamson Avers Cisco Record for Past Year is Envyable—Loss of \$1 to 332 in Premiums.

For every \$32 paid in for insurance in the City of Cisco during 1919 there was in proportion but \$1 in loss from various causes for which insurance is carried according to a compilation by M. Williamson, mayor, which is forwarded to underwriters to be used in setting the rate for Cisco.

Firms and individuals here carried during the past year, an approximate \$20,000,000 worth of insurance with the various companies that have agents in Cisco according to the report, which excludes many firms that carry their insurance with eastern companies direct, not handled through a local agent.

On this amount \$54,289.22 were paid in as premiums and the total losses amounted to but \$1,708.43. In the opinion of Mayor Williamson this record is enviable and the city will experience little difficulty in obtaining a rate of a very reasonable character.

Printed schedules were used in the taking of the United States census for the first time in 1890. Previously, the enumerators had used such paper as they happened to possess.

### Cisco Barbers Have Suspicion That Some Of Their Customers 'Swore Off' Shaves And Hair Cuts Along With Other Luxuries

"There's a lot 'o fellows in Cisco that swore off shaves and hair cuts on New Year day or else they blew themselves on Christmas and are broke now."

That was the statement of one of the artists in a local barber shop as he lamented this week to a customer, the fact that business has suffered a considerable slump, at least in his shop, since the first of the year.

"It's a fact," he continued, "and I never saw it fall yet. Business always slumps right after the first of the year. Why this week the best I will make is \$45. I hardly ever make less than \$60 a week and Christmas week I cleaned up \$75. Of course \$45 is good money but when one is used to something better it hurts to come down like that." Beyond a doubt the barber's feelings were injured at the slump in his trade which is evidence of the fact that others besides coal miners have financial troubles.

The barbers say that when the increased price in tonorial luxuries invaded Cisco the blow barely was felt to the business. They say that for a short time the safety razor business boomed and that a number of regular

customers acquired the shave-at-home habit.

But it didn't last long. In a short time all the old steadies were back in the enlambled swivel chairs and the barbers business stepped on to more business and better profits. In fact, said one barber, during the lull caused by high prices the increase in barber's rates made up for the loss in business so in reality the barbers suffered but little.

But that brings on the question of the barbering trade. Country-wide reports say young men no longer become interested in the barber trade and that the number found anxious to learn barbering decreases each year. In the bigger cities it is to be noticed that older men man the shavers almost entirely and that the young barber is a scarce article. The "tonorially posted" have no explanation for this, whether the greatly increased wages paid in a barber shop now over a few years ago do not compare to other lines or if young men find higher callings they cannot say.

But despite this fact barbers in Cisco do not appear to be scarce and they are apparently satisfied—except when they only make \$45 a week.

**EASTLAND PAPER COMMENDS WORK OF JUDGE E. A. HILL.**

The Oil Belt News of Eastland, in commenting on the activities of the Eastland country district court of the 88th district, commends the work of Judge E. A. Hill as follows:

Joe Burkett was appointed the first judge of the district, and he proved efficient, but soon private practice offered greater remuneration, so he resigned.

Judge Burkett was succeeded by E. A. Hill, who had served as county attorney, county judge and mayor of Eastland. Judge Hill had proven efficient and capable in all of these other positions and he is proving the same in this higher office. He is a native of Tennessee and came to Texas in 1884. His long residence here has endeared him to the people and they are glad to honor him with any office within their gift.

At the beginning of the fall term in September, there were nearly 1,000 cases on the docket. During the eight weeks court, about 100 cases were disposed of, but nearly 350 cases were filed on the appearance docket. Numerous criminal cases were also settled, but those grow faster than they can be settled. The result is going to be another new district court in Eastland county to care for the largely increased legal business, as it is now considered of greater magnitude than any other district in Texas.

**CASES FILED FAR EXCEED DISTRICT COURT CAPACITY**

The new district court, in session since January 5, has a legal docket on its hands that will not be easy to eliminate according to reports from Eastland which state there are more than 1,000 cases on file.

Despite the fact that the recent term of the court did away with more than 100 cases on the docket it is said that nearly 300 additional cases were filed during court and that the rate at which criminal cases are making their appearance far exceeds the capacity of the court.

For these reasons county officials are maintaining that criminal court is essential to the progress of the law in Eastland county representatives are to be asked to insist upon the creation of a county criminal court. This district, the 88th, is but eight months of age having been created to care for increased business brought about by growth of the community.

**Hard To Get Carriers.**

Mail carriers for Cisco are hard to get according to attaches of the post office who say the lone Cisco routes are difficult to handle. Inclement weather and location of the routes are said to have caused several carriers to resign.

**WILL BEGIN MOVING POLES INTO ALLEYS IN 30 DAYS.**

According to officials of both the Cisco Gas and Electric company, and the local branch of the Southwestern Telephone and Telegraph company, it is simply a matter of waiting on routine work before operations will be started on the removing of the electric light and telephone poles from Avenue D to the alleys.

P. W. Campbell of the electric light company says he is waiting on a grant of right of way by the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad, and intimated that his company would begin the removal of the power poles in the next 30 days.

L. C. Pope of the telephone company said that operations by his company probably would not start until after the installation of the new telephone exchange.

**T. & P. CONDUCTOR INJURED IN DERAILMENT NEAR CISCO**

J. D. Halsey, of Fort Worth, a freight conductor on the Texas & Pacific, was seriously, though not fatally injured Monday night when a freight train was derailed four miles west of Cisco. The injured man was brought to Cisco and taken to Fort Worth on the night train.

The train was derailed back of the engine, and eight cars jumped the track. Several cars of stock were in the train, but only one head was killed.

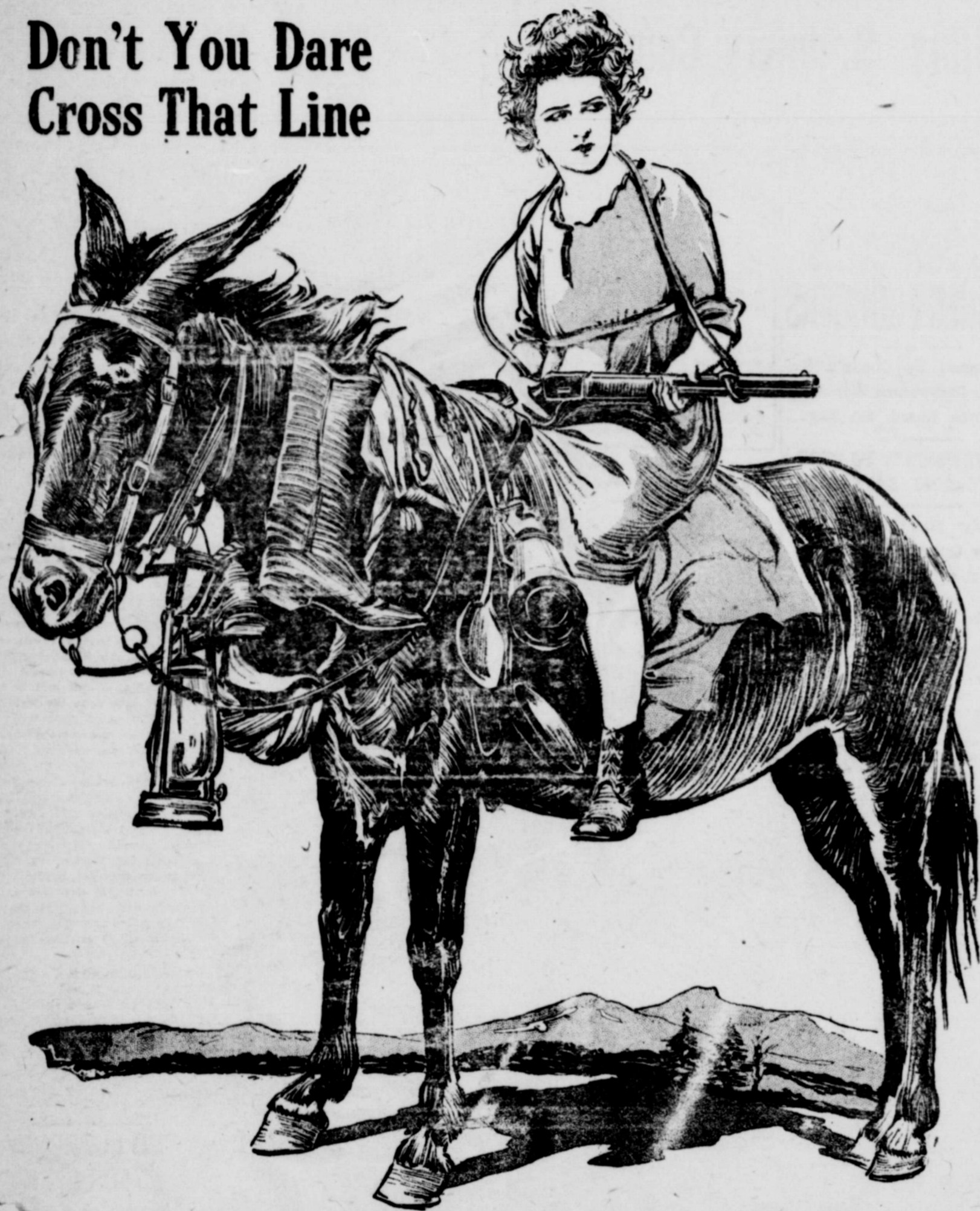

REPORT SHOWS A COTTON INCREASE FOR EASTLAND

According to the recent report of Sam L. Rogers, director of the bureau of the census, Washington, there were 11,758 bales of cotton ginned in Eastland county during the season of 1919 as compared with 3,725 for 1918. The preliminary report for the state shows 2,334,495 bales for 1919 and 2,417,875 bales for 1918.

KANE DECLARES HE IS POWERLESS TO CHECK GOUGERS Handicapped by Cooke's Refusal to Reorganize Wartime Fair-Price Board, He Says ATTORNEY'S DUTY TO STOP PROFITEERING, SAYS HEINZ Prosecutor 'Has No Time' to Answer Questions Concerning Action in Other Cities

With the housewives of this city clamoring for direct, vigorous action against the food gougers, whom they hold responsible for the undernourishment of their children, Francis J. Kane, United States district attorney, declared yesterday he was powerless to check profiteering. Mr. Kane complained he was being handicapped by the refusal of Cooke, formerly food administrator in Philadelphia, to reorganize the fair-price board. That of publicity, ought to be given to profiteers, he said. But Howard Heinz, attorney for Pennsylvania, said Mr. Kane on that point. Heinrich with the PUBLIC LEADER in Pittsburgh last night Mr. Heinz, although he was making every effort to have fair-price boards re-established that would not relieve the federal authorities from their duty to suppress profiteering. The district attorney said that the Lever food-control act would be ineffective in cases of profiteering as distinct from profiteering. He reiterated that it would be extremely difficult to prove violations. Mr. Kane acknowledges that prices are inordinately high, ignoring the price of meats, regarding which Robert M. Simmers, agent of the State Food and Dairy Department and government food and drug inspector, has given him a mass of evidence, he said, that "the price of green vegetables are terrible."

Great Quantities of Food Seized by Federal Agents in Big Cities

INDICATIONS of the real punch behind the high cost of living were given in a campaign to reduce quantities of foodstuffs by federal agents in big cities. While Attorney General Palmer's committee that he intended to place higher prices than those listed by word came from Chicago, St. Louis, and Philadelphia, quantities of foodstuffs by federal agents proceeded under the food control act. In Chicago 1282 tubs of butter, 284,180 pounds of coffee, wheat, and in Birmingham 100 barrels of flour.

**AMES ADDS MEMBERS TO CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.**

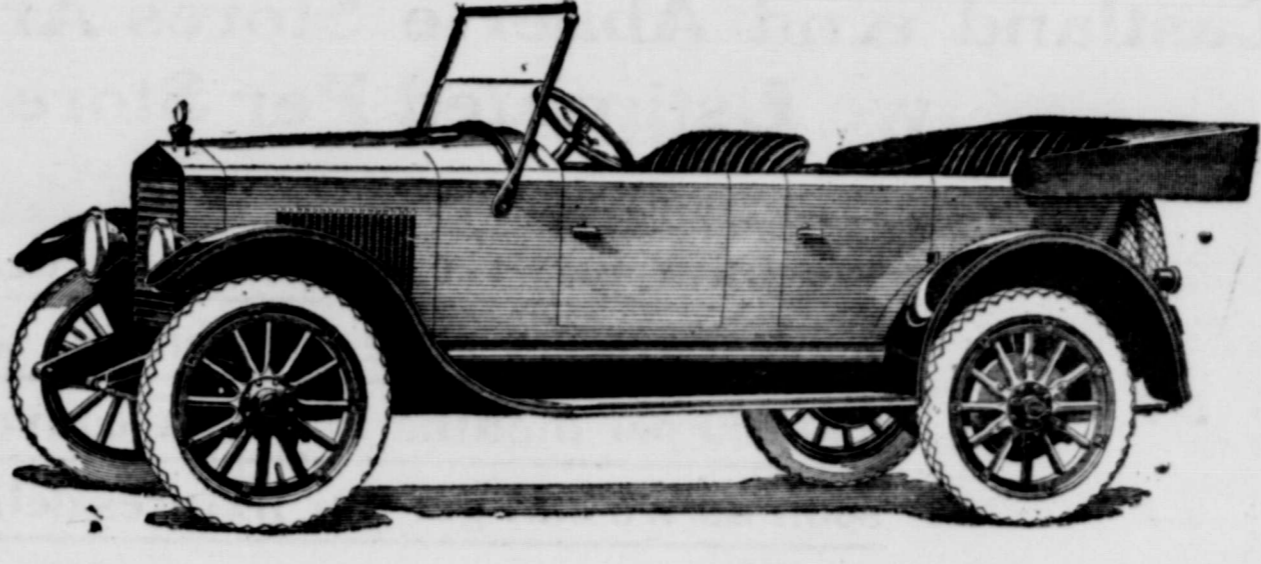
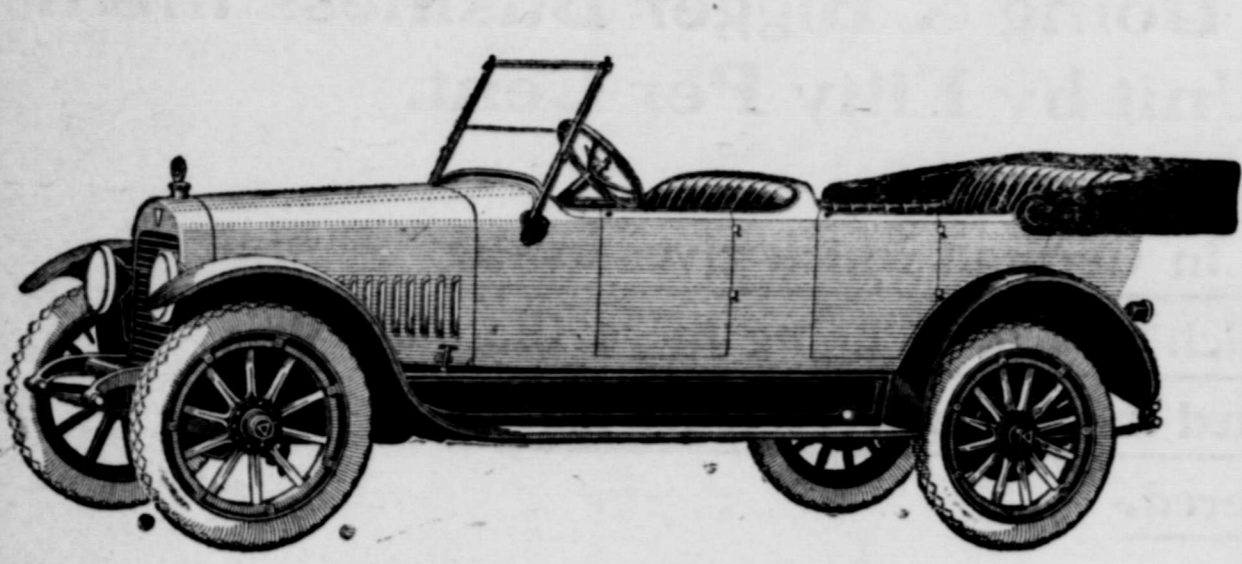

## A TRIBUTE to MAUD POWELL

All music-loving Americans mourn the recent death of Maud Powell, whose flawless playing delighted large audiences during her too brief career as one of our greatest violinists. She was born in Peru, Illinois, and began taking violin lessons when she was eight years old. Her first teacher was William Lewis, of Chicago, who, doubtless, because of her evident earnestness, took great interest in her. She described him as an "unfettered" player, without much refinement of technique, but extremely rugged. Within artistic limits Miss Powell put a splendid energy into her own playing, and there seems little doubt but that some of this energy can be attributed to her early lessons with this "unfettered" player. Miss Powell studied with Lewis four years, and then went abroad, a girl of twelve, to study first with Schradieck and then with Dancla in Paris. Afterward Joachim heard her play in London and offered to take her into his classes without obliging her to go through any further preliminary studies. She returned to New York in 1884 and made her debut with the New York Philharmonic in the Bruch G Minor Concerto, and since that time has created a new standard of violin playing.
