How to Feed Turkeys And Not Lose Money

The question being asked by turkey raisers in Texas is "How am I going to feed my turkeys and not lose money? Ted Martin, poultryman for the Texas A. &M. College Extension Service ,lists will help the turkey raisers to get more birds to market.

First, the poultryman says, turkeys should get all the green feed they can eat. Sudan grass s a good summer pasture, but if green feed is not available on the range, then baled alfalfa may be fed. Texas fruit growers must cul tivate their orchards continously during the summer months in order to produce a good frui crop ,warns J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist with the Texas A and M. College Extension Service. Fruit buds must have foliage

to maintain proper health throughout the growing season ,the horticultrist says. Trees that shed leaves due to drouth, malnutrition or improper care will not produce good fruit the following season, because the buds will be weakened. The care of the trees now and into the fall season will largely determine the fruit crop for next season.



Many trees and shrubs which were set out in West and Central Texas last fall have been lost due to lack of moisture. J. F. Rosborough and C. R. Heaton, horticulturist for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, say that these losses are due largely to improper watering methods.

The tight soils of West and Central Texas must be watered very slowly in order to get deep moist re penetration, the horticulturists say. Every 10 to 14 days is often enough to water if it is done properly.

A soil covering placed around the trees will hold the moisture in the soil. Hay, weeds or any cured material that will make mulch may be used for a ground covering. Experiments ave shown that a mulch will cool the soil as much as 20 de-

Danger Of Inflation In The Incidence Of Disease

In discussing the possible danger of inflation to the American way of life, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health officer, has declared that he believes one phase of this menace which could not be overooked is the danger of inflation

in the incidence of disease. "Just because we have won war is no reason why we should allow the disease and death rates in the country to become higher than in recent peacetimes," Dr. Cox said. "Indeed, it is an urgent reason why we should sharply reduce these rates among our people and use every effort to keep the health levels among our civilian and military population

at their highest possible peak." The State Health Officer emphasized once again, as he has often done in the past, the necessity for using the more easily accessible ,common-sense safeguards of health. Immunization against several of the more killing diseases is available to all, at little or no cost. Such protection should not be neglected and the person who allows himself or his family to suffer from a preventable illness, is whether he realizes it or not, actually handicapping the nations reconversion effort. Another health percaution which an and should be practiced in every home and community is careful sanitation clean clothes, a clean body, and clean home environments do much to prevent the appearance of illness in the home and the same sanitation practiced throughout the community will help to insure the good health of that community.

"Good, wholesome, nourishing foods, home and community sanitation ,and the protection afforded by immunization can do a lot to prevent the needless inflation of the disease and death rates in this country," Dr. Cox asserted.



Stretching Wheat Flour Brings **Variety In Baking**

Stretching wheat flour in home baking can bring a variety in taste and texture to home baking. Possible extenders include rye flour .oatmeal or cornmeal, potatoes and sweet potatoes. But Edith Lawrence, specialist in Food preparation for the A. & M. College Extension Service, cautions housewives that for good results they must know the correct amounts to use and the best. method of mixing.

Yeast bread may be made entirely from rye flour. The German bread, pumpernickel, is a familiar example. All-rye bread is darker, more moist and heavier than wheat bread. A lighter loaf may be made by using half rye and half wheat flour.

In extending with oatmeal or cornmeal, only a third as much finely ground cats or fine cornmeal as wheat flour is recommended. Oatmeal bread is slightly coarser and darker than whitebread but excellent in flavor.

These flours or meals are sifted or mixed with the wheat flour and then the bread is made by the standard method for white bread offered in any reliable cookbook.

In using potatoes in bread. both the proportions and the method of mixing are different. Only a small quantity of potato can be used -- about one cup of mashed potatoes to five or six cups of flour. The mashed potato is thinned with potato water, then mixed with the softened yeast cake before the flour is stirred in to make a dough or sponge. Mashed sweet potatoes may be added to the sponge with the



DDT is still a very new story particulary in connection with feed and food crops.

For household and livestock nsects, DDT is the best insecticide that has been found, said C. A. King, Jr., entomologist for the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service. 
