Mrs. G. Brown, 73, Pioneer West Texan Died Here Jan. 26

Funeral services were held from the Spur Methodist Church for Mrs. G. Brown, Tuesday, January 27th, at 3:00 p. m.

Rev. H. L. Thurston, pastor of the Spur Methodist Church, where Mrs. Brown held membership, officiated, assisted by H. L. Burnam, a pioneer Baptist minister, neighbor and close friend of the family. Rev. Burnam paid a tribute to the beautiful Christian life of this pioneer mother, neighbor and friend.

Pallbearers were V. C. Smart, Dee Hairgrove, T. N. Morgan, Geo. S. Link, Sr., John L. King, Sr., and Floyd Barnett.

Flower bearers were: Mesdames Blanche Collier, Floyd Barnett, T. N. Morgan, Cecil Godfrey, George S. Link, and V. C. Smart.

Mrs. Brown was born March 2, 1869, Margaret Ann Chapman, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Chapman. At the age of eighteen years she was married April 10, 1887 to Granville Brown at the home of her parents, 4 miles east of Temple, Texas.

To this union were born eight children, six of whom survive.

In December 1890 Mrs. Brown with her husband came West, locating at Anson in Jones County, later moving to the Plains and establishing a home in Floyd County at Floydada; from there they moved to Matador in 1900 and on January 10, 1910, less than two months after the opening of the town they came to Spur and established their present home.

Since the death of her companion, January 30th of last year, Mrs. Brown has been in declining health. Death occurred Tuesday morning at 5:00 o'clock at her home, 1 mile north of Spur.

Campbell Funeral Chapel was in charge of arrangements. Interment was made in the family burial plot beside the grave of her companion and daughter, Alice. Another daughter, Susie Brown Crush, predeceased her in death.

Surviving children include: Mrs. Bess Shepherd, Spur; Mrs. Nell Goodwin, Long Beach, California; Mack Brown, Roseburg, Oregon; Ed Brown, who lived in the home, Mrs. Pauline McCormick, Mathis, Texas; and Eoyd Brown, Artesia, New Mexico. Three children, Mrs. Nell Goodwin, Mack and Boyd Brown were unable to attend. All the others were present as were Earl and Frances Crush, grandchildren, of Garland, Texas.

Also surviving are two sisters, Mrs. J. V. Burns of Graham, Texas, and Mrs. G. W. Williamson, Mt. Top, Arkansas.

Big Expansion Program Planned For Local TGD Unit

The Texas Defense Guard will meet Thursday night at 7:30 at the High School Gym. The local Company needs a large number of new recruits and all able bodied men are invited to attend the meeting. Complete new uniforms will be furnished to enrollees without cost. New guns and ammunition will be furnished also. An indoor and an outdoor rifle range is to be built immediately and target practice will be held shortly. Men will be taught the latest drill regulations and the manual of arms by some of the most capable men in this section of West Texas. The local Spur Company is captained by Jack Christian and is ably assisted by Lieut. George Glover and Lieut. Lonnie Lewis. They are also assisted by several efficient sergeants and corporals.

An armory has been obtained for use by the Company and there will be a downtown office for the officers.

The Company is expected to be partly financed through contributions of the Civic Club and by the business men of the City of Spur. The City of Spur has offered to assist in any manner possible.

The Company has called upon O. B. Ratliff to act as volunteer enrollment solicitor and all with whom he has talked have expressed a desire to obtain and receive the fine training offered at this time.

2000 Bales Of Cotton Destroyed By Fire Here Friday

Fire of undetermined origin razed the warehouse just east of the Farmers Co-Op Gin, in which was stored close to two thousand bales of cotton, Friday afternoon of last week. The fire was discovered around 4:30 in the afternoon Friday and burned all night and up in the day Saturday.

Some two hundred bales were removed from the warehouse and extinguished, from which some cotton can be salvaged, the rest was completely destroyed.

The Spur Fire Department answered the call and helped in rolling out the cotton salvaged and preventing the fire from spreading to a nearby cotton yard.

The cotton is reported to have been completely covered by insurance.

Places Announced For February 16th Registration

The new registration as required by the Selective Service Act will be held on February 16th 1942. Young men who reached their 20th birthday on or before Dec. 31st, 1941 will be required to register. Young men who became 20 after Jan. 1, 1942 will not have to register. However those who have become 21 since the last registration will also register. Individuals not previously registered who have not reached their 45th birthday on Feb. 16th will be required to register.

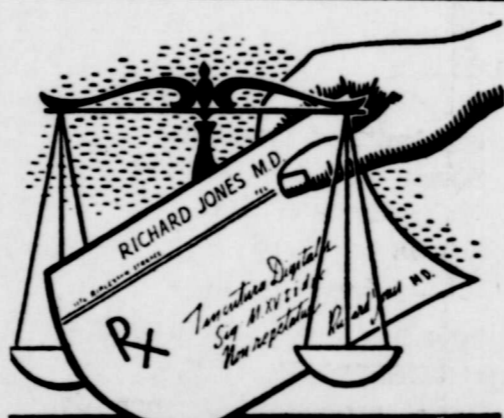

Cleo Rogers Writes To Parents From Army Camp

Following is a letter received from Cleo Rogers by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. Rogers, of Dry Lake. Young Rogers enlisted December 4, 1940 and was promoted to Corporal April 5, 1942. He is now in line for another promotion at an early date and also will be transferred to Boise, Idaho, where he will attend training school for a time. The letter follows:

Dear folks:

Will answer your letter I received last week. I am charge of quarters tonight, and haven't got any sleep yet. I am on from eight o'clock in the morning until eight the next morning and then get the rest of the day off. The Charge of Quarters checks out rifles and ammunition to the guards, makes out passes to go to town, wakes up the mid night shift, and gets everyone up at six-thirty in the morning; also there is a thousand and one other things to do. I go in on C. Q. over at the Headquarters building tomorrow night, but all I will have to do is put my cot up and go to sleep and be there if anything comes up I will be off all day Saturday.

I think we will be pulling out of here within ten days. The rumors have been flying thick and fast all day, and no one knows where or when we are going. I have heard so many rumors since I have been in the Army that I don't pay any attention to them until I see the orders to move. I do know that we are going, for we are turning in all of our bedding and drawing a cot. All we will have to sleep on until we leave is a cot and three blankets. No mattress or pillow. We are also turning in our foot lockers tomorrow. I am going to send my civilian clothes home, for we can't wear them any more. I sure would like to know where we are going, but guess I will have to wait and see. If I was guessing I would say we were going across: because the Supply is packing all the equipment for water shipment. If we cross the water it will either be Australia, Ireland or some place like that. I thought sure I would get to go to school before we left here but guess I won't.

You said it had been cold here. It has been a little chilly up here. We have about three or four inches of snow on the ground, and it got down to twenty degrees below zero last night, and is just about that cold tonight. I won't be sorry to leave here and get in a warmer climate. Sure would like to be back

I got the box O. K. and sure did enjoy it. Someone in the barracks was always getting a box from a week before Christmas until after Christmas. I believe I ate more candy, cake, nuts, and fruit this Christmas than I ever have before.

Well guess I had better close and see if I can get an hours sleep. Every time I get about half asleep someone comes in to check a pass in or out, or the telephone rings so I doubt if I will get any sleep tonight. Will close for this time. Answer right back and maybe I will hear from you again before we move.

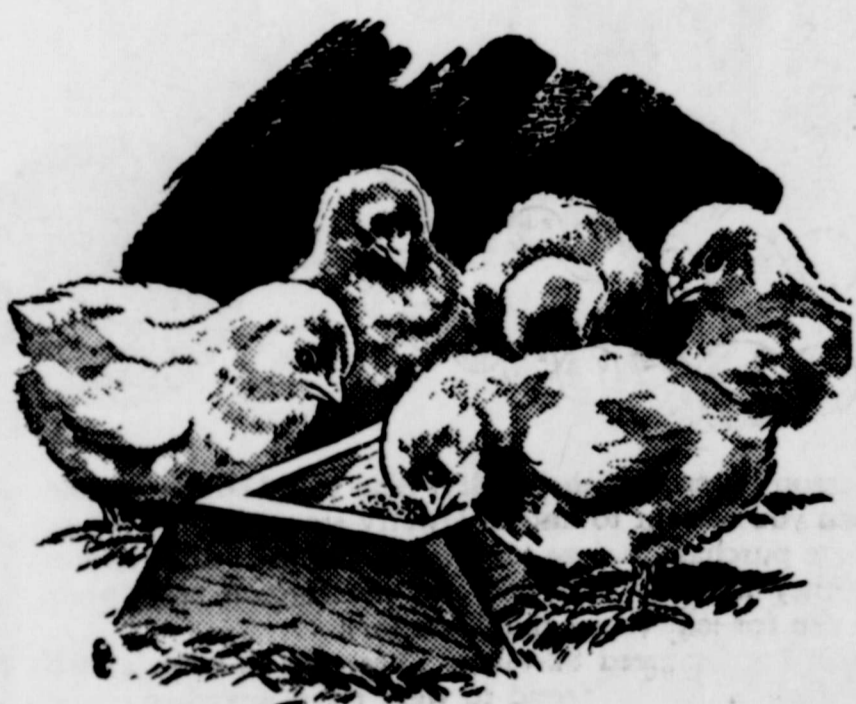

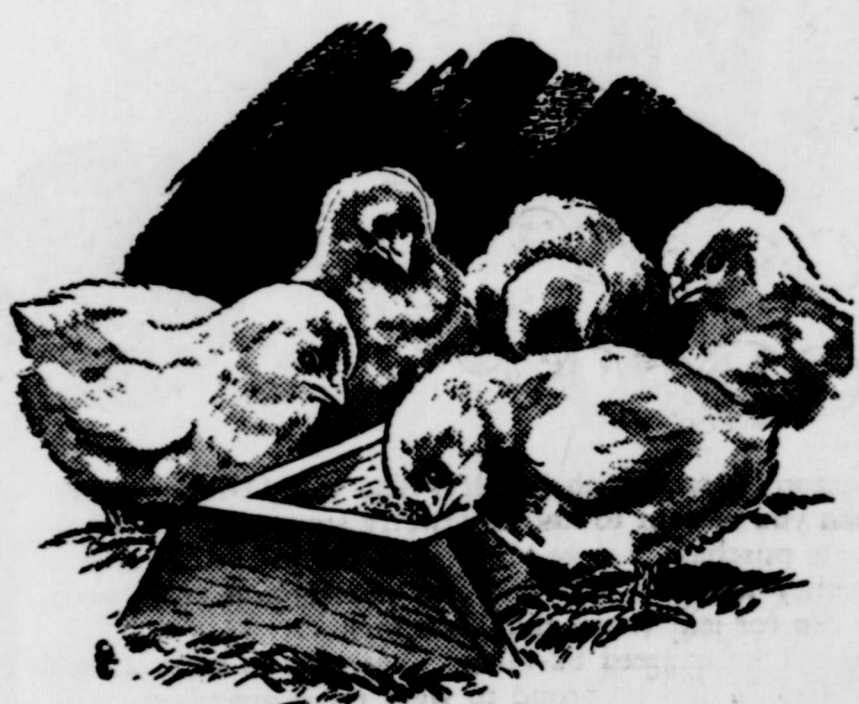

Supt. O. C. Thomas Asked To Help In Science Training

O. C. Thomas, superintendent of schools, has recently received a letter from the State Department of Education, Austin, Texas, asking for his support in training a personnel of high school graduates in the applications of physical sciences.

The letter quotes:
"The present emergency demands that every effort be made to increase the supply of personnel trained in the application of the physical sciences, chemistry, and physics. They will be called upon to put physics to work in the defense industries, in the Civil Service of the United States Government, and in the armed forces. Our country has been caught desperately short in the supply of such men because careers in physics have not been brought adequately to the attention of high school students."

"Tens of thousands of such individuals are necessary now and many more will be called in the immediate future. All boys and girls showing a natural aptitude for laboratory work and a reasonable skill in mathematics and physics should be given the opportunity to acquire as much physics instruction as possible."

A recent survey of our laboratory facilities show that physics could be added to our school at a cost of approximately \$224.03. Chemistry is already a regular course in our curriculum.
