

THE WORLD'S **GREAT EVENTS**

GOUTY old man sat in a monastery cell, surrounded by dozens of clocks and watches.

"I cannot even make two clocks tick in unison," he whined peevishly. "No wonder I failed to make millions of people think alike!"

The old clock fancier was Charles V, who had given up affairs of state at the age of fifty-six, and who was spending the two remaining years of his life in monastic retirement. He had had a half century of experiences such as lent a certain pathos to his complaint about the clocks. Born in 1500 to the greatest power ever inberited by mortal man, he had risen to heights reached by no other ruler of his century and had lived to see

his most cherished plans fall to pieces. Here are some of the titles that Charles fell heir to, as a mere boy: the archduchy of Austria, the sovereignty of the Netherlands, the kingdoms of Spain, Sicily and Navarre, and the rulership of all Spain's American possessions. In addition to this, when only nineteen, he was chosen emperor of Germany, and at twenty-six was crowned king of Italy. He ruled four nations which had nothing in common and no ties of mutual interest. These facts, of course, led to endless rivalries, revolts and international complications.

Moreover, a throng of outside enemies rose against the young monarch. Francis I, king of France, who had been one of his competitors for the German crown, promptly declared war on him, seizing the duchies of Milan and Burgundy, which Charles regarded as his own. Soliman, the Magnificent (under whom, from 1520 to 1566, Turkey reached its pinnacle of greatness), invaded Hungary, advancing to the very walls of Vienna, and, with his fleets, held the Mediterranean, menacing Italy and Spain. The Netherlands, too, were ripening for revolt, while a furious revolution broke out In Spain.

Added to this, an Augustinian monk of Germany, Martin Luther, defied the pope, protested against certain tenets of the Catholic church and advanced a "reformed" creed. He drew to him thousands of Germans, his adherents becoming known as "Protestants." The security of the Catholic church, of which Charles was the acknowledged champion, was thus menaced. Altogether he had his hands full.

To beat back France's armies on the Flemish frontier and in Italy, to check the Turks on the Mediterranean and in his own duchy of Austria, to stem the tide of religious disagreements and to reconcile clashing political parties-this was the task before him. He entered on an eight-year war with France, during which he drove the French from Italy and captured King Francis. He forced a humiliating treaty on Francis. This the latter at once broke, but in a second war was again beaten.

Soliman led a great Turkish army over the German frontier and Charles advanced in person to meet him, and drove the Turks back to their own territory. Then Francis, forming an alliance with Sollman, again invaded Italy. But Charles opposed the allles so successfully that they were soon glad to sign a treaty of peace. The revolt in Spain was put down and the Netherlands for the time appeased, so Charles had at last time to attend to the Reformation, which, under Luther, Melancthon and other teachers, had by ths time swept Gerperor had crushed every military foe and had humiliated every royal rival; but here, in this new religious movement at home, he found an opponent he could not conquer-a power that throve under persecution.

Council after council was held, scheme after scheme proposed. Compromises were suggested, but found favor with neither party. As if this one setback had undermined his whole edifice of greatness, so the failure of Charles in reconciling the religious sects was followed by a series of new disappointments and misfortunes. He had hoped to bequeath all his power and possessions to his son Philip, but to this the German electors would not agree. So he foresaw that on his death the mighty one-man empire he held would be split up as had those of Alexander and Charlemagne. To add to his worries, Henry II (son of Francis I) of France, backed by other rulers, invaded Germany and captured several important cities, notably Metz. Charles sought to recapture Metz, but failed, and until 1870 It remained in French hands.

Charles made one more throw of the dice against fate. He arranged a marriage between his son Philip and Queen Mary of England, thus forming an English alliance to strengthen his own power and that of the Catholic church. But the couple had no children to perpetuate the scheme.

His most cherished plans set at naught, his own subjects refusing to be guided by him in matters of religion, his health broken, his territory successfully invaded, his son debarred from inheriting his chief possessions—the combination was too much for the old emperor. He gave up his throne and left to others the helm of state which would no longer obey his enfeebled hand.

His was that saddest of fates: The fate of the man who outlives the greatness he himself had created

RUTH AND NAOMI

LESSON TEXT—Ruth 1:14-22.
GOLDEN TEXT—Thy people shall be my people and thy God my God.
PRIMARY TOPIC—The Story of

IC-The Message of the Book of Ruth. In order to grasp the matter contained in the lesson subject, there must be swept into view the whole book of Ruth. The lesson text which is to be printed has been confined to

the first chapter, verses 14-22. I. Ruth's Connection With Naomi (1:1-15).

On account of famine in Bethlehem of Judah, Naomi with her husband and two sons sojourned in the land of Moab. After the death of her husband her two sons married Moabitish women. After a time her sons died also. After the death of her sons Naomi resolved to return to her homeland, having heard that the Lord had visited his people in giving them bread. They went to Moab to escape trouble but only got into more. It was not until Naomi was thus chastised that she resolved to return. One purpose of God's chastisement is to cause His children to return. Naomi had the good sense to recognize that the hand of the Lord was upon her for good. When the time came for her to go, Ruth and Orpah accompanied her for a distance. This she permitted but determined to place before them frankly the difficulties which would necessarily confront them.

II. Ruth's Noble Choice (1:16-18) Much as Naomi loved her daughtersin-law, she would not have them go into this matter blindly. She wished them to know the seriousness of their undertaking. She told them the worst that could come upon them. This principle ought to be carried out by us in all our relations in life. In this respect Jesus is our supreme example.

1. No chance to marry again. Naomi told her that she had no more sons for whom she could wait. In that day to be unmarried was the greatest disgrace. Society differed then from now. No avenues were left open by which a woman could earn her living and be independent. Furthermore, it was against God's law for the Jews to marry outside of their own people.

2. She must renounce her gods. Her idolatrous worship could not be carried on in the land where God's people dwelt. This was delicately touched upon when Orpah went back (v. 15). Orpah went back when it was plain there was no chance to get a husband. Now Naomi puts an additional test upon Ruth, that of giving up her religion. Ruth was equal to the occasion. Her mind was fully made up. She was willing to accept as her God the one who was able to produce in His subjects the nobility of character she had observed in Naomi. Naomi's very frankness in dealing with her caused Ruth to be more determined to cast her lot with her. Ruth's position was so definite and unfaltering that the very expressions have come down to us in words which "no poetry has outrivated, and no pathos has exceeded, and which have gone through centuries with the music that will not let them be forgotten." She was determined to share Naomi's journey, her home, her God, her lot in life, and her grave. III. Blessings Which Attended Ruth's

Faithfulness. Ruth was never sorry for her

choice, because:

1. She found the true God (1:16). Instead of her heathen god who was unable to help her, she now had the living God, the God of Israel.

2. She found human friends (ch. 2). As she went to glean in the field she was led to the field of Boaz, a man of wealth and grace. The servants of Boaz treated her with consideration.

3. A good husband and a happy home (chs. 3, 4).

She not only secured a husband, but a man of God who had an abundance of this world's goods. 4. An honored place in the Israellt-

ish nation (4:13-17). Though she had to forsake her own people she became one of a nopler

5. She became a link in the chain of Christ's ancestry (4:18-22; cf. Matt. 1:5).

QUEER QUIRKS IN HUMAN DESTINY

By HARRY R. CALKINS

WNU Service A Madman on a Throne

HE momentary elevation of a mad-I man to a throne in 1762 saved the budding empire of the Hohenzollerns and prevented the breaking of a link in the chain of events that was to lead to the great World war of 1914.

The opening of the Seven Years' war in 1756 found Austria and France in arms against Prussia and England. King Frederick, by his gifts as a warrior and diplomat, had raised Prussia from a third rate kingdom to a rival of the Great Powers. He lost no time in seizing Saxony at the outbreak of war, then crossed the mountains to Bohemia. Austrian forces drove him back into his own domain. Then the powers fell upon him. Russia invaded East Prussia, the Swedes entered Brandenburg from the north, the Austrians pressed into Silesia and the French attacked from the west.

Frederick now earned a place among the greatest generals of history. Hemmed in by superior forces, he first drove furiously at the French at Rosbach and beat them badly. Dashing against the Austrians in Silesia, he captured a third of their army and put the rest to flight. Greatly weakened, however, by incessant fighting, he was forced to adopt defensive tactics. The Russians cap-tured Berlin, and Spain entered the was against him. Despite his heroic exploits, King Frederick was facing inevitable ruin.

Then the Tsarina Elizabeth died and was succeeded on the Russian throne by Peter III, a dangerous madman. Peter was an admirer of Frederick. He immediately transferred his effective army from the alliance with Austria to the side of Prussia. Frederick was saved. The mad Peter was dethroned and Catherine II, his successor, promptly withdrew from the war, but Frederick's triumph was already achieved. By the treaty of Hubertusburg (1763) his claim to Silesia was allowed and his right to a place among the powers was established. The might of the Hohenzollerns had arisen, not to fall until the late Kaiser Wilhelm II lost his "place

Garlic Stew Beat Napoleon

COOK who spoiled the broth con-A tributed to the wrecking of Napoleon's brilliant prospects after his victory in the battle of Dresden in the campaign of 1813-1814.

At grips with nearly all of Europa and closely pressed by the armies of Russia, Prussia and Austria, Napoleon turned defeat into victory at Dresden by a swift movement that brought him and his guard overland from Silesia to succor St. Cyr and twenty thousand troops, beleaguered in Dresden. The magic of the great warrior's presence infused new enthusiasm in the wornout troops. "There he is! There he is!" was shouted on all sides as the emperor crept through a murderous Austrian fire to enter the city.

The following day Napoleon laid a concentrated artillery fire on the allied center, and sent Ney against the right and Murat against the left. The allies broke and retreated leaving twenty thousand prisoners. Throughout this day Napoleon rode about his lines, his clothing soaked and that night he suffered a slight chill. His spirits had risen, however, and he believed that the tide at last had turned in his favor. General Vandamme, in the enemy's rear, was expected to complete the annihilation of the retreating Russians and Prussians. He failed, partly through his own weak tactics and partly through Napoleon's failure to pursue his advantage. The latter was laid low by an attack of illness, which some attributed to exposure and exhaustion, but which the emperor, himself, said was "nothing but an attack of indigestion caused by a wretched stew seasoned with garlic, which I cannot endure."

The Napoleonic army was cut to pieces in its subsequent retreat and from that time, August, 1813, misfortune dogged the steps of the emperor of the French.

Bee Kept Fairly Busy

The bee often works-both day and night, gathering the pollen and nectar during the daytime and helping to fan the nectar with its wings during the night, to make the sweet fluid thicker by evaporation. One good authority says that it takes twenty thousand bees to make a single pound of honey. It also takes five pounds of the sweet and precious nectar from the flowers to make one pound of honey. So, although the bee does not always work, in accordance with the latest scientific investigations, the phrase "busy as a bee" still retains its full significance.-Our Dumb Animals.

The novels of Honore Willsie offer a tremendous appeal to men and women alike. All women love her novels, while men also have come to know that whatever she writes will be of prime interest. She puts real men into her books—men who are not movie mannequins, Greek gods or paragons of virtue. And her heroines are the sort of girls that men rather fancy. One would look a long way through American fiction of the present day to find a more charming heroine than the Lydia of this story. Yet she is drawn without any of the excesses of sentimentality. Throughout "Lydia of the Pines" there runs a vein of mysticism that turns even the murmuring of the pines into meaningful whis-perings, as though the vanishing trees and the dying Indians, companions in their days of strength and freedom, were now fulfilling together a fateful, tragic des-tiny. You will like this latest Honore Willsie story if only for its optimism and romance, as re-flected by the honest ambition and affectionate loyalty of its and affectionate loyalty of its heroine, Lydia. From childhood she is beset with a seemingly hopeless tangle of difficult sur-roundings. How she blazes her own way through it to a splendid womanhood is the substance of this story.





The South Plains country is to get two new lines of railway. This country is no longer an experiment. On the contrary it has been proven to be the best farming country in the Southwest. For a long time it was looked upon as a very uncertain section in the matter of seasons, but the past twenty years has demonstrated that the Plains country is perhaps the most certain of any part of Texas. This country never suffered a worse drought than did Central Texas in 1925. Moreover it has been demonstrated that the cultivated area of this county, over any five year period, will produce more on an average than the famous "black lands" in North Central Texas. At this time, railroads are not building into any but proven localities, and the contention among the big systems for a permit to build into the South Plains can mean but one thlng-this country is due for the next big development. There are but two sections in Texas now in which the railroads seem to care to build. One is the Lower Rio Grande Valley, the other is the South Plains. The "Valley" has been developed by high presure while the South Plains is coming to the front because of the opportunities offered by its natural resources.
