Make Piecrust Perfect Always Don't roll the pastry too much or it

will be tough. And avoid extra emounts of flour. Never stretch the pastry to fit the tin or it will shrink. Fit loosely to avoid shrinkage. To prevent a soggy crust in berry

and fruit pies, place in a hot oven on the lower shelf to set the crust and bake it before it becomes soaked with the filling.

You also can help prevent soggi-ness in berry pies by sprinkling the lower crust with a bit of flour before adding the fruit. Pastry is baked quickly in a very

hot oven and best done when the ple is on the lower shelf. The intense heat of the oven expands the cold liquid in the pastry into steam and makes the crust rise in flaky layers. The heat should set the crust before he shortening melts.

To prevent soggy crust in cream ples, cool both the crust.

Add cream of tartar to egg whites and beat until stiff. Add sugar. Continue beating until very stiff. Spread over chocolate. Chill one hour.

3 1/2 tablespoons corn starch

1/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon almond extract

Measure shortening accurately. The water displacement method is good. For every cup of flour, 1/3 cup of shortening is required. Place 2/3 cup of water in the cup and add shortening until the water reaches the top. Saves a dirty cup, too.

Never over-mix the flour and shortening. It's best to use scissors or a pastry blender to prevent heating the fat with warm fingers. Leave some of the fat in large sized pieces so these streak through the crust and give you the desired flakiness, Only enough water to hold the mix-

ture together is required. It should be ice cold. And, don't forget, on damp days, less water is required Sprinkle in the amount lightly. And don't work too hard mixing it to-A good idea is to use heavy crash

or a pastry cloth with a child's white ribbed hose for the rolling pin. Flour rubbed into each of these prevents the dough from sticking and also will prevent an extra amount from being picked up by the dough.

OFFICIAL WASHINGTON GIVES a bad case of war jitters or else planning a deliberate show of military activity in order to outbluff the Russians.

Telegrams have been sent to large groups of reserve officers to be ready in case of trouble. No one has been called officially, but many have been warned that they may be In addition, army representatives

have visited certain key factories and inquired about plans for rapid conversion of their plants in case of trcuble. The army has been espe-cially interested in cement factories, pointing out that it may be necessary to do a lot of underground con-

Behind this, war chiefs admit, have been some ominous moves by the Russian army, which has now concentrated heavy reinforcements either in Russian-occupied Germany or else near the German border.

There is no way of knowing just what this means. It may mean that the Russians are prepared to move into Western Europe in retaliation for the Westalliance and the U. S.-British-French plan for a separate control of the Ruhr. Or it may merely mean that the Russians are shifting their troops around in order to intimidate the Itallans on the eve of the election States. It is considered unlikely that Russia really wants war now, so it may well be that the Russian troop maneuvers are a

In any event, U. S. war chiefs, having been caught napping at Pearl Harbor, are taking no chances again.

To this end, only a few U. S. troops are being left in Germany, Large U. S. forces there might tempt the Russians to deliver a crippling blow and execute a Dun- tury.

TRIESTE: Surprise

In a move that surprised everyone from the Russians to American congressmen, the U.S. proposed jointly with France and Britain that the tree territory of Trieste be returned to Italy.

Trieste, long a storm center coveted by both Italians and Yugoslavs. had been made a free state under United Nations guidance in the sixmonths-old Italian peace treaty. The proposal was, apparently, a

shrewd and calculated move to try to help the anti-Communist forces in Italy win the April 18 election. It literally put the Russians on the spot, leaving them with little choice of reaction. If they support the western powers' proposal to return Trieste to Italy they will be, in effect, turning their backs on their previous arguments for a Yugoslav Trieste, thereby kicking their Yugoslav cohorts in the face.

On the other hand, if Russia were to side with Yugoslavia it would amount to a rebuff for the Italian Communists. Possession of Trieste is a great political issue in Italy, and it well may turn out now to be a deciding factor in the elections coming up there.

Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito, however, lost little time in answering the proposal of the U. S., Britain and France. He simply rejected the demand and proposed instead that a plebiscite be held in the free state of Trieste to decide whether it should be Italian or Yugoslav. Moscow diplomats were calling

the action "another move toward war." Said one: "The beginnings of international order which emerged after the war are being destroyed." 
