Galbraith, Jr., of the American Legion, today issued the following statement apropos of Armistice Day: "The swift triumph of our arms and those of our gallant allies, which two years ago gave us the victory, long can survive the spirit that celebrates today, marks the high-light of the present century in American affairs. Victories such as Armistice Day commemorates are not the issues solely of clashes of flesh and steel. They are a finer quality than that. They are the triumph, as well, of an unconquerable spirit.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 11.—With plans for what is said to be the largest development, subdivision and colonization project on record, engineers from Los Angeles are on their way to Chihuahua City for the preliminary work of rehabilitating the 8,000,000-acre estate of General Luis Terrazas, aged Mexican warrior, who has been a refugee in Los Angeles for the past six years.

Associated Press. LONDON, Nov. 11.—An armistice was signed between the Armenians and the Turkish nationalists, it was announced in an Armenian communique dated November 7 and received here today.

DR. GREGORY MAKES OCTOBER REPORT ON VITAL STATISTICS

The following is the summary of the report of Dr. Joseph W. Gregory, city health officer, to the state board of health for the month of October. There were fifteen births and nine deaths in the city. There were four cases of diptheria, one of tuberculosis and two cases of typhoid fever. The typhoid cases were investigated and the board of health is of the opinion that these cases were infected outside the city. Both cases had rapid recovery. Most of the deaths occurring during the month were those of people between the ages of 58 and 80 years. Health conditions throughout the city continue good.

FT. WORTH BANKS SUBSCRIBE. With Full Honors.

Associated Press. FT. WORTH, Nov. 11.—The Ft. Worth banks subscribed three percent of their capital stock to the Southern Export Corporation, recently organized at the New Orleans meeting, last night. Every bank in the city subscribed the allotted amount.

SCARED OF "BIG FINES."

Associated Press. HOUSTON, Nov. 11.—Either bad colds are becoming less prevalent or physicians have found other cures than the prescription of whisky, according to M. A. Moore, federal prohibition inspector here. Mr. Moore stated that the city recently went twenty-three days during which one whisky prescription was written by a Houston doctor.

MISCREANT BROKE WINDOW.

Associated Press. AT 3 o'clock this morning some unknown party fired a revolver shot through the plate glass window of the Daniels hotel. The ball buried itself in the wall of the office, just back of the clerk's desk. A negro porter was sleeping near the shattered window and threw several fits before he discovered he was safe and uninjured.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS CLOSE.

Associated Press. The city schools were closed this afternoon, Prof. J. J. Godbey, the superintendent having declared a half holiday for the pupils on account of Armistice day.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 11.—The body of Raymond Hurst, of Oklahoma City, who went down with the transport, Tuscania, was buried with full military honors in connection with the observance of Armistice Day.

BLANTON'S STAND. Representative Blanton made public yesterday an open letter he addressed to Secretary of the Navy Daniels, protesting against the announced cruise of the Atlantic and Pacific fleets, the former to South America and Africa, the latter to Australia and New Zealand.

Then, too, he has repeatedly called attention to the thousands of useless and idle employes in the departments at Washington. The list he recently had prepared and made public, showed a condition hardly believable by the citizens who have been raised up on talk of democratic simplicity and how the democratic party was always the economic party in the administration of government.

To these and other conditions, Mr. Blanton has given much attention and it is now patent to all that had some of his recommendations along this line been heeded, even in a small degree, it would have proven much better campaign propaganda than would be the promise of more places and more government employes to fill them.

A league of nations and a covenant for the peace of the world, will, before the ending of the coming meeting at Geneva, be found as far from consummation as it was before President Wilson went to Versailles and still likened to John L. Ingalls' definition of honesty is politics, only an "iridescent dream."

AIDING STOCKMEN. The livestock men, as did the cotton growers, appealed to Washington, to the federal reserve board, for help that they might not be forced to sell their products at prices which meant to them less than the cost of production and were refused any assistance, were not even accorded a promise of any relief whatever, and they went home disappointed and once more turned to their own bankers to save them from bankruptcy and worse.

The local bankers, in many cases, operating up to their limit, but ever willing and anxious to accommodate the cattlemen and the cotton men, appealed to the larger banks of the country and have gotten results. Yesterday at Chicago it was determined to form an organization with \$30,000,000 capital, for the purpose of assisting in the financing of the livestock industry.

Following is a part of Mr. Bancroft's report: Cisco is a lively little city, about ten thousand population. Frank O. Bancroft Signs Contract With Chamber of Commerce Friday Night — Fifty Baseball People and Number of Newspaper Men Here From March 8 to 26—Rooms Secured at the Guide Hotel—Meals Be Furnished by Savoy Cafe.

A contract was executed Friday night between Frank C. Bancroft, business manager, acting for the Cincinnati Baseball club and the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, the terms of which provide for the coming here of the Cincinnati team, the Reds, for their spring training.

The team, manager, youngsters and others of the club to the number of fifty will arrive here March 8, and remain until March 26. Quarters for all the ball people have been secured at the Guide hotel and their meals will be taken at the Savoy cafe.

The Cincinnati newspaper men to accompany the team and who will remain here throughout the training season are Jack Rider, of the Enquirer; Bill Pheasant, Times Star; Bob Newhall, Commercial-Tribune; Tom Swope, Post.

Mr. Bancroft left here yesterday afternoon for Ft. Worth where the Texas league meeting was being held. From there he will go to Kansas City, meeting with the baseball officials from Texas. On the way home he will look games for the Reds after they complete their training here next spring.

During their stay here the Reds will play nine games with such teams as the Chamber of Commerce may bring here, or may be here, the arrangement for these games and the business connected with them, to be under the full control of the Chamber of Commerce.

GREAT WHISKEY PLOT BEING UNEARTHED BY THE GRAND JURY

According to "Mike de Pike" Chicago and New York Men Were Planning to Sell Whiskey in Those Cities, Securing Their Supply From Louisville — Many Policemen and Prohibition Enforcement Officers Involved.

Associated Press. CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—"Mike de Pike" Heitler, road house and saloonkeeper, and Robert Perlman, saloonkeeper, surrendered to federal authorities today and were held in bonds of fifteen thousand dollars each under indictments charging violation of the Volstead act. They are accused by a pedler of selling two hundred thousand dollars worth of whiskey to them and then sending men to steal it back.

Associated Press. CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—Federal indictments for at least thirty policemen, police officials, whiskey runners, saloonkeepers and "high ups", in minor violation of the prohibition laws, were forecast today with the beginning of the grand jury's personal of the evidence concerning "Mike de Pike" Heitler and the one hundred and seventy-five thousand dollar whiskey graft.

Federal warrants were issued for the arrest of Heitler, his partner, Robert Perlman and Manly Greenberg, on charges of possessing and selling liquor, and procuring whiskey with forged government permits. Heitler's connection with the one hundred and seventy-five thousand dollar liquor theft, was brought forth in an alleged confession implicating the Chicago police and prohibition enforcement officers.

Deputy United States marshals today took up the search for Heitler, Perlman and Greenberg, held under fifteen thousand dollar bonds. It is charged that the Heitler apartment entails the transportation of one thousand cases of whiskey from Louisville to Chicago. When transferred to trucks, for local disposition, another force operated to remove the cargo, bringing forth Heitler's alleged confession.

Heitler is said to have disclosed the bribery of federal and city officials and implicating a number of Chicago and New York men, to go to Louisville distilleries with plans of politicians and bootleggers to organize a ten million dollar company to sell whiskey in Chicago and New York.

Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the general election laws of the State of Texas, governing city elections, and under the city charter of the City of Cisco, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of said city shall be permitted to vote, and all votes at said election shall have written or printed on their ballot the following words: For the issuance of bonds in the amount of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) maturing serially over a period not to exceed 40 years from date, and to bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum payable semi-annually, maturities to be fixed by the City Commission, for the purpose of purchasing and acquiring title to 212 acres of land out of the North Half (N 1/2) of Section No. 84, Block No. 4, H. & T. C. R. Co. survey in Eastland County, together with the improvements thereon, to be used for a Municipal Sanitarium and Park; and for the levy of a tax on all taxable property in said city to pay the interest and create a sinking fund to redeem said bonds as they shall mature.

Against the issuance of bonds in the amount of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) maturing serially over a period not to exceed 40 years from date, and to bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum payable semi-annually, maturities to be fixed by the City Commission, for the purpose of purchasing and acquiring title to 212 acres of land out of the North Half (N 1/2) of Section No. 84, Block No. 4, H. & T. The fact that the City of Cisco has no hospital, sanitarium nor park necessary for the health and welfare of its citizens, creates an emergency and public necessity that the rule requiring ordinances to be read at more than one meeting makes it necessary that said rule be, and the same here and now, is suspended, and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

### COTTON FARMERS TO MEET AT WACO NOV. SIXTEEN-IMPORTANT

Gathering is for the Purpose of Considering a State-wide Pool of Low-Grade Cotton — Call is Signed by Farmers From More Than Thirty Counties.

**CORPUS CHRISTI, Nov. 8.**—More than thirty signatures are attached to a call issued to the farmers of Texas to meet in Waco, November 14, for the purpose of considering a state-wide pool of low grade cotton, to be shipped and sold to Europe. Following is the call:

To cotton growers and all others holding low grade cotton: We, the undersigned cotton growers of Texas, hereby call a mass meeting of all citizens of this state who are now holding low grade cotton, to meet in Waco, Texas, on Tuesday, November 16th, at 10 a. m., at the offices of the Chamber of Commerce, for the purpose of considering the advisability and practicability of pooling all low grade cotton in this state for shipment and sale to European countries.

In view of the fact that low grade cotton has been accumulating during and since the great war, it is absolutely necessary that some effective measures be adopted at once to dispose of this low grade cotton before next year's crop is put on the market. After a careful investigation and conferences with leading farmers and cotton growers of this state, it is deemed wise and proper that the best course to pursue is the one outlined above.

An investigation shows that Germany alone today needs two million bales of cotton; Bohemia needs half a million bales, and other European nations need at least a million bales. These countries today are idle for lack of cotton.

The time is too short to rely upon an export corporation yet to be organized to handle the enormous quantity of low grade cotton now on hand in this country.

We urge the citizens of every county and community who are holding low grade cotton to attend this meeting or send representatives.

### PREACHER AND PRO LEADER MAY BE HELD ON MURDER CHARGE

**Rev. J. Spracklin Who is Said to Have Killed a Man on Whose Place a Raid Was Being Made Was Spirited Away by Officers to Avoid Lynching — Much Excitement on the Canadian Border Where Killing Occurred.**

**WINDSOR, Ont., Nov. 8.**—Whether Rev. J. Spracklin, a minister and prohibition enforcement leader, must stand trial for slaying Beverly Trumble, following a raid on the latter, may be known tonight.

The inquest into Trumble's death which began Saturday night will be continued this evening. It adjourned yesterday to permit officers here to search for a man named Smith, who is said to have been the shooting and is expected to testify whether Trumble was armed when he was killed.

Rev. Spracklin is at Chatham, Ontario, today, where he was spirited yesterday when officers heard rumors of an attempt of violence by Trumble's friends.

Feeling ran high in the border towns over Sunday.

### SUITOR CONFESSES TO KILLING YOUNG WOMAN IN ST. LOUIS

**ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 8.**—The old adage, "hell hath no fury like a woman scorned," was reversed here Sunday when Albert Ellis, 21 years old, a rejected suitor, confessed to the murder of Miss Edna Ellis, 18 years old, whose mutilated body was found here last Friday in a vacant lot.

The girl's throat had been slashed with a razor and the body had been brutally mistreated. The police declare it was the most brutal murder in St. Louis' criminal history.

Ellis confessed Sunday after hours of grilling, the police announced. He declared that the girl's mother had objected to his attentions to Miss Ellis and that he had tried to win her love for two years. Much of this time he lived at the Ellis home as a boarder, finally being ejected because of his attentions to the girl, he said. Then, he confessed, he decided to kill her.

Before the coroner's inquest the youth denied having committed the murder. He was taken to the scene of the crime. "I did not do it," he insisted there. Finally he was taken to the undertaking rooms, where he was shown the body of the girl. He wept then, but it was not until he had been subjected to several hours of grilling by Police Lieutenant Gerke that he broke down and confessed.

**DIED.** The infant child of Mr. and Mrs. T. P. Barnard died this forenoon at their home on C avenue. The funeral will be from the residence and interment in Cisco cemetery. Undertaker Wippen will have charge of the funeral.

### COUNTY JUDGE TELLS WHY LEERAY WILL BE LEFT WITHOUT ROAD

**Judge Starnes at Meeting of Chamber of Commerce Tells How the Road Will Run From Cisco to Breckenridge Leaving Leeray Cut Off to Himself — He Discusses the Work He Says Has Already Been Done on the County Road System.**

County Judge Starnes was at Ranger Wednesday night and attended a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, of that city and talked much of road building in the county. He reviewed much that he gave in an interview while in Cisco several weeks ago, relative to the purchase of much material from the government, all of which was to be used in road construction. He told of the number of miles of right of way secured and construction done, as published in The Daily News yesterday. Then he told why some roads were being built and others not. He discussed all the roads leading out of Ranger and Eastland and when he reached the road between Cisco and Breckenridge, he is quoted by the Ranger Times, as having said:

A full explanation was made of the junction with the Stephens county system. It was originally agreed that Stephens county would build two highways to connect with the Eastland system, one extending from Breckenridge to Necessity and hence to a connection with the Ranger-Caddo road, and the other from Breckenridge to Leeray. The Stephens officials have since informed Judge Starnes that they will be able to build only one road to the south, but in view of the altered plans, would build it to any point selected by the Eastland county commissioners.

This decision has affected not only the road from Ranger but the Cisco-Eastland road as well. The original plans were for a road from Cisco northeast to Leeray, tapped by a road from Eastland. But Judge Starnes pointed out, to make this the sole highway to the northern oil fields would be putting a road in the western part of the county, where only 12,000 persons reside, to the disadvantage of the eastern, part, with a population of 46,000. However, the people in the western part of the county are entitled to be "taken out of the mud," Judge Starnes asserted, and a plan has been worked out which is believed the most feasible for all sections concerned.

The plan is to build the road from Cisco, but shift it to the east of the mountain near Leeray instead of running it through the low ground to the west. A road will be built due north from Eastland, to a connection with the Ranger-Pleasant Grove road, and the combined highways will then swing northwest to a point on the Cisco-Breckenridge road, some miles south of the county line. This proposed route, will cross both Leeray and Gunsight. It will lengthen the distance from Eastland and Ranger to Breckenridge about one mile. It is not the ideal solution Judge Starnes said, but considering the need for serving the county with as little mileage as possible, in order to obtain better construction, coupled with the fact that Stephens county will make only one connection, the commissioners believe this to be the best and most impartial plan.

### EIGHT MEN AND SIX TRUCKS HELD IN THE CASING THEFT CASE

**RANGER, Nov. 9.**—Eight men are being held by the sheriff's department at Breckenridge in connection with the spiriting away of more than \$5,000 worth of casing from two wells on the Lane lease, eight miles north of Ranger, early Sunday morning. Six truck loads of casing are in the hands of the authorities. Two trucks loaded with casing are still missing.

Sheriff Sears of Stephens county today declared that the men held, protest their innocence of intention to steal the casing, claiming that they had been instructed to bring the casing from the Lane lease to the Breckenridge townsite by a man who told them he had bought the casing. This man, a contractor at Breckenridge, is also being held, Sheriff Sears said. The sheriff also has in his custody a man whom the contractor claims to have bought the casing from.

The six men other than the contractor and the man from whom he says he bought the casing, are truck drivers. They were caught by members of the Stephens county sheriff's department when they were notified that a posse was forming here to take up the chase early Sunday morning. No explanation of what became of the other two trucks has been obtained by the sheriff, he said today.

### SAYS HE IS CHRIST

**MEXICO CITY, Mexico, Nov. 9.**—A sensation has been caused in Tampico by the appearance of a man who asserts that he is Christ.

He has been detained for examination as to his sanity. According to reports from Tampico, great crowds gathered about the jail to get a glimpse of the man.

### BOTTOM DROPS OUT OF PRICES FOR MEN'S WEAR SAYS CLOTHIER

**For Immediate Delivery Clothing is Offered Ten to Fifty Per Cent Below Present Wholesale Prices — For Spring and Summer Delivery Prices Are Ten to Thirty-three Off — Meeting of National Clothiers Association in Chicago Today.**

**Associated Press.** CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—Men's clothing, for immediate delivery, was offered today at prices ten to fifty per cent below present wholesale prices.

Goods for spring and summer delivery were shown at prices ten to thirty-three and one-third per cent under those of one year ago. Men's shirts and similar articles were shown at greatly reduced prices at the opening of the thirteenth semi-annual buying convention of the United National Clothiers' association in Chicago.

Retail clothing dealers from seventeen middle western states are attending the convention. "The public is not buying; manufacturers and dealers are overstocked," said W. L. Mohr, treasurer and general manager of the association. "The price must come down. We have passed the peak in prices on wearing apparel. Men's clothing will be considerably cheaper from now on, retailers can afford to sell at less for his costs are becoming lower."

### BRITISH PAPERS HAVE VARIOUS IDEAS AS TO HARDING'S ELECTION

**The Nation Says: "Europe Has Disgraced Herself in the Eyes of America. The Infamy of Our Irish Policy and Overrepresentation by the British Empire in the League of Nations Some of the Ingredients in This Brew of Enmity."**

**LONDON, Nov. 8.**—The weekly reviews, commenting on the election of Warren G. Harding to the presidency of the United States, attributed it as being primarily due to "a revolt against Wilsonism." Occasion is taken by several of the journals to criticize President Wilson's policy severely. An instance, the New Statesman says:

"President Wilson's name will surely go down to posterity as one of the greatest failures of history." All the reviews discuss the fate of the League of Nations, the consensus being that the force of events will drive the United States away from its policy of isolation.

"All accounts agree," says the Spectator, "that there is a strong feeling throughout America in favor of the principle of associating the great common work of preventing wars. That is enough for us."

The Economist also thinks that complete isolation by the United States is impossible. "We may be confident," says this newspaper, "that the American people will not be found wanting at any great crisis in the future re-making of a distracted world."

The Nation, taking the line that a spread of bolshevism and fear of being engulfed in "the morass of European political and economic troubles" led the Americans to vote for republicanism and what it terms virtual isolation, remarks that the election of Senator Harding means tariffs and subsidies and "the big stick" for "refractory labor unions and radicalism."

The Nation adds: "Europe has disgraced herself in the eyes of Americans. Sympathy with the allies has evaporated and given place to suspicion and hostility. Never were the relations with England worse since the crisis of Venezuela. The infamy of our Irish policy, the grabbing of our mandates, our overrepresentation by the British empire in the League of Nations and our world struggle for oil are some of the ingredients in this brew of enmity."

The Nation thinks that European indebtedness to America alone will suffice to compel an abandonment of isolation in favor of closer relations with Europe and the world and that "the spasm of tight nationalism will quickly yield to generous enthusiasm, which lately has been suppressed."

### JUDGE HILL WOULD STOP GAMBLING IN EASTLAND COUNTY

**EASTLAND, Nov. 5.**—Judge E. A. Hill of the Eighty-eighth district court, charged the grand jury specially to investigate persons in the county who are running and operating gambling houses, and said in the course of his charge:

"The gambling house in Eastland county is the source of more crime than any other. It is there that other crimes are committed. The high-jackers have been there. Men who do not engage in an honorable livelihood and do not work for their money. The unsuspecting boys of the country are found there and are caused to engage in gambling. I want you to indict the men who are getting the 'rake off' at these places. It is all right to indict men who commit crimes at these places, but I want you specially to indict the men higher up, the men who are responsible for the existence of these places.

"Then I want you to investigate the houses where men are said to harbor criminals and have led women housed for purposes of prostitution. They are said to be running rooming houses in several places in the county and I want you gentlemen to find them out and return indictments where the proof justifies."

The judge called the jury back and directed them to look into the matter of the official conduct of all the county officers, and if they find that any officer was willfully failing or neglecting to do his duty, then such an officer is subject to indictment.

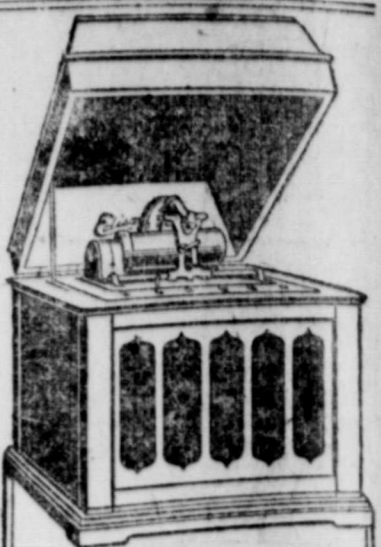
