

Foodway Store Is Damaged By Fire Tuesday Night

Fire of proportions to inflict several thousand dollars in damage to their grocery stock broke out in the Costolo & McMahan Foodway Store here Tuesday night about 10:30, origin not determined.

Managers of the store report that damage might be in the neighborhood of \$5,000.

The fire broke out in the rear of the building in a spot that caused heavy damage to stored stock, and in which place to be extinguished, caused much damage by water.

Losses were partially covered by insurance.

The store, McMahan stated, will reopen as soon as proper adjustments can be made and damaged stock replaced.

Holidays Start In Spur Schools Today

Although some of the equipment has already been moved to East Ward, final arrangements will be made for all departments during the holidays, and the school routine will not be broken other than with the holidays.

Pat Bullock To Be Candidate For Representative

Snyder, Dec. 18—Pat Bullock, former state director of rural education and former superintendent of Scurry County schools, announced this week that he will be a candidate for state representative, 118th District.

1939 Cotton Crop Now Showing Two-Fifths

According to the December 10th report of cotton ginning made by the Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, Dickens ginned two-fifths of the cotton in 1939 that was ginned to a like date in 1938. The report is of December 1, and lists round bales as half counts.

Up to December 1, 1939, the county ginned 10,162 bales and to the corresponding time last year 25,942 bales were ginned.

In Kent county the figures are given as 8,188 bales up to December 1, and for 1938 the number is 3,273.

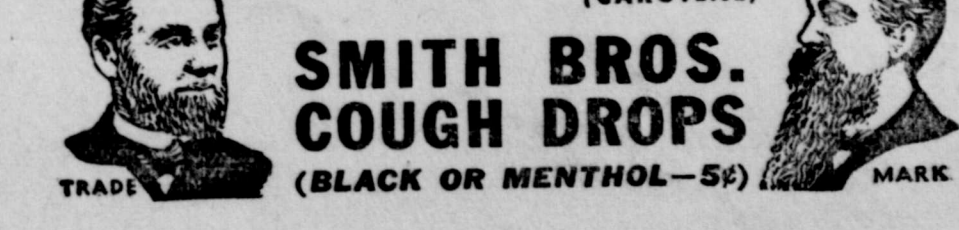

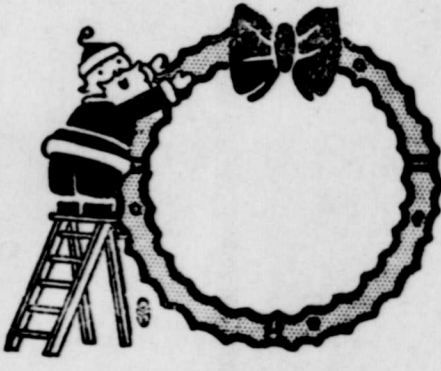

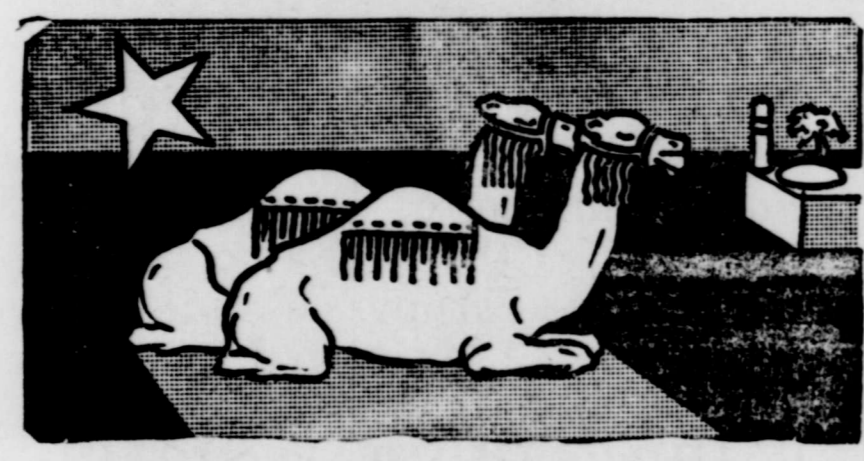
