

> WINNING IN AIR—The struggle to oust German-Italian airline control over strategic South America routes is showing the beginning of an interesting victory for Americancontrolled airlines. Recent figures reported by C. V. Whitney, board chairman of Pan American Airways, show that since the outbreak of the European war, airlines operated or sponsored in South America have gained two route miles for every one lost by Axis operated lines. The net loss sustained by the Axis from September 3, 1939 to August 6, last totals 8,173 miles, while U. S. operated or influenced airlines gained 15,056 miles, according to the Pan American report. Whitney describes Axis airline operation s in South America as a "time bomb" aimed against the Americas.


