Dickens County Pioneer Dies In Spur, April 26

Funeral services for Benjamin Tood Arthur, 86, who passed away at the home of his brother, Olen Arthur of Spur, on Monday night, April 26, 1946, after a short illness, were held Wednesday afternoon, April 28th in the Church of Christ in Spur, with Bro. Frank L. Cox officiating.

Tood Arthur as he was called by his friends in Dickens county, was a man liked and respected by all who knew him. He was one of the pioneers of this section and has many friends among the old time cowboys, with whom he rode the range in days long gone. He was a member of the Church of Christ and as long as his health permitted was to be found in his place there.

He was born August 5th, in 1860 in Eastland County, has lived in Texas all his life. With his parents he came to Dickens county in 1898, and has lived in and around this section ever since.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Elmina Arthur, of Dickens; two brothers, E. V. Arthur, of Dickens, and O. C. Arthur of Spur, a number of nephews and nieces, two sister-in-laws, Mrs. W. B. C. F. Cook and Bruce Browning Attend Conference

C. F. Cook, Superintendent of Spur Schools, and Bruce C. Browning, Principal of Spur Junior High School went to Austin last week to a three day conference on Elementary Education.

The conference was sponsored by the Texas Elementary Principals and Supervisors Association, which Mr. Browning is a member. There were five hundred and twenty five members present for the conference.

Principal speakers for the meeting were Dr. Elizabeth M. Fuller, Associate Professor, Institute of Child Welfare, University of Minnesota and Dr. Maycie Southall, Professor of Elementary Education, George Peabody College for Teachers. The topics of discussion for the five general assemblies were: Physical Factors in Child's Growth and Development; Educational Factors in Child's Growth and Development; Children's Social Development; Children's Emotional and Personality Development; and, In-Service Teacher Education in Child Growth and Development.

Each of the five lectures was followed by the breaking up of the general assembly into groups of thirty to forty persons who met in classrooms where group leaders directed a general discussion of the previous lecture. Many school problems, which were common to all of us, were discussed and much helpful information was given out by various principals.

There is a very definite change in the trend of education today, and the new trend places the emphasis on the child. In the words of Dr. Southall, "This is the child's age. These meetings are very helpful in making the educational system of Texas standard or uniform throughout the state. We hope to be able to inaugurate some of the ideas into our system in the near future, and thereby improve our school.

Mr. Cook attended to some business as well as attending the lectures, and he and Mr. Browning state that they brought back some ideas that will be worth enough to our schools to merit the time and expenditure of the trip.

AUSTIN, April 27. Pro-Truman forces of the Texas Democratic Party will have free radio time Thursday night to answer Gov. Beauford H. Jester's recent criticism of the President.

Woodville J. Rogers of San Antonio, leader of the Truman group, said Tuesday the Texas Lone Star Chain has given him the 9:30 to 10 p.m. spot on a station hookup Thursday.

Rogers complained to the Federal Communications Commission Sunday that he had been refused free time after it was granted to Jester, who blustered Truman last week at the Fort Worth political barbecue.

Charlie Gibson of Amarillo, a member of the State Democratic Executive Committee, will participate in a round table discussion Thursday night, Rogers said.

He also named the following as participants on the radio program: Gaston Ulmer, Beaumont attorney; Warren Phillips, Corpus Christi publisher and attorney; Judge E. T. Brooks of Abilene, and Casa March, professor of law at Baylor University in Waco.

Teacher Pay Plans Ready, Says Jester

AUSTIN, Texas, April 27. Plans for underwriting teachers' payroll warrants so that some schools will not have to end their terms early this spring were completed Tuesday.

Teachers will receive their full pay without having to sign notes at banks or discount their warrants, the Governor said. Their salary warrants will be cashed at banks in their community in the usual way.

A group of nine large city banks have agreed to underwrite the procedure and will carry all the warrants. Jester said.

DEPACIT APPARENT

Some weeks ago it became apparent that there would be a \$2,500,000 deficit in the equalization fund by which some school districts receive special aid.

The Texas State Teachers Association requested a special session to appropriate the fund. The Governor countered with a proposal that the banks loan the teachers the money in their warrants.

Many small banks were unwilling to accept the warrants upon the promise that the money would be made available by the next Legislature.

The Governor then called upon the Texas Bankers Association for aid. It was agreed at a meeting of bankers, officials of the teachers association and the joint legislative committee that the banks would handle the warrants.

Later W. A. Kirkland of Houston, president of the bankers association, announced the teachers would have to personally sign notes.

That was not practical nor acceptable, said representatives of the teachers and they threatened to renew their demands for a special session.

The banks reconsidered and Tuesday's action is the result. The banks which will underwrite the project include three Dallas institutions, the First National Bank, Mercantile National Bank, Jester said. The other banks are First National Bank and the Fort Worth National Bank, First National Bank, National Bank of Commerce and the Second National Bank of Houston.

DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE TO MEET IN SPUR AT 1

FORT WORTH AND DENVER RY. WILL CUT 75 CANDLE BIRTHDAY CAKE, MAY 26

(This is the fourth and last of a series of articles giving the background history of the Fort Worth and Denver City Railway, which celebrates its Diamond Jubilee Anniversary on May 26, 1948.)

Competition, a cardinal element of the American way of life, plus a marvelous development of agricultural and industrial interests, resulted in construction of the Fort Worth and Denver City Railway's last two major branches in Texas. In doing so, the railway showed its appreciation of friendly interest and cooperation of the citizens of Texas by building a 19-mile spur from Sterley to Silverton, after the original intention of building from Quitaque to Silverton had to be dropped because of the steep grade in the Tula-Canyon country.

The Fort Worth and Denver Plains Railway Company was chartered on March 6, 1925 to

meet the competition of the Santa Fe which was invading the cotton-rich South Plains territory out of Lubbock, a hub. Cooperation came from many shippers and communities. By June, 1927, the road had been completed 43 miles from Estelline, once the world's largest cattle-shipping point. In 1928 the main line had reached Lubbock and Plainview, and branches had been built from Plainview to Dimmitt and from Sterley to Silverton. The little town of Sterley was named for W. T. Sterley, the first General Freight and Passenger Agent of the Fort Worth and Denver City Railway.

The 240-mile tripe-pronged stretch into the South Plains embraces some of the most scenic country in Texas. The line boasts two tunnels, one 790 feet in length and the other 390 feet long. The road makes 14 six-degree curves in two miles through the Tula-Canyon country.

The line was opened for business on November 20, 1928, and was put into operation on November 21st of that year, with six big special trains making up the celebrating entourage. The trains were from Dallas, Fort Worth, Wichita Falls, Amarillo, Childress-Memphis, and the official special. At Plainview, sportsmen served the visitors 1100 baked wild ducks.

The party at breakfast in Dimmitt the next morning, with the exception of the Wichita Falls Special which had turned back during the night because of the sudden death of John Bradley, President of the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce.

A. B. Davis, Secretary of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, had a full round of activities and staged simultaneous banquets at a dozen places for the large number of trippers.

The Fort Worth and Denver South Plains line was a busy and profitable one from the beginning and has grown in value and service to the rich area it traverses.

In 1929, one of the Panhandle's bumper wheat years, decision was reached to build into the North Plains, where oil and wheat and cattle were the sources of great prosperity. The Fort Worth and Denver Northern Railway Company was chartered on May 20, 1929 and application filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission to build from Childress to Pampa, a distance of 111 miles. This aroused immediate opposition from the Rock Island which filed an application for authority to build from Shamrock through Wellington to a connection with the Frisco near Quanah. Later an agreement was reached whereby the Burlington would build its line and give the Rock Island an option for 120 days after completion to buy a half interest in the line between Shamrock and Wellington. This was approved by the Commission, but the Rock Island never exercised its option.

The Childress to Pampa line was built in record time. John

TO PRESENT PROGRAM



James P. Hart Announces His Candidacy For Associate Justice Of Supreme Court

AUSTIN, Texas, April 29—James P. Hart, of Travis County, this week announced his candidacy for associate justice of the Supreme Court of Texas. Judge Hart will be seeking his first elective term on the Court. He was appointed to the position seven months ago.

Judge Hart said he was basing his candidacy on nearly 20 years legal experience as a practicing attorney, a prosecutor, Assistant Attorney General of Texas, and a Judge.

This is the first time he has asked the people of Texas to elect him to a State office.

A native of Texas, who married a hometown girl, Katherine Drake in 1929, Judge Hart is the father of five children, ranging in age from six to eighteen.

In his announcement, Judge Hart stressed he was entering the race without a formal platform.

"A judge's only proper platform," he explained, "must be a promise to follow as closely as he can, the ideals of judicial service."

He said his ideals of judicial service included: Ability to write simple, direct and understandable opinions.

Complete impartiality in all cases.

Sincere devotion to the State and Federal Constitutions.

Willingness to spend the "necessary" time in solving correctly any complex legal problems, but unwillingness to tolerate unnecessary delays in disposing of cases.

A love of "plain justice" over legal technicalities.

Proper respect for all branches of the government.

Dignity, courtesy and fairness toward all who come before his court.

"I have followed these guidelines as associate justice," he said, "and I pledge myself to continue to do so."

Judge Hart is a graduate of the University of Texas, where he was an honor student and a member of Phi Beta Kappa, the honorary scholastic society. He was elected district attorney of Travis County in 1932 and served two terms. In 1938 he was named a special district judge of Travis County, and the following year began a two-year term as assistant attorney general of Texas.

Prison doors from Texarkana to El Paso and from Amarillo to Brownsville were swung open to the blue and red uniform of The Salvation Army who for 86 years have carried their missionary work behind prison walls.

"This special Sunday is but a part of the program of The Salvation Army to bring the work of God to the men and women in our jails and prisons," said Lt. Col. Charles H. Dodd, Texas Divisional Commander of The Salvation Army.

"The Army holds regular weekly prayer meetings in numerous penal institutions of the state, many special religious services are held and Bibles and other religious literature is distributed to the men and women behind the walls," Colonel Dodd said.

The Salvation Army also performs many welfare services to the needy families of prison inmates, supplying them with aid in food, clothing and other necessities.

"One outstanding service of The Salvation Army in the rehabilitation of criminals," Colonel Dodd said, "is its operation of voluntary parole boards in Texas where no provision is made for their operation by the state."

"At the present time," he continued, "there are 950 persons on parole to The Salvation Army in Texas, and we are doing everything within our power not only to reclaim them but to make them valuable members of our society."

Santa Rosa Cowboys And Cowgirls Visit Spur, April 17

With the blowing of car horns, the shrill cry of the sirens filling the air, the Santa Rosa cowboys and cowgirls of Vernon, invaded our fair city on Saturday afternoon, April 17, 1948.

Tall men in cowboy regalia wearing yellow, red and plaid shirts, with neckties in every color and hue, including turkey red, rich green, bright blue and flowing window ties, rivaling those worn by the Hollywood cowboys. With the cow girls also dressed in red, corresponding western garb it was a picturesque crowd.

They were led by Highway Patrol car driven by two patrolmen followed by a new Henderson Ambulance equipped with oxygen, air conditioned, a number of new features. A bright red truck driven by Fred Russell, President of the Chamber of Commerce, and owner and operator of the Russell Dry Goods in Vernon, carried the musicians. After making the main drag a couple of times they formed a semi-circle and the band struck up a hot hoedown and such dancing in the street you've never seen. It was a jolly and an affable crowd, the music was good, the boy playing the bass fiddle was as good as a man "South of the Border."

When tired out by the dancing the group mingled with the Spur crowd and passed out pamphlets and circulars advertising their rodeo in May from the 4-9 inclusive, 1948.

Twenty-eight cars were in the group, carrying two hundred and twenty five passengers.

Air Force Reserve Officers Start Two Weeks Active Duty

Livingston, Wing A-3 Officer, personnel from Carswell Air Force Base and the 10th Air Force at San Antonio have outlined a strenuous 14-day program consisting of flying training, ground school, radar and navigation training, bombing and gunnery practice.

Tactical familiarization with the B-29 is the goal for the officers and enlisted men handling the flying and administrative details for the 399th Bombardment Wing.
