### Meet the Candidates:



Walter Gruben

(Editor's note: This is the second of a series of articles on candidates for city offices.)

Walter Gruben, candidate for street commissioner of the City of Spur, has been in business here for 23 years. He is a native of West Texas, having been raised in Fisher county and a resident of Spur for 26 years.

This marks Gruben's first time to seek public office. However, he has served on various committees of the Spur Chamber of Commerce and was one of the first directors named to the city hospital board. This year he is completing his first year as a member of the Spur schools board of trustees.

Gruben is a past president of the Spur Rotary club and is a past chairman of the board of directors of the First Baptist Church. At present Gruben is the owner-manager of Gruben's Radio and Appliance Store. He is married and has one daughter.

He states, "Spur at present is at the most crucial period in its history. We have reached the place where, as a city, we must do definite things to assure the future."

Having worked closely with the chamber of commerce and having been on the hospital board, Gruben states that he feels conscious of the city's needs. He stressed, for example, the need to solve the parking problem on Burlington to better serve shoppers and to minimize congestion.

## Uniform Adopted By Posse at Fri. Meeting

The Dickens County Sheriff's Posse selected its uniform at a meeting of the membership last Friday night at the chamber of commerce office in Spur.

The group chose white Panama hats, light grey shirts, blue jeans, and red-gold chaps trimmed in royal blue as the official uniform of the organization. The cost per uniform is not to exceed \$50 and will be furnished through local merchants on a cost basis.

A stamped breast collar with blue lettering will be used for the horses.

Selections of the various parts of the uniform were ordered and will be considered for approval as soon as they arrive.

The by-laws of the organization were officially approved at the meeting. Olney Walker was selected as truck boss.

During the meeting the group voted to act as co-sponsors of the Spur FFA of a show here Friday and to appear in the parade at the county club show here on April 4.

It was decided by the group to apply for membership in the West Texas Association of Sheriff's Posses and Riding Clubs whose idea is to standardize requirements and establish a point system for judging such clubs' entries at area shows.

Posse officials state that the organization is getting off to a very good start with over forty members already and more joining every day.

## County Tops Goal In Fastest Campaign In History; Officials Thank Workers

The annual Dickens county Red Cross fund drive went over the top in three fast days last week to mark the fastest, largest, and most thorough Red Cross drive in the history of the county.

John Albin, funds drive chairman, states that the workers over the county collected the \$2,360 set up as the county goal on the first three days of the drive. By Wednesday morning of this week \$2,438 had been turned in with a couple of community workers yet to report. The drive started last Thursday morning.

Cecil Godfrey, county Red Cross chairman, Albin, Tom Johnson, Dr. W. F. Patrick, and the other Red Cross officials express their sincere thanks and appreciation to the many workers who gave of their time in collecting the funds and to each individual who contributed to the fund.

Godfrey says he would like to insist that if there are any cases that the Red Cross could help in the county, please report them to the Red Cross so that aid can be given where investigation indicates it is needed.

Of the funds collected, approximately \$850 will remain in the local chapter's fund and the rest will be sent to the national Red Cross.

## FFA Boys To Have Stock Show Friday

### First Offset Drilling Below 1400 ft. Wed.

The Western Pacific No. 1 Emery-Smith wildcat, located 1,990 feet from the north and west lines of section 162, is drilling below 1,400 as the first offset to Dickens county's first and only producing oil well, the No. 1 G. F. Smith.

A pump has been installed on the No. 1 G. F. Smith and is reportedly pumping 122 barrels of fluid which is approximately 12 percent water.

The new wildcat is a 4,500 foot venture.

Local reports state that the Self well in Kent county, south of Spur is drilling in time below 5,000 feet.

## County Show To Be Here On Sat., April 4

The Dickens County Livestock Show committee met last Tuesday night to work on plans for the county show to be held here in Spur on Saturday, April 4.

The show will be held across West Harris Street south of Denton implement company.

The committee plans a big parade to open the day's activities. FFA and 4-H club sweethearts from over the area are to participate in the parade. The newly organized Dickens County Sheriff's posse has also been invited to take part and will probably make its first official appearance at this time.

Dickens county FFA and 4-H boys will show their calves, hogs, sheep and rabbits in this year's show. They will be competing for several hundred dollars in premiums and for championship honors in all classes.

Winners in the show will leave the county the following morning for Fort Worth in a Spur school bus to visit the stock pens.

All committeemen and other show helpers will have lunch together at Dyess hall at noon on the day of the show.
