TESUS SAID of him that there had never been a greater man than has never been a greater preacher, to this day. He had none of the aids a modern preacher has. He had no song leader, no music of any kind;

no church organization, no building, not even a tent. He not even a tent. He was not even in a village but in a bandit-infested wil-derness. There was little "dramatic" about him or his methods.

Yet he started a tremendous revival. Dr. Foreman and he won higher praise from Jesus than any other human being received from him.

CONSIDER SOME of the qualities of this famous man. One was candor, that is, he was not afraid to speak his faind. His opinions were not always popular; his verdicts were not always those of the mind. masses. But he spoke his mind all the same.

He called his hearers "generation of vipers,"-snakes' babies, in modern words. He freely admitted he was no Messiah. When on a later occasion he had his doubts about Jeaus, he did not conceal them, but told Jesus straight from the shoulder that he questioned him. And Jesus bonored his honesty.

Candor is a rare article. Thos few persons in public life who are willing to speak their minds may more admirers. The odd thing is that people cover up their mind for fear they will be unpopular whereas you will generally find that the candid person does no lack for friends.

THAT BRINGS up another quality nary man: his courage. He coulstand up to the most prominent citizens and tell them they were sinners, and name their sins.

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
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
