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



Located Near Houston

This memorial towers 567 feet above the hallowed soil on which it is located. 

Landsday peramace of being lived in and cared for incre than a background of trees, an open lawn and shrubs about the house. Natural groupings of trees, an important part in landscaping the revening may be had with very little expense if one will pay the price in time, labor, and patience.

Since plants play such an important part in landscaping the rula home, particular attention should be paid to selecting and placing each plant in relation to its purpose in the whole design. One shrub may be designed to help frame the picture or some lovely part of it, another to cut off some undesirable view, and another to soften a harsh line or bold corner. Still others may be used to accentiate some pleasant spot, and add a needed note of color, or to afford back ground for other plantings.

In any arrangement, several plants of the same kind should be used together and all the plantiage supposed so a harmonious arrangement of color, texture, size, and form results rather than a display of individual, showy plants each clamoring for attention.
