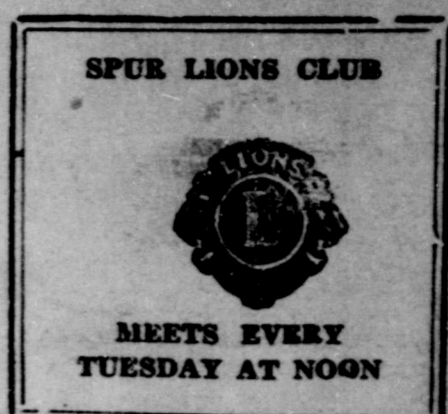

Chamber of Commerce Doings: Chamber Office Unveils Frauds After Local Citizens Get "Took"

ILLEGITIMATE SOLICITORS IN SPUR:
Two cases of fraudulent solicitation were reported to the Chamber of Commerce this week. Many merchants and members of the Chamber of Commerce forgot to ask for a letter of introduction from the Commerce office before donating to these individuals. One party was soliciting for an old age home in Dallas, and after a check by the Commerce office, it was found that a home of the nature did not exist.

Another party was selling deaf mute cards and this also was found to be illegitimate. The amount of money collected by these two organizations from merchants, has not yet been determined, however, it is estimated that over \$200.00 left Spur un-be-knowing to the merchants and individuals who donated to these illegitimate solicitors.

The Chamber of Commerce is striving to protect citizens from these types of illegitimate solicitors. Spur's citizens and businesses have been seriously troubled by out-of-town money solicitors during recent months and they will continue to come unless some type of restriction is maintained. The control of such solicitation is an easy task if everyone will comply with the following suggestions:

1. When you are asked to contribute to any cause, local or otherwise, ask to see the solicitor's written approval from the Chamber of Commerce.
2. If he doesn't have it, tell him to come to this office for a Letter of Introduction.
3. If he is honest and the cause is worthy, he'll come to the C. of C. for that approval. BUT, if the contribution he is seeking is to line someone's pockets with easy money, he will never ask for an approval.
4. The Chamber of Commerce office will not issue an approval to any solicitor unless it is proven without a doubt that the cause is legitimate. Rest assured that we will demand that proof. The rest is up to you.
5. When issued, a solicitation approval is NOT a request from the Chamber of Commerce that you contribute. It merely means the solicitor, to the best of our knowledge, is not a crook out looking for suckers!

If you do not have a solicitors card, call your Chamber of Commerce office. We have one for you.

THE MEMBERS MAKE THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE:
It is not the President, Vice-President or any single member that controls the Chamber of Commerce. Regardless of the amount of membership he holds, large or small, every member is a very essential part of the work and has a voice in the Chamber of Commerce. It is not necessary for any member to have an invitation to attend the Directors Meetings, or any of the Commerce meetings, because every member is invited, anytime, to attend these meetings when-ever he chooses. Every member should feel free to use the Commerce office anytime, to inquire concerning the growth of Spur, to ask assistance, to register business complaints of any nature and to use the material such as credit reports, business information, buyers directories which is made available to the public.

"A member is the most important person ever—in the office, in person—by phone—or by mail. A member is not an interruption of our work—he is the purpose of it. We are not doing him a favor by serving him—he is doing us a favor by giving us the opportunity to do so. A member is not an outsider to our business—he is part of it. A member is not a cold statistic—he is a flesh and blood human being with feeling and emotions like our own, and with biases and prejudices. A member is not someone to argue with. Nobody ever won an argument with a customer. A member is a person who brings us his wants. It is our job to handle them profitably to him and to our selves."

"Everyone who calls at the Chamber of Commerce, in person or by telephone, is either a member, a prospective member, or the friend of a member. We try to keep this in mind when anyone contacts the Chamber of Commerce in any way."

Texas Rancher Corrals Reindeer For Santa's Visit To Spur

Inside the Arctic Circle a reindeer man from Texas is busy now corralling some reindeer to draw Santa Claus' bright-colored sleigh in the big Spur parade December 9, under auspices of SPUR CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, INC.

Grady Carothers, Goldthwaite ranchman, is this reindeer man. This is his third expedition to the Arctic for antlered sleigh deer.

When Santa comes to this city he'll ride in state behind Dancer and Blitzen, Dancer and Prancer, four of the reindeer Carothers will bring out of Alaska and train to pull the sleigh.

There are two good reasons why Carothers became a reindeer man—his two sons, 10 and 16 years old. They used to ask him, "Dad, why doesn't Santa Claus come to see us in his sleigh pulled by reindeer?" Each December they listened in vain for sleigh bells in the frosty night around Christmas time.

His father wondered, too—wondered why some one did not help Santa Claus find some real reindeer for his sleigh. Finally, Carothers wrote some air mail letters to towns in the Far North of Alaska, asking about reindeer. He learned that herds, which feed on reindeer moss, are under Uncle Sam's supervision. It took two years before Carothers could complete arrangements to take out some reindeer.

John Carothers was 14 then. He went along with his father on that first trip to Alaska. For three weeks they camped on the frozen Arctic coast, where herds of reindeer grazed. It was summer and the reindeer had shed their fine antlers when they were flown south to the hot Texas climate. Carothers learned a great deal about reindeer on that trip and after he got home. Last year he made his second trip to the Arctic. In November he roped some reindeer out of a herd on the Arctic coast. At night he slept beside the tethered, wild reindeer, to protect them from great packs of wolves.

"There were wolves all around us," the reindeer man said. "But we had trouble, too, with our sled dogs. They were half-wild, those dogs, and they attacked the tethered reindeer. We had to fight them off."

Carothers traveled by dog sled to an air base from which the reindeer were flown to Texas. "Reindeer are not native to Alaska," Carothers explained. "In the 1890's the Eskimos in Alaska were facing starvation caused by depletion of wild game life on which they had fed. The United States Government appropriated money to import reindeer from Lapland in order that the Eskimos might have reindeer venison for food and the skins of the reindeer for clothing to protect them from the Arctic blasts. A herd of 1,200 reindeer was brought out of Siberia about 1892, and attendants who knew how to care for reindeer were imported from Norway and Finland to teach the Eskimos."

"These attendants were allowed to settle on American soil. 'Uncle Mike' Nilluka was one of those men. Nilluka settled on an island near Seattle, Washington, and when Carothers brought some reindeer out of Alaska to Seattle, Nilluka helped the Texan train these animals to pull a sleigh for Santa Claus."

On his third expedition to Alaska, Carothers took along Jack Allen of Borger, another ranchman, for a companion. They hope to corral some 15 reindeer—the pick of two large Alaskan herds. The two Texans traveled by

FFA Boys Plan 1951 Livestock Show

Members of the Spur Future Farmers of America chapter are making plans to hold one of the largest livestock shows ever presented in the Spur area in the early spring of 1951, according to Donald Norman, reporter of the local club.

Boys are now feeding approximately 25 steers, this number to increase slightly before show time. It is difficult to estimate the number of barrows and gilts which will be shown, but it is believed the number will be far above that of the 1950 show, stated Norman.

Several lambs are already on feed, said Norman, and it is estimated that a sizeable increase will be noted in the number of sheep shown from this area.

A few of the better steers, barrows and gilts may be shown in the Lubbock Livestock show next March, said Norman. Present plans are to make the Dickens County Livestock show of 1951 a larger exhibit with more competition in the different classes of animals than ever before.

Mail Delivery To Be Started "If Spur Wants It"; Karr

REA Office Has Remodeling Job

A new street front has been installed in the office of the Dickens County Electric Co-op.

Removal of the old show case type windows allowed for installation of modern plate glass set straight across. Interior walls are being redone as well as the ceiling, according to W. M. Hilley, office employee.

Part of the office will be paneled in plywood and a new cashier's counter will be constructed of matching plywood. Asphalt tile will be installed on the floor, stated Hilley.

Work on the office remodeling has been progressing for about two weeks and it is hoped that work will be finished within a week. New office furniture has been purchased and will be arranged in the larger quarters.

"City mail delivery is very probable for the City of Spur if the people want it and will use it," states Postmaster Guy Karr, this week, following an inspection and investigation by Post Office Inspector Vernon J. Bell.

Bell, working out of the Lubbock office, spent three days in Spur this week investigating the conditions of the city relative to door-to-door mail delivery.

According to Bell, the city meets every requirement for the service with the exception of population. However, it is believed the Post Office Department will waive this requirement on the grounds of the extra large postal receipts and satisfactory conditions on other requirements.

HONORABLE MENTION

Several citizens have expressed recently what is believed to be the general attitude of all Spur Bulldog fans.

"We thoroughly and sincerely appreciate and pay tribute to the fine work of Melvin King and the Spur Band, the Pep Squad, the concession workers and the announcer, Fred Kenney and his assistant A. J. Harvey, for the fine work they've done during this and past football seasons."

"We must first determine whether or not the people of Spur really want city delivery," states Karr. It is explained that if the service is established, it will not by any means be a temporary thing or be on a trial basis. For this reason, officials state that the service must be desired by the people to be had.

If the service is made available, it will cover only the city limits where there is either an all-weather street or a continuous sidewalk and only on blocks which are at least 50% developed. The survey made by Karr and Bell reveals that there will be no islands within the established zone.

The proposed area to be covered by the delivery runs north to and including Hill street and south to and including Harris street in the residential districts and to and including 6th street on Burlington. The area includes Calvert on the west and Cowan on the east. Garner Addition will also be included.

According to Karr, the mail carriers will leave the post office around noon and will have their routes completed by five o'clock p. m. There will be no delivery on Sundays or holidays.

The plans include the placement of collection boxes through the residential districts for mailing letters. The service will include partial post delivery.

The postmaster explains that businesses and individuals still rent lock boxes in the post office and have their mail delivered there. However, he states, one will not be permitted to receive door delivery on weekdays and box delivery on Sundays and holidays.

City delivery will make it impossible for businesses and individuals to mail first class mail in the city for one cent ("drop mail"). All first class matter will go at regular rates, i. e., three cents for letters, if a city has city delivery.

In an effort to determine the attitude of the citizens of Spur concerning city mail delivery, readers are requested by Karr to fill out the questionnaire appearing on this page and clip it and return it to him, Guy Karr, Postmaster, Spur, Texas, in person or by mail. The response to this questionnaire and to a similar one to be presented to individuals at a later date will be used to determine whether or not Spur wants the service.

Karr states that if the city is granted the service, all houses will have to be properly numbered and have a mail box. All streets will have to be properly named and marked, and mail receptacles and relay boxes erected. It is estimated that it will take from three to six months to get set up for the city delivery service.

The service will open two full-time jobs and one part-time job in the Spur Post office. Karr states that these jobs will be filled locally if at all possible.

Before returning to Lubbock, Inspector Bell began an investigation of depreciation of rural boxes in this area. Bell states that it is a serious federal offense to destroy, shoot, or in any way damage a rural mail box. Several area cases are now under Bell's investigation.

Ginning Doubles To 4,659 Bales

Although a shortage of hands still exists over Dickens county, ginnings almost doubled in the four Spur gins this week. Season's total through Tuesday was 4,659 bales.

Quality of cotton has remained high, and gins located in Dickens, Afton and Girard have reported their gins are running steadily.

Last week's freeze was severe enough to kill leaves on the cotton stalks, thus facilitating easier gathering and less trash in the cotton.

Local gins are estimating that their work is approximately 60 to 65 per cent finished. Some fields in the county have been pulled over for the third time, and furnish no further promise of later cotton.

U.N. Fights Disease in Korea



To avoid the threat of epidemics the United Nations is carrying out a mass inoculation campaign in Korea. Inoculations against small pox of the populations of Inchon and Seoul will have been completed by the end of October. U.N. is also carrying vaccination campaigns against typhus, typhoid and cholera with native doctors under the supervision of the Unified Command which supplies equipment.

Fats Keep Best With Spice Added

That spices help prevent the deterioration of fats in food, a fact suspected for centuries but never before verified by modern science has been proved by studies at the Hormel Institute of the University of Minnesota. Seventy-seven samples representing thirty-two spices were tested, with the result that, "Virtually all samples tested showed at least some antioxidant activity in a few cases the antioxidant effects were very pronounced."

plant origin that are widely used in a variety of fat-containing food products for the purpose of improving their palatability," the introduction to the report read. "It is therefore important to know what effect these spices have on the keeping qualities of the products in which they are used." Several studies have been made on the properties of spices in preventing food spoilage caused by microorganisms, but this is the first made on the prevention or retarding of the oxidation of fats in food. Additional studies will be made in the institute to isolate, identify and further evaluate the substances in spices which are useful

as antioxidants in fats and food products.

All lard samples to which spices had been added had an index above one, which means that they were less subject to oxidation than the lard to which no spices had been added.

Popular Cold Drugs Are Not Advised

The wide advertising of antihistamines for the prevention of colds should not persuade people to place too much confidence in these drugs as a treatment for colds, "Dr Geo W. Cox, State Health Officer warns the citizens of Texas. "Those who decide to take any of the antihistamine pills should realize it is highly important for them to follow exactly the directions.

"Regardless of the effectiveness of these new products it remains most desirable to take the ordinary precautions against contracting a cold—adequate sleep, clothing adapted to the weather, well balanced diet, moderate outdoor exercise and avoidance of unnecessary contacts with those already suffering from colds. Extra rest and the drinking of large amounts of fruit juice are still important aids to physical well being and cure if a cold occurs.

"Unfavorable reactions such as dizziness, drowsiness, and temporary loss of muscle control sometimes occur after taking this drug. Everyone is strongly advised against driving an automobile or working around machinery while taking the pills. "Some readers of advertisements may get the idea that taking small doses of antihistamines every day will prevent colds. Such use of drugs should be discouraged. Antihistamines are still new and largely unproved drugs. Physicians have not yet determined

Meat Price Hike May Create Control

Can the government avoid placing rigid price and wage controls for national economy? This is a top question in Washington, and there is strong belief that cattle and hog farmers—and the Agriculture department—hold the answer.

If you knew what meat prices will do next year—especially next spring—you could tell whether controls are in store.

Consumers react more sharply to changing meat prices than to those of perhaps any other food or non-food commodity. That's because meat is the backbone, so to speak, of the American diet. Furthermore, not many consumers get all the meat they want.

Prices Interdependent Meat prices pretty generally set the prices for eggs, poultry, dairy products and many other foods. When meat is scarce and high, poultry and dairy products tend to be high. That's because they are interchangeable with meat in the diet.

So sharp advances in meat prices—resulting from an increase in demand flowing from defense spending—could start consumer as well as political demands or price controls.

Farm officials are aware of this. They're saying farmers should produce more meat next year. Yet reports from livestock farming areas indicate that present producers plans will not provide enough meat to prevent price increases.

What's holding farmers back? Reports show farmers are wondering whether it's worth while to take the risk.

Production costs are high. What

effect these products may have upon the human system if taken over a long period of time.

if the market failed to develop? Prices of meat animals would tumble and a lot of farmers might not make expenses.

The situation is putting pressure on the government to set up a price guarantee program. Such programs were used during the war to encourage farmers to expand output.

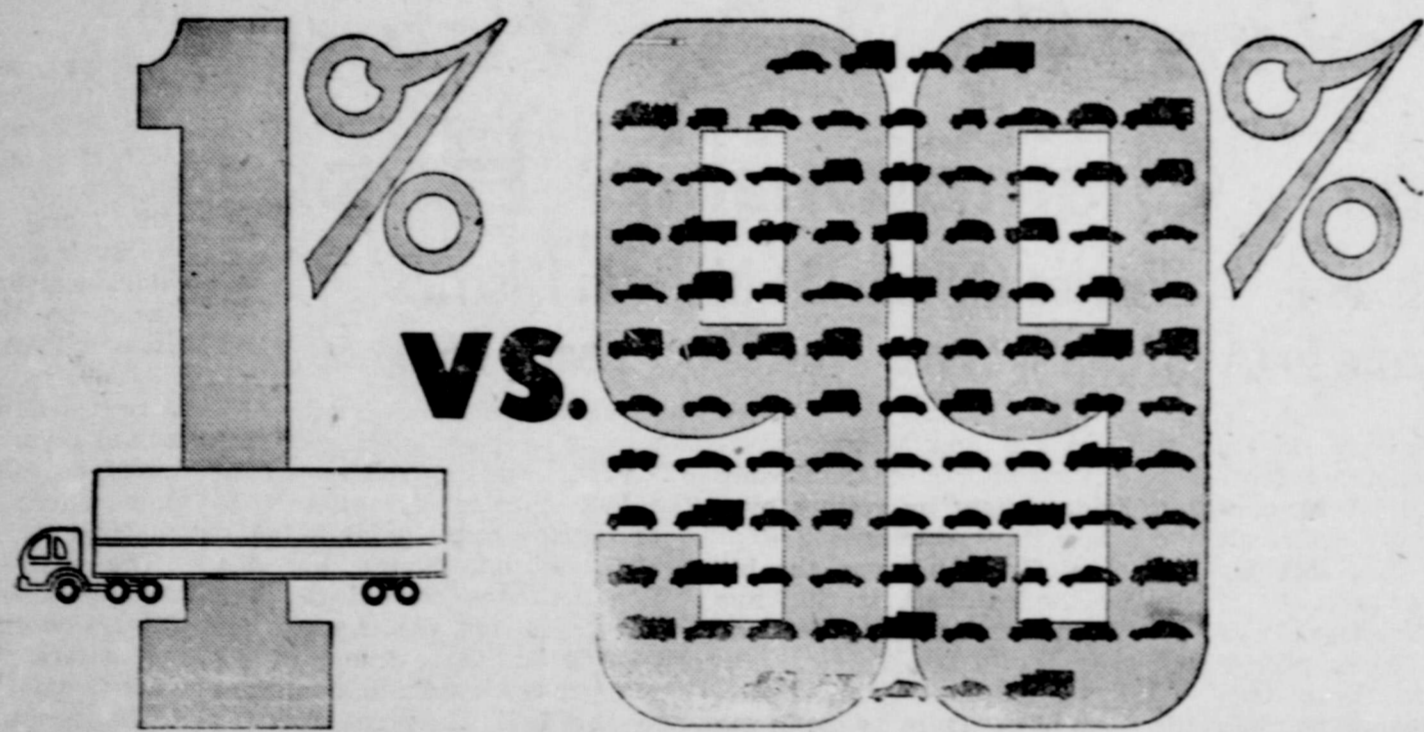

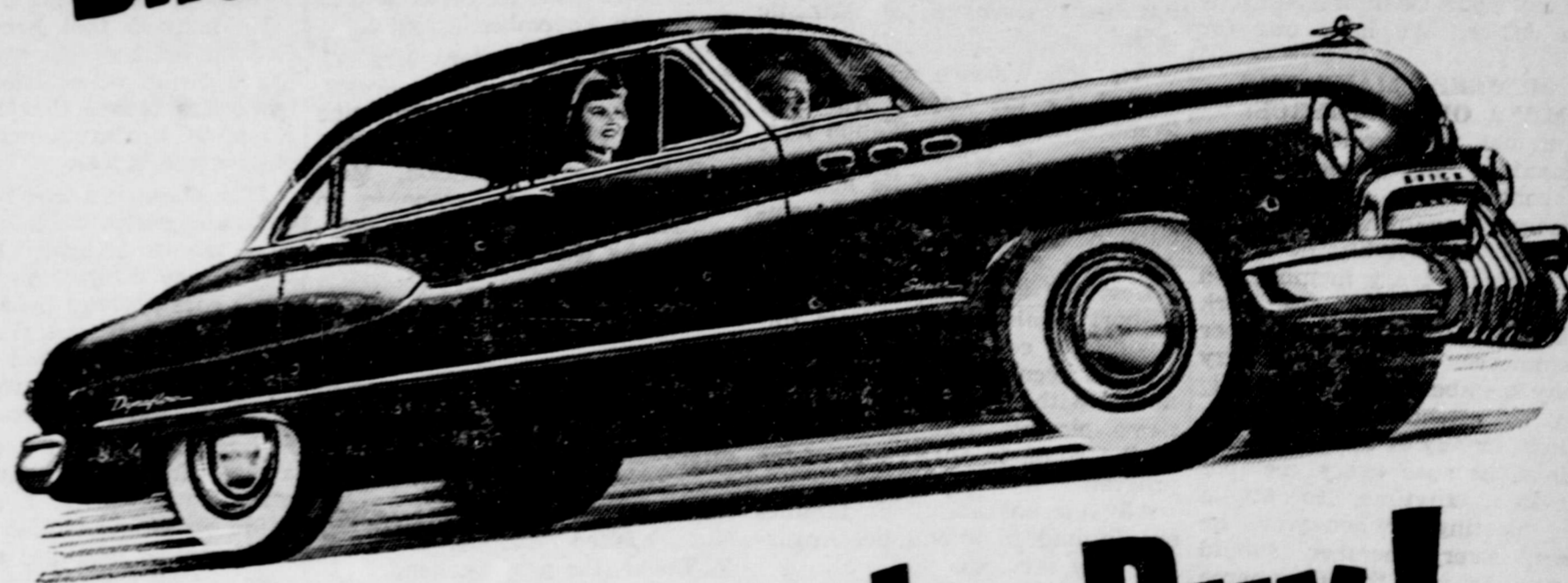

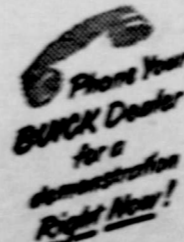

School Bus Change Urged In Formula

A major change in the Gilmer-Aikin school transportation program was proposed recently by the Texas Education Agency.

After surveying twenty-three counties, the agency recommended basing aid on a new formula. Many citizens attending a recent conference on school programs called the present bus-aid plan unsatisfactory.

Commissioner J. W. Edgar described this part of the Gilmer-Aikin program as a "stop-gap" when passed by the legislature last year.

Superintendents of more than 2,300 districts will study the proposal. Edgar invited them to give their views on it before January, when the legislature will be asked to pass a corrective bill.

The new formula would pay each district according to size of buses it needs, and miles traveled.

A typical Texas school bus travels forty-five to fifty-five miles a day. Sixty per cent of the route is surfaced and the remainder on dirt roads.

The state would allow \$2,250 a year for a district to operate a large (72 passenger) bus. This aid would be scaled down, according to the size of the bus needed, to \$1,350 a year for carrying fewer than 20 pupils a day.

The district would get more extra money if the route exceeds fifty-five miles or is more than 40 per cent over dirt roads.

If put into practice, this plan would add about \$600,000 a year to the \$11,400,000 the state spent under the transportation formula in 1949-50, according to Bascom Hays, director of administrative services.

Local districts would also benefit by knowing in advance how much money to expect from the state, he said. Now they get a tentative bus allowance, covering 6-month estimated cost. Final payment is made in the summer after school is out.

Districts still would pay part of the transportation costs. The state would not help carry any child who lived within two miles of school.

State aid now is based on the number of pupils and the sparseness of school population. The state pays \$31.50 per pupil annually to carry students in the

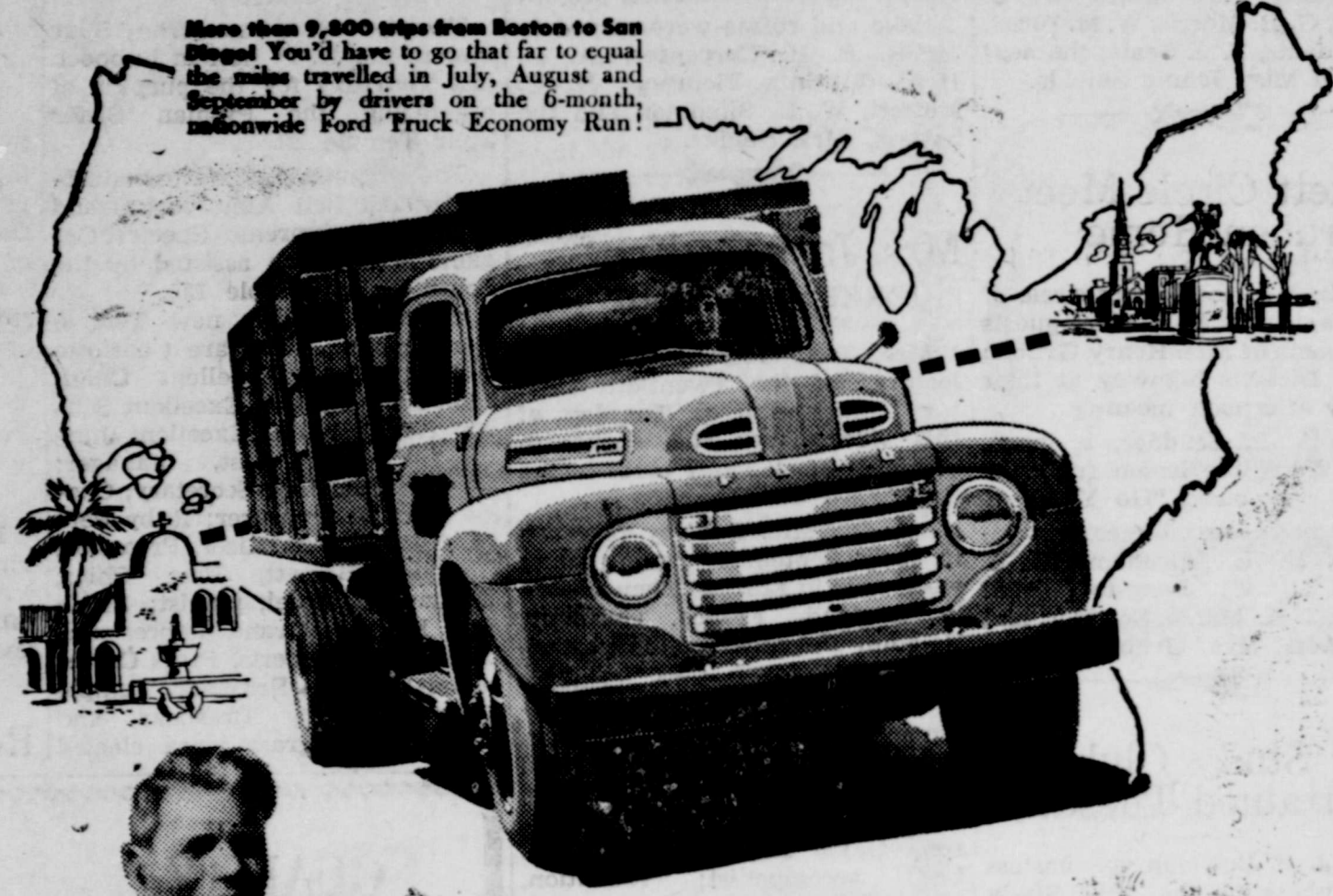
more thickly populated areas, and up to \$63 a year on each child in remote territory.

Future state help would be based on bus routes existing Jan. 1, 1950. Changes could be made only with approval of the state commissioners.

The agency recommended continuing to buy buses, tires and

tubes through the state board of control, on competitive bids.

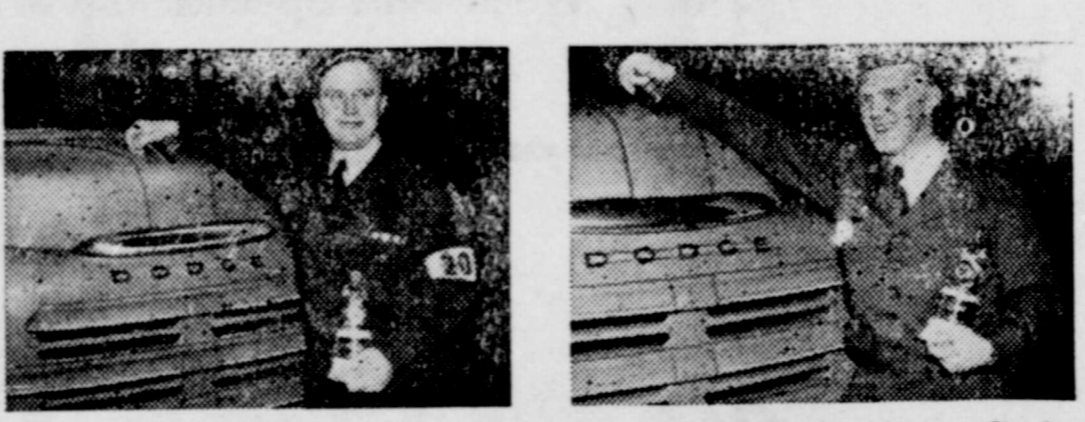

First Draft Call Issued For Doctors

First call for examination of physicians, dentists and veterinarians went to local Texas draft boards Friday.

State Selective Service headquarters in Austin announced the order in this category will involve 95 physicians, 42 dentists, and 54 veterinarians. They will be examined Nov. 20, 21, 22 and 24.

All persons included in the call will be of the first priority—personnel educated at government expense or deferred to complete professional education during World War II who have had less than 90 days armed forces service since that time, State Director Paul L. Wakefield said.

Not all local boards will receive calls in this category. Some boards have no registrants of this type and some have classified none.

Examination of all Texas registrants in the category who are classified as available for service will be held before Dec. 15, Wakefield said. December examination dates have not been set.

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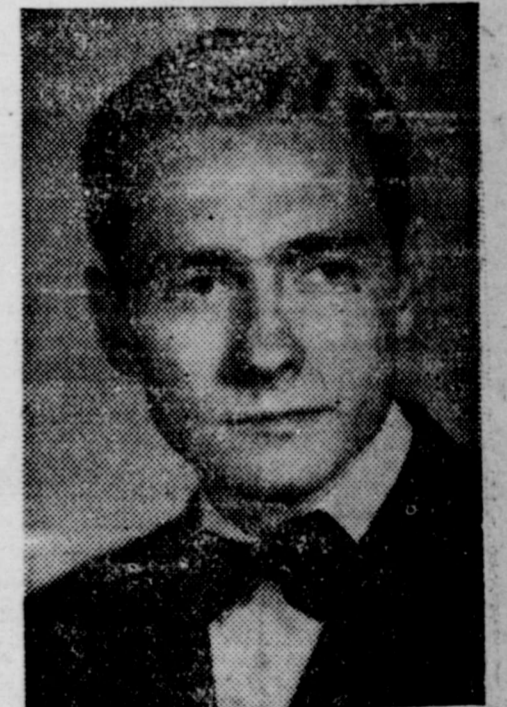

On November 26 eleven hundred farm boys and girls will "blow" into the "Windy City" to attend the 29th National 4-H Club Congress. For five days they will be treated to the best Chicago has to offer in educational tours, food, entertainment, etc.

These "formers-in-the-making" from every part of the country are the state and national champions who for their outstanding achievements have won a trip to the 4-H Congress. They will represent the nearly two million members enrolled in the nation's 84,000 4-H Clubs. Savings Bonds and 227 watches will be given to state winners, and beautiful gold and silver medals representing twenty projects will be awarded to 4-H members for winning county honors.

Water Code Group To Cite Revisions

The Texas Water Code committee which has spent almost a year working on a revision of the water laws of the state, will have its preliminary report ready for distribution to the public about the middle of November.

Senator Rogers Kelley, chairman of this legislative committee, announced in Edinburg that the committee will hold a state-wide public hearing in the senate chamber

of the capitol in Austin on December 11, 12, and 13, in order to give all citizens an opportunity to present their views concerning this proposed revision of the water laws.

"The Committee has received recommendations as to the revision from sub-committees appointed to draft the new legislation, but will not take final action thereon until after the public hearing," Senator Kelley stated.

"The committee feels that the importance of the subject matter of these reports requires a full public hearing before we make

our final recommendations to the governor and legislature," he continued.

"We plan to have about four thousand copies of this proposed revision published and distributed throughout the state to newspapers, water users, county judges, mayors, chamber of commerce, and members of the legislature. In this way, all of our citizens who are concerned with the problem of

water control and conservation will have ample opportunity to express themselves and make their wishes known before final action is taken by our committee," Senator Kelley concluded.

After the public hearing in Austin next December, the committee will prepare its full final report and submit it to the governor and to the 52nd legislature when it convenes in January.

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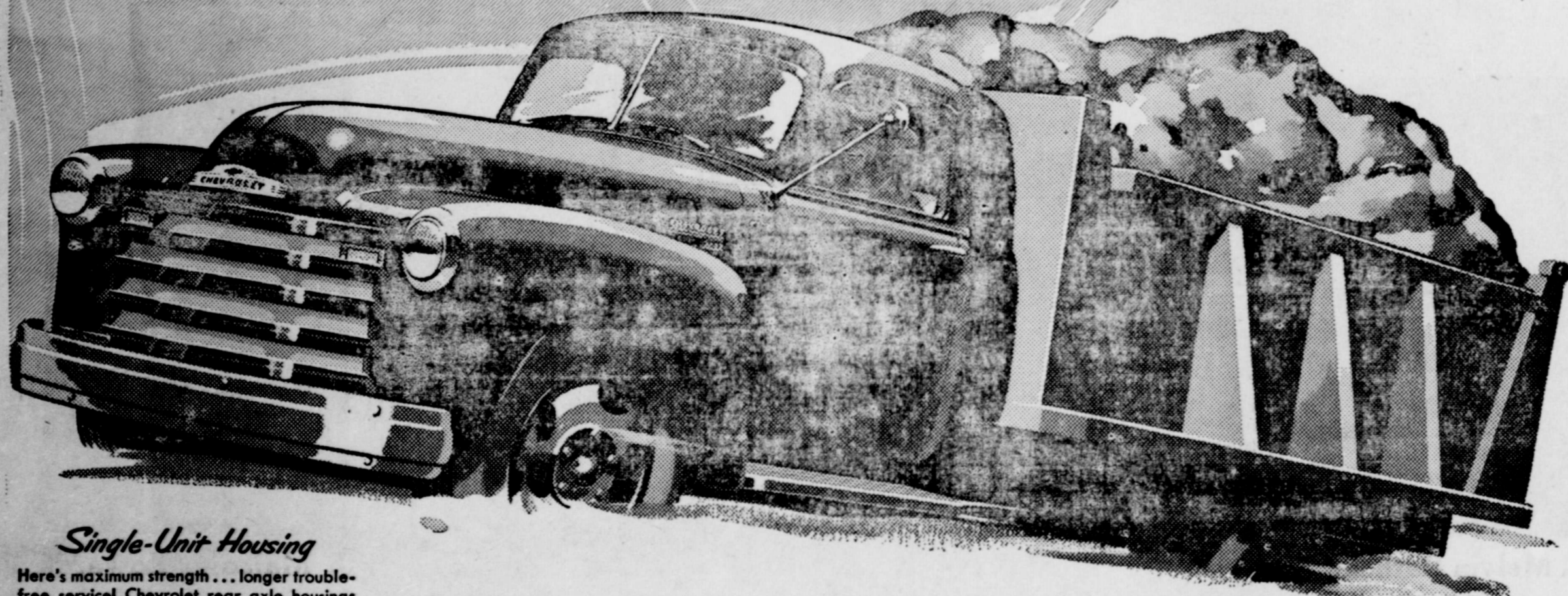

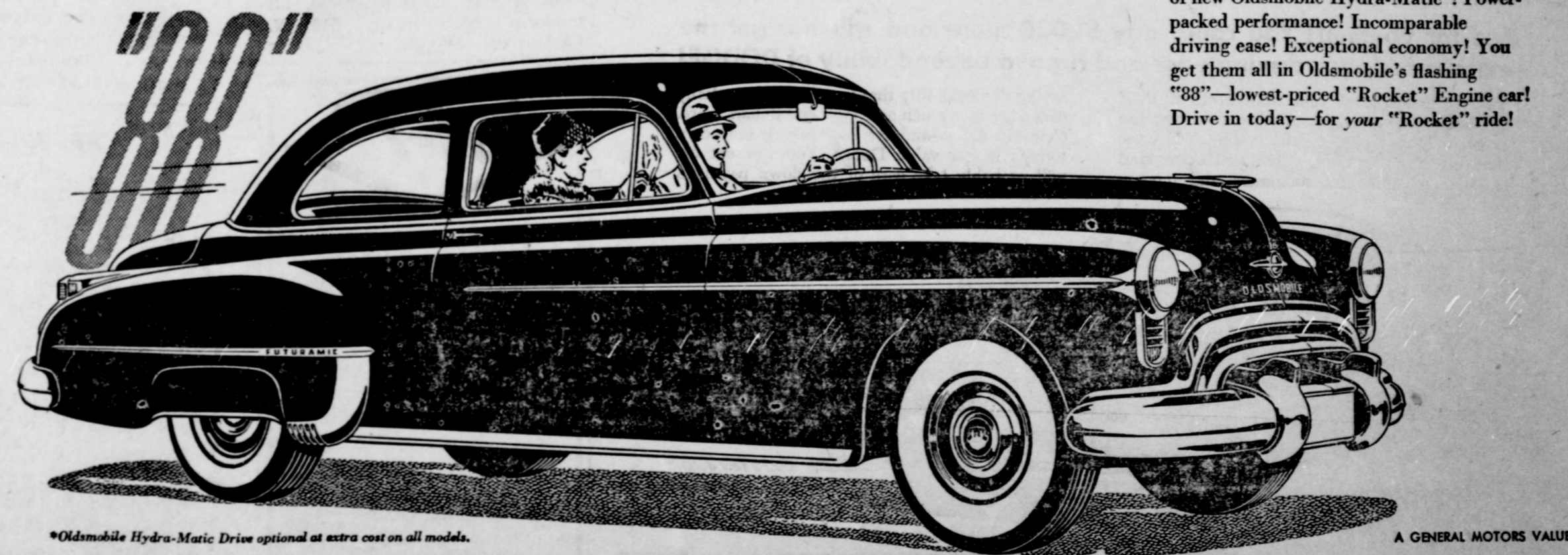

seven weeks on this trip. Reindeer ranching has taught Carothers many things. He has learned that the miracle drug, penicillin, protects reindeer from pneumonia, a disease to which they are subject in the Texas climate.

Every year the reindeer grow a new set of antlers. Bucks, females and fawns alike grow antlers. Some reindeer have antlers with a three-foot spread and 30 to 40 points. When a reindeer walks he pants

With his tongue out, like a dog. That doesn't mean he is too warm; it's his way of doing things. And the popping of his ankles when he walks is another reindeer peculiarity.

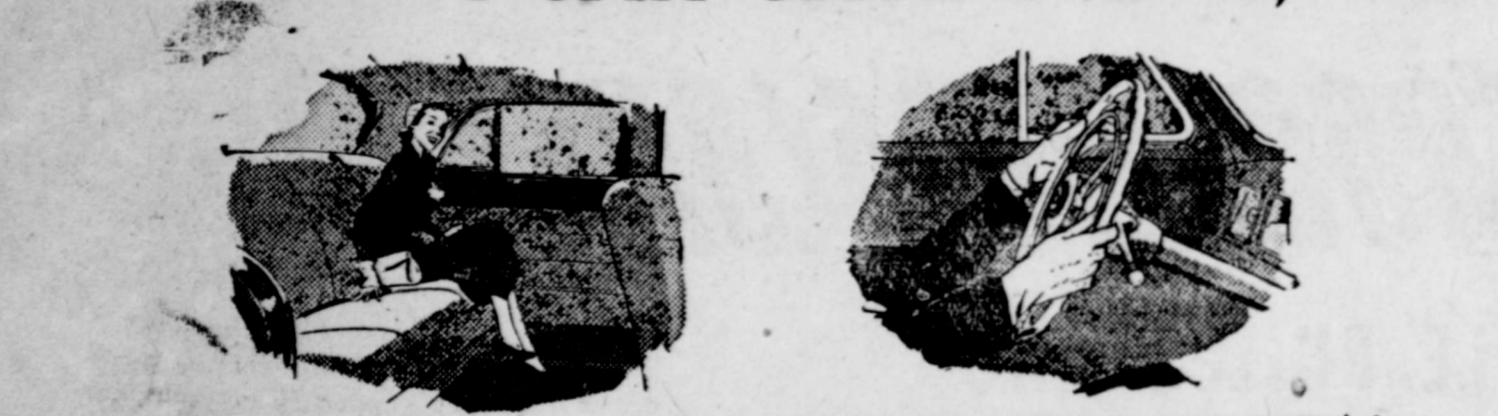

U.N. Fights Disease in Korea



To avoid the threat of epidemics the United Nations is carrying out a mass inoculation campaign in Korea. Inoculations against small pox of the populations of Incheon and Seoul will have been completed by the end of October. U.N. is also carrying vaccination campaigns against typhus, typhoid and cholera with native doctors under the supervision of the United Command which supplies equipment.

Fats Keep Best With Spice Added

That spices help prevent the deterioration of fats in food, a fact suspected for centuries but never before verified by modern science has been proved by studies at the Hoernel Institute of the University of Minnesota.

Seventy-seven samples representing thirty-low spices were tested, with the result that, "Virtually all samples tested showed at least some antioxidant activity in a few cases the antioxidant effects were very pronounced."

"Spices are natural products of

plant origin that are widely used in a variety of fat-containing food products for the purpose of improving their palatability," the introduction to the report read. "It is therefore important to know what effect these spices have on the keeping qualities of the products in which they are used."

Several studies have been made on the properties of spices in preventing food spoilage caused by microorganisms, but this is the first made on the prevention or retarding of the oxidation of fats in food.

Additional studies will be made in the institute to isolate, identify and further evaluate the substances in spices which are useful

as antioxidants in fats and food products.

All lard samples to which spices had been added had an index above one, which means that they were less subject to oxidation than the lard to which no spices had been added.

Popular Cold Drugs Are Not Advised

The wide advertising of antihistamines for the prevention of colds should not persuade people to place too much confidence in these drugs as a treatment for colds, "Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer warns the citizens of Texas. "Those who decide to take any of the antihistamine pills should realize it is highly important for them to follow exactly the directions.

"Regardless of the effectiveness of these new products it remains most desirable to take the ordinary precautions against contracting a cold—adequate sleep, clothing adapted to the weather, well balanced diet, moderate outdoor exercise and avoidance of unnecessary contacts with those already suffering from colds. Extra rest and the drinking of large amounts of fruit juice are still important aids to physical well being and cure if a cold occurs.

"Unfavorable reactions such as dizziness, drowsiness, and temporary loss of muscle control sometimes occur after taking this drug. Everyone is strongly advised against driving an automobile or working around machinery while taking the pills.

"Some readers of advertisements may get the idea that taking small doses of antihistamines every day will prevent colds. Such use of drugs should be discouraged. Antihistamines are still new and largely unproved drugs. Physicians have not yet determined

Meat Price Hike May Create Control

Can the government avoid placing rigid price and wage controls for national economy? This is a top question in Washington, and there is strong belief that cattle and hog farmers—and the Agriculture department—hold the answer.

If you knew what meat prices will do next year—especially next spring—you could tell whether controls are in store.

Consumers react more sharply to changing meat prices than to those of perhaps any other food or non-food commodity. That's because meat is the backbone, so to speak, of the American diet. Furthermore, not many consumers get all the meat they want.

Prices Interdependent
Meat prices pretty generally set the prices for eggs, poultry, dairy products and many other foods. When meat is scarce and high, poultry and dairy products tend to be high. That's because they are interchangeable with meat in the diet.

So sharp advances in meat prices—resulting from an increase in demand flowing from defense spending—could start consumers as well as political demands for price controls.

Farm officials are aware of this. They're saying farmers should produce more meat next year. Yet reports from livestock farming areas indicate that present production plans will not provide enough meat to prevent price increases.

What's holding farmers back? Reports show farmers are wondering whether it's worth while to take the risk.

Production costs are high. What

effect these products may have upon the human system if taken over a long period of time

if the market failed to develop? Prices of meat animals would tumble and a lot of farmers might not make expenses.

The situation is putting pressure on the government to set up a price guarantee program. Such programs were used during the war to encourage farmers to expand output.

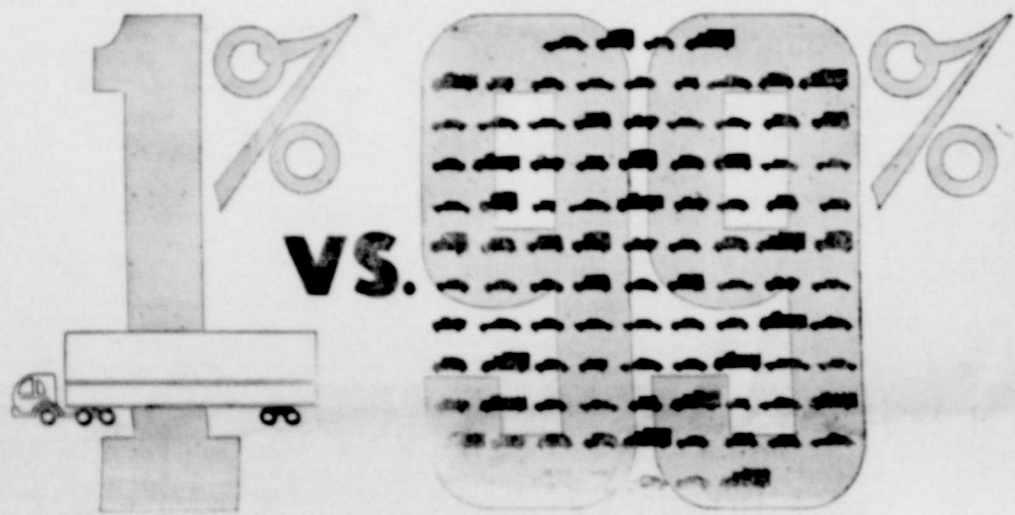

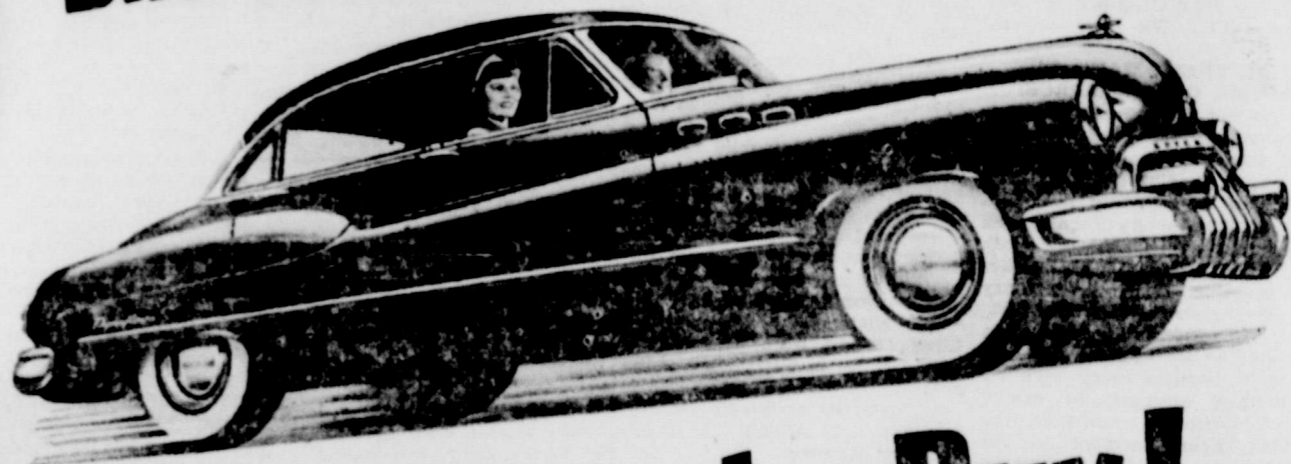

A major change in the Gilmer-Aikin school transportation program was proposed recently by the Texas Education Agency.

After surveying twenty-three counties, the agency recommended basing aid on a new formula. Many citizens attending a recent conference on school programs called the present bus-aid plan unsatisfactory.

Commissioner J. W. Edgar described this part of the Gilmer-Aikin program as a "stop-gap" when passed by the legislature last year.

Superintendents of more than 2,300 districts will study the proposal. Edgar invited them to give their views on it before January, when the legislature will be asked to pass a corrective bill.

The new formula would pay each district according to size of buses it needs, and miles traveled. A typical Texas school bus travels forty-five to fifty-five miles a day. Sixty per cent of the route is surfaced and the remainder on dirt roads.

The state would allow \$2,250 a year for a district to operate a large (72 passenger) bus. This aid would be scaled down, according to the size of the bus needed, to \$1,350 a year for carrying fewer than 20 pupils a day.

The district would get more extra money if the route exceeds fifty-five miles or is more than 40 per cent over dirt roads.

If put into practice, this plan would add about \$600,000 a year to the \$11,400,000 the state spent under the transportation formula in 1949-50, according to Bascom Hays, director of administrative services.

Local districts would also benefit by knowing in advance how much money to expect from the state, he said. Now they get a tentative bus allowance, covering 6-month estimated cost. Final payment is made in the summer after school is out.

Districts still would pay part of the transportation costs. The state would not help carry any child who lived within two miles of school.

State aid now is based on the number of pupils and the sparseness of school population. The state pays \$31.50 per pupil annually to carry students in the

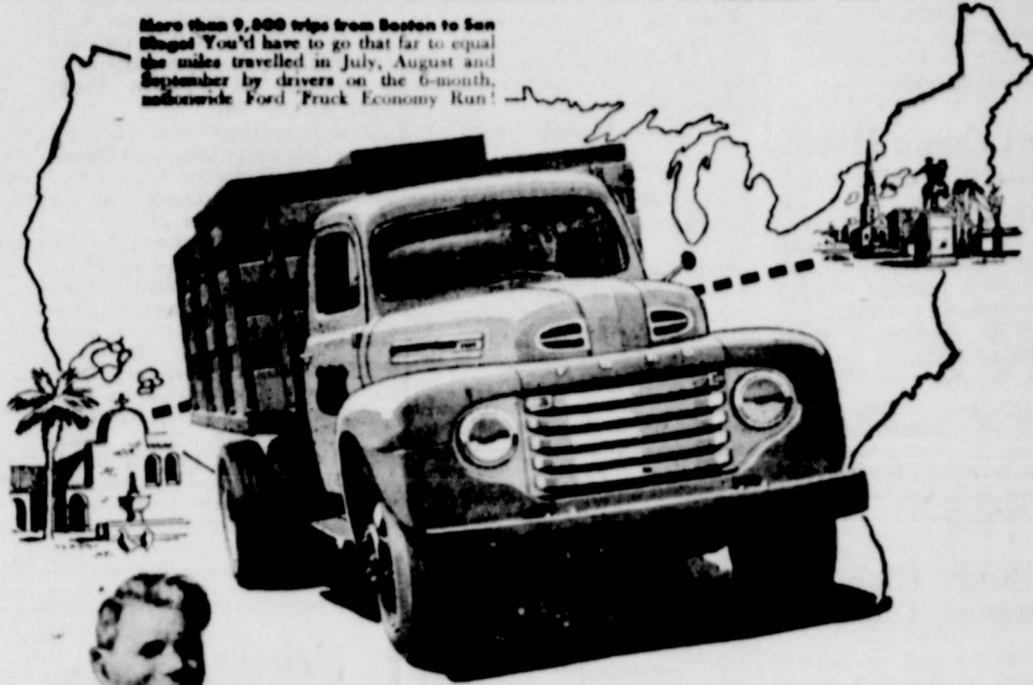
more thickly populated areas, and up to \$63 a year on each child in remote territory.

Future state help would be based on bus routes existing Jan. 1, 1950. Changes could be made only with approval of the state commissioners.

The agency recommended continuing to buy buses, tires and

tubes through the state board of control, on competitive bids.

On November 26 eleven hundred farm boys and girls will "blow" into the "Windy City" to attend the 29th National 4-H Club Congress. For five days they will be treated to the best Chicago has to offer in educational tours, food, entertainment, etc.

These "formers-in-the-making" from every part of the country are the state and national champions who for their outstanding achievements have won a trip to the 4-H Congress. They will represent the nearly two million members enrolled in the nation's 84,000 4-H Clubs. Some 150 college scholarships will be presented to club members chosen for national honors; a total of \$15,112 in U. S. Savings Bonds and 227 watches will be given to state winners, and beautiful gold and silver medals representing twenty projects will be awarded to 4-H members for winning county honors.

All this has been made possible by the National Committee On Boys And Girls Clubs Work, Inc., which today is supported by nearly 30 industries, businessmen and women who are backing up their faith in the 4-H Clubs with incentives valued at \$400,000 annually. This large sum is distributed for awards and leader training funds in 4-H programs which range all the way from canning to tractor maintenance.

"The money," declares Guy L. Noble, director of the National 4-H Committee, "is considered a sound investment in the nation's future by encouraging these rural boys and girls who have pledged their head, heart, hand, and health TO MAKE THE BEST BETTER."

4-H youth learn by doing," Mr. Noble stated, "and guiding their efforts are 250,000 volunteer club leaders who work under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural colleges to carry out 4-H program objectives." According

Water Code Group To Cite Revisions

The Texas Water Code committee which has spent almost a year working on a revision of the water laws of the state, will have its preliminary report ready for distribution to the public about the middle of November.

Senator Rogers Kelley, chairman of this legislative committee, announced in Edinburg that the committee will hold a state-wide public hearing in the senate chamber of the capitol in Austin on December 11, 12, and 13, in order to give all citizens an opportunity to present their views concerning this proposed revision of the water laws.

"The Committee has received recommendations as to the revision from sub-committees appointed to draft the new legislation, but will not take final action thereon until after the public hearing," Senator Kelley stated.

"The committee feels that the importance of the subject matter of these reports requires a full public hearing before we make

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our final recommendations to the governor and legislature," he continued.

"We plan to have about four thousand copies of this proposed revision published and distributed throughout the state to newspapers, water users, county judges, mayors, chamber of commerce, and members of the legislature. In this way, all of our citizens who are concerned with the problem of

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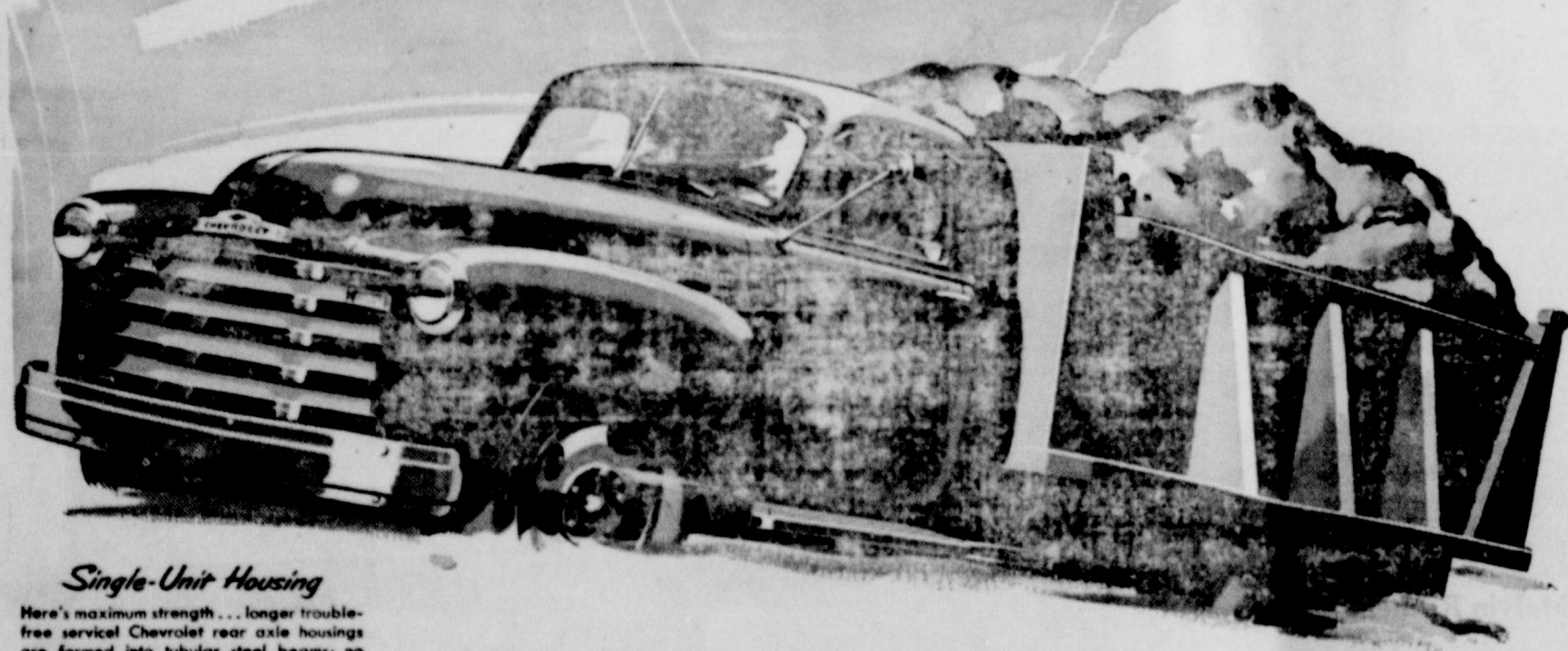

bus, boat, rail, plane, dog sled and deerled to an Eskimo village at Kotzebue, on the Arctic coast. With Eskimo guides they headed north from there by sled to a frozen river inside the Arctic Circle where a large herd of reindeer grazes. They'll be gone

seven weeks on this trip. Reindeer ranching has taught Carothers many things. He has learned that the miracle drug, penicillin, protects reindeer from pneumonia, a disease to which they are subject in the Texas climate.

Every year the reindeer grows a new set of antlers. Bucks, females and fawns alike grow antlers. Some reindeer have antlers with a three-foot spread and 30 to 40 points.

When a reindeer walks he pants with his tongue out, like a dog. That doesn't mean he is too warm; it's his way of doing things. And the popping of his ankles when he walks is another reindeer peculiarity.

Deprived of his natural food—reindeer moss—the Santa Sleigh animal thrives on the same things many children have for breakfast. Carothers supplements the diet of rolled oats, with mixed grain and a small amount of peanut hay for a balanced ration.
