REPUBLICANS BREAK THE SOLID SOUTH

DOMINANT MAJORITY GROWS AS RETURNS NEAR COMPLETION

Albany, N.Y., Nov. 4.—The Republican Column—This Leaves the Fourteen Doubtful Votes and Three of the Four States Where they are. Show Harding in the Lead—The Electoral Vote in Detail Up to Noon Today.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Tennessee has joined the swelling republican column, shattering democratic tradition of a solid south, unofficial, but complete returns, showed today. This break in the democratic ranks, with a similar upset in Oklahoma, reported late last night, assured leading of three hundred and ninety-two votes as against one hundred and eleven for Cox.

Memphis, Nov. 4.—On the face of the returns compiled by newspapers practically the entire state, Senator Harding today had a lead of approximately ten thousand votes over Governor Cox and seemed assured of Tennessee's twelve electoral votes. Figures tabulated by the Commercial Appeal from all but fifty precincts in ninety-three of the ninety-five counties in the state gave Harding a plurality of 10,717 and showed Alf Taylor, republican candidate for governor, leading over his democratic opponent by 37,197 votes.

Montana to Harding.
HELENA, Mont., Nov. 4.—The plurality for Harding over Cox in Montana was increased to forty-two thousand by returns compiled today. Returns from 1,122 of the 1,492 precincts, gave Harding 89,841, Cox 47,831.

The Paris Press.
PARIS, Nov. 4.—Newspapers of this city give great prominence to reports of the American election and publish many pictures of the republican victor in the presidential race. In their comments the newspapers declare the election of Harding was a triumph, praise his personality and recall that he has always asserted great sympathy for France.

Arizona Goes, Too.
PHOENIX, Nov. 4.—Returns from all counties in Arizona with only isolated precincts missing, gave pluralities for the republican candidate for president, senator and governor. Representative Carl Hayden, democrat, appears to have been re-elected by a margin of about six thousand.

POLICE MAKE RAIDS ON THREE HOTELS ARREST TWO COUPLES

Saturday night the police arrested a man and woman in a local hotel when they found them together in a room which the officers were searching. Going from there to another hotel, the police made two more arrests of a man and woman under similar circumstances. The four arrested paid fines and costs into the municipal court in the sum of \$12.29 each.

A new man on the force, being as he said, refused admission to a room in a third hotel, secured a search warrant and got into the room. There he found a man and his wife and baby. He apologized and did not disturb them.

Wilson Says Nothing.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—President Wilson was up early this morning and after breakfast spent some time on the south porch of the white house enjoying the sun. White house officials said they did not expect the president to make a statement today on the result of the election.

Debs' Surprising Vote.
NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Returns early today show that Eugene V. Debs, socialist candidate for the presidency, now in the Atlanta penitentiary, received 131,896 votes from New York City. This is more than one-third as many votes as were cast here for Cox.

Pro Are Pleased.
CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—Election of Senator Harding was more pleasing to the prohibitionists than the election of Governor Cox would have been. Virgil Sinschaw, chairman of the prohibition national committee, said this morning in his first statement on the election.

SCHOOL GEOGRAPHIES
SAID KAISER WAS 'IT'
EDWARDSVILLE, Ill., Nov. 4.—The school board here is up in arms. Just as school was opening for the year, it was discovered that geographies in a batch of textbooks declared that the "German empire includes Alsace Lorraine, that the kaiser is its emperor and is a powerful monarch." Also that next in strength to the German empire is the great Austro-Hungarian monarchy. There was a lot more along this line, with maps to prove. The frenzied school board discovered that many of the books were twenty years old.

GIRL CHARGES HER SISTER IS TRYING TO CAUSE HER RUIN

RANGER, Nov. 4.—Telling a story of the fear and misery she has suffered in keeping her virtue inviolate against the influence of her own sister, known in Ranger as Mickey Young, and W. D. Young, Little Olive Hisey, 15 years old, went before Judge Fenlow and signed a sworn statement which led to a charge of white slavery against the man and woman. Both Young and Mickey Young, arrested under the name of Clara Connor, were taken by the police and will be sent to Abilene to answer the charge. An additional charge of criminal assault has been filed against Young.

Olive Hisey has no mother or father. She has been living in Iola, Kan. In her sworn statement she sets out that her sister, Clara Connor, wired her at Iola that she was sending her \$20 and for her to come to Ranger. She worked one day and a half in the Main street cabaret. On Oct. 24, the statement continues, she was sleeping in a hotel with Young and that three times during the night her sister left the room and Young tried to assault her. Each time telling her that it would be all right with her sister.

President R. Q. Lee, of the Cisco and Northeastern railway, said yesterday that the road is in great need of shops and roundhouse, and need them right now. He was just then in receipt of a telegram relating to the great body of traffic which is now ready for the road and in the handling of which they will need the shops and roundhouse as badly as anything can be needed.

GOVERNMENT QUITS
WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The last vestige of government control of sugar has been removed through the signing by President Wilson of a proclamation providing for the reorganization November 15 of the license held by wholesalers in reference to exporters and importers.

EASTLAND REPORT ON CONSTRUCTION OF COUNTY ROADS

Shows That Our Ninety-four Miles of Right of Way Has Been Secured and Over Forty-five Miles of Road Cleared, Curbed and Graded, Complete—Weather Has Interfered With Progress of Work But Report Claims It is Now Going Forward With a Rush.

Recently a statement of what purported to be the apportionment of road construction in the county was published by the commissioners' court, but it really showed nothing definite as to how much and where the money had been expended.

PARIS, Nov. 4.—The summary trial and execution of an unidentified Mexican, charged with the murder of Arthur Mosley and Gustave Salazar, American citizens, has been reported to the American embassy in Mexico City by the Mexican foreign office, the state department was advised today.

MILLERAND THE NEW PRESIDENT WALKS PARIS STREETS ALONE

PARIS, Nov. 4.—President Millerand has amazed some of the old residents of Paris by appearing on the streets of the city apparently without a guard. Scores of persons recognized the French president when he walked the other day from the Elysee Palace through the Champs Elysee toward the Seine and his progress was marked by a succession of bows. Not a detective was in sight.

NEW PLANT ON C. & N. E. WILL PRODUCE TWELVE THOUSAND BARRELS OF GASOLINE DAILY

One of the new industries nearing completion at Paris Camp, on the Cisco and Northeastern railway, is the gasoline abstraction plant being erected for the Texas company. The plant is being built by the Dwight F. Robinson company, successors to Westinghouse, Church-Kerr & Co., and will be ready for operation within the next fifteen days, when the work of extracting gas oil from oil and gas will begin.

I. W. W. PROSELYTISM IN THE OIL FIELD OF STEPHENS COUNTY

Radical Speakers Are Holding Meetings and Security Many Members—Believed the Money Being Used Comes From Russian Bolsheviks—Federal Government Said to Have Many Operatives Watching the I. W. W. But No Arrests Have Been Made.

What may be an explanation of much of the crime that has recently been reported from the oil field surrounding Breckenridge is found in the report of the activities of the I. W. W. in that part of Stephens county and particularly in that section. The extent to which the activities of these outlaws have reached, is almost unbelievable. A special dispatch sent from Breckenridge to the Ranger Times tells of their operations, as follows:

To swell the membership of the organization and spread its powers in Texas, a part of the country heretofore singularly unaffected and unpolluted by this type of radicalism, the I. W. W. is now conducting a recruiting campaign among workers in the oil fields of Stephens county and the rest of the state, which is depending for effectiveness on intimidation being brought to bear on men who do not willingly join the organization. At the present time three members of the federal secret service are understood to be working in the field.

Several cases of intimidation of men who refused to join the organization when approached by the agitators have been reported to the secret service men, it is understood. In one case, it is declared, members of a pipe line crew working on an extension of a pipe line spur, deliberately loosed their hold on a length of pipe and allowed it to drop on the foot of the obdurate man who refused to join the organization. In another instance, according to information reaching a member of The Daily Times staff, quick time was placed in the toes of a recalcitrant oil field worker's shoes and he was made lame by the corrosive chemical action which took place when he wore the shoes for a short time and his feet perspired.

PETROLEUM RECORD REACHED HIGH SPOT DURING SEPTEMBER

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—The consumption of petroleum reached a high record figure of forty-eight million six hundred twenty thousand barrels in September, while production fell slightly, the geological survey reported today in its monthly statement. The average daily production is placed at one million two hundred sixty-one thousand five hundred barrels, compared with one million two hundred seventy barrels in August.

ATTACK PRO LAW IN COURT OF CRIMINAL APPEALS AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, Nov. 3.—An attack on the validity of the Texas prohibition law was launched today when the case of ex-parte J. W. Gilmour, of Collins county, was submitted on oral argument before the court of criminal appeals.

FEEDING CHILDREN.

PEKING, Nov. 4.—Boys and girls up to 15 years of age are being fed free of charge in the Far Eastern republic of Siberia, says a Verkhne Ulink dispatch to the Delta News Agency. Corps are reported to be exceedingly good and the cattle supply abundant. The chief contention of the defendant is that the state law is invalid in so far as it does not conform to the national prohibition acts. The possibility of Russian soviet money being the basis of the financial assistance of the organizers is a theory which has been advanced by those in touch with the situation, it is understood. It is known in secret service and department of justice circles, it is said, that a large amount of money has been placed in the hands of the I. W. W. leaders by representatives of the Russian communists, who thus seek to carry on the work of their cause in this country. The I. W. W. because of the close surveillance under which it has been kept for the past two years by the government, was until recently, practically bankrupt. The action of the Russian communists in furnishing funds amounts to a virtual taking over of the organization by foreign agitators, who have a large part in dictating how the money shall be spent.

HOW IT HAPPENED.

Never, following an election, were there so many explanations as to how it happened, forthcoming as there are today in telling why the republicans have beaten the democrats in the presidential race.

But here may be found the real explanation: High prices for commodities, high prices for labor and a depreciated currency do not mean prosperity.

With panics and strikes and thousands of unemployed people throughout the country a party then in power may not hope to succeed itself.

Washington have sought to impress the people with the fact that they were living under a degree of prosperity never before known.

Disatisfaction with the present administration and the fact that Governor Cox so readily accepted President Wilson's views on the League of Nations and the further fact that the great majority of the democratic party are still old fashioned democrats and want no "entangling alliances."

Normally the United States is republican. Eight years ago and four years ago, division in the republican ranks made possible democratic victories.

Perhaps American newspapers have had something to do with this delay. Let an American be killed in Mexico and the news item is splashed all over the first page of the yellow papers.

Since 1884, after being under republican rule for a quarter of a century, the democrats, during the first and second terms of President Cleveland and the two terms of President Wilson, have conclusively shown that when they do get into power they have the most splendid ability for making fools of themselves ever exhibited by any party.

It's tough; awful tough. But it's no use crying. Texas might have gone republican, but it didn't. The sun shines in Texas and the government at Washington still lives.

MEXICO. While not definitely stated from Washington, it has been very generally believed that immediately following the election the state department would take up the question of recognition of the new government in Mexico and that it was more than probable that the recognition would be brought about at an early day.

All foreign nations will follow the example of the United States in this. There is probably not one foreign nation that would not have recognized the new government some time ago but for the fact that the United States has not done so.

There is every evidence that the new government, under the provisional presidency of De la Huerta, is making splendid progress toward peace and quiet in that republic and more and more and better evidence is at hand to prove that when General Obregon becomes president, next month, there will be still better conditions maintained.

Mexico needs recognition, needs it now, to aid in the great struggle it is making. Just why this recognition has not been given, is a secret of the white house alone.

AN ORDINANCE.

Ordering that an election be held within the City of Cisco, Texas, on the 18th day of November, 1920, for the purpose of determining whether the City Commission of the City of Cisco, Texas, will be authorized to issue the bonds of said city in the sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing 212 acres of land out of the North Half (N 1/2) Section No. 84, Block No. 4, H. & T. C. R. R. Co. survey in Eastland County, being the same tract of land conveyed to J. B. Spears by O. C. Britton by deed recorded in Volume 63, Page 463, Records for Deeds for said Eastland County, together with the buildings and improvements on said land, the same to be used for a Municipal Sanitarium and Park, said bonds to mature serially over a period not exceeding 40 years from their date and to bear interest at the rate of 5% per annum, maturities to be fixed by the City Commission, and whether said commission shall be authorized to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest and provide a sinking fund to retire said bonds at maturity, and declaring an emergency.

Whereas, there exists a necessity for the construction or acquisition of suitable buildings for a Municipal Sanitarium and for the acquisition of land for a Municipal Park, and because of lack of funds in the City Treasury of said City with which to construct or acquire such buildings and land, and to improve the same, the City Commission deems it advisable to order an election to determine whether the qualified property tax paying voters of the City of Cisco will authorize the City Commission to issue the bonds of said City for said purposes.

Therefore, Be It Ordained by the City Commission of the City of Cisco, Texas, that an election be held within the limits of said City on the 15th day of November, 1920, at which election there shall be submitted to the qualified voters of said city the following proposition:

Shall the City Commission of the City of Cisco be authorized to issue the bonds of said city in the amount of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) maturing serially over a period not to exceed 40 years from their date and to bear interest at the rate of 5% per annum, payable semi-annually, maturities to be fixed by the City Commission for the purpose of purchasing and acquiring title to 212 acres of land out of the North Half (N 1/2) of Section No. 84, Block No. 4, H. & T. C. R. R. Co. survey, in Eastland County, being the same tract of land conveyed to J. B. Spears by O. C. Britton by deed recorded in Volume 63, Page 463, Records for Deeds for said Eastland County, together with the buildings and improvements thereon, the same to be used for a Municipal Sanitarium and Park; and to levy a tax on the property in said city sufficient to pay the interest and create a sinking fund to redeem said bonds as they shall mature.

Said election shall be held at the City Hall in said City and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election:

D. L. Rogers, Presiding Judge. Fred Davis, Judge. G. Bedford, Clerk. Roy Keathly, Clerk.

Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the general election laws of the State of Texas, governing city elections, and under the city charter of the City of Cisco, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of said city shall be permitted to vote, and all votes at said election shall have written or printed on their ballot the following words:

For the issuance of bonds in the amount of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) maturing serially over a period not to exceed 40 years from date, and to bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum payable semi-annually, maturities to be fixed by the City Commission for the purpose of purchasing and acquiring title to 212 acres of land out of the North Half (N 1/2) of Section No. 84, Block No. 4, H. & T. C. R. R. Co. survey in Eastland County, together with the improvements thereon, to be used for a Municipal Sanitarium and Park; and for the levy of a tax on all taxable property in said city to pay the interest and create a sinking fund to redeem said bonds as they shall mature.

Against the issuance of bonds in the amount of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) maturing serially over a period not to exceed 40 years from date, and to bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum payable semi-annually, maturities to be fixed by the City Commission for the purpose of purchasing and acquiring title to 212 acres of land out of the North Half (N 1/2) of Section No. 84, Block No. 4, H. & T. C. R. R. Co. survey in Eastland County, together with the improvements thereon, to be used for a Municipal Sanitarium and Park; and against the levy of the tax on all the taxable property in said city to pay the interest and create a sinking fund to redeem said bonds as they shall mature, so that all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds of said City for said purpose shall strike out the word "against the issuance of bonds, etc.," and those opposed to the issuance of said bonds shall

strike out the words "for the issuance of bonds," etc. A copy of this ordinance signed by the Mayor of said City and countersigned by the City Secretary shall serve as a proper notice of said election, and the Mayor of said City is ordered and directed to cause notice of said election to be published in the Cisco Round-Up, a newspaper of general circulation in Eastland County, published in the City of Cisco in said County, for four consecutive weeks next preceding the date of said election, and in addition thereto shall cause notice of said election to be posted at three public places within said city, one being at the City Hall, at least thirty days prior to the date of said election.

The fact that the City of Cisco has no hospital, sanitarium nor park necessary for the health and welfare of its citizens, creates an emergency and pub-

lic necessity that the rule requiring ordinances to be read at more than one meeting makes it necessary that said rule be, and the same here and now, is suspended, and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage. 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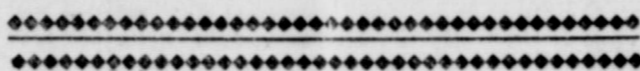

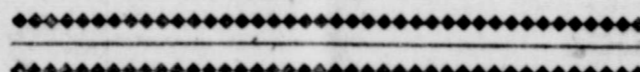

NEW DIPPING VAT IS BEING BUILT ON THE SOUTH LINE OF CITY

B. E. Weddington, livestock inspector for this commissioner's district, said yesterday that a dipping vat is about completed on the land of Miss Theresa Weddington, immediately southwest of the city. The concrete work is being finished and the lumber is on the ground for the corrals and runways. Another vat is being built near Scranton and one on the farm of Mr. Scheurer, about six miles south of Cisco.

The county furnishes the material for these vats and the stock owners do the work, thus being able to provide the vats with but little outlay. They are located where they will accommodate the largest number of stockmen within the shortest distance.

The work of the tick eradication, Mr. Weddington says, is progressing well in the county. During the last three months he has had dipped approximately 6,000 head and in all that number only one was lost, that being a cow which entered the vat with a jump, fell on her head and was strangled before they could get her turned over.

He said it is a question of education; that many are opposed to dipping their cattle and they must fully realize the great advantage of it before they will consent to it. Of course the law makes it obligatory, but the officials are trying to bring it about by agreement and with satisfaction to all.

This county is still below the quarantine line but good efforts are being made toward having it released. One man was speaking the other day of dipping cattle on one of his ranches when a man remarked to him that he thought he was in the clear. He said he was, that the county where his ranch was had been released, but he kept up the dipping of his own accord as a matter of safety from ticks and would continue to do so for he had learned the lesson and knew how much better were his cattle when free from ticks.
