





CLEAN-UP PART OF PLAN TO KEEP CITY A SPOTLESS TOWN

Authorities Now Have Trash Cans Ready For Business Section, Where Debris Must Be Dumped.

The cleaning up of Main street by local business men last Friday morning is no joke. They policed it up not only for the sake of getting it clean but for the sake of finding out who it is that makes a practice of sweeping stores and sidewalks directly into the street without taking up the refuse.

The Young Men's Business League, the city commissioners and the chamber of commerce have all taken a definite stand. They have an ordinance that has been in effect since May of 1919 to back their stand.

They are going to see to it that the most fashionable thing a man can do is found doing is picking up pieces of paper in front of his place of business. Henceforward it will be just as much a breach of civic etiquette for a merchant to have paper and rubbish on his sidewalks or portion of the street as it will be for him to appear before his customers with unwashed hands and face and uncombed hair, or to come down town in his B. V. D's.

Friday morning the men of Cisco shoveled into trucks every excuse any merchant has for not keeping his place clean. There is at present no accumulation of rubbish or dirt that cannot be disposed of in a few moments each morning.

If every business house sweeps its sidewalk every morning upon opening for business and picks up the few pieces of stray paper it will be impossible for any quantity of debris to accumulate.

Claude Wild, president of the Y. M. B. L., suggests that every merchant see to it that within 20 minutes after he has opened up for business his premises are clean.

Saturday afternoon trash cans were placed on every corner in the downtown business section by members of the league. Merchants are asked to take up their sweepings and deposit them in these receptacles.

The city ordinance covering the debris question is as follows:

- 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to sweep, throw, place, deposit, or leave upon any street, alley, vacant lot, unoccupied area or public place within the corporate limits of the city of Cisco, any paper, trash, floor sweepings, scrap iron, tin, parts of old vehicles, implements and machinery, junk, weeds or rubbish of any kind.
2. It shall be unlawful for any person to place, throw, deposit, or leave upon the premises of another person any paper, printed circulars, advertising or printed matter, junk rubbish, scrap iron, tin, parts of old vehicles or machinery or implements, weeds, grass or trash of any kind, without the consent of the owner, agent or occupant of said premises.
3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance creates a menace to the health, safety, and welfare of the inhabitants of the city of Cisco, makes it an imperative necessity that this ordinance take effect at once.

TO ENLARGE LOCAL PASSENGER STATION TO MEET EMERGENCY

Material and Men Arrive and Start Work on T. & P. Building; Surprise to Local Representatives.

Railroad officials of the Texas & Pacific and Missouri, Kansas & Texas have taken note of the congestion at Cisco and the lack of passenger depot facilities to handle the travel in and out of this city, and have begun work enlarging the passenger station here. Work was begun Wednesday.

Local officials know nothing of the plans, but railroad mechanics just dropped in and were erecting a tool house, preparatory to the main work. From what could be gathered from these men, the open court on the south side of the present building will be inclosed, adding another large room to the depot. And maybe the building will be lengthened on the west end. Brick and other material for the enlargement are in the yard, says the local agent.

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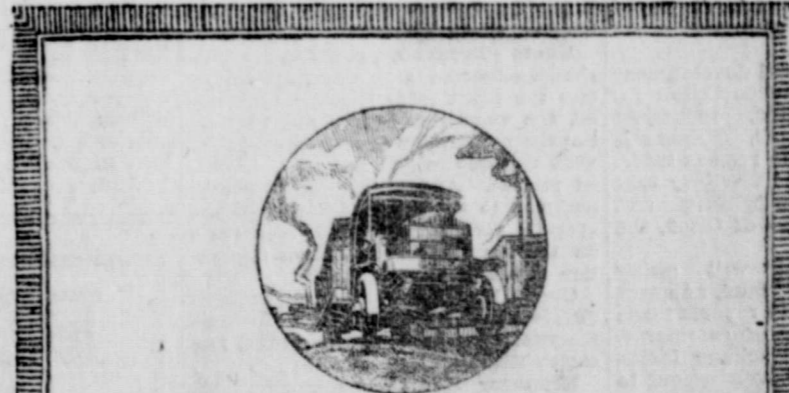
