# LANSING RESIGNS PRESIDENT'S CABINET

## OPPOSE GERMAN SHIP SALE WORLD NEWS RUPTURE BETWEEN EXECUTIVES FOLLOWS

## SHARP OPPOSITION ARISES IN SENATE ON SALE OF LINERS

DISCUSSION CROPS OUT IN SEN-ATE BUT CHAIRMAN PAYNE OF SHIPPING BOARD APPEARS AND

#### SELL ONLY TO AMERICANS

Injunction Filed by William Randolph Hearst as Tax Payer of New York; Supreme Court Orders Shipping Board to Show Cause For Refusal.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 .- Vigorous position to shipping board plans for he sale of 30 former German passenger Mners, broke out in the senate today, expressed in sharply critical debate and presentation of several resolutions pro posing to block the action. While the debate was in progress, other developments came thick and fast.

John Barton Payne, chairman of the board, appeared before the senate commerce committee to explain the whole affair and after hearing him the committee through its chairman, Senator Jones of Washington, reported to the senate that no immediate action was necessary. No action accordingly was

Flarts Injunction Proceedings.

In the District of Columbia supreme court, William Randolph Hearst of New York, appearing as a tax payer, filed an application for an injunction to prevent the proposed sale of the ships at auction Monday. The court issued an order requiring the board to show cause Monday why a temporary injunction

Denies Senatorial Charges. Chairman Payne assured the senate would merely receive bids Monday for the vessels, and would report the results to the senate before acting. He met charges that the sale of the vessels to a single purchaser for \$28,000. 000 was intended, with a flat denial. but repeated his own conclusion that

Senator Ashurst, democrat of Arizona, opened the debate and later brought it to a head by offering a concurrent resolution directing the shipping board not to sell the ships except through regular bidding after three months advertising. ### LEERAY SINGLAIR WELL MEANS MUCH TO CISCO

Offset to Sam Thorpe Well Loosed Era of Drilling at Townsite-Predict 100 Rigs Within the Year.

Development in the vicinity of Leeray, the new townsite on the Cisco & Northeastern railway, reached a climax Friday, when the Sinclair company drilled in a big well half a mile from the townsite. This well, offsetting the Sam Thorpe well, is the first into the deep sand, and has started an era of drilling that means at least a hundred rigs running there within the year.

At least 15 wells are now drilling, at depths ranging from 500 to 1500 feet. The development of the field will not only build Leeray, it is predicted, but will also make Cisco a greater oil hub. The demand for material in the field will be taken care of by local supply houses, and the completion of the Cisco & Northeastern to this point will make transportation problems easy to solve. 




