



Texas NYA Lowers Youth Age Limit To 16 Years

Unemployed boys and girls in Texas who are 16 years of age, out of school, in need, and who want the work experience provided on National Youth Administration projects are now eligible for such employment, J. C. Kellam, state NYA administrator, announced.

With the minimum age requirement for work on NYA projects reduced from 17 to 16 years, approximately 127,000 Texas boys and girls become eligible for NYA employment, Kellam said.

With funds that are available, the National Youth Administration in Texas will be able to provide employment for 15,000 of these young persons at any time, it was pointed

"As youth go off NYA projects into private industry or are selected for military service, other eligible youth in the State will have the opportunity to replace them," Kellam explained.






