Saddam Hussein 'Caught Like a Rat,' **U.S. Commander Says**

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WASHINGTON, Dec. 14, 2003 - Saddam Hussein was "caught like a rat" and offered no resistance when U.S. soldiers captured him near Tikrit Dec. 13, the U.S. general in charge of the operation said today.

Saddam was found hiding at the bottom of a hole hidden on a farm near his hometown. Roughly 600 U.S. soldiers were involved in the operation, but no shots were fired. Two other men were captured in the compound, Maj. Gen. Raymond T. Odierno, commander of the Army's 4th Infantry Division, said during a press briefing in Iraq. The 4th Infantry Division is responsible for coalition operations in the Tikrit area.

Odierno surmised the pressure on Saddam had become so tight that he couldn't risk traveling with a large entourage, and therefore had no bodyguards with him. "It was him and just a couple other people with him, so he really didn't have much of a security force," the general said. "And he was in the bottom

of a hole, so there was no way he could fight back, so he was just caught like a rat."

The 4th Infantry Division has been in Iraq since April, and Odierno said he believes Saddam largely had been in the Tikrit area since then. So there was "some satisfaction" in capturing the Iraqi dictator. However, he stressed, "there's still a lot of work that we have to do, and we're still focused on our tasks of defeating any regime elements who might be remaining who want to conduct attacks against coalition forces and more importantly try to stop most Iraqis from moving forward."

The most important thing for the Iraqi people now, he said, is for them to continue to move forward in their efforts to control their own country. "We continue to help the Iraqis take charge of their country, and we continue to help build the infrastructure so that they can take charge of their country," Odierno said.

In his opening statement,

capture "a significant event for the Iraqi people." He said he believes most Iraqi people are relieved that Saddam has been captured. "I think there was always a (fear) that he might return, and now that he's in coalition custody there is no doubt that he will never return to power in this country," Odierno said.

"The intimidation and fear this man generated for over 30 years are now gone. Many will rest much better tonight knowing Iraq is moving forward to a more secure environment," he said. "A significant blow has been dealt to the former regime elements still trying to hamper progress in Iraq.'

He also had high praise for the American soldiers who conducted the raid, as well as all U.S. service members. "I want everyone to know how proud I am of the great soldiers of the task force and the division and all the great soldiers, sailors and airmen in our armed forces," Odierno said. "They perform superbly each and every day."

Hospital Board calls special meeting to open construction bids

The regular meeting of the Sutton County Hospital District, Board of Directors, was held on Monday, December 8, 2003, in the Annex at the Hospital. The following directors were present: Lewis Allen, President; Sherrill Dannheim, Vice President; Preston Faris, Mike Healy, Maria Carrasco, and Virginia Epps. Also present were Rex Ann Friess, Chief Appraiser, Sutton County Appraisal District; Keith Butler, Administrator/CEO, Ben Epps, Mickey Schaefer, and Kathy Knight, Board Secretary. After being called to order and the regular business of approving prior meeting minutes, Friess advised the Board that the 2003 tax levy was \$1,051,505.84. She reported that as of the end of November, 9% has been collected, as compared to the 4% collected at this time last year. A called meeting was set for Tuesday, December 23, 2003, at 2:00 p.m. to open the bids for the construction of the hospital and the wellness center. Butler advised the board that he had visited with Angela Williams with O'Connell Robertson & Associates and there have been a number of calls from all over the state showing interest in bidding on the project. Butler said that the District had been rejected on five of the grants he had applied for, but he was waiting to hear from three other organizations. Virginia Epps made the motion to confirm Michelle Schaefer as Chief Financial Officer beginning January 1, 2004. Mike Healy seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Holman began the meeting by explaining that in the last weekend in April she would be having a full blood goat show at the Civic Center. The event will be for two days, bringing in out of town competitors and participants for the weekend. A judge from South Africa is being brought in to judge and to conduct a seminar. Holman requested that the Chamber of Commerce assist with advertising expenses for the event. After discussing how the event will help to bring in visitors to local hotels, restaurants and businesses, the Board voted to sponsor the event and take care of all advertising costs. Holman expressed her appreciation and said that she plans on making the event annual and to expect a class act.

In committee reports, Bounds said that Flowers by Irene had renewed her membership with the Chamber, and had her grand opening in her new location on Tuesday, December 9, 2003. Business After Hours for the fourth quarter had to be cancelled due to the busy holiday season.

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Bounds reported on the "Holiday Weekend", including the "More the Merrier" Christmas Bazaar and the Christmas Fair on Main Street. She said that the "More the Merrier" was very successful, with the majority of the vendors reporting great sales. The Christmas Fair on Saturday was not as successful and several ideas were discussed to change the holiday plans for next year. Several suggestions were made for improving the "More the Merrier" to make it even bigger next year.

Bounds reported 39 visitors that signed the log in November, with 107 calls requesting information about Sonora (Game Dinner, Caverns, hunting, hotels, relocations and local events). There were 733 hits on the web site last month, and five relocation packets had been sent out by request.






McDaniel, and Billy Ray McDaniel, and his sister, Mary Alvinia "Sis" Whitlock.

Q. Why do people have Christmas trees? They have nothing to do with Christ. A. Yes they do! There is an

English legend about the early days of Christianity in the British Isles. A monk named Wilfred, later to be called St. Wilfred, was trying to spread Christianity to the Druids. The oak tree was considered an object of worship in the Druid religion. One day, surrounded by a group of his converts, Wilfred took a great axe and struck down an oak tree. It split in four pieces and from the hollow center there grew a young fir tree, pointing a green spire toward the sky. The crowd was amazed to see the young tree growing inside the oak.

Wilfred dropped his axe and turned to the people saying "This little tree shall be your Holy Tree tonight. It is the wood of peace, for your houses are built of the fir. It is the sign of endless life, for its leaves are evergreen. See how it points toward the heavens. Let this be called the tree of the Christ Child. Gather about it, not in the wilderness as the Druids worship the oak, but in your homes. There it will be surrounded with loving gifts and rights of kindness.

The earliest mention of Christmas, in the existing issues of the Devil's River News, tells that there was a grand dance held in Sonora the nights of December 24 and 31, 1891. The Christmas Eve dance was held immediately following a celebration around a Christmas tree in the old wooden school house. The decorating committee were E. C. Saunders, L. L. Russell, Geo. Traweek, G. L. Moore, J. M. Bell, Mrs. & Dr. Coleman, Mrs. Baugh, Misses May Callahan, Mary Rudicil, Agnes Murchison, Ollie Cusenbary, Susie Martin and Lucille Adams. Evergreen collectors were Geo. Traweek, Dave Dunagan, G. Huber and P. Hurst, Jr. In 1920 a celebration was

held in the School Auditorium with a Christmas tree decorated for children under 15 years of A special thanks to every- age. All these children were


Finally we will tell you about a Christmas Day wedding in 1919. Mr. Wayne West and Miss May North were united in marriage by Rev. A. J. Carson, at the home of the bride in Ozona. Very few were present

at the ceremony except the immediate families of the parties. Following the ceremony the young couple took a wedding trip in the beautiful new car that was a present from the groom's father. Wayne West was one of the leading young stockmen of Crockett County. He was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. West.

AUSTIN - What parents haven't fantasized about their child becoming a doctor when they grow up?

The federal Council on Graduate Medical Education estimates that the U.S. will need between 1.09 million and 1.17 million physicians by 2020. Unfortunately for anyone who may need medical care then, current projections are that only 971,000 to 1.08 million doctors will write prescriptions that year.

Texas certainly will be doing its part to overcome that anticipated shortage of M.D.s.

The state currently has eight medical schools, but during the special session in October, lawmakers approved a ninth school.

House Bill 28, which received little fanfare except in and around El Paso, authorizes Texas Tech University to sell \$45 million in tuition revenue bonds to fund construction of a four-year medical school for Tech's Health Sciences Center in El Paso.

Currently, the El Paso center trains only third - and fourthyear medical students.

Though Texas Tech must still come up with funds to service the bonds, with \$2.6 million in seed money for the next biennium, construction could begin late next year or early in 2005.

When Perry signed HB 28 into law, El Paso leaders said it was the most significant legislation affecting that city in a half century. The new school will nearly double the number of medical students, and with addi -. tional faculty and staff, it will amount to a needed economic shot in the arm for the biggest city on the left side of Texas. 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James B. Francis Jr., a member of the Public Safety Commission, the policy body that oversees the Department of Public Safety, has stepped down from the panel after eight years. No word yet on who the governor will appoint to replace

him on the three-member commission.

The Transportation Commission, which oversees the Texas Department of Transportation, also still has three members, but legislators in the last session passed a bill expanding that commission to five members.

The two new members have yet to be appointed, though there has been some buzz that at least one of the appointments is coming soon.

Remember, Santa wears one...

Everyone in law enforcement or other safety-related fields says it all the time, as if they were reading from a script: Wear your safety belt.

The DPS says that if someone is thrown from their vehicle during a crash, the likelihood of death or injury increases 70 percent. The place to be when metal meets metal is snugly behind the wheel, and an air bag.

Though some Texans still resist using seat belts, surveys continue to show more and more are wising up. A decade ago, seat belt usage was estimated at 69.1 percent. In 2002, the level was 81.1 percent and still inching upward.

More startling news: Extensive research also shows you are far less likely to need a safety belt if you abide by the speed limit and don't drink and drive.

State sales tax up again

State sales tax revenue is up for the third month in a row. The last time state sales tax revenue increased three months in a row was July-September 2001, before 9-11," Comptroller Carole Texas Keeton Strayhorn said. November sales tax revenue is up 4.3 percent compared to November 2002. This is the largest growth since August 2001.

The state received \$1.36 billion in sales tax revenue in November.







The treasurer and president will see to the filing of the tax return.


President Jim Stephen thanked everyone who worked to make the year a success, including Claire Jones, who opened her home for the event earlier in the year.

When the weather turns Buckle the child in and THEN put the coat or blanket OVER them--on TOP of the harness system. You can even turn the coat around and put his arms through the sleeves after he is buckled into his car seat... BUCKLE THEM, THEN BUNDLE THEM.

This will ensure your kids are kept snug in their seat, the harness system is able to do its job in the event of a crash, and that the kids stay warm.



The same thing happens if you put a coat on your toddler and loosen the straps before buckling him in his seat.

In a collision, this extra fabric and padding will compress and create slack in the harness system, which will allow your child to move further forward during a crash before being stopped by the harness straps--increasing the injuries they will suffer.

So what should you do? First, always keep your child in the clothes they will be wearing when they are indoors. Place the child in the infant seat or car seat, making sure the harness straps are snug over the shoulders and that they lie straight and flat down to the buckle.

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

Bonilla applauded by **U.S. Ag Industry**

- Congress Approves Bonilla's Country of Origin Labeling Provision -

WASHINGTON, D.C. -U.S. Representative Henry Bonilla has halted a provision included in the 2002 Farm Bill that could have been disastrous to the nation's agriculture indus-A grateful industry is applauding and thanking Bonilla for his steadfast support.


"We thank Chairman Bonilla for his leadership in addressing a law that has caused frustration and controversy throughout the beef cattle industry," stated the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association and Texas Cattle Feeders Association in a recent news release.

tribution chain. Thank you, wrote the United Fresh Fruit & Vegetable Association in a letter to Bonilla.

The U.S. Congress today approved a provision introduced by Bonilla that will delay implementing a potentially onerous system of Country of Origin Labeling (COOL). Country of Origin Labeling for all commodities will now be put on hold for two years, with the exception of farm-raised and wild caught fish. Bonilla believes the delay is essential so that Congress may commit further time to researching the costs and benefits of the system. "We commend you for your The complete bill will now leadership to address this chal-lenging issue. You have struck wote and then on to the president for his signature.

"Country of Origin Labeling could be disastrous to our meat industry. We owe it to our nation's meat producers, processors, retailers and consumers to investigate before acting," said Rep. Henry Bonilla, Chairman of the House Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is estimating the implementation costs of COOL record keeping at close to \$2 billion -- some industry experts calculate the total reaching close to \$10 billion. Another study conducted by Texas A&M University stated that the changes brought-on by COOL would cost nearly 2000 jobs and almost three quarters of a billion dollars for beef regulations in South Texas alone. The USDA estimates that the cost of COOL on every head of cattle will be \$10.00, with the cost per head of sheep being \$4.50. "If you were going to start your own business wouldn't you do all the research, check the facts and talk to people who know and understand the industry? Or would you jump blindly into the business and hold your breath hoping for success? I know I would choose research and education, and that's exactly what my provision allows for Country of Origin Labeling," said Bonilla. "We must provide Congress time to adequately address Country of Origin Labeling before we evoke potentially devastating consequences on our rural economy." Industry organizations that applauded Bonilla's work include: National Cattleman's Beef Association, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raiser's Association, Texas Cattle Feeders Association, Texas Produce Association, United Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Association, Texas Pork Producers, and National Pork Producer Council. Congressman Henry Bonilla was named Chairman of House the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee in January of 2001. This is the third spending bill Bonilla has overseen. Bonilla is dedicated to keeping the agriculture industry strong and healthy, and remains committed to reducing wasteful spending and unnecessary projects. In addition to chairing the Agriculture Subcommittee, Bonilla is a senior member of the Defense and Foreign Operations Appropriations Subcommittees.


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Rangeland restoration, Prescribed burn workshops to be offered

SONORA - A rangeland restoration and management workshop is scheduled for Jan. 8-10 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station near Sonora.

Basic information on rangeland ecology, plant identification, grazing strategies and other topics will be covered. The workshop will provide information to help participants develop strategies and meet resource, goals. Participants will tour the Experiment Station to observe the effects of grazing and burning treatments first hand.

A rangeland burning basic class will be Feb. 19-21. Fire characteristics, dangers, benefits and burn planning will be part of the educational program. Habitat manipulation with burning will be discussed. Participants will develop a burning plan and participate in different duties during practice burns.

All the workshops will be held at the Sonora Station. Participants will observe a wide

variety of rangelands either depleted or covered by unwanted brush, areas that are in the process of being restored, and rangeland that has been restored by fire and management. Most of the workshops will be spent in the field learning and observing in small groups.

The cost for each three-day workshop is \$395. Lodging and meals will be provided. Space is limited and available on a firstcome, first-serve basis. Separate sleeping arrangements will be available for men and women, with limited space available for couples.

Instructors for the Academy are Dr. Charles "Butch" Taylor, director of the Sonora Station; Dr. Mort Kothmann, professor at Texas A&M University; Ray Hinnant, senior research associate at Texas A&M; and Kent Mills, manager and consultant with Ezell Key Grain Co. grief How to help when comes home for the holidays

Holidays are traditionally times to gather together with family and friends. They can also be an all too painful reminder of someone who isn't with you anymore. If someone you love is experiencing grief this holiday season, here's what you can do to offer them comfort.

Recognize that everyone grieves at their own pace. Some progress rather quickly, some move very slowly. No one ever moves at the speed that others think they should. Help them take one day at a time.

Keep them company and be there for them. You don't need to say anything profound or do anything earthshaking. Often, your greatest help is your quiet presence and simplest deeds.

Make suggestions and initiate contact and activities. It is important for you to respect their privacy and give them some time alone, but they also may not have the energy to structure their lives right after a traumatic loss. They may have to rely on others to think of things that they don't know to ask for.

Provide a safe environment for them to show strong emotions. It may be very painful, but it can be of enormous help.

Help them remember good things. Tell them your memories of their loved one as you listen to them tell you theirs. If they begin to show their emotions outwardly, you have not upset them, you have simply enabled them to be a bit more open in your presence.

Be there after the first wave is over. Make the effort to call, to come by, to help them out six months and even a year down the road. Crowds may be difficult for them. Shopping and holidays will be overwhelming. Offer your help. If they're not up to a visit they'll let you know, but let them know you remember and are there for them.

RRC points out safety tips for propane space heaters

AUSTIN, Texas -- The Texas Railroad Commission encourages consumers to observe the following safety practices with their propane space heaters as cold winter weather looms in Texas.

Listen to them. They need to tell their story over and over in order to process their grief. They may even say outrageous things. Don't judge them by what they say or how they feel. They have a lot to work through, and in time, they will come to the answers that are right for them.

Be careful of clichés, religious platitudes, or easy answers. You may not be able to help them with certain issues right now, so don't be too quick to share your opinions if they say something you don't agree with. They need time to work things out on their own.

Be sensitive to their needs, be patient, have confidence and believe in them. They will get better; they will experience healing; but it will take some time, and it can be rough going for much of the way, especially the holidays.

Be on the look-out for behaviors. destructive Traumatic loss can lead some people into depression, alcohol or drug abuse. A friend or loved one may need you to keep an eye on them while things are especially tough.

Help them find humorous diversion. Laughter is good medicine.

Help them find ways to bring good things out of the bad. It is important that their loved one be remembered and memorialized.

Make new traditions. This new phase in their lives deserves some new traditions. Let them hold onto the traditions that still offer comfort, but help create new traditions as well.

Loved ones that are grieving have to go through a valley in order to get to the other side. Dealing with grief cannot be

That way money that would ordinarily be spent the first part of next year can be spent the last part of this year instead and help lower total tax paid.

- Teachers may be able to deduct up to \$250 spent for classroom supplies, Cavanagh said, but "that's just for the 2003 tax year. If you know you're going to need things at the first of the year, buy them before Dec. 31. But don't spend just to save money on taxes; spend money you were going to spend later anyway."

This Educator Expenses Deduction is taken as an adjustment to income, she said, "so it

"Gas-fired heaters are a popular choice in Texas, both as the main source of heat and for those areas where the furnace doesn't quite reach," Railroad Commission Chairman Victor Carrillo said. "It's important to choose a space heater that is designed for indoor use. Outdoor patio heaters do not have proper venting for indoor use and could lead to a buildup of carbon monoxide inside the house.

"Vented gas space heaters should be inspected every year to ensure the vent is free of debris and the heater is in good condition," said Commissioner Charles R. Matthews. "If the heater is not vented properly, dangerous levels of carbon monoxide (CO) can enter the home.

"Consumers should be aware that older space heaters might not meet the newer safety standards," said Commissioner Michael L. Williams. "For

Don't let foodborne 'Bug' spoil holiday festivities

COLLEGE STATION -Unexpected guests can ruin holiday festivities – especially when those "guests" are pre-ventable foodborne illnesses. Good food safety practices, from storage to cleanup, are the best way to keep these 'bugs' at bay, said Dr. Peggy Van Laanen, Texas Cooperative Extension nutrition specialist. Harmful bacteria, which

cause foodborne illnesses, grow best in moist, protein-based food, such as meat, poultry, seafood, eggs, dressing, gravy and dairy products. These bacteria also thrive at temperatures between 40° F and 140° F, which is designated as the "danger zone," she said.

Unfortunately many favorite holiday foods are exactly the ones most likely to contain foodborne illness-causing bacteria. That's why perishable foods should be kept in this danger zone for no longer than two hours. To keep meals safer during the holidays, or any other time, Van Laanen said:

- Thaw frozen foods in the refrigerator. Food thawed in a microwave should be cooked immediately. Do not interrupt the cooking process, and never thaw food on the counter.

- Keep hands and preparation areas, such as counter tops and stoves, clean when preparing food.

For whole chicken and turkey, that's an internal temperature of 180° F and 170° F for poultry breasts; ground poultry and stuffings, 165° F; beef, veal or lamb, 170° F for well done; ground beef or pork dishes, 160° F; egg casseroles, 160° F; and leftovers, 165° F or boiling hot. Seafood should become opaque. - Do not serve egg dishes – such as eggnog – made with undercooked or raw eggs, which may contain the harmful bacteria Salmonella.

Don't transfer bacteria from raw meats to cooked foods or food that will be eaten fresh.

- If cooking large amounts of food ahead, make sure it is cooled quickly by dividing large portions into smaller ones and storing in shallow containers (less than 3 inches deep) at temperatures of 40° F or below.

- Serve hot foods at or above 140° F, and cold foods at below 40° F. Make sure foods served on a buffet are at room temperature for no more than two hours.

- If serving buffet style, put out small quantities of food and replace often. If a serving dish empties, replace it with a fresh one.

- Discard any foods that have been at room temperature for more than two hours; don't keep them as leftovers. Use refrigerated or frozen foods within recommended storage times.

If food items are received as gifts:

- Make sure food, such as meat or poultry, is still cold or frozen and has been packed with a cold source. The food item should also be packed in a foam container or heavy corrugated cardboard box.

Check the postage date. Perishable food should be delivered quickly, ideally overnight. The outer package of the food should be clearly labeled "Keep Refrigerated."

- Immediately open any package marked "Keep Refrigerated." Check the tem-"Keep perature of the food items inside. Perishable items should arrive partially frozen with visible ice crystals and still be frozen in the middle. Baked or canned hams and other smoked, cured, or fully cooked perishable items should arrive cold.

- If the perishable food is warm, do not consume or taste it. Alert the company immediately if the food is warm.
