Whoa, Now!

We note an invitation in last weeks edition of TEXAS SPUR inviting comment on the proposed County Hospital and as the issue of your paper containing my former article on this subject failed to make connection with the readers in the northern portion of the County in time for their consideration before the election, it occurs to me that possibly another discussion of this subject, by me would not be amiss, especially as many of my friends seem to question my attitude on this issue.

To begin with, may I make it clear that there is no opposition on my part to the erection of an adequate hospital at Spur, Dickens or any other place in the County. I questioned the wisdom of voting a \$125,000 bond issue for the purpose and have not receded from that view-point, but the bonds are voted upon us and the question of building a hospital is not now under debate. Only the location thereof.

The writer heartily concurs with the majority of the Commissioners Court that the hospital, if built or operated with County funds should, by all means, be located at the County Seat of Government for the following reasons among others: First: Dickens is more centrally located and therefore more easily reached by the persons in those areas which the hospital is assumed to serve and has the advantage of two main paved highways and is served by some 18 or 20 buses daily as well as numerous freight equal to other locations in the County.

Second: If the County builds, maintains or operates this hospital it would be assumed that the legal requirements place same at the County Seat of Government, just as the Courts, Public Records, County Officials and other public facilities are located and any deviation from this rule should be backed by at least a two-thirds majority of the voters of the County. If this requirement is not strictly a legal one and mandatory of the Commissioners Court, customs and usages give it, more or less, the dignity of law and should not be violated except for the most urgent of reasons. We therefore heartily concur with the action of the Commissioners Court. The pathway was plain for them to act as they did and they are to be commended for doing their duty in the face of adverse criticism by The Texas and other interested individuals and organizations, and furthermore the individual right is theirs to exercise their judgement for the best interest of the County in general and their precinct in particular.

The door is still open for the citizens of Spur to build a hospital if they so desire, and perhaps be in line for Government assistance in the erection of it and we would be very glad for them to take such action if they are not whole heartedly in support of the one voted to be held at Dickens, We, of Dickens County, should all get down to earth and act for our own good and the welfare of our County and Country.

The other 15 associations in Texas had repaid this capital in previous years—the Stamford Production Credit Association having paid in 1948, and we have been a fully member-owned, self-supporting, tax-paying business ever since."

The Spur Production Credit Association was organized on January 24th, 1934, with George S. Link President and Jas. B. Reed Secretary-Treasurer. Other directors were R. R. Wooten, McAdoo, C. C. ### HEALTH NOTES

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Jan. 5, 1950—Seasonal health hazards for young children are to be guarded against in the winter time just as carefully as they are in the summertime in the opinion of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Every mother is familiar with so-called summer complaints which affect small children but certain winter diseases can be just as harmful and are just as likely to make their appearance unless proper precautions are used," Dr. Cox said.

In the group of winter diseases Dr. Cox included influenza, tonsillitis, pneumonia, bronchitis, asthma, and even diphtheria when a child has not been immunized. Any such disease affecting a child's respiratory or breathing system is apt to be very serious and only too often fatal. Pneumonia often develops from a neglected cold or may follow a severe case of measles or whooping cough. Bronchitis condition may also prove to be an after effect of these diseases and these respiratory ailments are much more difficult to combat successfully than the digestive ailments which are prevalent in the summertime and known as summer complaints.

"These winter diseases are especially dangerous to babies and very young children," Dr. Cox stated. "Nearly all of them are spread from the secretions of the nose and mouth. Children are naturally more susceptible to these complaints and the first line of defense against them is to strengthen the child's power of resistance against disease," Dr. Cox advised.

"The second step is to keep them under medical supervision and the third is to make sure that they avoid contact with those who have coughs, colds, or fevers."

### HEALTH NOTES

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Jan. 5, 1950—Seasonal health hazards for young children are to be guarded against in the wintertime just as carefully as they are in the summertime in the opinion of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Every mother is familiar with so-called summer complaints which affect small children but certain winter diseases can be just as harmful and are just as likely to make their appearance unless proper precautions are used," Dr. Cox said.

In the group of winter diseases Dr. Cox included influenza, tonsillitis, pneumonia, bronchitis, asthma, and even diphtheria when a child has not been immunized. Any such disease affecting a child's respiratory or breathing system is apt to be very serious and only too often fatal. Pneumonia often develops from a neglected cold or may follow a severe case of measles or whooping cough. "These winter diseases are especially dangerous to babies and very young children," Dr. Cox stated. "Nearly all of them are spread from the secretions of the nose and mouth. 
