DUBLIN, March 20. - In 93 days, Charles A. Jones of this place picked a total of 39,992 pounds of cotton, for which he received \$1074.45 for an average daily picking wage of \$11.55. The cotton was picked in McCulloch, Fisher and Stonewall counties. The record picking for one day was 905 pounds. In bales he gathered 26. This is one of the few remarkable cotton picking records made in west Texas during 1919-1920, according to the west Texas chamber of commerce.

Jones began picking September 29 and finished March 4.

#### The Cisco Spirit

We commend to other communities the spirit of the progressive town of Cisco! It is the spirit which insists that a thing can be done if it must be done.

Cisco found itself facing a situation in its schools which is not uncommon in Texas communities just now. More money was needed in order to keep them open and at a standard which would insure the education of the children of the town. Teachers had to be paid adequately if they were to be retained. The taxes were not sufficient to meet the situation. What was there to be done.

Well, the people of Cisco knew that something HAD to be done. The situation could not be permitted to "just jog along" and take care of itself. The people knew what the result of that would be. They knew that even if their schools remained open under such circumstances it would be worse than if they closed. They knew that it would be worse than if their children wasted their time, for years spent by children under overworked or incompetent teachers are frequently more harmful to them than if they remained away from school altogether. There is no more mistaken idea than that a very poor school is better than no school. The people of Cisco knew that. They knew that something MUST be done. And so they set out to do something.

They held a mass meeting to discuss the situation. It was clear that there must be more money for the schools, and it was equally clear that the people of Cisco must provide that money, no matter what methods of raising it were emplo The upshot of it all was that they cut all the and simply raised the money right there at the red-tap meetin There were about four hundred persons present voluntarily pledged and contributed fifteen thousand the and dol thousand of it was paid in cash. Now, this is not the proper way to raise money to support the schools, of course. It is not equitable, and it is not "according to law." But if there is no other way to be found, what ought the people of Cisco have done? Let the situation "just jog along?" The people of Cisco thought otherwise, in any event. They felt that the education of their children should not be sacrificed to red-tape. It may be that some gave more than their share and others gave less than they ought to have given-that the "tax" was not levied equitably. Be all that as it may, after the meeting they were able to send out the message to the world: 'Cisco schools will not close!"

Yes, we commend to other communities the spirit of the progressive town of Cisco. When it reached an obstacle it climbed over it. It neither stopped nor went back.


