Unprecedented And Unexplainable Drop In Wheat And Corn Prices
Puts Extra Volume In Storage

| Chicago, Aug.1-Collopse of grain prices last week, going far below levels which Uncle Sam deems compatible with American farm prosperity today gave the grain trade its most perplexing puzzle in years. <br> Wheat values are scraping sevenlowest in six years. Rye and oats also are at or near four to six-year lows. This is the situation despite governmental efforts to maintain prices at a higher level. It reflects world conditions to a large extent. <br> This does not mean, however, that current low market prices are the figures at which all farmers are selling their major grain crops. A record breaking volume of wheat is going into storage, most of it under loans guaranteering producers a price well above the market. At Liverpool and Winnipeg, where wheat futures are below 50 cents, a dime or more cheaper than in Chicago. record lows are being written up on the blackboards. <br> Government efforts in this country, through loans, crop reduction and export subsidy, help to give domestic values a premium over the world market, grain men said. But Argentina and Canada have been offering subsidies, too, with the result that the three leading western hemisphere exporters are competing for Europe business by lowering their prices. Each have big surpluses which form a major portion of the world's huge caryover that is depressing valucs. <br> Corn futures here were around 39 cents, meaning that on the farm corn was valued from 35 cents to around 56 cents; two years ago, \$1.16. <br> The current value compares with the loan rate of 57 cents granted producers who stored $257,000,000$ bushels of 1938 and 1937 crops. It compares with a June, 1939 "parity" price of 81 cents. The largest reserve stock of corn on record at this time of year is on farms. Furthermore, the prospective crop may be the third largest since 1928, according to recent government estimates. <br> "The average truck driver will invariably give you your share of the road and often, if his load is heavy and wide he is thoughtful enough to pull over a little, frequently gatting one line of his wheels off the pavement entirely for the others accomodation. <br> Private cars will often roar past one if they are having any trouble on the highway; but truckers frequently stay to render assistance In some instances, of course, where they are running on close schedule or have perishable loads, their firms do not allow them to stop for anyer than the rule.
