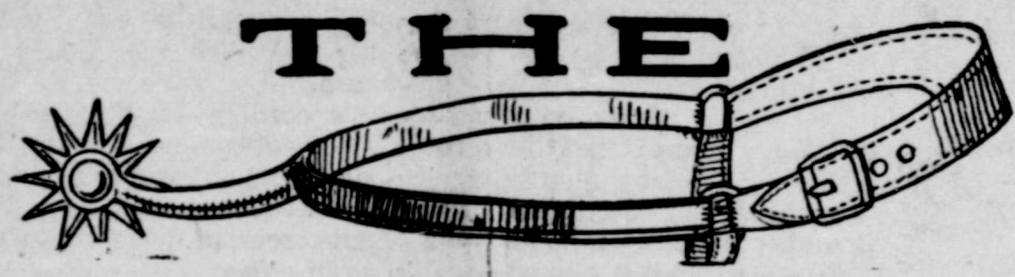

Price Ceilings Will Raise Pork Prices

LUBBOCK — Dollars-and-cents ceiling prices that will mean increases of 3 to 9 cents a pound in the cost of pork loins have been issued by the Office of Price Stabilization in order to offset the cost of processors and sellers of the substantial increases in the cost of live hogs since last January, the Lubbock district OPS office advises.

The higher ceiling prices affect pork loins weighing 16 pounds or less and will affect retail prices of roasts and chops. The prices replace those frozen at seasonally low levels by the general ceiling price regulation issued last January. The new interim regulation, which was immediately effective, sets a maximum ceiling price of 52 cents a pound for regular pork loins weighing 16 pounds or less delivered in Chicago to the buyers by sellers who slaughter hogs or cut the loin from the dressed hog he bought.

For pricing purposes the country is divided into six zones and actual ceilings in various areas will reflect special transportation cost additions. The district OPS office said the ceilings will be effective pending establishment of uniform dollars-and-cents ceilings for pork products.

Other recent OPS regulations are in the process of being put into effect, too, according to C. J. Taylor, district price executive. The agency has announced dollars-and-cents ceiling prices on scrap tires, tire parts and scrap tubes and set ceiling prices for other kinds of scrap rubber for each seller on the basis of his selling price between November 15 and December 31.

It also placed dollars-and-cents ceilings on three standard types of antifreeze applicable to retail sales and sales to retail dealers. For all other sales, retailers determine their ceiling prices by applying to the spelled out ceilings the same percentage discount or price differentials that were in effect from April 1 to December 1, 1950.

1. WHY IS CANCER TREATMENT LIKE GARDENING? 2. HOW LONG DOES PNEUMONIA HOSPITALIZE YOU? 3. WHAT DO COLDS COST?

Answer to Question No. 1: 1. The Sloan-Kettering Institute points out that, since cancer is like a terrible weed, the destruction of the disorderly growth of cancer cells follows gardening methods: pulling out the weeds (surgery); burning out the weeds (irradiation); altering the soil (changing body fluids by giving steroid hormones); killing the weed in the soil (giving treatment to kill cancer cells, yet leaving normal cells unharmed); exploding weeds with chemicals (use of chemicals which explode cancer cells). Every gardener knows weeds are easiest to destroy when they first appear. The same is true of cancer.

Answer to Question No. 2: 2. It used to be that pneumonia would keep you in the hospital for as long as five weeks. Now, because of modern drugs and techniques, many cases of pneumonia can be discharged from the hospital in five days. Although hospital costs have risen, because modern hospitals, adapted to high standards of medical care, are expensive to operate, this reduction in the length of hospital stay has actually lessened the expense of illness.

Answer to Question No. 3: 3. Authorities say 40 per cent of all days lost from work are due to colds, assuming a \$7 a day loss in earnings or productive capacity, colds cost \$420,000,000 a year on this basis alone. 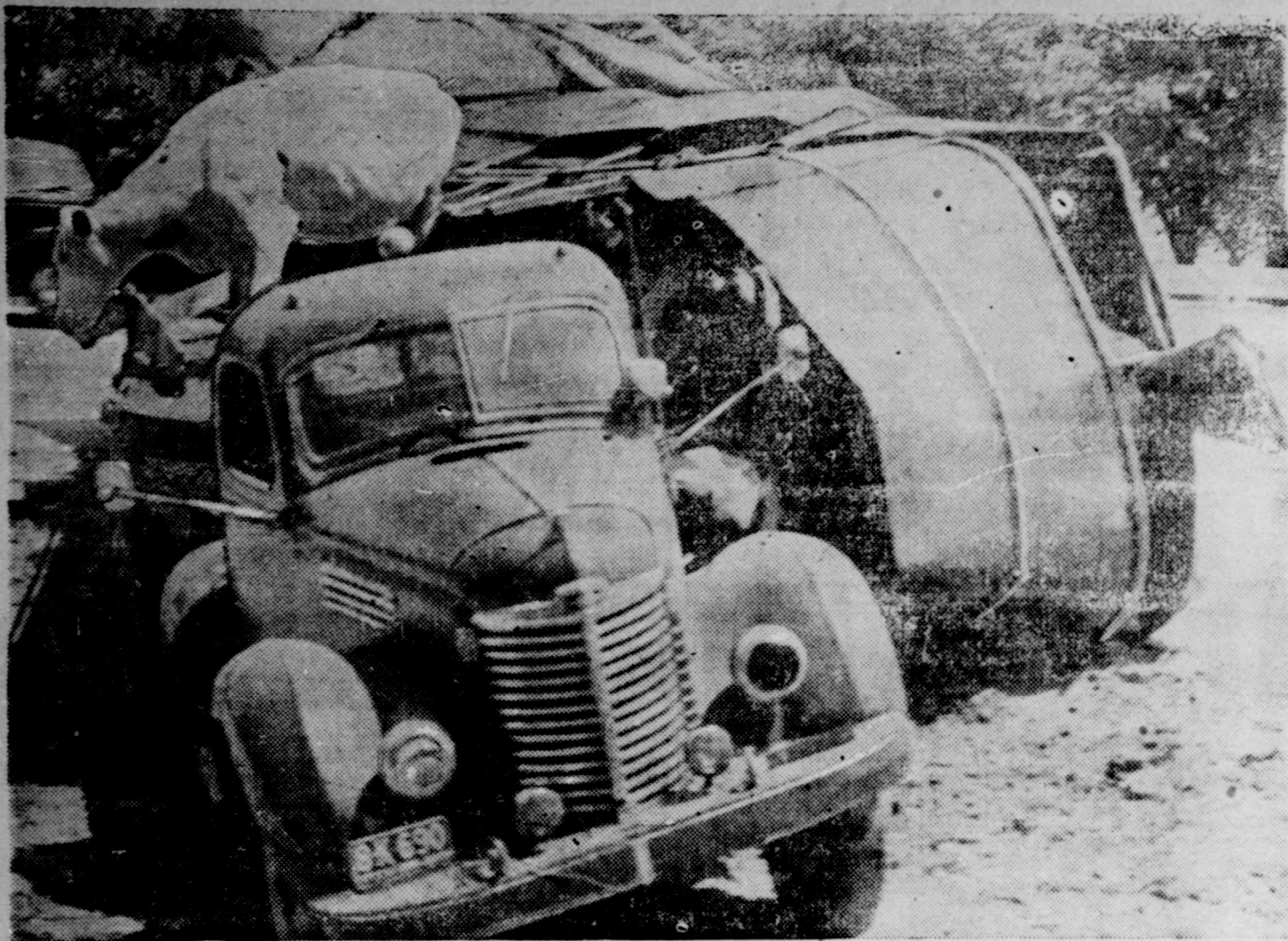

Texas Dove Season Reduced By 5 Days

AUSTIN, Aug. 8.—Endorsement of the mourning dove season changes as a step toward "good conservation" was voiced by the Executive Secretary of the Game, Fish & Oyster Commission. His comment followed an announcement by the Federal Fish & Wildlife Service that the Texas mourning dove season would be reduced from 45 to 40 days for most of the state, with the daily shooting period cut from sunup to sundown, to noon to sundown. The Fish & Wildlife Service, which makes the final decision on all migratory birds, followed the season opening dates for mourning doves as recommended by the Game Commission, pursuant to a popular poll of Texas sportsmen.

The opening in the north zone which comprises about three-fourths of Texas, will be September 1, as usual, and will end October 10. The south zone opener will be November 15. The season in that zone will close December 21, with the season three days shorter than the north zone because south zone hunters in twelve counties will have a special three-day whitewing dove season, September 14, 16 and 18.

The Executive Secretary said field reports indicate sufficient birds to provide a good harvest without endangering the brood stock, under the curtailed regulation.

"Texas still will have a pretty generous dove hunting season," he said. "I am confident Texas sportsmen will understand that the game that is not killed this fall will survive to assure their favorite sport in future seasons."

The daily limit for mourning doves is 10. The possession limit is also 10. Hunters bagging whitewings during the special season must count their mourning doves in their bag. Thus, if they shoot three mourning doves they may take only seven whitewings.

Big Spring Hospital Appeals For Nurses

The Veterans Administration Hospital in Big Spring has issued an urgent appeal for more doctors and nurses. The installation was designed for a 250-bed hospital but is not

operating at full capacity, Dr. L. B. Andrew, manager said, because of a shortage of doctors and registered nurses.

Nurses' salaries range from \$3,400 to \$5,400 per year depending upon experience, education, and training, he said. Doctors' salaries also vary with qualifications.

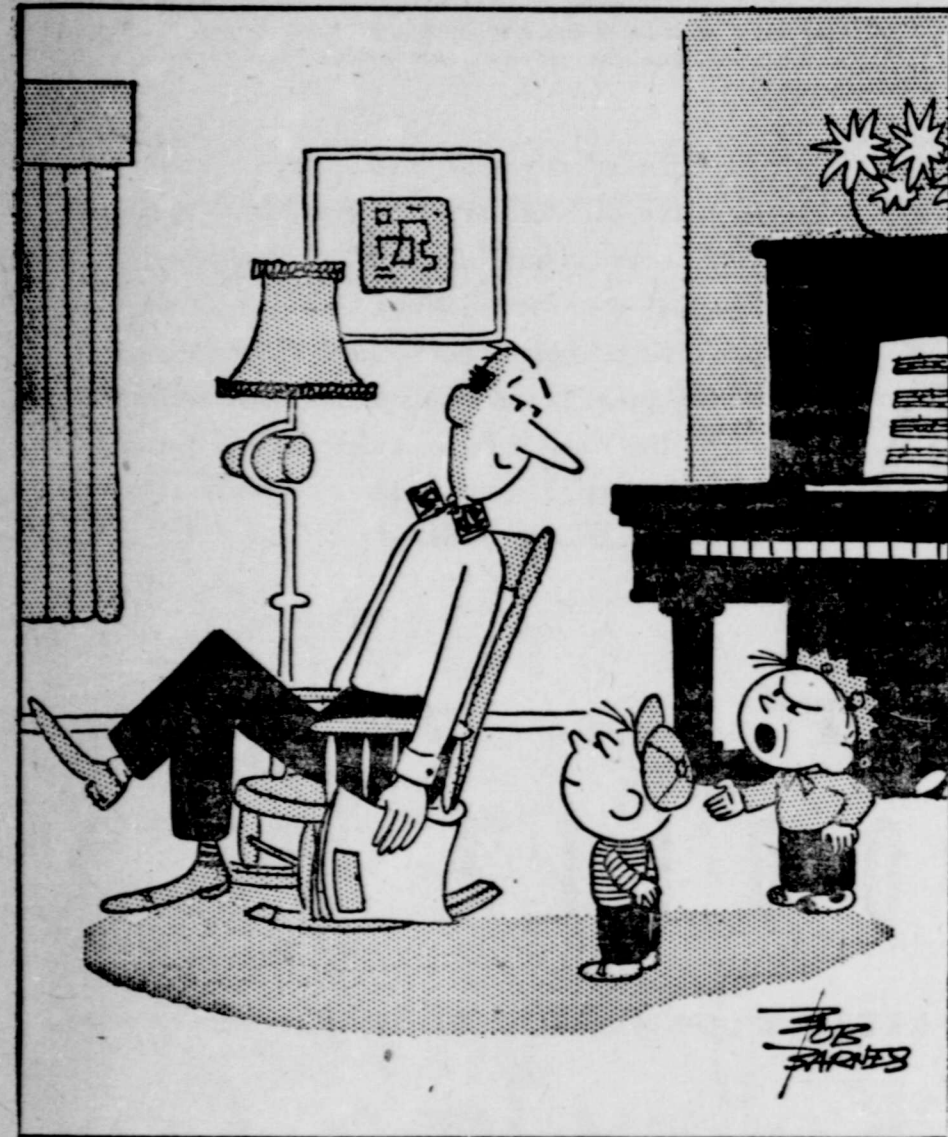

sets a maximum ceiling price of 30 cents a pound for regular pork loins weighing 16 pounds or less...

For pricing purposes the country is divided into six zones and actual ceilings in various areas will reflect special transportation cost additions.

The district OPS office said the ceilings will be effective pending establishment of uniform dollars-and-cents ceilings for pork products.

Other recent OPS regulations are in the process of being put into effect, too, according to C. J. Taylor, district price executive.

The agency has announced dollars-and-cents ceiling prices on scrap tires, tire parts and scrap tubes and set ceiling prices for other kinds of scrap rubber for each seller on the basis of his selling price between November and December 31.

It also placed dollars-and-cents ceilings on three standard types of antifreeze applicable to retail sales and sales to retail dealers.

For all other sales, sellers determine their ceiling prices by applying the same percentage discount or price differentials that were in effect from April 1 to December 1, 1950.

The regulation requires that all anti-freeze packaged 30 days after the effective date must specify the type of anti-freeze, its strength and the ceiling price.

Retailers must post ceiling prices in their establishments.

And the Office of Price Stabilization also issued a ceiling price regulation for the canned fruit and berry industry which will permit price adjustments for changes in raw material costs, sugar costs and other costs.

The regulation, establishing a method for calculating ceiling prices for all canned and processed fruits and berries, will apply first to light sweet cherries, dark sweet cherries, red sour cherries, cherries, and apricots of the 1951 pack.

Answer to Question No. 3: 3. Authorities say 40 per cent of all days lost from work are due to colds. Assuming a \$7 a day loss in earnings or productive capacity, colds cost \$420,000,000 a year on this basis alone. In addition, they often lead to more expensive and more serious illnesses.

Texas Dove Season Reduced By 5 Days

AUSTIN, Aug. 8.—Endorsement of the mourning dove season changes as a step toward "good conservation" was voiced by the Executive Secretary of the Game, Fish & Oyster Commission.

His comment followed announcement by the Federal Fish & Wildlife Service that the Texas mourning dove season would be reduced from 45 to 40 days for most of the state, with the daily shooting period cut from sunup to sundown, to noon to sundown.

The Fish & Wildlife Service, which makes the final decision on all migratory birds, followed the season opening dates for mourning doves as recommended by the Game Commission, pursuant to a popular poll of Texas sportsmen.

The opening in the north zone which comprises about three-fourths of Texas, will be September 1, as usual, and will end October 10. The south zone opener will be November 15. The season in that zone will close December 21, with the season three days shorter than the north zone because south zone hunters in twelve counties will have a special three-day whitewing dove season, September 14, 16 and 18.

The Executive Secretary said field reports indicate sufficient birds to provide a good harvest without endangering the brood stock, under the curtailed regulation.

"Texas still will have a pretty generous dove hunting season," he said. "I am confident Texas sportsmen will understand that the game that is not killed this fall will survive to assure their favorite sport in future seasons."

The daily limit for mourning doves is 10. The possession limit is also 10.

Hunters bagging whitewings during the special season must count their mourning doves in their bag. Thus, if they shoot three mourning doves they may take only seven whitewings.

Big Spring Hospital Appeals For Nurses

The Veterans Administration Hospital in Big Spring has issued an urgent appeal for more doctors and nurses.

The installation was designed for a 250-bed hospital but is not

operating at full capacity, Dr. L. B. Andrew, manager said, because of a shortage of doctors and registered nurses.

Nurses' salaries range from \$3,400 to \$5,400 per year depending upon experience, education, and training, he said. Doctors' salaries also vary with qualifications.
