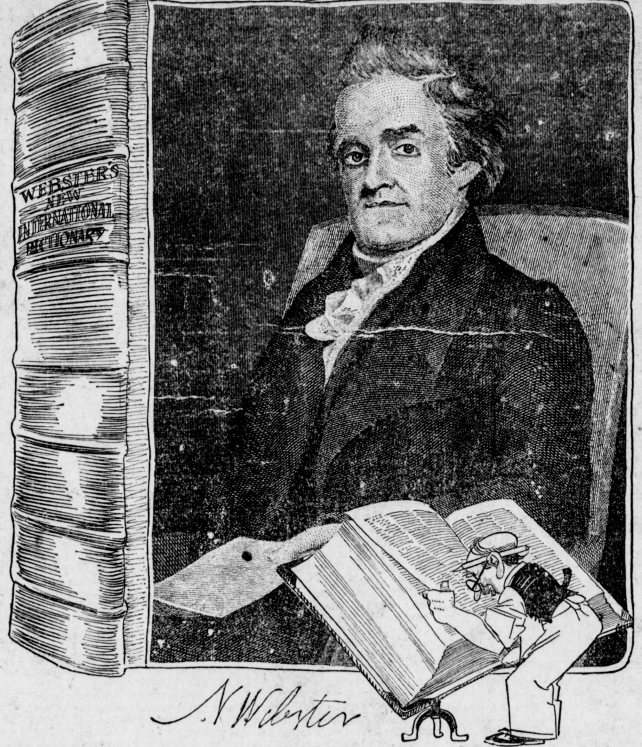

"Look it Up in the Big Book"



By ELMO SCOTT WATSON. I F. WHILIE you're reading, you come across a word, the meaning of which you do not know, what do you do? The chances are that you ask somebody to tell you what it means, and the chances are, also, that that somebody will tell you to "look it up in the big book" or to "consult Mr. Webster."

For that is what Americans have been doing now for exactly a hundred years—"looking it up in the big book" or "consulting Mr. Webster." For it was just one hundred years ago this summer that a scene of unusual activity was taking place in the print shop of Henshikh Hove in New Haven, Conn. and just one hundred years ago this autumn there came forth the first edition of Noah Webster's "American Dictionary of the English Language."

Now, the issuing of a dictionary is not in itself a unique event, but the issuing of Noah Webster's dictionary away back there in 1828 was a noteworthy event, and in some respects the book itself was unique. Hereafter the English-speaking world had depended upon Dr. Samuel Johnson's for authoritative spelling and definition of words. But when the edition of 2,500 copies of the new dictionary came, consisting of two bulky volumes of more than 1,000 pages each, appeared, Doctor Johnson's work was already obsolete. For Webster's book listed, defined and illustrated with appropriate quotations somewhere between 70,000 and 80,000 words and included 12,000 words and nearly 30,000 definitions which had never before appeared in any dictionary of the English tongue. Most of the definitions Webster had coined anew, doing virtually all of both the mental and manual labor involved unassisted. He also did some revising and simplifying, and it is to him that we owe the fact that we write it "shorter" instead of "shorter" and "traveler" instead of "traveller." But more than that, his dictionary was almost an encyclopedia in which he set a standard for accuracy and completeness of definition which governs the textographer's art of this date. In fact, nearly all of the later dictionaries have been based upon Webster's work and have preserved his identical words in a large number of his definitions.

Bubble in a Sapphire. There is exhibited in the British museum a sapphire weighing nine carats and containing a bubble that appears and disappears with changes of temperature. It is believed that a cavity in the gem includes a quantity of carbonic acid gas under great pressure. When the temperature is such as to correspond with the "critical point" for the gas, under the particular pressure to which it is subjected in its brilliant prison house, it liquefies and becomes visible as a bubble.

Valuable Nettle. Nettles are usually associated with unpleasant sensations, but a species of the plant is widely cultivated in China for the manufacture of a soft silk-like fabric for textile purposes. In strength, heft and texture it is said to compare favorably with the finest grades of silk and is less costly. The "grass cloth" of China has been used for more than 4,000 years.

From that little edition of 2,500 copies issued in 1828 have grown the millions of dictionaries which are to be found in the homes, schools and offices of the English-speaking world of today, and every one of these dictionaries whether it bears his name on its cover or not is a monument to Noah Webster, the Yankee school-teacher and lawyer, who devoted forty-eight years of his life to a task which has enriched our language immeasurably. Although the words "Webster" and "dictionary" are synonymous in the minds of most of us, but few of us know much about the man, Noah Webster. Nine out of ten perhaps would confuse him with his distant relative, Daniel Webster, the orator and statesman. Yet it is not too much to say perhaps, that the contribution of Noah Webster to American life will be an important one long after that of Daniel Webster will have been forgotten entirely.

Noah Webster was the son of a poor New England farmer of West Hartford, Conn., who in 1774, when Noah, Jr., was sixteen years old, mortgaged his farm to pay his son's expenses in Yale college from which the boy was graduated four years later. Upon the day of his graduation his father gave him an eight-dollar Continental bill (worth about four dollars at the time) and told him that he could do no more for him. Although young Webster had intended to become a lawyer, he had no means to continue his studies in that field, so he had to resort to teaching to make a living while he studied law by himself—so successfully, it proved, that he was admitted to the bar in Hartford in 1781. He was unable to wait for a practice, however, so he again engaged in school teaching, this time at Goshen, N. Y., where he established a classical school.

There in 1782, foreseeing that America, after separation from the mother country would need to have its own school texts, he planned a "Grammatical Institute" to include a spelling, a reader and a grammar. The spelling was issued first, in 1783, followed in 1784 by the grammar, and in 1785 by the "Institute." The success of the now famous "blue-back speller," still familiar to the older generation of Americans of today, was instantaneous and must have been amazing to the young schoolmaster. In preparing it, he had shown the same skill and sound sense which characterized his dictionary later. It was arranged

in a more logical and serviceable manner than Dilworth's speller, the work of an Englishman previously used, and instead of dry passages from the Scriptures, he used interesting, if homely, anecdotes which appealed immediately to the children who for the next hundred years were to be impressed by the moral of these stories. By 1815 the sales of the speller were averaging 280,000 copies a year. By 1828 they had risen to 250,000 copies annually, and by 1848 they were up to 1,000,000 a year. As late as 1880 it was still going strong, and it has been estimated that more than 100,000,000 copies have been sold since 1782. Webster's fame may rest mainly upon his dictionary, but in a sense the dictionary owes its existence to the speller, for during the remainder of Webster's life, and especially the twenty years he spent in compiling the dictionary, most of the support of his family came from the profits of this little blue-backed 15-penny book. In 1800 he gave up all his other work to devote himself to his dictionary. His original plan was to correct the errors and supply the omissions in older dictionaries, especially Johnson's. So he spent a number of years collecting words. Then realizing his own lack of knowledge as to the origin of words he changed his plan. For the next ten years he devoted himself to a comparative study of words, and when he was sixty-eight years old, having exhausted all the resources of libraries in this country, he went to France and England to complete his work. Finally his great task was done, and in the autumn of 1828, it came from the press. Not content to rest after a quarter-century of incessant labor on one exacting task, the sturdy old Yankee set about revising some of his earlier works. In 1840 he published a revised edition of his dictionary and he was in the midst of a second revision in 1843 when death came to claim him.

So the next time you come across Webster's name, you do not understand, before you ask somebody what it means, think of the admonition of one chronicler of Webster's career—"If there is one too lazy to take the half-dozen steps necessary to reach the dictionary, let him picture the Connecticut scholar spending twenty-five years pacing about before his huge semicircular table, laden with dictionaries of all languages from Arabic to Icelandic, so that he might give his great work to the world."

Sunday School Lesson

Lesson for July 29

THE FIRST FOREIGN MISSIONARIES

LESSON TEXT—Acts 13:45.
GOLDEN TEXT—Isa. 55:10, 11. And teach all nations, explains them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and to, I will be with you always, even unto the end of the world.
PRIMARY TOPIC—Paul and His Friend Go to Tell Others About Jesus.
JUNIOR TOPIC—Paul and Barnabas Sent as Missionaries.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—How Paul Found His Life Work.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Holy Spirit in Missions.

This lesson marks the beginning of foreign missions as the deliberate planned enterprise of the church. The occasion for the beginning of this work was a meeting of certain prophets and teachers at Antioch. While these ministers were engaged in praying the Lord laid upon their hearts so heavily the evangelization of the world that they refrained from eating in order to seek the will of the Lord in prayer. This is the kind of fasting that in its God's approval.

I. Barnabas and Saul Sent Forth (vv. 2, 3).

The Spirit directed the church to send forth Barnabas and Saul to the work whereto He had called them. The Spirit called and the church responded the motion by sending those who were Spirit-called. A real call to missionary service comes from the Holy Spirit. It should be the concern of the church to constantly seek the mind of the Spirit relative to the sending forth of laborers into the Lord's vineyard. It is to be noted that the Spirit called and the church sent the very best men from Antioch to Antioch. This is as it should be. Success in the mission field is dependent upon the laying of the best men and women upon the altar by the church.

II. Barnabas and Saul Preaching the Word of God in Cyprus (vv. 4, 5).

After a second season of prayer and fasting, the church formally organized these first foreign missionaries for their work. Ordination by the imposition of hands has its proper place. Cyprus being the home of Barnabas perhaps accounts for their first going to this country. It is most natural that those who have heard the good news should go first to their kindred and friends. Then, too, Barnabas was acquainted with the country and people and could thus be assured of a proper hearing among the Greeks. Andrew first went to his brother, and the man out of whom the deacons were cast was commended by Christ to go home and tell what great things the Lord had done for him (Luke 9:30).

III. Barnabas and Saul Withstood by Elymas, the Sorcerer (vv. 6-12).

Sergius Paulus, the deputy, invited Barnabas and Saul to dine at his house. Elymas, maliciously sought to turn the deputy's mind from the faith. This first obstacle encountered, as the gospel was being carried to the heathen world, was overcome through the power of the Holy Spirit. Paul denounced Elymas in most scathing terms, calling him the child of the devil, declaring that he was full of guile and villany, pronouncing him the enemy of all righteousness, and accusing him of preventing the right ways of the Lord.

IV. Paul and Barnabas in the Synagogue at Antioch in Pisidia (vv. 13-17).

From Paphos Paul and Barnabas with Mark went northward to Perga. It is from this place, perhaps because of hardship, that Mark went back. He started out with good intentions, but the trials seemed too great for him to endure. Mark redeemed himself later, though when they started on their second missionary journey Paul would not consent for Mark to accompany them, although he later testified in Mark's favor (II Tim. 4:11). From Perga they went to Antioch in Pisidia and entered the synagogue on the Sabbath day. While he was the apostle to the Gentiles he began with the Jews. After the usual reading of the Scriptures, in response to the invitation of the rulers, Paul delivered his first recorded sermon. This sermon is worthy of careful study. When analyzed we find it had four parts. 1. Historical (vv. 17-23). 2. Political (vv. 24-27). 3. Doctrinal (vv. 28, 30) 4. Practical (vv. 40, 41).

The effect of this sermon was that many Jews and proselytes requested to hear these words again. Almost the whole city came to hear the Word of God the next Sabbath. While many came to hear these words jealousy provoked open opposition.

Experiments Show the Value of Light Baths

By taking a holiday in Switzerland and sitting in the sun, five pit boys from the mines in Holland, England, have demonstrated the value of light baths for men and boys who work underground. A report of the committee which has been testing the usefulness of light in industrial hygiene has just been published. Following the Swiss experiment with sunlight baths, a clinic was opened and 20 volunteers from the mines, fourteen to seventeen years old, have had ultra-violet light baths several times a week for three months. At the end of the time, the boys had gained in weight an average of more than four pounds. Boys of the same ages who did not get the light baths gained a little more than two and a half pounds during the same three months. The boys who had the light baths gained in height more than the boys who did not. The clinic will be continued, and the committee report recommends that wherever pithead baths are provided, light baths should be established with them. The report warns, however, that artificial light baths should be given only under medical supervision.

New York Jews Move

Manhattan has had to yield to Brooklyn as the chief center of the Jewish population of the metropolis. A survey just completed under the auspices of the Bureau of Jewish Social Research shows Brooklyn now has 45.9 per cent of the 1,720,000 Jews in the entire city.

The Brooklyn movement has all been into one-family, two-family and apartment house sections, the survey showed. Coney Island, with 92.7 per cent, comes nearest to being all Jewish of any section.

Accidents will happen. We read that Robert Arnone, aged 9 years, of Philadelphia, was playing "cowboy" and lassoed a passing automobile. He was jerked off of his feet and the end of the rope, which was tied about his neck, tightened and strangled him to death. He was dragged a mile before his body was discovered dangling at the end of the rope by a motorist who came up from the rear. Muleshoe patients would do well to bear in mind that freak accidents like this can occur here the same as they occur elsewhere and they should never cease to impress upon the children the dangers that surround an automobile. Only by constant warning and threats of punishment if those warnings are disregarded, can we hope to make children realize the dangers all about them while they are at play. The parent who fails to deliver these warnings often and sternly is neglecting the welfare of the child.

TOO MUCH CARELESSNESS

Postmasters throughout the country are receiving a request from the postal department to impress all patrons the necessity for placing their name and address in the upper left-hand corner of all letters they mail, and that unless they do so the same cannot be returned to them when undelivered. It is said the dead letter office is now receiving more unclaimed mail matter than ever before, and that greater carelessness in addressing letters now exists than at any time in the history of our mail service. If it keeps up it will be necessary for the postal department to eventually resort to handle any letter that does not bear a return card. The cost of having these return cards neatly and clearly printed and addressed is very small. But if you simply won't see the economy of it, as millions of others do, then for goodness sake write your name in the upper left-hand corner of every letter you mail. It is the only way you will ever have of getting it back if it cannot be delivered to the party for whom you intend it.

WANAMAKER ADVERTISING

The local merchant who fears to spend his money in advertising, should never read the life story of John Wanamaker. If he does, he will have to revise his own life completely. In a recent address made by Arthur Williams, vice-president, of the New York Edison Company, the speaker remarked apropos of John Wanamaker and his first venture into the retail business: "It is notable, and perhaps prophetic of modern business, that of the first day's receipts of \$24.67, \$24.00, were spent for advertising, 67 cents being retained for convenience in making change the next morning." PURE OXYGEN IS SURE CURE FOR HAY FEVER

Buffalo, Aug. 6.—The use of pure oxygen, hitherto thought dangerous, upon patients suffering from pneumonia, asthma, hay fever, heart trouble and nervous disorders, has been successful, according to Dr. John H. Evans, Buffalo physician.

Patients for whom hope had been abandoned were restored to health by causing them to inhale pure oxygen for hours at a time, he declared. In 35 pneumonia cases, where concentrations of oxygen were administered within 48 hours, all of them recovered he said.

He said that administration of pure oxygen will cure, because it increases the oxygen content of the blood, which has been reduced through partial non-functioning of the lungs or other causes.

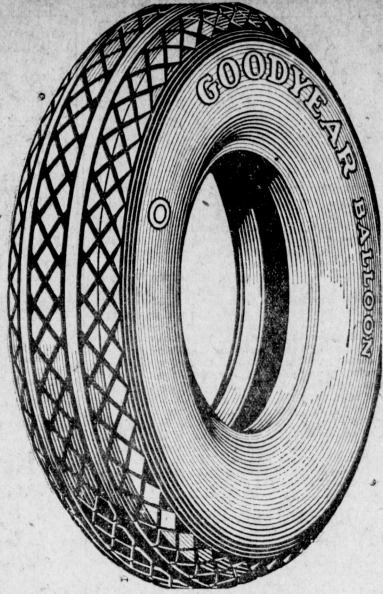

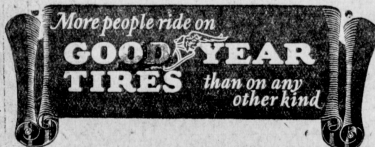

NEW UTILITY TRUCK IS ADDED TO CHEVROLET LINE

The Chevrolet Motor Company, whose unprecedented sales and production record of placing on the road 750,000 "bigger and better" models since January 1, established a new mark for the sale of a new model, announces this week the addition to its line of a new utility truck. The new truck, which embodies several improvements, chief of them a four speeds forward transmission, four wheel brakes and channel steel bumper, went into production in the various Chevrolet plants July 2. It will be on view this week in dealer showrooms throughout the country.

The four speeds forward transmission will insure a more efficient application of engine power. The extra low speed gear, provides maximum pulling power on heavy roads and steep grades while driving requirements are met as usual with second, third and fourth speeds. A power take-off port to which various devices can be applied, is a further feature of the transmission.

The four wheel brakes are non-locking and supply a total of 317 square inches of braking area from an entirely separate and independently operated set of emergency brakes on the rear wheels. The front wheel brakes are of the internal expanding type, the rear wheel service brakes of the external contracting type, insuring quick and positive stops regardless of grade or speed.

A new low loading height 41 inches from the ground, is made possible by a special "kick-up" feature of the long chassis. An unusually long frame support, extending behind the center of the rear axle, assures proper load distribution.

Rigorous and exacting tests, covering thousands of miles over all types of roads and under winter and summer climatic conditions, were applied to the new truck at General Motors proving ground before the Chevrolet engineering division approved it for production.

POINTERS GIVEN TO HOUSEWIVES ON USE OF LARD

Pork fat is one of the most widely used of the animal fats and is eaten in a variety of forms, such as ham and bacon, fresh pork and lard. Lard is used principally for cooking purposes. The best grade of lard, which is commonly known as leaf lard, is rendered from the fat which surrounds the kidney, but commercial lard is often rendered from any or all of the fatty portions of the carcass.

Home rendered lard will contain varying amounts of water, but the commercial product contains practically no water. Since the water content affects the melting point of the fat, the lard which contains little or no water keeps very well.

Lard contains relatively small amounts of those constituents which make fats hard, therefore it has a low melting point. This is the reason why housewives prefer it to harder fats for shortening, especially in cold weather—it is easily handled in preparation of doughs.

Another reason for the popularity of lard is that it is practically free from flavor and odor which makes it desirable as a shortening agent. The use of lard in making pie crusts gives a more tender and flakier product than any other type of shortening. In substituting lard, which is 100 per cent fat, for butter, which is 85 per cent fat, one-eighth less lard should be used than butter and the liquid should be increased slightly.

FLOWERS ARE IDEAL TABLE DECORATIONS

During the summer and early fall when the garden starts to bear a gift of flowers, there is nothing more suitable nor beautiful than table decorations of flowers.

A most attractive table was done in the old fashioned manner. A pewter bowl held a stiff colonial bouquet of simple garden flowers and small colonial bouquets were at the place of each woman guest. The candle sticks were pewter and held bayberry dips which were in keeping with the colonial atmosphere given by pewter and garden flowers.

The garden clubs which are active in many towns and cities are responsible for many truly beautiful ideas in table decoration and every prospective hostess who wishes to take a look in hand to the nearest garden show, will be able to gather enough ideas for table decorations to last here throughout the year.

BREEDING EWES ARE SCARCE

Breeding ewes are pretty scarce the country over, the Oklahoma Farmer-Stockman declares. Sheep have paid their owners well and no one wants to sell. A farmer's best chance to get started with sheep will be to buy old ewes at the stockyards this fall. These ewes will be brought from the ranges. With good care they will do well on the farm, with winter feed and shelter. From them he can get a good start in a couple of years. Buy a good purebred ram of a chosen breed and begin at once to build up a high grade flock. This method has been used by many in getting into the sheep business and is regarded as safe and sound.

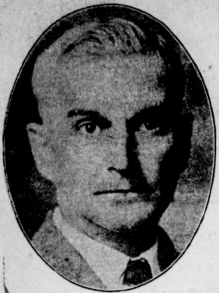

TEXAS AND TEXANS

By WILL H. HAYES

Terracing of Lands.
Before many years Texas farmers will wonder that they ever allowed valuable lands to wash away that could have been saved by terracing. Terracing is being better understood and practiced although the instruction has in many sections been slower than the land erosion. Last year a total of 494,000 acres was terraced in Texas, by far the largest acreage since the work was first begun under the direction of the agricultural engineer of the A. & M. College. This year more than a half million acres will be terraced. Farmers who have rolling lands that are losing their fertility through washing rains should inform themselves on the value of terracing their farms. The county farm agent of your county will assist you in every way possible, and if you have no farm agent the A. & M. College will be glad to help you save your soil.

Federal Road Help.

The Federal Government has made up its mind for State road aid for the next three years, amounting to \$219,000,000. Because of its large area, Texas gets the largest apportionment, \$4,502,567 a year. To obtain this the state must put an equal amount into the road construction, but as Texas is spending far more than that amount each year the apportionment for the state may be safely counted in our road building estimates. The Government recognizes that good roads are a national, as well as a state and local asset.

Seeking New Industries.

Fred L. Haskett, a well-known newspaper man, has been employed by the Childress Chamber of Commerce to visit the several sections of Texas and interest manufacturers in the industrial needs of Childress, the First National Bank of the town co-operating in the employment of Mr. Haskett. The purpose is good, but Mr. Haskett is working the wrong territory. Every Texas locality needs more manufacturing industries and has none to spare. Mr. Haskett should work in other states, where industries are seeking new locations. Texas industries that are placed should stay placed.

Jacksonville's Plan.

Jacksonville is an East Texas town with a vision of growth and the pluck to go after it. The Chamber of Commerce has purchased 80 acres of land adjoining the Missouri Pacific railroad on one side and the Southern on the other, to be used as site for any industries that may want to locate there. The Cotton Belt Railroad has recently acquired 53 acres of land adjoining its tracks in the same town to be used for industrial purposes. The Chamber of Commerce is said to be negotiating now with at least two industries regarding a Jacksonville location. That is a good way to get them.

Milk Products Plants.

Marshall has opened its milk products plant. It cost \$150,000. The plant manufactures a powdered milk in addition to butter and cream. It is prepared to handle all the cream, sweet milk and butter-milk it can get from Harrison and adjoining counties and the prices are said to be satisfactory. Such a plant would be a great addition to the industries of this section, as no better dairy products section can be found anywhere in Texas than in the Marshall vicinity.

Cisco was interested a short while ago in a similar enterprise and sent a committee to other states to study the operation of similar plants. The committee made a favorable report, and a survey was made to see if the milk could be secured in the territory to keep a plant running. Dairy interest is increasing all over Texas.

Buildite City Halls.

Cities and towns need creditable business places for their officials, just as other business interests need them. Many Texas towns have modern city halls, but some city halls are more like barns. They give an impression of lack of city pride. Mercedes and Westlaco, in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, are among the young Texas cities that have just completed city halls costing \$50,000 each.

Boys and Girls' Man.

H. E. Ross is a county farm agent who finds it pays to work with farm boys and girls and he gets genuine pleasure from it. A few years ago he was county agent in Shelby county. He got together, with the assistance of the progressive business men of Center, a party of some 300 boys and girls and took them on a tour of Texas, including Austin and San Antonio. They carried their own camping equipment and food and had a good and a profitable time. On the trip they spent a week at the A. & M. College Short Course. Since then County Agent Ross has left Shelby county, but the annual tour of the boys and girls continues, a new itinerary being made each year. This year New Orleans is the objective point.

**Conflict of Interests Producing Dangerous Rift
Between England and America**

By DR. MINOT SIMONS, New York (Unitarian).

England and America are drifting into serious and definite opposition over the issue of the freedom of the seas, and war is more than probable unless an agreement is reached between the two countries.

It is Lincoln's spirit of frankness and sincerity which speaks both to England and to America the need of the hour, "Come out into the open with the issue and settle it now while there is yet time."

The conflict between America's insistence upon the free and undisturbed right to navigate the sea in time of war and the British policy of controlling neutral commerce with its opponent has been the underlying cause for the practical nullification of the Washington conference, the failure of the Geneva conference, the launching of this country's huge naval program and the serious difficulties with England in 1916 and 1918.

Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler's recent suggestion that the United States agree to recognize a blockade as punishment for an aggressor nation is the most constructive suggestion yet made in an effort to settle the problem.
