



"A lot of things go into the making of a record like that," Col. Garrison said. "Low visibility, slippery road surfaces, fogged windshields, more drinking drivers, and long hours of darkness that cover the peak hours of traffic every day are the factors chiefly responsible for such a high fatality rate."

Maintenance of windshield wipdefroster, and brakes, use of hains, lower speeds, and abstinence from alcohol before and while driving were the preventive measurers urged by the Department of Public Safety and the Texas Safety Association.
