If quotas are in effect for 1941, a producer may grow all of his peawithin his acreage allotment; however peanuts grown and marketed excess of the farm marketing quota are subject to a 3c a pound governmental agencies to be used for oil mill purposes. If quotas are not in effect, no loan or diversion program can be offered .. .

A new provision provides that if marketing quotas are voted on favorably, a producer may divert his cotton acres and plant this acreage to peanuts without any penalty under the AAA Program and will be able to sell them for oil mill purposes without any tax.


