Glenn O. Harwell, brother of Mrs. Buck Thomason of Girard, recently was given a battlefield promotion from the rank of staff sergeant to second lieutenant and awarded the Bronze Star medal for outstanding leadership in action during a Fifth Armored division battle on the Western front, The Texas Spur was no-

tified this week. When a company of armored infantry, supported by a tank platoon, came under an intense artillery barrage as the troops launched an attack against the Germans, the commander of the infantry company was killed, the report said. Despite being wounded, Harwell helped reorganize the force and continued the

attack. Shortly afterward, Harwell's tank struck a mine, and he was wounded again. Dismounting from his disabled tank, he discovered that the medical aid men were unable to take care of

### **V-E Day Observed** Here Tuesday With **Thanksgiving**

Spur, like countless other American towns, observed Tuesday, V-E day with solemn thanksgiving, and in compliance with President Truman's request, most Spur business concerns remained open all day-closing only about an hour in the morning to attend the church services.

At the conclusion of the Chief Executive's radio announcement that the war in Europe had ended (about 8:15), the fire alarm was sounded and the church bells rung to notify Spur residents of the German surrender. Boisterous display of joy was noticeably absent. Most people went calmly about their work-

### **Locker Plant Suffers** \$1000 Damage From **Explosion Sunday**

Approximately \$1,000 damage was done to the Leon Ice Co., Spur, about 3:30 p.m. Sunday when a drum of ammonia, lying in the door way of the plant engine room, exploded, Tom Vivian, manager, announced. No persons were injured and the cold storage lockers were unharmed. Damaged machinery was in

working order within a few hours, consequently contents of the frozen food compartments were not affected, and the plant continued operation, Vivian said. Cause of the blast which blew the top off the engine room and cracked the walls on the back side of the building, is unknown. The 125 gallon drum of ammonia was purchased from a factory in Illinois and was lying on the floor. The drum from which 25 Discharge from Navy gallons of ammonia had been used, was not connected with the plant machinery, Vivian stated. ### Saturday Marks 25th **Anniversary Nichols General Hospital**

Saturday, May 12, will mark the 25th anniversary of Nichols General hospital in Spur, and at the same time be the day observed nationally in recognition of hospitals all over the United States.

Dr .P. C. Nichols, owner of the hospital, came to Spur in 1920 and purchased the hospital from Dr. Thomas E. Standifer. The institution then became known as Nichols Sanitarium. It was not until last year when the hospital was moved to its new location on East Hill street that it became known as Nichols Gen-

eral hospital. Before coming to Spur, Dr. Nichols received his M.D. degree from Louiseville Medical college. Kentucky, and practiced medi-cine in Fisher and Stonewall

It is the stern duty of the United Nations to educate all Germans in regard to the brutality of Hitlerism. They must be convinced by indisputable evidence that millions of fathers, mothers and children were tortured, mistreated and slain in the process of securing benefits for Germans.

This process is apparently underway as Allied commanders compel German civilians to visit prison camps where they witness emaciated inmates, see with their own eyes the evidence of inhumanity and bury the bodies

of wasted human beings. The process of educating the German people must go further than an effort to convince them that stories of atrocities are true. They must be forced to disgorge the loot of modern piracy and, when this is impossible, repair all damage inflicted upon other peoples.

This means reparations and rebuilding. It will require drastic taxation inside Germany and the labor of thousands of Germans in foreign lands. In brief, the Germans must learn the doctrine of restitution as applied to stolen goods.

There is no asurance that the of education outlined above will develop better Germans. It may produce increased bitterness and a stronger desire for revenge. Even so, it should be resolutely enorced be-
