





Fig. 1 shows the ideal curvature, the highest point of which is eight inches above the level of the curbs (indicated by the dotted line) and eighteen inches above the gutters. A glance shows that the crown is raised sufficiently high to afford good drainage to the gutters. This curve is the chief factor of a good road.


