

Under highly favorable conditions, that is, when the plants are making rapid growth, soil moisture is abundant and the humidity of the air is high, certain formylations of 2,4-D have killed the top growth of mesquite and have delayed regrowth from the roots for two years or more. Under less favorable conditions the topgrowth or some times only the leaves are killed and vigerous regrowth takes place 30 to 90 days later. The use of various oils alone to overcome the effects of undesirable plant and weather conditions have not been successful when 2,4-D formula tions are applied to the leaves of

Until these new chemicals car be developed or improved to the point where consistant kills are obtained of both the topgrowth and the roots of mesquiet, only small test areas should be treated and results should be observed for the next 12 to 18 months after treatment before any large scale plans are made. Killing the topwood of mesquite without destroying the sprout buds on the roots may easily multiply by times the undesirable nature mesquite on pasturelands.




