### Farm Roads To Be **Built In County**

Texas Highway Department has announced new farm-to-market roads to be constructed in Dickens county, with funds to be available in September, and contruction to start soon thereafter. Roads designated as farm-tomarket thoroughfares are subject to the condition that Dickens county furnish all required rightof-way free of cost to the state. Those in this county which will be built are:

From end FM 265 at Afton south and east to road intersection, a distance of ap-proximately 5.3 miles. ...From FM 264 at McAdoo northwest to road interecction, a distance of approximately 3.7 miles.

As soon as county officials have accepted the order, the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with preparation of plans for construction at an estimated cost of \$62,700
