Mrs. D. W. Smith who suffered a broken hip some time ago, is very ill at this time.

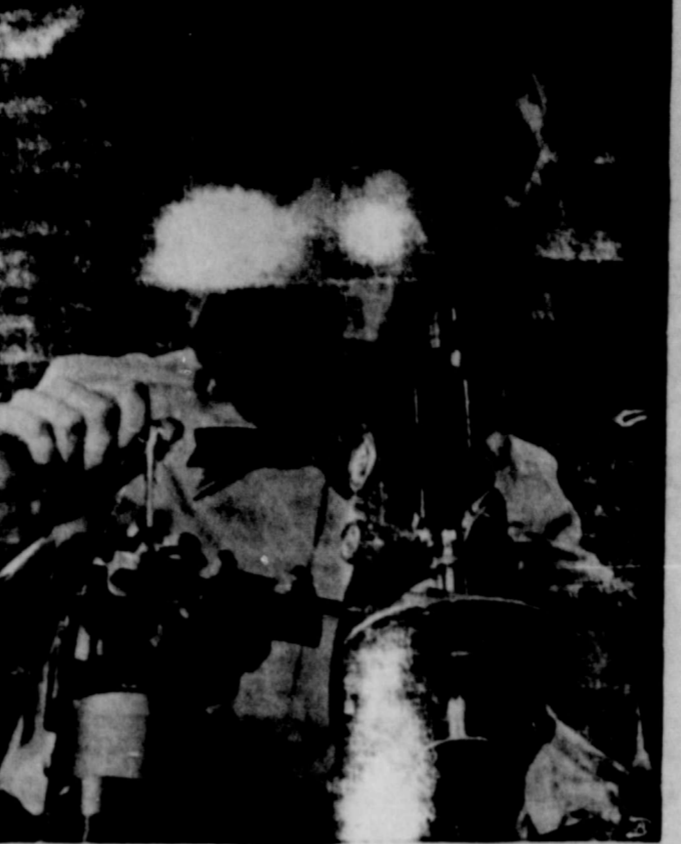

Machine for Handling the Invisible



HARMARVILLE, PA.—Particles invisible to the naked eye are handled by this wizard-like machine of modern science, called the micro-manipulator. The hand lever operates a hydromatic drive directing probes, rakes and shovels so tiny they work within a drop of water as would ordinary instruments in a brook or test tube. A humidified cell prevents evaporation of the minute sample beneath the microscope lens. Photo was taken at Gulf Oil's micro-laboratory where research into the infinitely small is speeding progress toward meeting the world's demands for oil.

Cherry Pie Champ

 "You don't do anything special, but stick to the recipe and watch what you're doing." That's the advice of Miss Valeria Johnson, 17, Chicago, recently crowned champion cherry pie baker of the nation in competition with entrants from eleven states conducted by the National Hatcher Club in Chicago. And here's her tip on how to serve cherry pie for best eating: serve it with a generous wedge of aged cheese.
Pie Crust
 2 cups flour 1 top salt
 1/2 cup shortening 1 cup water
 Sift flour then measure. Sift again with salt. Cut in shortening with Pastry Blender. Add water needed. Flour pastry cloth and rolling pin stockinette. Place in pie pan, add prepared cherries. Trim crust. Cover with top crust. After steam vents have been cut. Turn top crust under bottom crust and flute edge. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 45 minutes.
Filling:
 4 cups cherries
 1/4 cup cherry juice
 1/4 cup maple
 4 tsp. cornstarch
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 1/4 cup almond extract
 Put sugar in sauce pan with 1/4 cup juice and bring to boil point. Mix rest of juice (1/4 cup) with cornstarch and add to sugar mixture. Cook for a few minutes. Remove from stove and add butter and almond extract. Add cherries just before filling lower crust.

 To rapidly boiling water, add salt. Gradually sprinkle in rolled wheat and cook for 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Pour into greased 9x5x3 inch loaf pan. Chill until firm. Cut into 12 slices, brown on both sides in small amount of hot oil. Serve with Cheese Sauce. YIELD: 12 servings.
Cheese Sauce
 2 tablespoons butter or margarine 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 2 tablespoons flour 1 cup milk
 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 cup grated American cheese
 Melt butter, add flour, salt and pepper. Stir to a smooth paste. Add milk gradually, cook over low heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Add cheese and stir until melted.

 WASHINGTON, March 25 Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, retired Army Chief of Staff, will not be available for a presidential nomination on any ticket, his friends said today.
 This was in reply to demands from a number of Democrats that the five-star general be given the Democratic presidential nomination instead of President Truman. The general is now writing his memoirs before taking up the presidency of Columbia university in June.
 Friends said the general is aware of recent moves to revive his name for the presidency in both Democratic and Republican quarters.
 But they said his position was made known irrevocably last Jan. 23 when he wrote a New Hampshire Republican supporter that he "could not accept" a nomination "my decision to remove myself completely from the political scene is definite and positive."
 They said he may be forced to reaffirm that stand if reports continue that he has not "closed the door" entirely to a nomination.
 Meanwhile, a Democratic party stalwart, Senator Murray, of Montana, called on the pro and anti-Truman elements in his party to discard politics now and concentrate on national security and the public welfare.
 Murray said in a statement he had been asked whether any westerners may line up with southern senators in opposing Mr. Truman's nomination.
 "I think the time to discuss any such matter," he said, "is at the national convention."
 Southern opposition to the President is based on his advocacy of laws against lynching, poll taxes, and discrimination in jobs and transportation because of race.
 "Westerners—a few in New York and Illinois—are also taking shots at him for reversing a previous stand for Palestine partitioning."

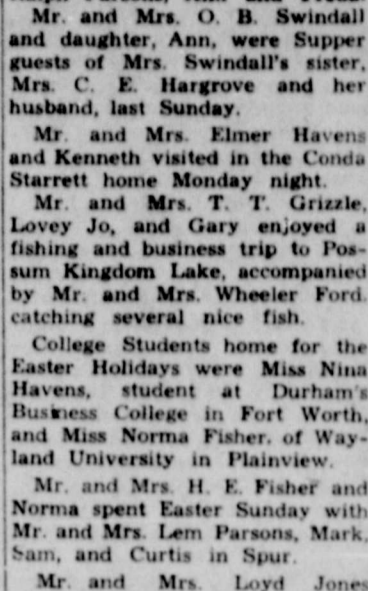

Pie Crust
 2 cups flour 1 top salt
 1/2 cup shortening Water
 Sift flour then measure. Sift again with salt. Cut in shortening with Pastry Blender. Add water needed. Flour pastry cloth and rolling pin stockinette. Place in pie pan, add prepared cherries. Trim crust. Cover with top crust after steam vents have been cut. Turn top crust under bottom crust and flute edge. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 45 minutes.

 1/2 cup cherry juice
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup flour
 1 top butter
 1/2 top almond extract
 Put sugar in sauce pan with 1/4 cup juice and bring to boil, pouring rest of juice in 1/4 cup with cornstarch and add to sugar mixture. Cook for a few minutes. Remove from stove and add butter and almond extract. Add cherries just before filling lower crust.

CONG. GEORGE MAHON DESERVES UNOPPOSED 1948 CAMPAIGN

In a simple announcement, George Mahon, who represents the 19th Texas congressional district in Congress, has said he would seek again the democratic nomination to the office.

While we recognize the sound right of any one to announce for the same office, we hope that the congressman from this district will not be obliged to lay down his duties in Washington to face a campaign at home.

George Mahon has faced some campaigns at home since he first went to Congress in 1935, but even against formidable opposition his margin of victory was sufficiently strong to remove any doubt as to the fact that a big majority of the voters in the district approve of and appreciate his record.

Because he is quiet and unassuming, a type of man whose name may seldom be found quoted at length upon this and that issue, his record is the one thing which has earned him the support of his district.

His chief assignment is that of member of the powerful appropriations committee possibly the most potent one committee in the House. Assigned to its military sub-committee, it fell Mahon's lot to handle the actual physical contact work for the committee in the days prior to and during the war. After the war had ended, Mahon's single-handed fight restored appropriations to the air force and kept it from being hamstringed worse than it was. Subsequent events certainly have proven his vision and wisdom on this point.

Hardly had he been oriented in Congress before he was chosen on a committee to visit the Orient.

During the war he made flying junkets on inspection trips all over the U. S., to Alaska, again to the Orient. One of his most significant assignments came last summer when he was named a member of the hand-picked Herter committee to make an inspection of condition in Europe. If will be remembered that Rep. Christian Herter, the chairman, selected the committee purely on a basis of merit, conscientiousness, and ability to work hard and long.

This trip afforded Mahon an opportunity to talk with common people, to visit in their homes and shops, to talk with officials and others in England, Germany, France, and Trieste. Thus, his background has given him some broad international understandings.

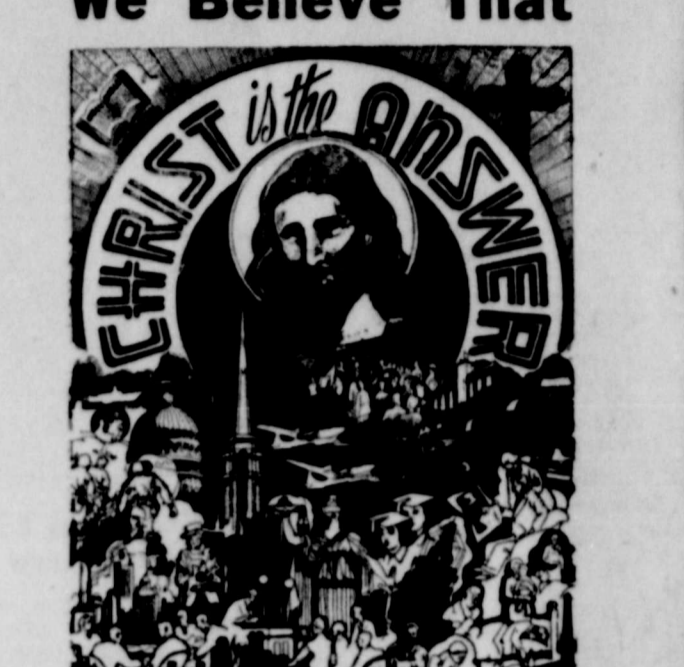
