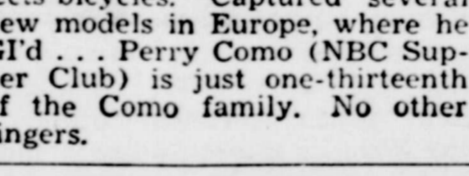

World's New Champ Milk Producer



IONIA, MICH.—With the production of 22,526 pounds of milk and 714.8 pounds of butterfat during the year ending February 1, Ionia Ormsby Queen of the Ionia State Hospital farm has added the title of world's champion milk producer to her 12 records, displacing Essex Suzone April Belle, who was announced as a new champion only last November.

The Holstein-Friesian cow's lifetime herd test record, over a period of 15 years, shows the tremendous production of 252,563 pounds of milk and 8,071 pounds of butterfat, with an average of 351½ days per lactation. Her highest individual record, at six years, shows 23,866 pounds of milk and 771 pounds of butterfat, milking three times daily, 365 days. Four of her records are over 700 pounds of fat and all over 500 pounds, with nine of her marks topping 20,000 pounds of milk.

Rodeo-Horse Show May 3-4 At Quanah

Quanah, Texas is staging a big Rodeo and Horse show in that city on May 3 and 4. Beutler Brothers of Elk City, Oklahoma will furnish the stock for the rodeo. Beutler Brothers are noted rodeo producers and Quanah and surrounding territory is looking forward to a gala and colorful affair on the above dates.

A huge, colorful parade will open festivities at 10 a.m., Friday morning, May 3. The first rodeo performance will be at 2 p.m. Friday afternoon. The Quarter Horse and Palimino Horse show will be held Saturday, May 4 at 2 p.m. The second and final rodeo performance will be at 8 p.m. Saturday night.

Saddle bronc riding, steer riding, calf roping and steer bulldogging will be the principal events. \$800,000 in prize money plus entry fees will be given to the winning contestants in the two day show.

Specialties include a cutting horse contest with \$125.00 in prize money plus entry fees. Calgary Red from Cody, Wyoming performing his trick roping act from a tight wire; the Reger sisters from Woodward, Oklahoma doing fancy and trick riding; and Wiley McCray, famous clown and bull fighter.

What is your GUESS?

on our profits . . . ?

SOMETIMES, although an idea is wrong, it does no harm. Like the idea that a square jaw is the sign of will power. That winters aren't as severe as they used to be, or that red hair denotes quick temper.

But there are other wrong ideas, which are definitely harmful to public confidence in and understanding of industry. One such idea is the current "guessing" about profits made by large business organizations.

Many people are apt to grossly exaggerate the money made by business. So Opinion Research Corporation (an independent organization) made a survey to learn just what the public thinks about profits. Compare these guesses and yours with the International Harvester profit figures given below.

Public guess on war profits . . . **30.0%**
In four war years average profit . . . **4.9%**

In this survey, the average of the guesses by the public of the wartime profits made by industry was . . . thirty per cent (30%).
But in the four war years of 1942, 1943, 1944, and 1945, the profits of International Harvester Company averaged only . . . 4.9% on sales. Less than one sixth of what the general public "guessed" for all industry.

rate of profit in normal times. Many large businesses, including ourselves, would consider it a banner year if we could reach this figure. Our average profit for the last ten years—four war and six peace—was 6.43%—more than a third less than what the public considers fair.

All these figures show that our profits are not high. As a matter of fact, the entire farm machinery industry is a low profit industry. In 1944, the Federal Trade Commission published a list of 76 industries ranked in order of their ratio of profits to sales. The farm machinery industry was 57th on the list.

What About Current I H Prices?
When the War ended and we planned our peace-time production, we had hoped to be able to serve our farmer customers at the same level which has held since 1942, regardless of war-time increases in costs of wages and materials up to that time. But recent developments have forced a change in our plans.

Wages and materials consume nearly all of every dollar Harvester takes in from sales. The Government has also allowed price increases on raw materials which we purchase in large quantities. Steel has had an average increase of 8.2%.

We regret this necessity. We prefer to lower prices, when possible, rather than raise them and we know our customers prefer to have us do that. We had hoped to be able to "hold the line," at least.
But we do not see how we can avoid operating at a loss if our prices continue to remain at their present frozen levels. We will NOT "cut corners" on any of our products, because QUALITY IS THE FOUNDATION OF OUR BUSINESS.
Our customers can be certain that we will seek no more than a moderate profit, both because of our policies and because we have approximately 300 competitors fighting us vigorously for your business. Our request for price relief will be no more than is necessary to insure continued service to our customers, continued work for our employees, and a reasonable return for our stockholders.

It is our hope, plan and purpose to interest our businessmen, civic bodies, clubs, etc., in the securing of the property where the cross is located, the erecting of a permanent cross, with tomb, etc., "The Calvary of West Texas" this to be a monument to the Faith and Hope of all Christians, where annually will be presented this great drama.

It is my belief that with the presenting of this drama each year we will attract and receive the wholehearted support of every congregation in West Texas who will send their copies, their leaders, to have a part in the preparation and presenting of this scene, thereby bringing together in Christian fellowship the largest number of people ever to be assembled in the history of Texas.

May the clubs, Chamber of Commerce, civic clubs, and all congregations now, while it is fresh in our minds and hearts, begin to talk and to set in motion a plan and program bringing to realization the completion of this most important step to put Western Texas in the forefront of Christian unity.
