Demand For Cotton Materials To Remain At High Level; Planning 8,460,000 Acres

Cotton Demand Raises Cotton Planting Goal

COLLEGE STATION, — Foreseen continued demand for cotton products in 1947 has set Texas' cotton planting goal for next year at 8,460,000 acres.

This information comes from specialists of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service who attended the Annual Agricultural Outlook Conference in Washington, D. C. to see what's in store for farmers next year.

The consumption rate of cotton has continued high since the end of the war, and no immediate change can be foreseen, the specialists say. Certain factors that may tend to weaken the demand for cotton goods, as well as most all farm products, are expected to become more prominent during 1947, however. As home construction and production of automobiles and household appliances increase, consumer expenditures will be shifted to purchase these goods and less money will be spent on food and clothing. Cotton consumption in

the nation for the first six months of the 1946-47 season is expected to be at approximately the same high level as it has been during the past few years, but may run at a lower rate the last half of the season.

Concerning prices that farmers are due to receive for cotton next year, the specialists say that the 1947 loan rate is fixed at 92.5 percent of parity as of August 1, 1947.

CHRISTMAS

This name means "Christ's Mass," is applied to the festive commemorating the birth of Christ, celebrated on Dec. 25. The exact date of the birth of Jesus is unknown. It was not until the third century that his birth anniversary was celebrated to any appreciable extent by Christians, nor was there any general agreement regarding the date on which it should be celebrated. January 6 and December 25, however were commonly chosen in the 4th century. The general adoption of Dec. 25, first in the West and a little later in the East, dates from the 5th century. December 25 was already a festive day for the sun God, Mithra and appealed to the Christians as an appropriate date to commemorate the birth of Jesus, the "Light of the World." Theatres in the Roman Empire were ordered closed down on Christmas as early as 400 but the day did not become legal (court) holiday until 534.

In Germany the Yule feast, held at the winter solstice, had been celebrated in pre-Christmas times, and many customs of the earlier festival were transferred to the christian holiday. To replace some of these, dramatic representations of Jesus' early life were instituted, hence arose the medieval "manger songs" and Christmas Carols. The Yule log first became a public ceremony in England, in 1577. Plum puddings and mince pies had long since been associated with the day. The exchange of gifts at Christmas had its origin in early medieval times, but the use of Christmas cards dates from the latter half of the 19th century.

The Christmas tree is believed to have its origin in the ceremonial use of the palm tree in the worship of the Egyptian goddess Isis. A palm with twelve shoots, one to represent each month of the year, was carried in a festival of Isis at the winter solstice, celebrating the completion of one year and the beginning of another. In northern climates this association of the palm tree with the celebration of December 25 was modified by the substitution of a fir tree.

The Christmas stockings comes from an Italian practice associated with January 6. The fairy Befana is supposed on that night to fill the stockings of children with gifts in accordance with their behavior.

WHEREFORE, the premises considered, the plaintiff prays that the defendant be cited to appear and answer herein and that upon trial hereof she have judgement dissolving the bonds of matrimony now existing between the plaintiff and the defendant; that plaintiff be awarded the care and custody of said minor children above named; that the defendant be required to pay the sum of \$40.00 per month for the support of said minor children above named until the further order of the Court, and for such other and further relief, general or special, either in law or in equity, to which she may be justly entitled under the facts presents to the Court.

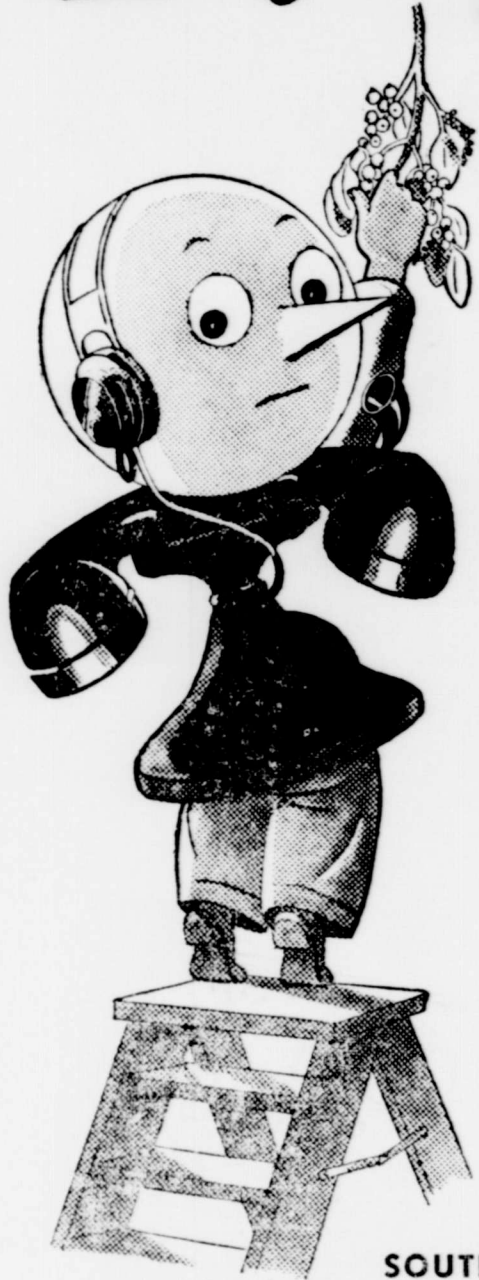

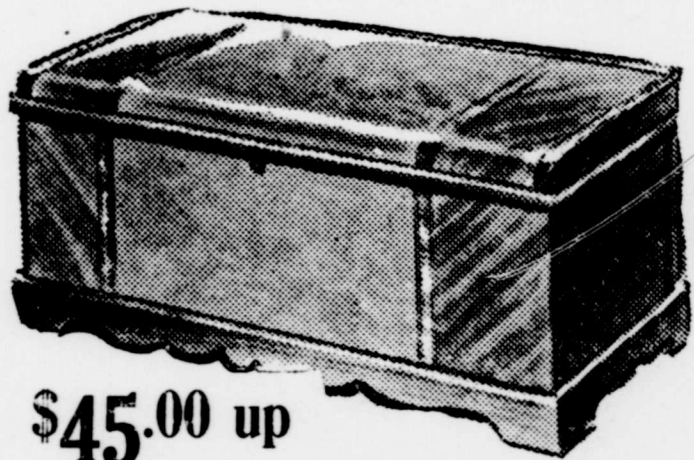

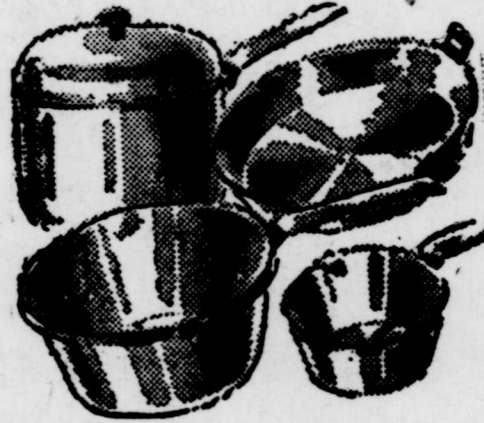

The theatre building has been completely remodeled throughout and new fixtures and seats installed. The interior is very attractive and will add to the entertainment facilities offered people of the community.

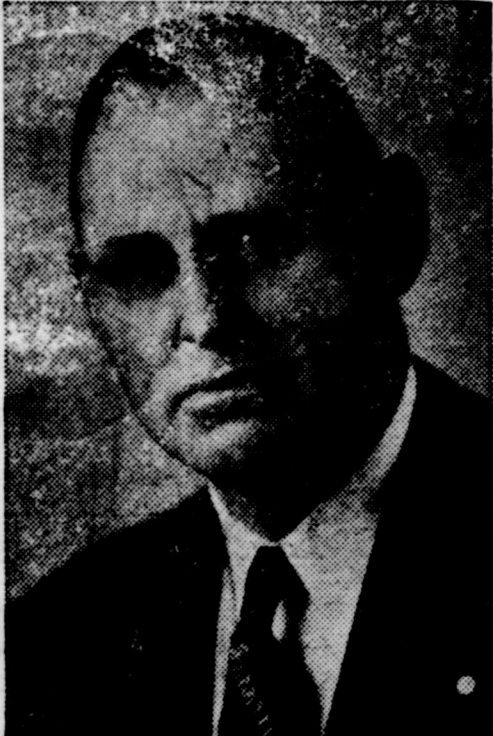

sioners' Court of this county to attend the meeting, according to Judge Boedeker.

Special efforts are being put forth by counties southwest of Dickens county, according to reports from the County Judge of Andrews county. Interest is keen in the northeast part of the state and also in Oklahoma and all are making a strong fight for the proposed road, which coupled with the efforts of local officials and leaders, assures citizens of Dickens that no stone will be left unturned to secure the road.

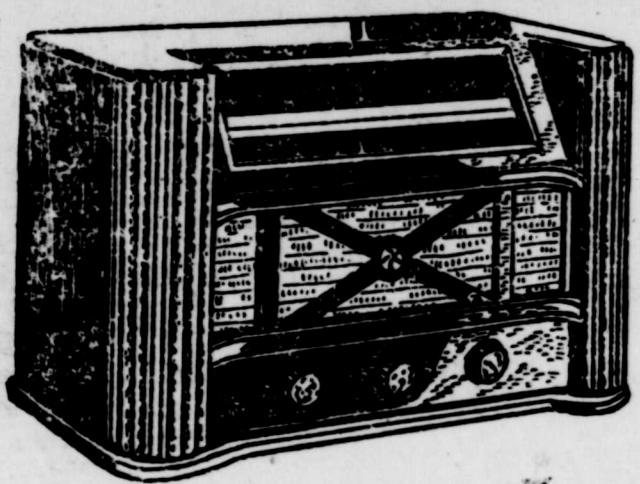

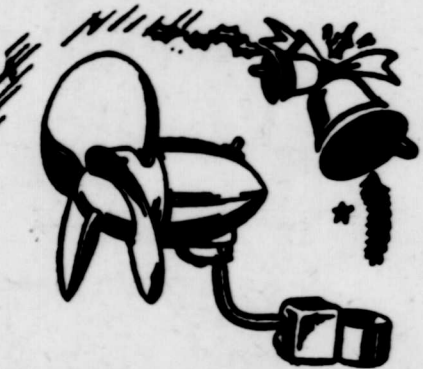

County's Farm Income Shows Large Increase

More than tripling their annual gross income in comparison with 1940, as reported by the U. S. Bureau of Census, Dickens County farm families last year produced crops & livestock with the record value of more than \$3,513,000.

This huge increase in farm revenue has already created heavy demand for general farm improvements and for home remodeling. With every industry anticipating greater business in the state than before the war, business men expect their sales here to triple in the next few years.

Increased sales of industrial products mean in turn a new level of prosperity for every local businessman and worker.

A study of farm conditions shows that many farm improvements were made even during the war. Since 1940, for example, the number of farm homes reporting electric lights here has increased from 66 to 102. Heavy demand for such modernizing as installation of running water, improving kitchen layouts has already resulted, according to reports.

It is also pointed out that farmers in the county today have 260 more tractors than in 1940, according to the Bureau of Census, and that the number of trucks on farms has likewise increased substantially. These facts not only indicate the importance of the farm market but also make it one which no businessman or manufacturer can afford to overlook.

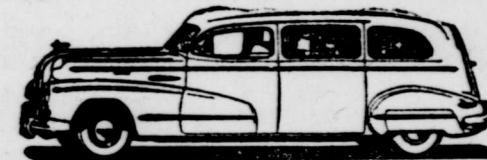
