### Bulldogs Drop Bi-District Tilt To Littlefield 47-14

#### Whoa, Now!

LET'S VOTE SATURDAY!  
Dickens County history will be made some Saturday night as the voters from over the county are tallied and it is determined whether or not we will construct and equip a quarter-of-a-million dollar hospital for the families in our county and neighboring counties.

Voters should take serious thought of the issue at hand. A hospital has been being talked in Spur and elsewhere in the county for many a moon; some for it and some against it. Let's look at some of the things "for" it—(1) Residents doctors ample to care for our needs, (2) Registered nurses at all times available when and where needed, (3) Modern and complete medical equipment essential in treating many emergencies, (4) A convenient haven for injured or ill when moving is impossible or time is an important element. These are just a few of the many advantages of erecting a hospital in Dickens County.

The major "agin" it item seems to be taxes. County officials state that a hospital bond issue will mean an additional tax of 12 cents per \$100.00—Less than half of the maximum tax that the county is authorized to levy for construction in the county.

It has been pointed out that the cost of one trip to the nearest modern hospital would more than pay the tax of one average man in the county.

And, if we choose to erect a hospital, we won't have to do it alone. The State Health Department has agreed to give—NOT loan—a sum of \$125,000.00 to help build the hospital. This amount has been set aside to place a hospital in this territory— if Dickens County doesn't claim it, some one else will.

**OUR CHAMPIONS**  
The District 3-A football champions returned to Spur last Thursday afternoon still the champions of the people of Spur and the Students of the Spur Schools.

Coach Sam Hawkes, in a pre-season discussion of the Bulldogs' chances at the Spur Lions Club stated, "We just don't have the necessary material and experience to have a championship ball club, but we do have a bunch of boys who want to play ball. I'll be up to them and the leadership of our three lettermen, Lindsey, Blair and King as to whether or not we win any ball games."

Our Coach, in spite of his slight pessimism at times, made these remarks with all sincerity. Spur really didn't have championship material. She entered the season with fewer lettermen than any school in the district save one. Many of the boys had never been in a pair of shoulder pads before.

#### Grimes Announces Civil Service News

The Civil Service Commission has issued a warning to the public concerning so-called Civil Service Schools, according to G. W. Grimes, Local Civil Service Secretary. Many of these schools grossly exaggerate opportunities for employment in the Federal Civil Service, and many give the impression they are connected with the government, Mr. Grimes said.

Mr. Grimes stated that the Commission wants to make clear to the public that no civil service school has any connection with the Civil Service Commission of any other branch of the Government. The Commission has no agents who sell "Civil Service" courses; no school can promise success in passing civil service examinations; no school is given advance information regarding examinations to be announced, nor any other information which is not available to the general public. It is not necessary to take a course with any so-called civil service school to compete in or learn about any of the Commission's examinations.

Information about examinations for the Federal Civil Service may be obtained at any time without cost from the Secretary of the U. S. Civil Service Board of Examiners at first- or second-class post offices, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission in Washington.

### Citizens To Vote Saturday On County Hospital Bonds

An allocation of \$125,000.00 will be made to the County of Dickens by the Texas State Board of Health with which to help build a county hospital if the bond issue before the county voters passes.

Saturday, December 3, 1949, the polls of Dickens County will be open to decide the largest issue ever before the voters of the county. If this issue carries, work will begin immediately toward erecting a quarter-of-a-million dollar hospital in Dickens county.

The voters will have the opportunity to vote for one of the following:

"FOR the issuance of hospital bonds and the levy of taxes in payment thereof."

"AGAINST the issuance of hospital bonds and the levy of taxes in payment thereof."

The proposed bonds, if elected, will be in total sum principal sum of \$125,000.00 to mature serially within any given number of years not to exceed thirty, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 3 1/4% per annum.

The special election has been called by the county commissioners as a reply to the petition presented to them recently by a group of citizens.

It has been pointed out that the proposed hospital will be operated with an open staff—that is, any recognized doctor is to be welcome to practice in it.

The proposed hospital is to be managed by a board of trustees to be appointed by the county commissioners. The trustees will hire a manager who will be responsible for the personnel and to the trustees.

#### Duck Creek Soil Conservation District News Notes

Winter cover crops of rye and hairy vetch throughout the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District look very promising this fall, according to Soil Conservation Service technicians who assist the district. Vetch has made more early growth this year than has been observed in the district in previous years.

Birdfoot trefoil, a relatively new legume to this district, came up to an excellent stand on E. C. McGee's farm but has made very little growth as yet. McGee made a trial planting on about 1 acre of his salty land in hopes of finding a plant that will grow well on salty soil and at the same time afford good grazing.

C. C. Swearingen in Upper J-2 Creek group is constructing 2.8 miles of level ridge type terraces on his farm. The work is being done with county equipment.

Approximately 1 mile of level terrace lines have been run on M. L. Ricketts farm in East Dock-terrace will begin soon. Clayton Willis in Perry group plans to extend some of his terraces this fall across a 12 acre field that has not been terraced.

Wayne Beadle in Lower J-2 Creek group has his sandy land pretty well guarded against the blowing wind. Wayne left his

feed stubble about 1 foot high when he cut it and the land that was not in feed is covered with rye and vetch.

Jessie Hagline has completed construction of 2 miles of terraces on his place in Lower 2nd Creek.

### HEALTH NOTES

Austin, Texas, Dec. 1. Governor Allan Shivers, by official proclamation, has designated the week between December 4-11 as Better Health For Texans Week, emphasizing general diseases.

The purpose of the week-long drive, according to State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, is to "quantify all segments of the population with true facts concerning this most serious group of illnesses, thus providing a weapon of knowledge which all persons can use in their own protection."

Cox indicated that the health department informational campaign would be a year to year project from now on, with a different phase of public health being the subject each year.

Highlights of this year's drive will be a state-wide radio address by Governor Shivers, and a short motion picture trailer featuring the Governor and the State Health Officer. Informational packets have been prepared for distribution throughout the State by city and county health units.

The official proclamation reads: "One of the most important factors that will influence the future of Texas is a healthy citizenship. Public health has phases, all contributing to welfare of mankind.

"One of these is the care to eliminate the general diseases. Methods of diagnosis and treatment are at hand to prevent unnecessary suffering caused

these diseases. All that remains now is to induce our citizenship to take advantage of the present day knowledge.

"In recognition of these facts and the vital importance of health in our every-day lives, I, as Governor of the State of Texas, designate the week of December 4-11 as Better Health For Texans Week."

Principle appeal of the campaign is directed to leaders of individual communities. Dr. Cox believes that the "final solution to the general disease problem will be forthcoming only when it is tackled on a community basis."

### New Highway Signs Make Appearance

Austin, Nov. 21. A few months ago a new type of highway sign, an advisory speed sign designed to aid in traffic safety, made its appearance on Texas main highways. This was part of the Texas Highway Department's program of informing motorists of the maximum safe and comfortable speed on curves and turns which are not considered safe to travel at

sign and d is Stressing the fact that tuberculosis is spread from person to person, the Governor praised the tuberculosis control program of the Texas Tuberculosis Association, particularly its projects, and those of county associations, directed at helping to find the estimated 25,000 "unknown" cases of tuberculosis in Texas. These unknown cases, he explained, are those not reported to the health authorities. Many of them are early cases and the people themselves may not know they are ill since tuberculosis has no obvious symptoms in an early stage, he said.

In issuing his official memorandum the Governor said: "The more we support the work of tuberculosis associations, the closer we shall be to victory over tuberculosis in Texas. Since the annual Christmas Seal Sale constitutes the sole support of State and local associations, we take an active part in the fight against this disease every time we buy and use Christmas Seals."

The text of Governor Shiver's memorandum follows: Tuberculosis is a leading cause of death in our State and takes the lives of more young people, in the productive years from 15 to 44, than any other disease. This dreadful disease is spread


Stressing the fact that tuberculosis is spread from person to person, the Governor praised the tuberculosis control program of the Texas Tuberculosis Association, particularly its projects, and those of county associations, directed at helping to find the estimated 25,000 "unknown" cases of tuberculosis in Texas. These unknown cases, he explained, are those not reported to the health authorities. Many of them are early cases and the people themselves may not know they are ill since tuberculosis has no obvious symptoms in an early stage, he said.

In issuing his official memorandum the Governor said: "The more we support the work of tuberculosis associations, the closer we shall be to victory over tuberculosis in Texas. Since the annual Christmas Seal Sale constitutes the sole support of State and local associations, we take an active part in the fight against this disease every time we buy and use Christmas Seals."

The text of Governor Shiver's memorandum follows: Tuberculosis is a leading cause of death in our State and takes the lives of more young people, in the productive years from 15 to 44, than any other disease. This dreadful disease is spread





**BOND ELECTION**  
We note an election called for  
Dec. 3rd, to vote on a proposed  
bond issue of \$125,000 for the  
construction of a county hospital.  
This being a most important issue  
to come before the people of Dick-  
ens Co. and one that so far seems  
to have attracted very little pub-  
licity, we consider it our duty to  
call attention to a few of the prob-  
lems in connection therewith and  
to urge that a truly representa-  
tive number of qualified voters  
take time out and go to the polls  
and vote.

We question the wisdom of this  
bond issue for the following,  
among other reasons:  
Dickens County is now and has  
for years been faced with a short-  
age of funds, harking back to the  
road bond issue of 1917 and other  
bond issues still in force and a  
heavy debt burden on the County  
and a further \$125,000 bonded debt  
would put us so deep in debt that  
it would take about all our income  
to pay the interest and sinking  
fund on these bonds and leave us  
but little to operate with, and too,  
our credit would be stretched to a  
point where it would become  
difficult for us to provide other  
urgent necessities that may arise.  
The tax structure of Dickens  
County is already too high and a  
further increase in these would  
operate as a burden on the people  
and a deterrent to investments in  
the County.

Hospitals, as a rule, are not  
self-sustaining and the writer  
can see no prospects for the pro-  
posed County Hospital to operate  
except at a heavy loss and the  
people of Dickens County will  
have to make up the deficit. Dick-  
ens County for many years has  
the only hospital facility between  
Lubbock and Stamford, which  
meant no competition and this  
institution has seldom, if ever, paid  
its full operating expenses despite  
a virtual monopoly. We therefore  
ask, How would this and another  
hospital fare in competition with

each other and the excellent facil-  
ities now in operation at nearby  
towns?  
We suggest that the proper meth-  
od for this wanting a new hospi-  
tal would be to organize a local  
or co-operative association and  
issue their own bonds against  
their own property, that is, the  
hospital itself, and not jeopardize  
the credit of the County which  
will certainly cut us off from other  
and perhaps more urgently need-  
ed improvements. Keep the County  
out of Business.

We would further suggest that  
a little more cooperation with,  
and support of existing hospital  
facilities would operate to in-  
crease its capacity and possibly  
efficiency to a point that it could  
very well handle the situation.

We urge all qualified voters to  
think the situation over and then  
go vote their choice in the matter,  
being ever mindful of the fact that  
the County affairs are their and  
to look at the situation as if it  
were their private business af-  
fair.







## Gin Mishap Is Fatal For Man At Turkey





**Your Child**

A WEEKLY COLUMN -

Many small children, especially little boys, are literally fugal from bathtub and washbowl. Their dislike of bathing and washing is frequently regarded as "cute" by doting mothers and aunts who love each grubby, little hand and dirty ear.

But, later, when little Mary and Junior are past the pre-school age and have lost their baby appeal, this same "allergy" for soap and water begins to be a cause for concern, particularly among the adult females in the family.

What many parents fail to realize is that an unpleasant experience associated with the daily bath in early childhood, may be the cause for a child's dislike of bathing.

Some of you mothers turn your children against bathing because you start off by being too conscientious about getting them 100 per cent pure-clean. In an effort to reach every dirty crevice in a tender, little face, you get soap into their eyes, or scrub their skins too hard, or dry them too briskly.

Too hot or too cold water will frighten a child; a slippery tub makes him feel unsafe. So, be sure the temperature of the water is just right, and put a towel or rubber mat in the bottom of the tub. There are also safety chairs that will keep youngsters of toddler age—between one and two—from slipping down into the water because their sense of balance is still poor.

Besides being unsafe, it is also unwise for psychological reasons, to leave the small child shivering in the tub while you go to answer the door or phone.

According to the Childcraft Advisory Service, bath-time can be made one of the most enjoyable times of the day for the child with the help of floating toys and bubble bath. Allowing your little girl or boy to "help" with the washing and to turn the water on or off—provided it isn't dangerously hot—will also add to the fun.


