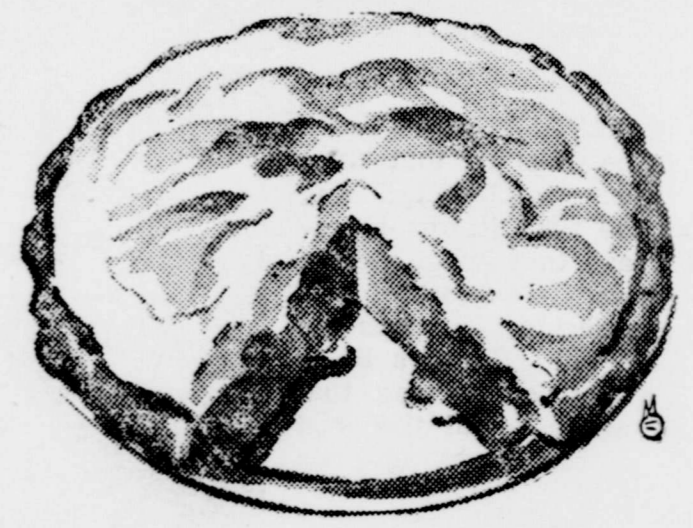

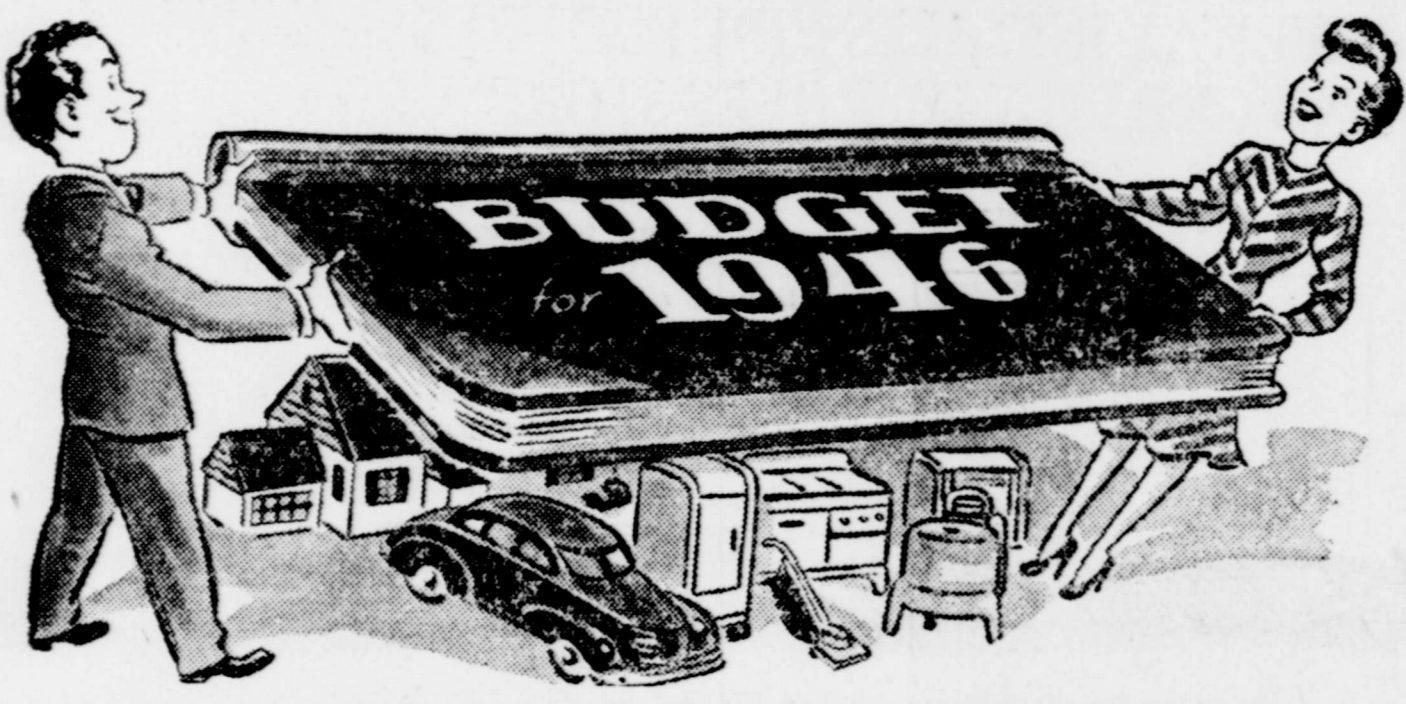

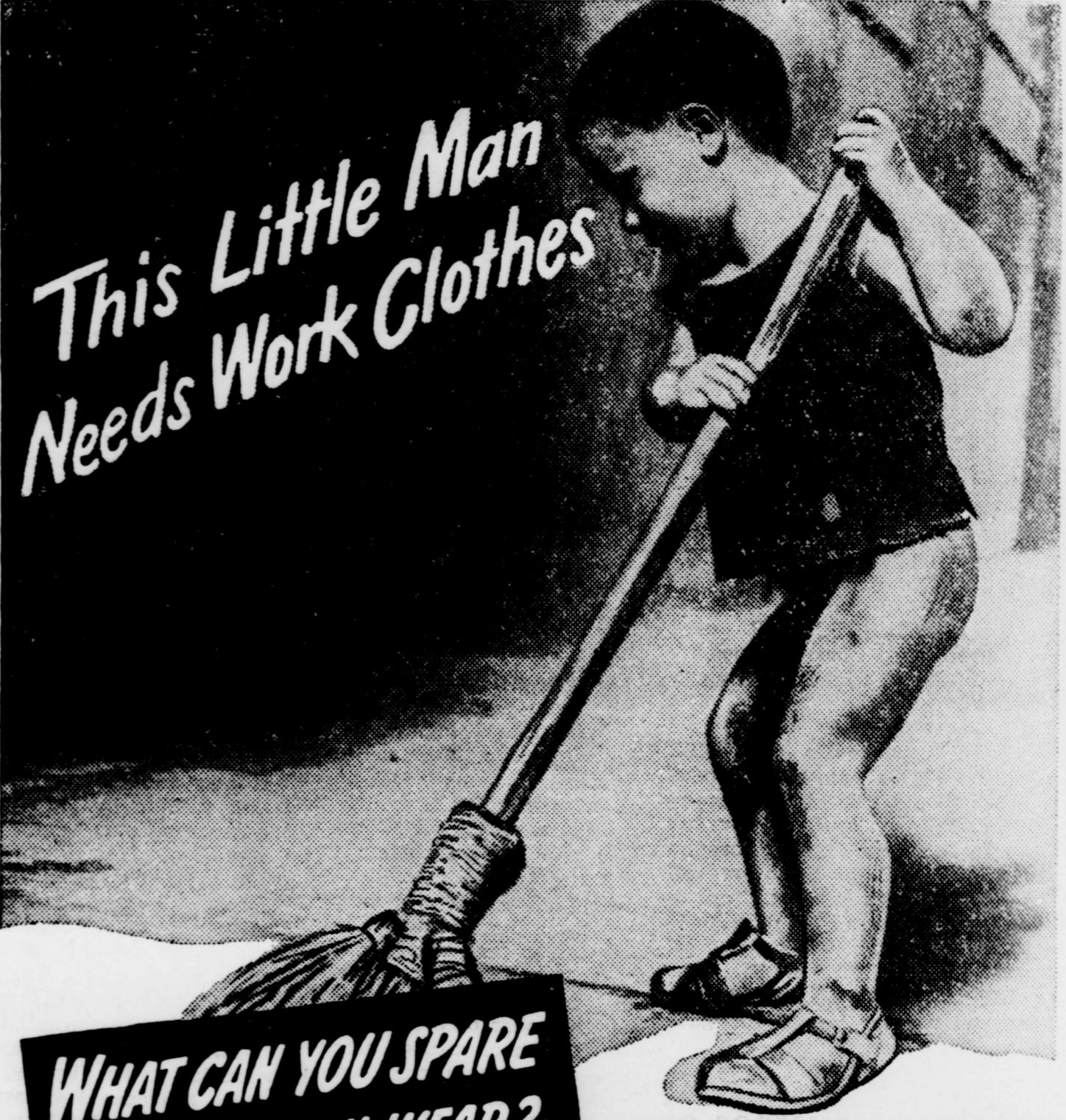

THE VETERAN'S FRIEND

Q. For a time my pension was my only income but now I have found employment. Shall I notify the Veterans Administration?

A. It is not necessary for you to notify the Veterans Administration of your additional earnings. Your pension is paid to you on the degree of a service-connected disability and in most instances is not affected by the amount you are able to earn.

x x x

Q. Is there a chance that families of overseas servicemen may be sent to a foreign theater?

A. The War Department doesn't think it would be practical and no change is contemplated in current restrictions against dependents of Army personnel joining their husbands and relatives stationed overseas in the armies of occupation.

x x x

Q. Are veterans of World War I still entitled to vocational training by the government?

A. No. However, the Federal Security Agency operates a vocational rehabilitation service which is available to disabled veterans and disabled civilians to aid them in preparing for and getting jobs.

x x x

Q. How does a disabled veteran of World War II make application to become a national service officer

trainee of the Disabled American Veterans?

A. He should apply to a DAV national service officer or the nearest DAV chapter for information.

x x x

Q. How soon must a veteran return to his old job after discharge from armed forces?

A. It is the policy of the Selective Service System that a veteran must be ready, willing and able to begin work within the 90 days from separation from the service in order to be eligible for mandatory reinstatement.

x x x

Q. Is a disabled veteran who is receiving educational benefits under the GI bill and who is entitled to vocational training paying him greater benefits under Public IC entitled to transfer?

A. Definitely, yes. He should take up the matter with his Vocational Training chief immediately.

x x x

Q. Is a disabled veteran, drawing pension benefits in excess of the amount allowed as training pay, entitled to his pension if he receives vocational training under Public 16.

A. Yes. He cannot draw both but he is entitled to the larger amount. His tuition and books will still be furnished by the Veterans' Administration.

Reserve Corps Men May Retain Grade in Regular Army

Wire From War Dept. Makes Offer For Veterans

The West Texas US Army Recruiting Service with enlistment stations in Amarillo, Abilene, Lubbock, Big Springs, and San Angelo, Texas, today received a War Department communication by telegraph which is of vital concern to men who have been released from the Army, and who are now on active status in the Enlisted Reserve Corps, particularly those who have been discharged more than twenty (20) days, thus being ineligible for retention of the grade held received, all members of the Enlisted Reserve Corps on inactive status who request enlistment in the Regular Army on or before 31 January 1946, may be administratively discharged from the Enlisted Reserve Corps and enlisted in the Regular Army in the grade held in the Reserve Corps.

The teletype further stated that members of the Enlisted Reserve Corps on active status, who request enlistment in the Regular Army on or after February 1946, will be administratively discharged from the Enlisted Reserve Corps and enlisted in the Regular Army in the grade of private; except that such individuals may be enlisted in the Regular Army in such higher grades as may be authorized by the War Department instructions in effect at the time of enlistment in the regular army for persons who are not members of the Enlisted Reserve Corps.

Summed up, this means that men now in the Enlisted Reserve Corps who wish to avail themselves of family allotments, and the twenty year retirement benefits have until the 31 January 1946 to reenlist and also retain their rank held time of discharge. Those men who have been in the enlisted reserve on an inactive status for less than 90 days and who receive a discharge from the Enlisted Reserve Corps and reenlist in the Regular Army within the 90-day period are eligible to receive the reenlistment allowance of \$50 a year for each previous year of service on their last AUS or RA enlistment prior to their recent discharge.

For further information and necessary forms, all veterans interested are urged to contact the nearest United States Army Recruiting Station, located in the Four County Veterans Service Officer's office, Spur Security Building, Spur, Texas.

Recruiting stations are also located in Dalhart, Pampa, Borger, Wellington, Childress, Plainview, Lamesa, Odessa, Sweetwater and Ballinger, Texas.

When President Roosevelt interested the moving picture people

in the infantile paralysis crusade of which he was the leader and is now the guiding symbol and spirit, he performed a master stroke for the cause so near his heart.

Back in 1941, the movies hastily participated in the March of Dimes on a semi-national basis and collected some \$435,000. Since then, the moviegoers have responded more and more generously and more and more theatre have participated. The 1945 March of Dimes collections thru movie theatres totalled \$5,971,000! That brought the total since 1941 to over \$14,000,000. Last year, it was estimated, there were more than 75,000,000 donations of pennies, dimes and dollars, meaning probably the most widely spread public participation in any scientific health crusade in history.

Shortly before he died, President Roosevelt had as his guests at the White House the movie campaign leaders and he commented, with a pleased smile, on how the infantile paralysis fight had developed into a truly American and democratic method of combating a common enemy.

Sausage Casserole Makes Savory Meal



There's nothing quite like a corn-sausage casserole as the main dish for a cold evening supper, invites Marjorie Griffin, rural home editor of Capper's Farmer, nationally-circulated farm magazine.

Corn-Sausage Casserole.

3/4 lb. sausage 1/4 tsp. pepper
1/2 c. onion 2/3 c. whole kernel corn
1/2 c. green pepper 1/2 c. tomato
2 tbsp. flour 1 c. canned tomatoes
1 tsp. salt 1 c. rice cereal

Use link sausages or bulk sausage shaped into links; brown them in a heavy frying pan and drain well. Brown chopped onion and green pepper in meat drippings. Add flour and seasonings and mix well. Add corn and tomatoes and simmer until juice has partially evaporated (about one-half hour). Pour into casserole; arrange sausages on top in pinwheel shape. Sprinkle cereal over top. Bake at 400° F. about 15 minutes. Serves 6.

New Dishwashers

Dishwashers for which so many farm homemakers have been waiting should appear early in 1946, declares the Rural Home editor of nationally circulated Capper's Farmer. There will be free standing portable models separate from the sink and others built into the sink. Some open from the top and others from the bottom.

Fruit Coffee Cake Livens Party Table



Fruit coffee cake waves a magic wand over the party table when friends drop in of an afternoon, writes the Country Cooking Editor of Capper's Farmer.

"Made of ordinary quick-bread dough, it's glamorized with raisins, nuts and spices," she writes.

Serve it at any meal for the family's delight. A thin icing puts it in the dessert class at lunch or dinner."

Fruit Coffee Cake.

1/2 c. raisins 1 tsp. flour
1/2 c. water 1 egg
1 tsp. lemon juice 1/4 c. milk
Ground cloves 1/4 c. flour
Ground cinnamon 2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 c. shortening 1/2 c. sugar

Combine seedless raisins and water. Bring to a boil and cook for two minutes. Gradually add 1 tsp. flour to mixture, stirring constantly, until thickened. Add lemon juice and a dash of cloves and cinnamon. Cool. Combine raisin mixture, lightly beaten egg and milk. Sift all-purpose flour, baking powder and sugar together. Work in shortening so particles are approximately the size of a small pea. Pour liquid mixture into middle of dry ingredients; stir two together just enough to mix well. Spoon into greased tube pan. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375° F.) for 25 minutes.
