TOMORROW AND NEXT DAY.

The following editorial from the Dallas News about the duty of the individual as regards the prevention of fires is opportune and to the point as far as the honest but careless man or woman is concerned. The article should be read and discussed in every home, and laid before the children of the household in a manner that will help them to understand and focus clearly on a very serious ques-

It is about time, too, that the proper officials in the various cities and communities gave sober thought to ways and means of reducing the tremendous annual loss from incendiary fires. The News says:

"Somebody in Texas is carrying in his pocket now the match or the cigarette that will necessitate a fire alarm tomorrow or the next day.. The match is still unstruck and the "fag" still unsmoked. But the alarm will have to be turned in just the same. People are careless that wayother people. One of the strangest things in the world is how people throw matches and cigarette stubs aroundhow other people do it, that is to say.

Somebody in Texas is driving a truck for a refining company. Tomorrow or next day he is going to drive up to a filling station and open up the pipe that leads to the underground tank. He is going to put in his funnel, let down his delivery hose, and then-the ambulance and the fire truck will come. The station will be embers, the truck twisted iron and smoldering rubber, the driver a writhing victim marked for death. It will be an accident, a bit of carelessness, the motor still running-something of the sort that people will overlook, other people, that is.

Somebody in Texas is rigging up a new home-made device for beating the coal man by burning oil in the heater. The joints in the feed pipe are a little leaky, but the sediment in the crude oil may stop them up. It will do it in time, unless the whole contraption blows into kingdom come tomorrow or next day. People seem to have little prudence about fires-other people, you understand.

"If it weren't for other people there would be no accidental fires. One reason we speak of them as "other people" is because so often they are taken off with the property destroyed by their negligence or ignorance. They are "other people" because they are no longer here to speak for themselves.

is today. And you can't leave prevention to "other people." Prevention is something you can't do by proxy or accident. Prevention may mean an extinguisher in the kitchen. It may mean a careful inspection of your electric wiring system. It may mean an occasional cleaning of the old lantern which still does duty once in a while when there's a commotion out at the hen house or the battery is burned out of the flashlight.

"You have to attend to prevention yourself. But it . pays. Prevention is better than a fire loss claim."

Senator Gore has not seen a ray of sunlight for forty years. His last remaining vision vanished when he was eight years old. Yet he is one of the great statesmen of America-one of its best posted men, a brilliant lawyer, a silver tongued orator and a politician whose craftiness is recognized in all quarters.

All men do not agree with Senator Gore. Indeed the people of Oklahoma last year overwhelmingly defeated him for the democratic nomination for United States Senator because he was not in line with some of the policies of the Wilson administration. And it is generally admtted now that his defeat in the primary by his fellow townsman, Scott Ferris of Lawton, was the cause of a republican victory in the general election.

And a peculiar paradox of this is that Senator Gore in 1912 contributed as much to the nomination and election of Woodrow Wilson as any man in America. William F. Mc-Combs, at that time national chairman for the party, in his memoirs gives much of the credit to Senator Gore. But he was one of the "willful few" and was marked for the slaughter eight years later by the administration's friends.

Senator Gore has the most retentive memory in America. He can reel off statistics by the yard in a public speech after they have been read to him but one time.

Because of the remarkable fight he has made against a tremendous handicap and the success he has attained under conditions which would have rendered most men impotent, Americans regardless of creed or politics will hope that this former Texan will be restored the use of his eyes in his declining years.
