DANGER OF ECONOMIZING

There is just one thing about the new airmail bids recently submitted in Washington that is a little bit disturbing. That is the thought that some lines, winning new contracts with extremely low bids, may have to cut the corners so closely in financing their flights that the safety margin will be reduced.

Carrying passengers through the air in safety depends on a number of things. Planes and other equipment must be of the first quality. The pilots themselves must be capable and experienced.

The network of ground service—radio communications, mechanical servicing, weather reports, technical supervision, and so on—must not be skimmed.

It is greatly to be hoped that no company will find itself with such a low figure on its contract that it will feel obliged to cut on any of these essential safeguards. Economy of that kind would, in the end, be frightfully expensive.

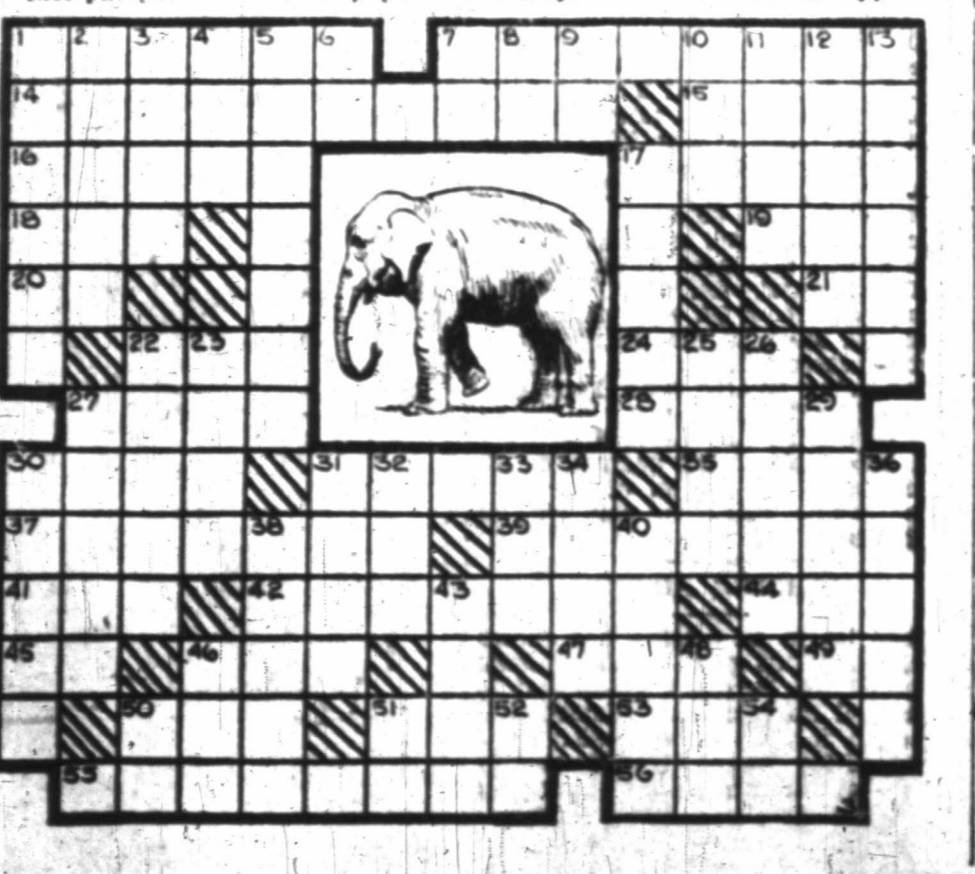

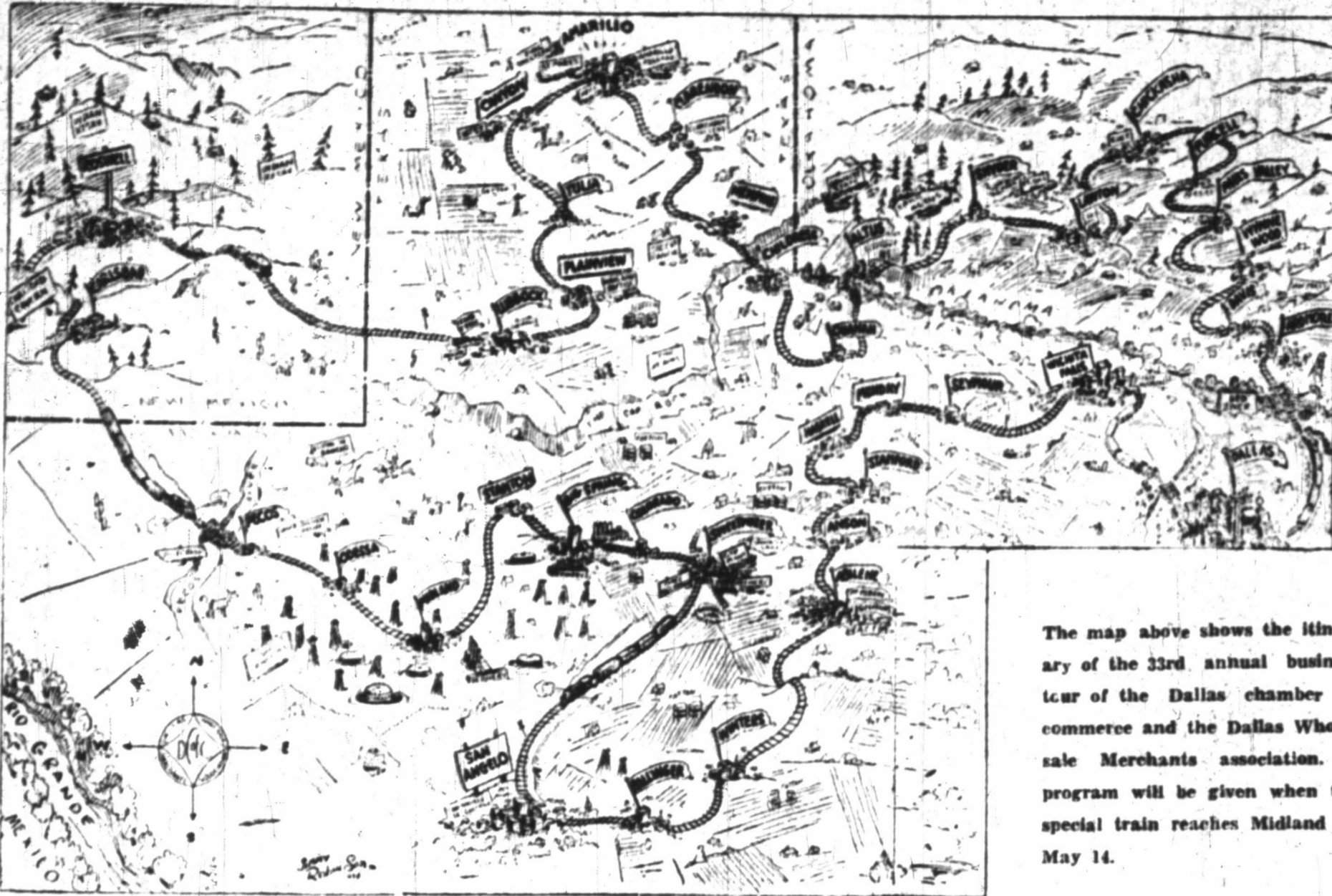

Just as a bunch of high school seniors and juniors may commit assault with malice aforethought and yet not run afoul of the civil authorities, it has been arranged by the coaching staff of the school that a football game be played in Lackey field Friday afternoon.

The game is a product of necessity, Head Coach L. K. Barry explains, pointing to a varied assortment of well thumped pates, drooping ears, shiners and torn pants received in the opening of hostilities attaching to the traditional class week fight.

"If they have to commit mayhem we thought it might be better to do it under supervision," the coach said. "The rest of the town can sit

The coach gave a sketchy idea of what the game will be like.

We expect to use a wide variety of plays and, of course, many of them will result in a loss of yardage, but, on the other hand, we hope some of them will bring long

gains and touchdowns.

"We are handicapped by lack of a first class passer and will have to bring a 'Daisy' out of the line on reverses or most of our passes. Jack Prothro probably will be used for this duty also, but neither of these is as good a passer as the juniors have."

"I am expecting a bloody battle. Most of the seniors are old and feeble in comparison with the young, spry juniors, who are now in the prime of life and the pink of condition. It would not surprise me if the juniors beat the smarter team."

### Auto Phrases Also Apply to Dancing

HOLLYWOOD. (AP)—It may sound silly and quite illogical, but the best way to learn to dance properly is through a careful study of new phrases conjured up in the making of automobiles.

This is the earnest and unapologetic belief of Veloz and Yolanda, young internationalists who in a brief space of years have become the highest-paid ballroom dancers in the country.

They see in the coined slogans "knee action," "free wheeling" and "airflow," three expressions that exactly fit the requirements

of a perfectly executed dance.

Yolanda, the feminine half of the team, which makes its screen debut with Guy Lombardo's orchestra in "Many Happy Returns" at Paramount, believes correct "knee action" is the basic foundation of good dancing.

"We dancers never thought of inventing a term to express this requirement," she said. "Knee action" means the difference between a stiff, uncomfortable dance and a graceful, effortless one. As in an automobile, perhaps, the "knee" should absorb the shocks, never the body.

Veloz agrees that knee action is tremendously important in dancing and adds that his knees always are bent, even when in re-

pose, but he feels that "free wheeling" is the most important of all.

"This term, which I would use freely if I were teaching the dance, synthesizes all that is good in art," he said. "To me it represents the effortless flow of motion and liquid fluidity we must achieve to be good dancers."

"Free wheeling" I suppose means motion without labor. If it does, it correctly describes the most important dance essential.

Both artists are agreed on "airflow," a term conceived through a study of aerodynamics. The dancers are never quite conscious of doing so, but instinctively they turn so that the broadest physical surface (the

back, for instance) rarely ever faces the direction of movement.

## Farmers Buy More Seed Since Rains

**BALTIMORE, May 5, U.P.**—Silver bloc leaders ended an unusual train conference with President Roosevelt today, still hopeful that their fight for silver legislation in this session of congress would win approval of the administration.

**Victim Must Always Trust the Swindler**

**SPRINGFIELD, Ill. U.P.**—The Illinois state supreme court recently held that a swindle does not constitute the crime of confidence game unless the victim trusts the swindler.

The ruling was made in a case where the court reversed the judgment of a lower court convicting Oscar Parker, alias Pepper Parker for operating a confidence game. He had been sentenced to imprisonment for allegedly taking \$123 from Mrs. Lydia Bills of Marissa.

Evidence in the case showed that Parker was selling Mrs. Bills four cases of cigars, understood by all to be stolen property, for \$123, a price less than the market. While Mrs. Bills got the money Parker brought the case into the business establishment, took the money from her woman's hands and fled.

Mrs. Bills testified she intended to examine the case before paying the money. Later when she opened the boxes she found them to be empty.

A swindling operation does not constitute a confidence game unless the element of confidence becomes a part of such swindling, the court's opinion said.

"The evidence shows Mrs. Bills indicated that she not only had no confidence in the plaintiff, but that the money actually was grabbed from her woman's hands and fled. Opportunity to make the investigation she wished.

"The evidence thus shows not only that the element of confidence is lacking as is also the further necessary element of voluntary parting with her money, as the result of such confidence."

**Decides Whiskey No Spring Fever Tonic**

**BUFFALO N. Y. U.P.**—Whisky is no spring fever tonic. So ruled Judge Clifford J. Chip in finding John Schultz, 38, guilty of intoxication.

"It was like this, judge," Schultz explained. "I got spring fever so when I got that way I feel blue so I thought a couple of drinks would do me some good."

"Well, did it?" queried the court.

"No, I feel worse now," Schultz answered glumly.

"Well, that's settled then," the court opined. "Alcohol does not."

**Grave Turned Wrong Direction Well Kept**

**STEUBENVILLE (U.P.)**—A grave, the mound of which is north and south is well kept in the Duffau cemetery, the oldest burial ground in Erath county. The crosswise grave is an old one, but it was worked and kept in good shape along with more recent graves because of the incident that caused it to be turned the wrong way.

Shortly before the man who occupies the grave died, he requested that his head be turned north instead of west when he was buried, explaining that he always had been crosswise with the world and that he thought it appropriate to be buried that way. So his head was turned north and his grave, although unmarked by a tomb, is well taken care of.

**African Catholic Church Continues Its Progress**

**VATICAN CITY (U.P.)**—Missionary reports which reach here show that the Catholic church continues to make headway in Africa, and is proving a fertile ground for converts.

Statistics show that on June 30, 1933, there were 1,182,518 Catholics in British East Africa. This represents a net increase of nearly 100,000 on the number of Catholics for 1932.

There is every evidence, too, that steady progress will be maintained, as there are 331,000 catechumens under instruction for baptism.

The spread of Catholicism among the various races of Africa is one of the most acceptable signs of the times for Vatican authorities. In British East Africa alone, the Catholics have more than doubled during the past ten years. In 1921, the official figure given by the various missions was slightly over the half million, while in 1930, the total had reached 689,000.

This large increase, as it is interesting to note, is due especially during the last few years to the enthusiastic work of the native missionaries who come to European seminaries in scores, make their study and then return to preach.

There are nearly 1,000 priests in British East Africa of whom about 100 are natives. There are 419 lay brothers, of whom 36 are natives. There are 1,529 nuns of different orders, including teachers and nurses of the sick, and among this number 317 native nuns are included.

The various seminaries in Africa and Europe account for 1,430 students. Tanganyika has 417 minor
