Now What do You Think.

By the courtesy of Tax Assessor R. H. Martin and deputy H. Thiers the News is able to give a short statistical sketch of Sutton county as taken from the tax rolls for 1910. We are enabled to give the number of acres, the value of town property, the number yams and kinds of live stock, etc.

The report shows Sutton to be an intensely diversified stock country and with the advent of the railroad the hog will be another revenue producer and greatly surpass the value of the dogs. Notice the numbers of the food supply and clothing growers, in fact all the items are interesting and shows that to be made revenue producers. We must have a railroad:

San Angelo Fair.

The annual fair and carnival at San Angelo will be held Oct. 3 & 4 inclusive. Races, purses aggregating \$7000. The star races, which closed to entry Sept. 1st, are well fixed, there being sixteen entries of high class horse for one running race for a purse of \$500.00. Eight \$700.00 purses and seven \$250.00 purses scattered among the runners, pacers and trotters, besides a number of \$100 and \$150 purses, will be contested for by the posties. At the track at this time a number of the best horses to Texas and Oklahoma are training getting ready for the fastest and highest money races West of Fort Worth.

Autoists will compete for prizes aggregating \$4075, there being five events commencing with Oct. 4th, or one each day. The cattle, horses, swine, sheep, goat and poultry departments each have attractive premium lists. Agricultural products will also stand to carry off a heavy list of premiums.

There will be a Matrimonial department, a baby show, bronco busting and other features. As a fitting climax to each day's program, a large and well known carnival company will hold the boards on the down town business streets, in fact San Angelo will be turned over to the pleasure seekers.
A special feature will be the trial flights of two aeroplanes now being contracted in San Angelo by two local amateur aviators, Noah Smith and Ben G. Campbell. A woman's building, which is being erected by the ladies of San Angelo at a cost of \$3500 00 will contain the ladies work department as well as providing a rest room for the women and children. Cheap rates on the Santa Fe and Orient have been announced.

Altitude in Sonora Country.

Your are often asked the altitude of your home town and how high the hills are and other similar questions and the News is pleased to be able to furnish some information this week as to altitude of different places along the Orient via Sonora survey. Eldorado is 2410; at the line of Schleicher and Sutton counties it is 2379 and in Sonora where the survey crosses Concho ayente near the school house 2120. At the line of Sutton and Edwards counties it is 2299; Double Tanks in Val Verde county is 1750 and Del Rio 920 feet above sea level. It is thought that there is not much difference between the elevation of Double Tanks and where they are now drilling for oil.

The Railroad Situation.
 A meeting of most of the active workers on the Railroad Subscription Committee, was held at the First National Bank Saturday night when it was decided that owing to recent laws it was advisable to endeavor to arrange with the Orient officials for a change of the proposed contract from a bond purchase to a bonus basis. Consequently, as the 60 days extension was about exhausted it was decided to send three representatives to Kansas City to confer with General Manager Dickenson.
 The sub-committee selected was W. L. Aldwell, James Cornell and W. A. Glascock. The action of the committee was verified Monday night at another conference and the above named committee left Wednesday morning for a conference with Mr. Dickenson at Kansas City Friday.
 If the sub-committee is successful it is probable that the subscriptions will be in cash without any bond issue attached and this will simplify the matter for all.
 The question will then resolve itself into: How much will my property be worth with a railroad, more than it is now, or would be if the railroad took the divide route. Now, my dear people, is not the time to pay or try to play a game of bluff. Don't play your antipathy to the railroad by saying it will ruin your ranch or that some other town is close enough for you. Those statements are of small moment and everyone knows why they are made. Many men stay with their neighbors even though they know they are wrong. Just because the rails may be laid through your pasture is no reason why you will not save to drive your stock 20 miles to a shipping station.
