## Community Meetings Planned to Evaluate Agricultural Practice

The Dickens County Mobilization Committee has announced that community meetings will be held during the next two weeks in order to analyze and improve the programs and agencies of the Department of Agriculture in our county.

Meetings are scheduled for 8 o'clock in the evening, on August 27 at the Patton Springs schoolhouse; on August 23, at the McAdoo schoolhouse; on August 17, at the community center in Highway; on August 29, at the community center at Dry Lake; on August 20 at the District Court room in Dickens; on August 21 at the Duck Creek school at Gilpin; and August 30 at the Spur Theatre in Spur.

Thirteen years ago a group of farmers and ranchers in Dickens county sat around a conference table and made some recommendations with respect to a family size farm and the crops and livestock and other practices that should be carried out in order to make the best use of all acreages on the farm, and yet realize enough income to make a comfortable living for his family.

Most of these recommendations are still practiced today, but many people believe that the family farm policy should be reviewed by the people of the United States and that the idea of all the people in the agriculture business should be combined and action concentrated as much as possible.

That each person farming, ranching or otherwise interested in agriculture in Dickens county might have an opportunity to review the family farm setup and also make some recommendations for a permanent agricultural program, the members of the Dickens County War Mobilization committee arranged the community meetings.

There are many people whose work involves the teaching, technical assistance and record keeping as well as research, loans and payments and that work should be evaluated to determine the needed changes, if any. The improvement of the services by the Department of Agriculture is of prime importance to that department.

## Uvalde Services Held For A. L. Jones

Funeral services were held on Thursday, August 2, at 2 p. m. for A. L. Jones, 55, in the Uvalde Church of Christ. Jones was the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Arnold of Spur and the brother of Hester and Jessie Arnold, both of Spur. Rev. Byrl B. Brockman of La Pryor conducted the service.

Palbearers were members of the Uvalde I. O. O. F. Lodge, of which Jones had been a member. Burial was in the Barksdale Cemetery with Odd Fellows in charge of the graveside service.

Jones was born Feb. 12, 1896 in Charleston of Delta County. On September 14, 1919, he married Artie Rhea at Barksdale and to this union were born two sons and six daughters. Jones was a veteran of World War I, serving overseas with the 36th division. The family moved to Uvalde in 1941. At the time of death, he was employed at Kelly Air Force Base in San Antonio. Death came to him Tuesday, July 31, in San Antonio.

Jones is survived by his wife, Mrs. Artie Jones of Uvalde; one son, Arthur C. Jones of San Diego; six daughters, Mrs. Gladys Wright of El Campo, Mrs. Luella Kessler of Victoria, Mrs. Jean Coltrane of Greenboro, North Carolina, Mrs. Mildred Wassmiller of Uvalde, Mrs. Ray Redden, Utopia, and Barbara Rhea Jones, Uvalde. A son, Doyle preceded him in death in 1942.

Other survivors include Jones' parents of Spur; three sisters, Mrs. C. B. Rhea of Stamford, and Hardy Sellers of Eastland, and Mrs. Jake Scott of Pecos; five brothers, Ernest Arnold of Hot Springs, N. ## Two Awards Given Spur FFA Chapter

The Spur Future Farmers of America will receive approximately \$156.60 from the Sears-Roebuck Foundation.

This money is divided into two awards, The Texas F. F. A. Sears-Roebuck Foundation Livestock Improvement Program and The Texas F. F. A. Sears-Roebuck Foundation Pasture and Grass Improvement Program.

The money for the Livestock Improvement Program will be used to buy three registered Berkshire Gilts. Three boys in the chapter will receive the gilts. They in turn will give some other boy in the chapter a gilt of the first litter. The circle will be perpetuated by each one returning one to some other boy.

The boys to receive these gilts are Rayburn Thomas, Tommie Hightower and Roland Powell.

Rayburn Thomas and Tommie Hightower, accompanied by Paul Sweet, the local Vocational Agriculture Teacher, went to Broadway, in Crosby County last Wednesday to buy the gilts. The gilts will increase the number of pigs in the Spur Chapter to 7 pigs.

The chapter received \$56.50 for this project. The F. F. A. Chapter will pay the difference in money received and the cost of the gilts.

Don McGinty, will receive the \$100.00 for the Sears-Roebuck Foundation Pasture and Grass Improvement. He plans to plant 18 acres of old cultivated land in a mixture of native and improved grasses: Blue Grama, Sideoats, Grama, Little Bluestem, Sand Bluestem, Sand Lovegrass, Weeping Lovgrass, Switchgrass and Blue Panic Grass.

The land has been planted in rye and vetch for the last two years. He plans to plant sudan grass as a cover crop, to be left on the land to protect the tiny grass seedlings as they come up.

"And I will send grass in thy fields for thy cattle that thou mayest eat and be full," quoting Deuteronomy 11-15. We know that grass is, and has been the basis for a great industry in our country.

The Chapter plans to start other projects like these, in the near future, as soon as finances and facilities are available.

## Minerals On 400 Lots Leased to Boles

Jack Rector, acting as agent for W. C. Boles of McEnterprise, Texas reports that the minerals on approximately 400 lots in the city of Spur have been leased by Boles, at \$25.00 per lot.

Boles is allegedly attempting to lease at least 51 per cent of the city lots with plans to drill a wildcat oil well just north of town.

An existing city ordinance restricts drilling in the city limits to 13 wells with as many drilling zones established. At least 51 percent of each zone must be held before a drilling permit will be issued.

Rector states that Boles will continue with his drilling plans if the required percentage can be obtained in "several" of the 13 zones.

It has been rumored around town this week that an individual or firm out of Midland is offering \$35 per lot for city minerals, but no verification of this rumor can be found and it is obviously unfounded.

With approximately 1500 lots in the city limits, a 100 percent leasing to Boles at \$25 per lot will bring into the city approximately \$37,000.00.

Rector states that Boles is considering a door-to-door canvass of the city soon in his effort to obtain the necessary leases prior to November 1, 1951.

# Hoover-McAteer Wins 1951 Spur Softball Championship

## Hotrods Receive Texas Spur Trophy Following 8-3 Victory Over Proctor's

The Hoover-McAteer Hotrods carried home the Texas Spur trophy with the championship of the Spur Softball league Tuesday night with an 8-3 victory over Proctor's.

Behind the pitching of Jerry Price, Buddy Hoover's team took an early 3-0 lead and never had it seriously challenged throughout the game. Proctor's squeezed two across in the first of the fourth inning, but the Hotrods retaliated with three more in the last half of the same inning.

A sixth inning rally which netted Proctor's their third tally was nipped in the bud by Hoover-McAteer.

Following the championship game Buddy Hoover manager of the winning team, was presented the Texas Spur trophy to be engraved by McClurkin's Jewelry with the team name and complete roster.

The Hoover-McAteer team finished the regular season in second place, led by City Drug. In the play-off, they defeated the V. F. W. two out of three to obtain their final berth.

They beat Proctor's in the first game of the finals, dropped the second one, and sewed up the championship Tuesday night.

Tuesday's game marked the end of the 1951 softball season in Spur which had included seventy two regular season games, eight play-off games and several All-Star and girl games.

Bigham states that this meeting will be the keeping of the promise to the school officials to leave the park in good condition for the coming football season.

WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9 of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80c) Cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at a general or special election; and in event

such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Dickens County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF DICKENS COUNTY, TEXAS:

Not exceeding nine Cents (9c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and

Not exceeding fifteen Cents (15c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements."

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15c) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as recinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to

levy and to continue to levy said tax.

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PITTSBURGH—The new Flex seal Bomb Glass units open automatically in four triangular sections when an explosive force strikes. This release of pressure prevents the window frame from being blown in and greatly reduces the possibilities of flying fragments. The window consists of three layers laminated into a single unit. The outer layer is a sheet of glass, the middle layer a sheet of polyvinyl butyral plastic, and the inner layer is four triangular shaped pieces of glass. The plastic layer extends beyond the glass edges and is bolted to the window frame to serve as hinges, permitting the four segments to open like doors when the outer plate of glass is broken. After an explosion of sufficient force to open the bomb window, the four segments may be returned to position and retained there by a bolt, as shown above, or even a wad of chewing gum. The crevices may then be closed with adhesive tape, putty, clay or whatever is handy, and the restored window again affords protection from cold, rain, storms, etc., until such time as the glass may be replaced.

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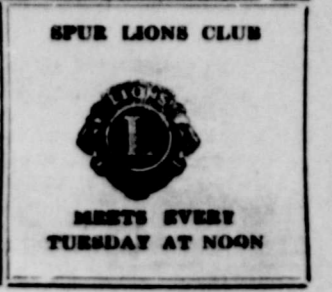

## Community Meetings Planned to Evaluate Agricultural Practice

The Dickens County Mobilization Committee has announced that community meetings will be held during the next two weeks in order to analyze and improve the programs and agencies of the Department of Agriculture in our county. Meetings are scheduled for 8 o'clock in the evening, on August 27 at the Patton Springs schoolhouse; on August 23 at the McAdoo schoolhouse; on August 17, at the community center in Highway; on August 29, at the community center at Dry Lake; on August 20 at the District Court room in Dickens; on August 21 at the Duck Creek school at Gilpin; and August 30 at the Spur Theatre in Spur.

Thirteen years ago a group of farmers and ranchers in Dickens county sat around a conference table and made some recommendations with respect to a family size farm and the crops and livestock and other practices that should be carried out in order to make the best use of all acreages on the farm, and yet realize enough income to make a comfortable living for his family. Most of these recommendations are still practiced today, but many people believe that the family farm policy should be reviewed by the people of the United States and that the idea of all the people in the agriculture business should be combined and action concentrated as much as possible.

Each person farming, ranching or otherwise interested in agriculture in Dickens county might have an opportunity to review the family farm setup and also make some recommendations for a permanent agricultural program, the members of the Dickens County War Mobilization committee arranged the community meetings.

There are many people whose work involves the teaching, technical assistance and record keeping as well as research, loans and payments and that work should be evaluated to determine the needed changes, if any. The Department of Agriculture is of prime importance to that department.

### Workers Over 75 Urged To Apply For S. S. Benefit Payment

Many employed workers over 75 years of age have applied for Old Age and Survivors Insurance benefit payments, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock, Texas Social Security Office.

Hutton is greatly surprised at the comparatively large number of insured persons in this age group, his office has no way of knowing the total number. The reason for this lack of information is that many insured workers who have passed their seventy-fifth birthday have not applied for benefit payments. "They do not

not yet realize that they and their dependents can now have these monthly payments," he says. Before the new Social Security Law went into effect last September, payments could not be made to any insured worker over 65 who continued in a job covered by Social Security and earned over \$14.99 in a month. Under the amended law, a worker over 75 may engage in any kind of employment or self-employment and have benefit payments regardless of the amount of his earnings. Between the ages of 65 and 75, the insured person may now have \$30 a month in work covered by Social Security.

Hutton says it has been found that most people are reluctant to stop working at any age if they are still in good health. He further points out that this new provision for insured people over 75 will be an incentive to continue in gainful work.

He urges all insured workers age 75 or older, and who have not yet applied for benefit payments to do so without delay. Back payments can be made for as long as six months, but failure to make application at the Lubbock Office promptly may result in the loss of one or more months' benefit payments to the worker and his dependents.

A representative of the Social Security Administration Field Office in Lubbock will be in Spur on Thursday August 16th at the Post Office at 9:30 a. m. to assist persons in Social Security matters.

### Texas Draft Call For Oct. Totals 742

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 4.—The Texas draft call for October is 742 men, Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, announced today.

Quota of 819 and an August call of 772. From March through July, state calls were decreased, but beginning with the August call, quotas have been increased, the state draft director pointed out. The October quota of 742 is the state's share of a national quota of 41,000, biggest nation monthly quota since March. Part of the September and October quota of men will get service with the United States Army.

General Wakefield said that local board quotas for October will be assigned and mailed "around August 28th or 30th." No local board quotas will be available until that time. Local boards have received September calls.

The state director of Selective Service said his headquarters had received information that not as many male college students in the Southwest had taken the Selective Service qualification test as in other areas.

Figures received showed that 6 per cent of male college students in Western South Central states had the test, as compared to 18 per cent in Northeastern states, and 21 percent over the nation and territories as a whole.

State headquarters also has received new regulations which permit some registrants who appeal

for occupational deferment to have a choice of appeal boards. For example, a man registered in California may have a right to appeal, if he takes such a California appeal board having jurisdiction of the area in which he works.

NOES: Commissioners None

The order is as follows:

WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9 of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section 9 of Article 8, by increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80c) Cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at a general or special election; and in general

such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Dickens County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF DICKENS COUNTY, TEXAS:

That a special election be held in said County on the 25th day of August, 1951, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"Shall the Commissioners Court of Dickens County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:

Not exceeding forty-one Cents (41c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;

Not exceeding fifteen Cents (15c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;

Not exceeding nine Cents (9c) on the \$100.00 valuation in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and

Not exceeding fifteen Cents (15c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements."

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15c) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as recinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to

levy and to continue to levy said tax.

"SHALL the authority heretofore granted to the Commissioners' Court of Dickens County, Texas, by election duly ordered and duly held in said County on the 3rd day of December, 1949, to issue the bonds of said County in the total principal sum of \$125,000.00, to mature serially within any given number of years not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 3 1/2% per annum, for the purpose of establishing and equipping a county hospital and for all necessary permanent improvements and buildings in connection therewith, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Chapter 1, Title 22, and Chapter 5, Title 71, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, but which said bonds have not been sold and delivered, be revoked or canceled?"

That the said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Chapter 1, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, and all persons who are legal voters of said Dickens County, Texas, and who are resident property taxpayers of said County, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

It is further ordered that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Senate Bill No. 202 passed by the 52nd Legislature in 1951, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following proposition:

"FOR THE REVOCATION OF BONDS"

"AGAINST THE REVOCATION OF BONDS"

EACH VOTER shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indication of his or her vote.

## New Window Resists Atom Bomb Effects



PITTSBURGH—The new Flex-  
seal Bomb Glass units open auto-  
matically in four triangular sec-  
tions when an explosive force  
strikes. This release of pressure  
prevents the window frame from  
being blown in and greatly reduces the  
possibilities of flying fragments.  
The window consists of three lay-  
ers laminated into a single unit. The  
outer layer is a sheet of glass, the  
middle layer is a sheet of polyvinyl  
butyral plastic, and the inner layer  
is four triangular shaped pieces of  
glass. The plastic layer extends be-  
yond the glass edges and is bolted  
to the window frame to serve as  
hinges, permitting the four seg-  
ments to open like doors when the  
outer plate of glass is broken.  
After an explosion of sufficient  
force to open the bomb window, the  
four segments may be returned to  
position and retained there by a  
bolt, as shown above, or even a wad  
of chewing gum. The crevices may  
then be closed with adhesive tape,  
putty, clay or whatever is handy,  
and the restored window again af-  
fords protection from cold, rain,  
storms, etc., until such time as the  
glass may be replaced.
