Old Man Texas has put his okey on it.

Jimmy Walker, State Sanitation officer, has visited here and givien Spur Pool his approval. The check-up was made June 17, and the pool has been drained, painted from stem to stern and refilled since that time.

Walker was highly pleased with sanitation conditions and cleanliness of Spur Pool, and made spicial comment on splendid conditon of dressng rooms, service system and issuance. He expressed surprise at the expensive equipment in evidence, the general set-up, and made a decision to return at a later date to make a general survey for reference in State Sanitation conditioins.

Mrs. Julia Cane, manager of the Pool, cooperating with the State office, submitted a sample of water from the pool for bacteriological examination, and the report declared the City swim place entirely safe for swimmers. Disinfection by chloriination was also summarized as one of the chief agencies of the excellent sanitarizing practices of the swim

One note of special interest to the management of the pool, as well as Spur area in general, is the comment made by visitors to Spur Experiment Station by the Iowa State school group. The comment was that "We have enjoyed our swim and the hospitality of the pool officials. The cleanliness of both pool and locker rooms is far above the pools we have had ocasion to visit elsewhere."

Fortunately for this area, as well as Spur, the City has built a pool which is beautiful as well as clean, and the managemennt is offering to give instructions at the lowest possible price so that each and every citizen may learn to swim and enjoy the pool. Appreciation has been expressed by the officials for the fine cooperation evidenced heretofore, and it is believed that hundreds of other people will take advantage of the splendid pool and other facilities in the weeks to





Many attempts have been made from time to time, to find and relocate the Old Lead Mine. To my knowledge besides many who lived in the New Town of Dickens, three or more men, entirely unrelated, and unknown to each other, at times far apart, who had actually been at the mine during buffalo days, have spent much time and not a little money, in their efforts to find it, but without success.

A few years ago, recollecting my talk with old Mr. Stegall, and hearing that his son, now living in New Mexico, was going to visit some of his kin here, I left word with them that I would like to see Witt if he came. The result was that

Witt and Mrs. Stegall visited us at my home. For the first time I then told him of what his father had done, and asked him if he knew of, or had ever seen the mine.

Witt told me he had never personally been at the mine, but knew as well as anyone about where it was, and had often seen the ore from it while a young man. He told me of some fun he had during one of the excitements while the folks of Dickens were trying to locate it. One of his sons had come home after spending some time near Childers, Texas, and had brought back with him a piece of lead ore (Galena).

Witt accidentally? dropped the piece of ore while taking some tobacco from his pocket. Eli Harkey immediately picked it up, and then the excitement immediately arose again, as Witt said it came from the old mine. All knds of offers were made to him if he would only open it up. For some time afterwards Witt could not leave Dickens where he was then living, without being followed by some one. Needless to say that he (Witt Stegall) led them a nice chase and jossed them for following him. There is another man now living in Dickens County, one of the sureenough Old Timers, Clint Garrett, who owns a pound or two of the lead melted from ore from this mine. Clint got it from his brother, Jimmie Garrett, who got it from the old mine. Clint himself never was at the old mine. By a queer freak of lady luck, no ne ever thought of Old Jammie Garrett while he was still alive. He died many years ago. He, I knew too late, was the last one of those Old Timers who did know where the Old Mine was located.

I have a piece of lead ore sent me by a man only a short time resident in Dickens County, who said he picked it up in the brakes, of Croton, and if he did, it came within a distance of four miles from where the Lost Mine is supposed to be.
