DISABLED SOLDIERS MUST HAVE HELP

LEAGUE OF NATIONS REGULAR MEETING BEGINS AT GENEVA

Associated Press. Forty-one Countries Represented on the First Day - United States Will Have Observers Present But Will Take No Part in the Deliberations - Many Questions to Be Acted Upon Are Already Mentioned - Nothing Said About Harding.

GENEVA, Nov. 15. - Determination to meet intricate problems of world affairs and lay firmly the foundation stones of a league of nations, was evident among representatives of forty-one countries today at the first session of the assembly. Differences of opinion have already arisen on the question of the make-up of the commission on protection of racial and religious rights and the admission of the Balkan states in some form.

Today there was evidenced a disposition to meet every situation with fairness and an open mind in an endeavor to reach a decision which would be acceptable to all. The United States is not represented officially but at the sessions American observers will be present who will keep Washington fully advised of developments.

The election of a president, several vice-presidents and committees will be the first work to be disposed of by the assembly. It is believed an adjournment will not take place for three weeks. A disarmament plan for using the blockade for nations trespassing is among the principal questions to be considered.

A plan for an international court, such as was set forth at Brussels last summer, will be revived. The Japan note is expected to bring a proposal relative to racial equality before the meeting.

The result of the presidential election in the United States has been uncovered among the delegates but no indication of any effort to get in touch with Washington or President-elect Harding is noted.

The organization represents producers of grain, cotton, wool and livestock said to number eight hundred thousand.

SCHOLASTIC CENSUS OF CISCO SCHOOLS SHOWS FINE GROWTH

Report is Unusual in Several Respects - Number of Girls Enrolled Exceeds the Boys by Only Fifty-nine - Total Enrollment Already Leads That of Last March by Ninety-five Students - Steps Taken to Further Reduce Tardiness.

The monthly report of enrollment and attendance for the second school month which closed November 5 sets a new high mark for the Cisco public schools. This report is somewhat unusual in several respects. First, the number of girls exceeds the number of boys enrolled by only fifty-nine, or eight and one-half per cent; second, the per cent of attendance of each school for the month is above ninety and that for the entire system is ninety-one and one-half; third, the enrollment already exceeds the scholastic census of last March by ninety-five students. The summarized report follows:

A further study of the detailed principals' reports shows the following with respect to tardies: Number times boys were tardy, 152; number times girls were tardy, 150; total, 302.

GRAND JURY SECURED THIRTEEN BILLS AT SESSION OF TWO DAYS

Confidently Expected That New Officers Will Curb Wave of Unbridled Crime Now Rampant in Some Sections - Sheriff and County Attorney Be Given Every Possible Aid By Present Eastland County Grand Jury.

After a session of two days, the Eastland county grand jury adjourned yesterday until December 6. Thirteen true bills were returned during the two-day session, including two for murder.

AMERICAN INDIAN SOCIETY DEMANDS OPENING CARLISLE

Associated Press. ST. LOUIS, Nov. 18.—Resolutions urging the appointment of one of their race as commissioner of Indian affairs and advocating increased educational facilities for the Indians, who are wards of the government, were prepared for introduction at the ninth annual conference of the Society for the American Indian.

LABOR DEPARTMENT FINDS PROFITEERS IN RENT HOLDING ON

Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Price studies given out by the department of labor show marked declines during October on practically all items entering into the cost of living, except housing. Clothing is said to have dropped eight per cent below the figures compiled to represent 1919 costs; farm products, twenty-one per cent. In some lines, October prices are still above those of a year ago, but all are quoted below September, 1920.

FOUR NEGROES TWO MEN AND TWO WOMEN ARE KILLED BY MOB

DOUGLAS, Ga., Nov. 18.—Two negro men and two negro women, alleged to have been implicated in the killing yesterday, of Pearly Harper, a planter of this county, were shot to death early today by a mob of more than one hundred and fifty men who overpowered the sheriff and two deputies.

NEGRO GIVEN 98 YEARS. PARIS, Texas, Nov. 18.—George Diekey, charged with the murder of Sallie Wilson, was given 98 years in the penitentiary today on a plea of guilty. The persons were negroes. The woman was killed at her home in Paris while at the wash pot out in the yard.

CHIEF RESIGNS AND GEORGE CARMICHAEL ACTS TEMPORARILY

Wiley Hitson Tender, His Resignation to the Mayor and Commissioners and Former Member of the Force Will Act Until Reorganization Can Be Brought About—Outgoing Chief Had Served Before and After the Time He Was in the War.

At a meeting of the city commission last night, Wiley Hitson, chief of police, resigned his office. On motion, the resignation was accepted and the mayor, after conferring with Police Commissioner Walker, appointed George Carmichael as temporary chief until the force can be reorganized.

RUSSIANS BELIEVE WRANGLER'S DEFEAT WILL OPEN TRADING

Associated Press. LONDON, Nov. 18.—A wireless dispatch received from Moscow, the seat of the Russian soviet government, says news of the success of Wrangel's destruction will make a great impression on all the western countries.

BOSTON POLICEMEN QUIT THEIR UNION BUT JOBS ARE GONE

Associated Press. BOSTON, Nov. 18.—More than eight hundred members of the Boston Police-men's Union voted unanimously last night to instruct their officers to surrender their charter to the American Federation of Labor.

NEW PREMIER SAYS KING CONSTANTINE'S RETURN IS DEMANDED

Associated Press. ATHENS, Nov. 18.—The return of King Constantine to the throne of Greece is demanded by the outcome of the recent elections, is the opinion of the new premier, George Rallis, who yesterday succeeded Venizelos.

TO REPRESENT GOVERNOR. GAINESVILLE, Nov. 18.—Frank M. Dougherty, a young cattleman and rancher of this city, has received his commission of appointment as one of the two men to be the permanent representatives of Governor Hobbs at the inauguration of Alvaro Obregón, President-elect of Mexico, on Dec. 1. The other man is Senator Beckland of Eastland.

CRESCENT CITY HAS SENATOR HARDING AS LUNCHEON GUEST

In Address He Tells What the American People Must Do to Pass Safely Through Reconstruction Period - Reaches New Orleans From Brownsville to Take Ship for the Panama Canal Zone - Not Stop at Mexican Port.

Associated Press. NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 18.—Plain living and square dealing were invoked by President-elect Harding in his speech here as the nation's strongest reliance during the coming period after war readjustment.

Senator Harding's speech was delivered at a luncheon given by the New Orleans Association of Commerce and contained a message of assurance for the industrial development of the south and an expression of the hope that the ties of commercial co-operation with Latin-America would be strengthened by every possible means.

NO STOP IN MEXICO.

Associated Press. NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 18.—Senator Harding may not stop at a Mexican port on his voyage to the canal zone as he has been urged by Mexican officials to do. No official announcement was made but it is understood he found it impossible to arrange for a call at any point on the Mexican coast, without seriously disrupting the schedule of the shipping company.

LORD MAYOR'S WIDOW SAILS FOR AMERICA ON NEXT WEDNESDAY

Associated Press. LONDON, Nov. 18.—Mrs. Terrence MacSweney, widow of the late lord mayor of Cork, will be accompanied to the United States by Mary MacSweney, who obtained a passport today.

REAL BUFFALO COMES TO FT. WORTH MARKET WITH LOAD CATTLE

Associated Press. FT. WORTH, Nov. 18.—A full blooded buffalo was offered for sale on the local livestock market here today. This is the first ever tendered in Ft. Worth packing houses. It came in a shipment from Garza county and weighed eleven hundred pounds.

APACHE DANCE TOO "VIOLENT" FOR CHICAGO. CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—The Apache dance, which was scheduled to be put on by the Chicago Grand Opera company tomorrow night in connection with the presentation of "The Jewels of the Madonna," was called off to Director E. M. Johnson declared it "too violent" for Chicago grand opera patrons.

TERRIFIC STORMS OFF ATLANTIC COAST CAUSE MANY ALARMS

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—A terrific gale of wind, accompanied by heavy rain, swept the entire Eastern coast, driving ships to shelter and causing much damage to property. Wireless appeals for help were received from four steamships.

One of the vessels, the Spanish cargo liner Yuto, reported she was sinking 100 miles off Nantucket. "S. O. S." calls came also from the 1,751-ton French freighter Genoua, in distress off Baltimore; from the 2,500-ton tanker Hisko, and an unidentified ship off Cape Henry.

Early in the day the marine division of the police department reported the receipt of a help call from the Allen State liner Madagascar off the Rhode Island coast. One person was killed and many injured as a result of the storm in this city. One man was blown to death from an elevated platform in Brooklyn. Plate glass windows were blown in and street car service crippled.

MOBILE, Ala., Nov. 18.—News from Fort Morgan at the lower entrance of Mobile Bay, says the four-masted auxiliary schooner Guanacaste is ashore on the beach, but is in no danger so far. The vessel was en route from New York.

BOLD BOOTLEGGERS PEDdle MOONSHINE IN DALLAS STREETS

DALLAS, Nov. 18.—Bootleggers are making a house to house canvass in Dallas now. They peddle their wares like fruits or vegetables. Last night a "white mule" vender rang the bell of a prominent business man and asked him if he drank whisky.

GERMANY'S STOCK OF GOLD AT LOW EBB AS PAPER IS EXPANDING

International News Service. WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Germany's gold stocks have dwindled to a low ebb, and paper money continues to expand with printing press speed, said private advices which reached the treasury today.

No official estimate is made of the amount of gold still in Germany's possession, but some statements not fully confirmed have put the gold stocks as low as \$150,000,000.

Officials today expressed more concern, however, over cablegrams from American advisers abroad, stating that expenses for running the German government this year will exceed 27,000,000,000 marks. Financial advisers said the situation in this respect had become so serious that Germany's chief financial agents had pressed for further devaluation in the outstanding currency, and heavy cuts in the government's expenses.

COMMANDER OF THE AMERICAN LEGION OUTLINES DEMANDS

At a Dinner Given in His Honor Commander Galbraith Tells What Will Be Asked at the Hands of the Next Congress - Consolidation of Many Boards Would Bring Relief - Insists on Americanization Work Among Immigrants.

Associated Press. PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 18.—The policy of the American Legion for the coming year was made public here today, as outlined last night in an address by Frederick Galbraith, national commander, at a dinner in his honor given by officers of the local posts.

Commander Galbraith said the first subject of the legion was insistence on a square deal for all disabled men. He said all disabled men and their dependents must be provided for, immediately.

BOY CONFESSES TO SAVE HIS BROTHER WHEN FOUND LYING

Associated Press. COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., Nov. 18.—Orville Phillips, seventeen, a young brother of Merle Phillips, surrendered to government authorities and confessed he participated in the three and a half million dollar robbery of a mail train on the Burlington railroad Saturday night.

FIFTY MEN BURIED WHEN BIG BUILDING FRAME COLLAPSES

Associated Press. INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 18.—Fifty workmen erecting a three-story building were buried beneath a mass of steel when the frame collapsed. Two are known to be killed and thirty injured.

SEND MEN TYPHOID AND GLANDERS FOR THE CAVALRY HORSES

Associated Press. LONDON, Nov. 18.—Sir Edgar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, stated in the house of commons that during a recent raid in Ireland troops captured the documents of the commander-in-chief of the Irish republican army and sent to his chief of staff containing a series of "vulnerable" hortatory statements regarding the spreading of typhoid among the troops and glanders among the cavalry horses.

FEDERAL AGENTS TO BEAR DOWN LIGHTLY ON THE PERFUMERS

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—Federal Prohibition Commissioner Kramer informed the perfumery manufacturers at a luncheon that the internal revenue officials at Washington are not disposed to interfere with legitimate business in enforcing the prohibition laws.

PACKERS' STOCKYARDS.
The greatest farce staged, greatest of all the farces enacted by Attorney General Palmer and they have been many, is that of compelling the packers to dispose of their interests in the stockyards throughout the country.

As the time approached for the disposal of the packers' interest in the stockyards, the attorney general gave out the word that these had all been sold to a firm in Boston. It was related how the packers would no longer have anything to do with any of the stockyards.

These continuances and delays have now come on for more than a year, during all of which time the old way has prevailed, there has been no change in the ownership or operation of the stockyards.

WHAT CISCO IS DOING.
It must be with no small degree of satisfaction that residents of Cisco constantly hear this city referred by people of other towns and cities in West Texas and by them pointed out as an example of what is possible in a small city, in the way of public improvements.

They must recognize the business acumen and energy and excellent direction of the work, when it is considered that all this has been done in a period of about one year. Laying forty miles of water mains and taking up fourteen miles of old mains, all within less than twelve months, is a task not often completed in cities of far greater population than Cisco.

Cisco has enjoyed an advantage over all other towns in the oil belt because it was a good town before the others were thought of and had a firm foundation on which to build.

Of the vast amount of improvements other than the water and sewer systems, nothing has been said here about the manner in which the city has accomplished in such remarkably short time.

And these are but few of the things Cisco has accomplished in such remarkably short time. Cisco is building permanently. It has no ramshackle buildings, no shanty town, but so rapid has been the increase of its population that it has been forced to have at present several tent cities.

On every hand there are evidences of building and growth and prosperity, unexcelled by any other city in the state. It all goes to make a wonderful showing of what can be accomplished in a small city in West Texas and it is not strange that the people of Cisco are proud of their work.

PROGRESSIVE CISCO.
The people of Cisco again gave expression to that progressive spirit which always characterizes them, when on yesterday they voted to acquire the Britton school property.

Those voting in favor of the bond issue, no doubt looked upon the proposition from many angles. And there are many angles to it. That is, business propositions of various kinds, for it offered so many opportunities for the advancement and betterment of conditions in Cisco that there is hardly a way in which one may look at it but they may find something for the good of the city.

It looks like a good business proposition and the people so accepted it and voted for it. It is not the acquisition of the property alone, and at a nominal price, but it is the exhibition of the willingness on the part of the people to pay their taxes, risk their money, give of their time and substance, in the upbuilding of the city that is worth far more than half a dozen pieces of property.

With the possession of this property, there is now an opportunity for those having charge of the city's affairs to not only solve the problem of a hospital, schools, industrial sites and other things of a real business nature, but the field is open for a display of rare taste accompanied by wise planning, to provide this city with some of the most beautiful spots in the way of parks and playgrounds in West Texas.

EDUCATION IN TEXAS.
During the recent campaign and particularly that portion of it relating to the "educational amendment," which was voted on at the election, it was not usual to see school children in parades with banners reading "Texas—Thirty Ninth in Education."

Texas is justly proud of its many educational institutions and its great public school system, but fully ashamed, or should be, that these are not greater. But better times are coming. The people of Texas have said they are willing to pay for education and they will secure it for their children.

While the state is doing much, while the taxpayers are meeting the burden in a spirit that shows they do not consider a school tax a burden, while the public school system is constantly widening and improving and the great state schools are performing a wonderful work, the churches are taking the real lead in education in the state.

He said the contractor hoped to have the work completed within two weeks.

There is on exhibit at the bank a number of fine sweet potatoes kiln dried in the kiln erected by W. B. Starr, who resides on Route 3. The curing of these potatoes in the kiln shows splendid results. There is one potato among those at the bank which shows that at the time it was placed in the kiln it had begun to rot and that this was stopped on being placed in the kiln.
