Mr. Van Leer passed away at his home here in Spur, Sept. 12, 1934. Mrs. Van Leer later moved to Post to make her home at that place with her daughter, Mrs. Irene Rogers.

Surviving other than her mother and sister are one brother, Wayne Van Leer, of McAdoo, and three nieces and two nephews.

## George S. Link Sr. Is Head Of Navy Relief In County

Austin, April 8.—The Navy Relief Society Citizens Committee in Dickens County will be headed by Geo. S. Link, Sr. of Spur. This appointment has been announced by Attorney General Gerald C. Mann who is Texas Chairman for the Navy Relief Campaign. Under Chairman Mann's direction every county in Texas is being organized for the purpose of raising funds for the families and dependents of men serving in the Navy, the Marine Corps and the Coast Guard. Texans are asking to contribute \$210,000 toward the national quota of \$5,000,000 for Navy Relief.

The Navy Relief Society campaign in Texas will be centered during Navy Appreciation week, April 19 to 25th, which has been officially proclaimed by Governor Stevenson.

"This Navy Relief Campaign gives the people of Texas a chance to contribute directly to the welfare of the brave men who are fighting our nation's enemies in the South Pacific, on the Atlantic convoy lines and on the seas everywhere," Chairman Gerald Mann says. "The Navy at present is our front battle line. They are suffering casualties and their families must be cared for. The Navy Relief Society acts speedily and care for emergencies not provided for by the Government. This appeal is made in behalf of our boys who are even now in the midst of battle. I know that Texans will not fail to respond generously to this request."

## Much Needed Rains Received Here

The entire state has been visited this week by rains from light showers in some localities to deluge of flood like proportions in others.

Hail and snow accompanying the rain fall at Amarillo, Lubbock, Madera and other sections of the Plains country.

Registration of rain at the Spur Experimental Station Tuesday was .50 inch, Wednesday .83, a total of 1.33 inches up to 6:00 o'clock Wednesday night.

With continued showers and the snow that fell Wednesday night the total will probably be over 2 inches.

Estimated fall in outlying sections adjacent to Spur is some higher than registered at the Experimental station. Farmers in general are in good spirits over present prospects of bumper crop yields this year and barring calamities such as floods, and destruction by hail and insects we see no way out of being forced to harvest a bumper crop this fall.

## Fourth Registration Light Vote Cast In Trustee Election Saturday 4th

The registration day for those from 45 to 65 years of age will be held Monday, April 27, 1942.

All men who have attained their forty-fifth birthday on or before February 16, 1942, and have not attained their sixty-fifth birthday on April 27, 1942, will be registered in the Fourth Registration.

The Chief Registrars and the places of registration will be the same as used February 16th, as follows:

The number to register will probably be 1 1/2 times the February 16th registration, which would be approximately 800 in Dickens County. The Chief registrars will be free to select their assistants.

Those registered in this registration will not be subject to Military training under the present regulations. Those who register may receive an occupational questionnaire but not a regular questionnaire.

## Shelterbelt Trees Can Be Obtained Free From Agents

Would you like to have some trees for a field shelterbelt, farm windbreak or the establishment of post lots or wood lots? If so, you should contact Mack Woodrum, County Agent, or Fae Bass, County Home Demonstration Agent, immediately.

These agents have received word from the State Experiment Service that the personnel, now engaged in planting shelterbelts, is being transferred to the Emergency Rubber Project in California, and that the farm people of north and west Texas have an opportunity to get the surplus stock of trees free of charge except for transportation.

The following trees are available and must be removed from the shelterbelt nursery at Childress before April 15: Desert Willow, Vitex, Apricot, Soapberry, Western Walnut, Ailanthus, Chinese Elm, Hackberry, Green Ash, Mulberry, Black Walnut, Black Locust, Honeylocust, and Sand Plum.

If you would like to use any of these trees for one of the above purposes please advise Miss Bass or Mr. Woodrum immediately as to the kind and number you wish. Please give 1st, 2nd, and 3rd choices. Arrangements will be made for transportation of the trees.

## CFSAs Funds Are Now Available For Loans

Additional funds have been allocated, effective April 6, 1942, to Dickens, Kent, and King Counties for the purpose of making loans to low income farm families, according to Roy L. McClung, Rural Supervisor.

The following is the type of loan that may be made: general standard farm loans to both new and old borrowers as has always been made in the past; Food for Freedom Loans to farmers; and Food for Freedom Loans to both 4-H Club and FFA boys and girls.

Eligibility for general farm loans are the same as in the past. Food for Freedom Loans are available to part time farmers, share croppers, day laborers, and low income owner-operators for the purchase of livestock, poultry, feed, seed, and supplies and shelter for livestock and poultry, or practically anything which would directly increase the production of food, feed, or fiber. The maximum amount which this loan may be made for is \$500.00. Club Loans are available to members of organized 4-H Clubs or FFA Clubs for livestock, poultry, feed, seed, shelter, etc. which they may have in their project that may increase food production. The maximum amount of this loan is \$75.00.

The repayment period on all loans bears 5% rate of interest and may be repayable over a period of 5 years. Loans, through the Farm Security Administration, are available only to farmers, or boys and girls who cannot get adequate financing elsewhere. For further information contact Roy L. 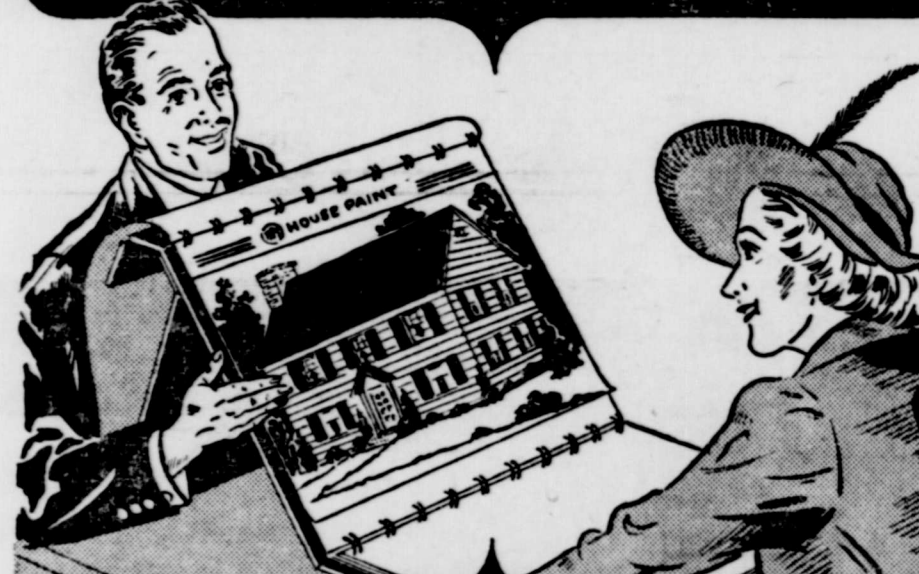
