


Directly above is shown Reynolds Packard, representative of the United Press, on a tour of inspection of a village in Djibouti.

The Texas State Teachers' Association annual convention was held

in San Antonio Friday. At one meeting, the eighteenyear rule was discussed. This rule had been ordered put into effect

as of September 1, 1936. Under this rule all pupils eighteen years of age before September 1, would be ineligible for interscholastic competition.

Educators who attended the meeting were overwhelmingly opposed to the rule, but were satisfied for the age limit to be placed at nineteen. The conference passed a resolution calling for submitting the rule to a referendum of the schools, the decision of the referendum to determine the action of the state committee.



### Mexican People To Have Baptist Church

The Rev. Frank Nixon Aids in Forming Group Sunday

Organization was perfected Sunday afternoon of a Sonora church to be known as the First Mexican Baptist Church.

Directing the organization of the new religious group were the Rev. Frank Nixon, pastor of the Baptist Church, the Rev. I. V. Garrison of Ozona, the Rev. D. Ruiz of San Angelo and the Reverend Rios of San Angelo.

Twenty members are enrolled in the church which is to have services in its own building in the Sonora Mexican district. The Reverend Rios has recently been assigned by the home mission board of the denomination to work with the Mexican people here and in other towns of this section. He will have headquarters here.

Most of those who make up the church now presented letters from churches in San Angelo, Ozona and Del Rio. Two presented themselves for baptism. Four others, it is understood, will come into the church by letter soon but were not able to attend the organization meeting.

It was voted unanimously that the church would work with the Concho Valley Baptist Association, the Mexican Baptist Convention and the Baptist General Convention of Texas. Articles of faith were read and adopted and at the close of the service the Church Covenant was read.



### Buffalo Grass to Resod

Great Plains Advised Quanah, Texas.-The Great Plains must be resod before the dust storm menace can be controlled, in the opinion of Superintendent J. Roy Quinby of the Texas agricultural experiment station here.

Buffalo Grass or "running mesquite," native to the plains country, Quinby says, is the ideal plant. However, Quinby has devised a machine to harvest buffalo grass seed. He characterizes the machine as an "overgrown vacuum cleaner." The seed grows close to the ground

and falls as soon as it matures. In tests Quinby has harvested 80 pounds an acre, he says. One pound will plant an acre of ground effectively.

"Resodding the Midwest with buffalo grass will lay the dust and keep the farms at home," Quinby declares.

### Princess Drops Royal Rights to Wed Salesman

London.—Inheriting her father's disregard for tradition, Princess Ingeborg of Bentheim-Steinfurt, twenty-four years old, cast aside all hereditary and royal privileges at Caxton hall register office in London when she married August Anton Hans Solken, twenty-two years old, a salesman.

Exactly 29 years ago her father, Prince Eberwyn, renounced an income of \$1,250,000 a year and all his royal privileges to marry the daughter of a German peasant. The secret wedding also was performed in London.

Questioned on the attitude of her family toward the wedding, Princess Ingeborg, who is related to nearly all the reigning monarchs

in Europe, said: "They do not like it very much. That is why we came to England in the hope of keeping the wedding a secret. I am sorry it has be-
