Mr. Van Leer passed away at his home here in Spur, Sept. 12, 1934. Mrs. Van Leer later moved to Post to make her home at that place with her daughter, Mrs. Irene Rogers.

Surviving other than her mother and sister are one brother, Wayne Van Leer, of McAdoo, and three nieces and two nephews.

George S. Link Sr. Is Head Of Navy Relief In County

Austin, April 8-The Navy Relief Society Citizens Committee in Dickens County will be headed by Geo. S. Link, Sr. of Spur. This appointment has been announced by Attorney General Gerald C. Mann who is Texas Chairman for the Navy Relief Campaign. Under Chairman Mann's direction every county in Texas is being organized for the purpose of raising funds for the families and dependents of men serving in the Navy, the Marine Corps and the Coast Guard. Texans are asking to contribute \$210,000 toward the national quota of \$5,000, 000 for Navy Relief.

Shelterbelt Trees Free From Agents

Would you like to have some trees for a field shelterbelt, farm windbreak or the establishment of post lots or wood lots? If so, you should contact Mack Woodrum, County Agent, or Fae Bass, County Home Demonstration Agent, immediately

These agents have received word from the State Experiment Service that the personnel, now engaged in planting shelterbelts, is being transferred to the Emergency Rubber Project in California, and that the farm people of north and west Texas have an opportunity to get the surplus stock of trees free of charge except for transportation.

The following trees are available and must be removed from the shelterbelt nursery at Childress before April 15: Desert Willow, Vitex, Apricot, Soapberry, Western Walnut, Ailanthus, Chinese Elm, Hackberry, Green Ash, Mulberry, Black Walnut, Black Locust, Honeylocust, and Sand

BESTstorekeeper I ever knew was a fellow named Sam Abernethy. Sam's specialty was to take over some run-down store that somebody else had given up as a failure. Then Sam would turn it into a gold

"But the most important thing of all," he used to say, "is to remember who's Boss!'

"You may think you are Boss of your business . . . but you're not. The Public, your customers, are the real bosses . . . and you've got to run your business the way they want it."

That little statement of Sam's made a big impression on me . . . particularly since it certainly seemed to work so well in Sam's




