Humble Oil Test Making Progress

On checking up the Humble oil test nine miles northwest of Muleshoe we learned they were 120 feet with the 20 inch hole. The drilling of a hole of this size you must remember takes time. After about 500 feet they start the 15 inch casing and then they draw it down as they go down to a six inch casing. They are running two crews, and John Ewing is the driller with Dan Easter as foreman of the job. They are to go 3500 feet, before they draw one dollar of pay. The driller said they would complete the test just as soon as they could, but were not under a contract to finish the job in a certain time.

The Findley Drilling Company with offices at Amarillo and Wichita Falls have the drilling contract. They are to make two tests on this lease before they quit the job.

Oil men have great hopes in this test.

The Mystery Company will spud in its well north of the Gulf Production Company, some time this week we have been reliably informed. The big Oil Companies have their eyes on the Plains country, are making many tests, and leasing all the land they can get hold of. They surely think well of this part of the state as the next big oil producing district.

Plainview To Have Celebration

Plainview is staging an all-day celebration next Friday, November 26th., which will be an All-Plains Jubilee celebrating the granting of the permits by the Interstate Commerce Commission to the The Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company, and The Quanah, Acme, and Pacific Railway Company to extend their respective lines into the South Plains territory. Permits were granted on Friday of last week to the Denver to build its line from Estelline to Dimmitt by way of Turkey, Quitaque, and Plainview, and build an interesting line from Silverton to Lubbock by way of Lockney, and Petersburg. The Quanah, Acme and Pacific was given permission to build from Roaring Springs to Floydada.

The granting of these permits removes perhaps the last obstacle in the way of the rail extension program that will mean so much to this section. In fact it is the greatest event in the history of the development of the Plainview country and in the South Plains. For over a third of a century this country has been working for just such lines as there will be when built. Plainview wants the people of Muleshoe to come over and help us in this celebration.

Would Drill Well in Hale County

L. B. House, of the Mystery Oil Company, the company that is drilling the oil well in Castro county 8 miles north of the Gulf well was in Plainview Saturday and while here told business friends that he is willing to drill a well in Hale county provided the proper acreage can be secured. As far as the prospects for oil are concerned he is satisfied with Hale county.

Mr. House is a successful oil man and has the reputation of being a straight, quick shooter in the oil game.

His frank statement is encouraging to those of us who may have doubted that oil would ever be discovered in this county.

Mr. House also suggests that Plainview should get busy and have oil supply houses located here, as the country surrounding the town is sure to come in for a thorough play, and if the supply houses should locate here Plainview's ambition to become the oil metropolis of the district would be greatly improved.

Rumors have it that by the first of January two or three locations will be announced in this county.—Plainview News.

Work Resumed On Whicker No. 1

Drilling operations were resumed on the Whicker No. 1 Monday night after a delay of several days due to the fact that some of the drillers were called away. The well is down now about 875 feet, according to foreman Teague, with the prospects of a steady run ahead. They are still working in the red bed, and it is anticipated that this formation will prevail for the next few hundred feet. Several good indications for oil have been encountered at various depths, and a few more week of drilling will bring the well to a depth at which it will commend the interest of the entire oil industry.

In the Tatum and Lovington sections southeast of Bledsoe, several very promising tests will soon be ready to drill in, and the country southeast of Bledsoe also has some interesting oil developments.

Several tests are promised for the country north scattering over the entire section between Bledsoe and the Panhandle oil fields.

The activity promises to develop almost all at once, which is a very good indication that a field will really be brought in if a field really exists. Immediately south east of Bledsoe, oil has been found in very small quantities at very shall depths, and several wells in the north and west are reported to have produced small quantities of gas at various times. A noticeable amount of gas was found in the Whicker No. 1 at a shallow depth.

Tests are going down in almost a complete circle surrounding Bledsoe, Brownfield, Lovington, Tatum, Portales, Sudan, Littlefield, Lubbock and Muleshoe each report some activity, and Bledsoe in the center of this activity is also the center of interest at present. Watch the west plains develop into the next great oil field.—Bledsoe News.

SO GOOD

When serving wild duck, garnish with slices of orange unpeeled and garnished with sprigs of parsley. The slightly acid fruit adds to the flavor of the duck. As a salad to serve with duck, oranges are especially good; serve with French dressing.

Orange and Rhubarb Ice.—Combine one cupful of orange juice with three and one-half cupfuls of cooked sifted rhubarb, one tablespoonful of lemon juice, the grated rind of an orange and one and three-quarters cupfuls of sugar. Stir until well dissolved, then freeze as usual.

Apple Fritters.—Mix and sift together one and one-third cupfuls of flour, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one-fourth teaspoonful of salt, add one well-beaten egg and two-thirds of a cupful of milk; mix all together. Cut two medium-sized apples into eighths, stir into the batter. Drop by spoonfuls into hot fat and fry until brown. Roll in powdered sugar and serve with meat at dinner.

Swiss Cheese Savory.—Dip round slices of bread in melted butter, sprinkle with salt and pepper and a little lemon juice. Put one-half pound of Swiss cheese through the meat grinder, add one tablespoonful of chopped parsley and the same of pimento, two tablespoonfuls of creamed butter, four tablespoonfuls of cream with salt and pepper to taste. Pipe through a pastry tube over the bread, sprinkle with paprika and put into the oven to heat hot.

Jellied Apples.—Pare, core and slice one quart of apples. Butter a baking dish and put a layer of apples, cover with a layer of sugar, repeating until all the apples are used. Add one-half cupful of hot water, cover and bake three hours. Soften one tablespoonful of gelatin in one-half cupful of cold water and dissolve in one-quarter of a cupful of boiling water. Mix carefully through the hot apples, turn into a mold and when chilled serve with cream.

Egg Sauce.—Beat well two eggs, separating the yolks and whites. To the yolks add one cupful of powdered sugar, one-fourth cupful of hot milk and a teaspoonful of vanilla. Fold in the beaten whites and serve at once.

Apple Ice.—Cut up six large tart apples and boil with four cupfuls of water and the rind of a lemon until soft. Drain, add two cupfuls of sugar and boil for three minutes. Add the juice of two lemons and the juice of an orange, mix all together and freeze.

Ways With Meats.

Some of the following dishes may be prepared from left-over meats; these are but suggestions which may be varied to suit the occasion:

Chili Stew.—Take one and one-half pounds of round steak, one and one-half tablespoonfuls of butter, one and one-half tablespoonfuls of olive oil, six tablespoonfuls of chopped onion, four cloves of garlic,

one and one-half tablespoonfuls of Worcestershire sauce, three teaspoonfuls of chili powder, two teaspoonfuls of salt, three cupfuls of canned tomatoes, one and one-half tablespoonfuls of flour. Grind the steak or cut in small bits, melt the butter, add the oil in a deep frying pan, add onion, garlic and fry until a light brown. While frying, add the Worcestershire sauce and chili powder, stir until well blended. Pour in enough water to just cover the bottom of the pan, add the meat and almost cover with water. Cook slowly for fifteen minutes, then add the tomato and salt. Blend the flour with a little tomato juice and add to the stew, then place in a fire-proof dish and bake in the oven for an hour. Serve with rice or noodles.

Veal Pie.—Cook a piece of veal from the neck or any cheap cut, until tender, with small piece of salt pork. Cut into bits and arrange in a baking dish, add cream seasonings, cover with a rich biscuit crust and bake until brown.

Chili Con Carni.—Take a half pound of lean and fat pork (fresh), add one and one-half pounds of round steak; put the meat through the meat grinder. Brown three good-sized, sliced onions, add the meat, one dried chili pepper, two quarts of tomato, salt, pepper to taste, three tablespoonfuls of chili powder and cook slowly three hours, then add two cans of kidney beans and let the whole stand to cook another half hour.

Ragout of Mutton.—Cut cold roast or boiled mutton into one-inch pieces. Take one tablespoonful of butter, add one of flour, one-half pint of seasoned stock, season with salt and pepper, three drops of tabasco sauce, a tablespoonful of Worcestershire sauce and a pinch of saffron. Add mutton, heat until boiling, then add one tablespoonful of currant and orange juice. Serve hot.

Lesson for November 23

GIDEON AND THE THREE HUNDRED

LESSON TEXT—Judges 7:1-25.
GOLDEN TEXT—Be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might.
PRIMARY TOPIC—Gideon and His Brave Band.

JUNIOR TOPIC—A Brave Leader.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Gideon and the Three Hundred.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Working Together With God.

Because of Israel's sin, God permitted them to be brought under the cruel yoke of bondage at the hands of the Midianites. So grievous was this affliction that they hid in dens, caves and strongholds (Judg. 6:2). In their distress they cried unto the Lord and He sent deliverance to them through the judgship of Gideon. The angel of the Lord appeared to him while at the post of duty. Gideon hesitated. His hesitancy was not due to unbelief but to modesty and cautiousness. He came from an obscure and unimportant family (Judg. 6:15). Before going forward in this enterprise he wished to be doubly sure that God had called him (Judg. 6:36-40). The tangible evidence was furnished by means of the fleece. Gideon began his reformatory work at once (Judg. 6:25-27). He not only began at once, but began at home. This is God's order.

I. The Opposing Armies (v. 1).
Gideon and his army arose early on the eventful day of his victory and encamped by the spring of Herod. Over against them was the host of Midianites in battle array. Gideon's army was quite insignificant in comparison with the Midianites.

II. The Sifting of Gideon's Army (vv. 2-8).

At Gideon's call, 32,000 men responded ready for the struggle. This seemed a small army to go against the Midianite army—135,000 strong, but God said even this was too many, lest they be led to boasting and self-confidence. Their real danger was not in their small army but in their pride. All that were faint-hearted were allowed to go back, leaving only 10,000. There were 22,000 cowards in that group of men and worst of all, they were not ashamed to confess it. Still, this was too many. When God was through with His sifting process only 300 remained. The 10,000 were brave men, but not of proper quality and fitness. Those who lapped the water showed alertness and watchfulness.

III. God Gives Encouragement to Gideon (vv. 9-15).

God commanded Gideon to go down to the Midianite camp where he would hear something that would cheer his heart and strengthen his hands. God always comes to cheer us when our hearts are faint. When he came near he heard a man tell a dream which was that of a barley cake tumbling into the camp and smiting it. He also heard the interpretation given to that dream. This greatly cheered his heart and strengthened him for his work and caused him to break forth in praise to God. The barley cake is a very insignificant thing—a very cheap affair in itself, but with the hand of God upon it it would be sufficient to spread consternation among the Midianites and bring destruction upon their armies. No matter how weak and insignificant a man may be, if God is with him he shall not fall.

IV. God Gives Victory to Gideon (vv. 16-23).

His attack was unique. The whole matter was of faith (Heb. 11:32). The ground of his faith was God's Word and the token which He had given him. Gideon with his 300 men formed into three companies, each man being provided with a lamp concealed within a pitcher. Thus armed they surrounded the camp of the Midianites. They were all instructed to keep their eyes upon their leader and imitate him. We too are to keep our eyes on our Leader, Christ, and to ever do as He does. At the proper moment they blew their trumpets and broke their pitchers, giving opportunity for their lights to shine out. This awful crash of breaking pitchers, followed by the sound of trumpets accompanied by the shout "the sword of the Lord and of Gideon" threw the Midianites into a panic, causing them to fight amongst themselves: 120,000 were thus slain, leaving but 15,000 of that mighty army (Judg. 8:10).

In making the application to ourselves in this age, we can think the sound of the trumpets as representing prayer or calling to God, torches as the light of the Gospel, pitchers our human nature as this treasure in earthen vessels.

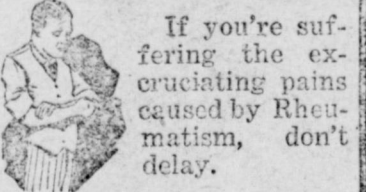

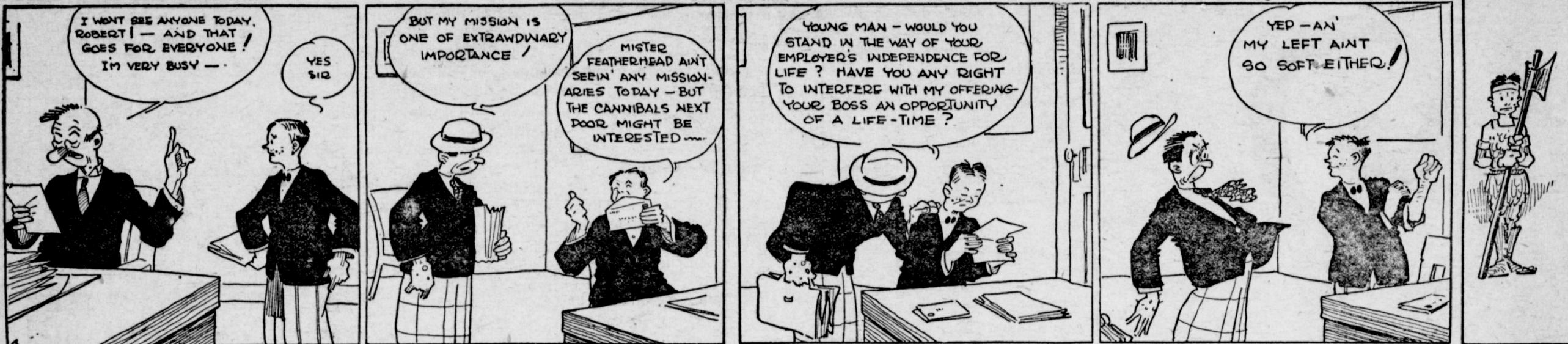

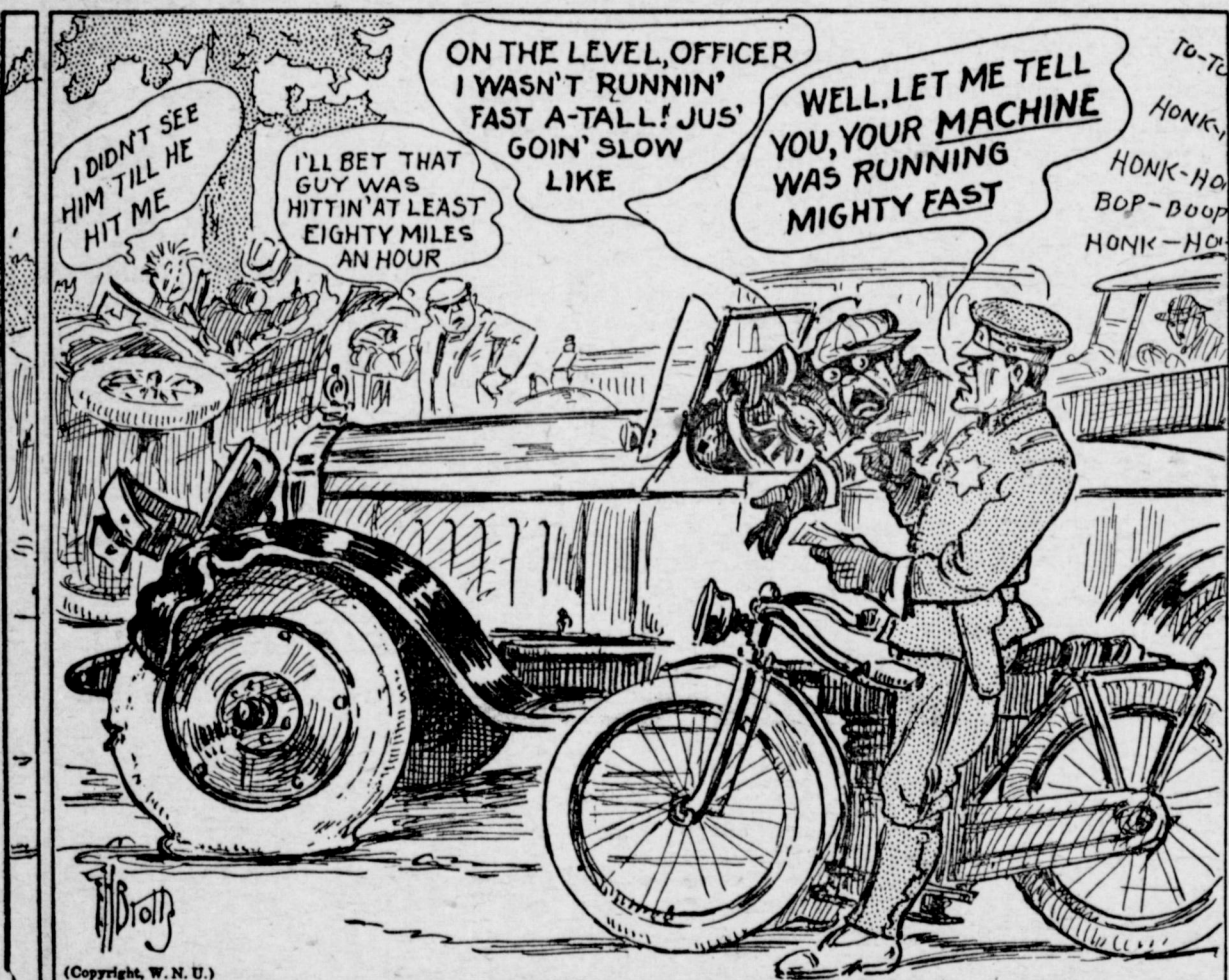
