R. R. Wooten Speaks Over Radio Station KFYO, Lubbock

Following is a copy of the speech made by R. R. Wooten over Radio Station KFYO, Lubbock, Tuesday of last week, in behalf of James V. Allred's candidacy for the United States Senate:

NEIGHBORS AND FRIENDS OF WEST TEXAS:

On July 25th the citizen of Texas will go to the polls to vote, which is our privilege and right, and I hope that every Texan will exercise his or her suffrage to the best interest of Texas and the Nation. For my part I'm going to cast my ballot for Jimmy Allred, and for the next few minutes I want to give you my reasons for doing so.

Right now at the beginning of these few remarks I want to tell you that Jimmy Allred's private and political life does not need me to defend it. His private life is unimpeachable, and he has been on the side of right and truth on all of the political questions that confront the people of Texas and the nation for solution. I say that he doesn't need me to defend him and what he stands for, he only needs you and me to proclaim him and what he stands for to the good citizens of Texas. He needs your help now, and we the citizens of Texas and the Nation need Jimmy Allred's help now as we have never needed it before.

Jimmy Allred as Attorney General of Texas was outstanding. He brought suit against 17 big oil corporations for violating anti-trust laws. Suit was finally settled by the companies paying the State of Texas \$450,000. One of his outstanding accomplishments while he was Attorney General was the investigation of the Fee System of Texas which led to its abolition by the Forty-second Legislature. In this undertaking he had a warm supporter and friend in our late Senator and friend, the Honorable Pink L. Parrish, of Lubbock.

Now my friends, we pass on to the constructive record as Governor of Texas. To the old people of Texas, I want you to reflect upon the following statements which are true: Jimmy Allred has the honor of being the first Statesman and Governor of this great state that advocated pensions for the aged of this State and in his Inaugural Address, and in his first term as Governor he made several speeches before the House and Senate urging the adoption of Old Age Pensions. Allred called two Special Sessions of the Legislature in 1935 for the specific purpose to pass the law and to raise necessary funds for its operation. The law was passed but could not become effective for 90 days. Governor Allred got busy, appointed the necessary personnel to administer the new set-up, and on July 1st, 1936 the first check went to 50,000 old people of Texas. I know this law was not what you elderly people expected, and it was not what I wanted it to be, but let me tell you, my good people, it was the beginning and I think that every old person and every young person who has the just interest of the old people at heart should thank Jimmy Allred for the effort he made in behalf of the old people of this State. Old people of Texas, if you have not done so, let me plead with you to sit down and write to Jimmy Allred and thank

him for his effort in your behalf, and if you have thanked him send him another letter and thank him again and again for no other man in Texas has fought, and plead, and worked for you as Jimmy Allred has done, and he fought your battles when the fighting was hard. You should thank him and everyone, old and young alike, should thank him. People of Texas, let's be grateful for what our own Jimmy has done, our own native Texan.

Other Social Security amendments passed while Jimmy was Governor were: Unemployment Insurance, and to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children, and the Teacher Retirement Act was passed while Jimmy was Governor.

Governor Allred abolished the pardon power of the Governor which had been violently abused. Instead of the Governor having pardoning power it was placed under a Board appointed by the Governor and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas, thereby eliminating abuses formerly made. This change greatly aided the rehabilitation of prisoners.

Allred also established the Department of Public Safety. Now rated by the F.B.I. as one of the best police organizations in the country. He fostered repeal of the race track gambling law, and he did it against violent opposition. Good people of Texas, you should still thank Jimmy Allred for this act of decency. He established a State Planning Board to bring industries to Texas. Here is Gov. Allred's statement, quote "I maintained cordial relations with the Federal government but I also went to Washington, and aided by Coke Stevenson, successfully led the fight which killed the distinct threat of Federal Oil Control, too, I fought and won the fight against Acquisition of Submerged Coastal Land by the Navy."

The records that I have given you are truly the things which Jimmy Allred has stood for, fought for, and won for the people of Texas. Let me remind you that he did all of this IN PEACE TIMES. What a record it is! No other Governor since Hogg has fought for and won such victories over the forces of evil.

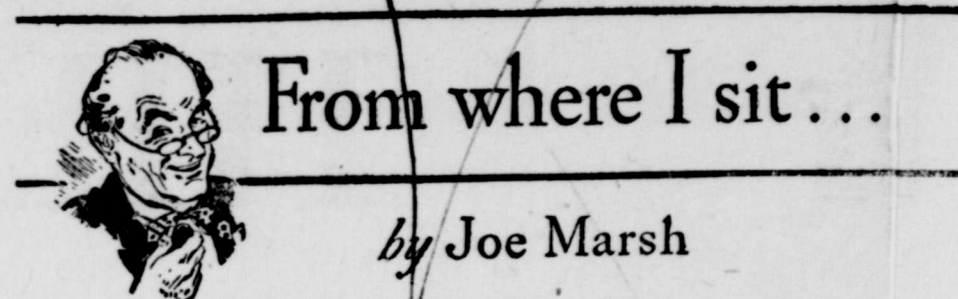
Now my friends, let us pass on to the Senatorial race. We have three outstanding candidates seeking the office. All three are former Governors of the great State of Texas. Let us ask ourselves what these men stand for. We have one man, Sen. O'Daniels, who says that the war is not an issue in this race. that the President doesn't need any help; that the war will be over sooner than we think. Now, my dear Texans, let us be honest with ourselves, do you believe there is a man or a woman in Texas who really believes that statement? Ask yourself that question, think of Senator O'Daniels statement, meditate awhile friends and then can you say "I believe it." My friends, these are serious times. I doubt if truth and freedom have ever been challenged as they are challenged today. I say, my friends, not since the son of God was nailed to the Cross and all truth and freedom were apparently banished from the face of the earth; but thanks be to God for His power was demonstrated, and on the third day truth and freedom were resurrected and brought back to the earth in the form of the resurrected body of Jesus Christ. Never again, do I believe, that truth will be banished again from the face of this earth. But it is now being challenged by all the forces of evil and the battle is now on, and the task of organizing the forces of "Right" here in

America has been entrusted to our President, who is the Commander-in-Chief. My friends I'm proud that in these dark days we have as our Commander-in-Chief, Franklin D. Roosevelt. We all believe in his leadership, we love him as we have loved no other President. He has our whole-hearted support. Every good American is saying down deep in his or her heart, "Lead Me, I Will Follow; Command Me, I Will Obey." My friends, this is total war! Don't be deceived by statements that this is going to be a short war; that peace will come sooner than we think. Now my friends, since I know that you love President Roosevelt and believe in him, let me ask you to ask yourselves the question, "Which one of these candidates is best qualified and the most willing to give aid and help to our great President who is in need of help?" Deep down in your heart, my friend, I know that the answer comes echoing back, "Jimmy Allred!" You know if the President were to express himself that it would be Jimmy Allred. Some of My very best friends have supported Senator O'Daniels in former election; some are still supporting him in this race but I know some who have been supporting him that are now supporting Jimmy Allred, for they know that Senator O'Daniels hasn't given President Roosevelt his whole-hearted support and cooperation that they feel he should have given. 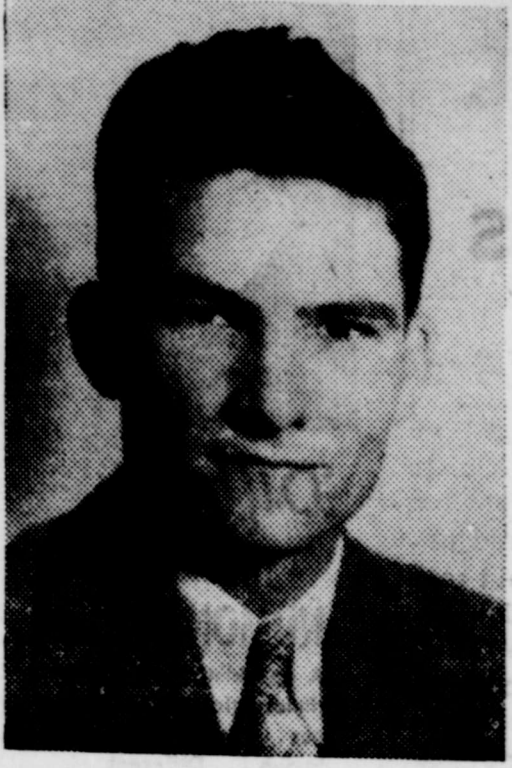
