David McAteer

David McAteer, 41, candidate for the office of water commissioner of the City of Spur, has lived in the Spur area all his life. He has been active in various phases of community work, emphasizing, more or less, the part dealing with agriculture and the youth programs.

He has been in business here for the past 2 years as a partner in Hoover-McAteer Mercury automobile and Ford tractor dealers. He and his family are members of the First Methodist Church of Spur. He is a member of the Spur Rotary club and is a Mason. He has served as a volunteer fireman.

As a member of the Spur Chamber of Commerce, McAteer has served on different chamber committees. He is a past director of the West Texas chamber.

At present he is an active member of the Dickens County Fat Stock Show committee and is always active in putting on the annual show here. He is a member of the Dickens county Farm Bureau, is a former director of the PMA and a former member on the Farm Service committee. He previously served as a member of the board of trustees of the Spur schools.

McAteer states that several citizens actively sought his candidacy for commissioner and that if elected, "I will do my best to try to run things for the betterment of the town as a whole."

### Work Clothes Firm Considering Spur

George Gabriel, president of the Spur Chamber of Commerce, was contacted this week by a representative of a major work clothes manufacturer concerning the possibilities of establishing a branch plant in Spur.

Gabriel states that the company is interested in locating a plant which will employ approximately 120 workers. The chamber president will make a trip to Fort Worth in the next few weeks to further discuss the proposition.

He adds that there has not, of course, been any final decision made as yet, but that Spur is definitely being considered.

### Hamilton Drops Out: City Ballot Complete

L. P. Hamilton dropped out of the race for City Street Commissioner as the final change of the ticket to be voted in Spur on Tuesday, March 7.

Absentee voting started March 17 at the city hall with voters having a choice between two candidates for each office.

In the race for mayor it's George Gabriel versus Roy Stovall. The candidacy marks Gabriel's first venture into city politics, while Stovall has previously served on the commission and has thrice been defeated seeking the office.

Two newcomers to city politics appear on the ballot as candidates for street commissioner. They are Walter Gruben, owner of a local radio and appliance store, and Dr. Joe P. Alexander, local osteopath. Both men have been active in civic affairs of Spur. Gruben is at present a member of the Spur school board of trustees from which he will resign if elected.

Dave McAteer and C. P. Scudder both seek election as water commissioner. McAteer has served on various committees and boards while in Spur, being more active in the agriculture and youth programs. Scudder has had varied experience in public office having served in both Mineral Wells and Decatur, Texas.

In Spur he has been active in several civic organizations. A sample ballot and the official election is displayed publicly in the city hall.

### Test Being Run On No. 1 Self In Kent

Test was being run on the No. 1 Self well located in the northwest quarter of section 9, block B, PSL, in Kent County, ten miles south of Spur, yesterday afternoon.

An unverified report late last night indicated that a show of gas was present. Drilling depth is at 6112, topping the canyon reef.

Skelly Oil Company will drill a 7,300-foot or granite wildcat in Dickens county, 19 miles southeast of Spur and eight miles east of Pacific Western's No. 1 G. F. Smith, recently completed pump-out discovery from the Tannehill sand and the county's first oil well.

The operation is No. 1 Begus Ranch, at the center of southwest quarter of southwest quarter of section 246, block F, H&TC survey.

The Pacific Western's No. 1 Emery in section 162, Dickens county, the first offset to the No. 1 G. F. Smith, is drilling below 3,025. The project is scheduled to go to 7,800 ft. or to granite.

### Weaver Completes 25 Years With WTU

On May 30, 1919, word was flashed to Washington from Lisbon, Portugal, that the first successful crossing of the Atlantic by air had been made by the U. S. Navy's NC-4. Four planes started the flight from the United States; two did not make it; and

the third crashed in the Azores. A young Navy radio operator flashed the news to Washington from a repair ship, and that radio operator was W. R. Weaver of Spur who completed 25 years of continuous service with the West Texas Utilities Company on Feb. 7.

Weaver served two years in the Navy during World War I, and part of that time was spent as a radio operator on a mine-layer in the North Sea. With more than 150,000 pounds of TNT under him most of the time, he completed his tour of duty without a scratch.

His mine layer was one of the fleet of ten which mined the North Sea from Scotland to Norway in 1914. Five U. S. Battleships and fourteen English destroyers escorted them.

Weaver spent the winter of 1918 with the Navy in Cuba, Haiti and Jamaica, and in April, 1919, his repair ship was ordered to standby for the epochal flight of the NC-4 across the Atlantic.

Weaver was born in Cooper, Texas, in Delta county in 1897, and spent the first nine years of his life in Cooper where his father was manager of a lumber yard. He graduated from high school in Hugo, Okla., where the Weavers moved in 1906. He was employed as bookkeeper for a lumber company in 1915 at DeWard, Okla.; in 1916 he was transferred to Cheateah, Okla., and from 1920 to 1927 he was employed at Francis, Okla., and Pecos Gap, Texas.

In 1928 he applied for a job with West Texas Utilities company. He was employed by R. M. Wolfe in the accounting department, and the first three weeks were spent in the store-room because there was no room for his desk. In a short time he was checking petty cash, and in Feb., 1930, he was named assistant traveling auditor under O. J. Hamilton. He was back in the office working at a desk a year later.

In June, 1931, the veteran W. T. Uer was sent to Santa Anna as a bookkeeper for the Texas Glass company and a part time book keeper in the Santa Anna local office. In 1933 Weaver was transferred to Spur as a bookkeeper in the WTU local office, and in August, 1937, when E. M. Wilson was transferred to Memphis, Weaver assumed his present duties.

He has been active in the civic affairs of this community. He is a member of the Church of Christ, the Masonic lodge and the American Legion. He has been active in Boy Scout work and is now serving his tenth year as treasurer.

Weaver completed 25 years of service with the West Texas Utilities Company on Feb. 7.

### Duck Creek Soil Conservation District News Notes

District cooperators are making plans for planting Blue panic grass with planting operations to begin about April 10. This is the promising perennial grass which has proved very successful the last two years in the district.

Spring growth is already underway as observed by Soil Conservation Service technicians on the Lawton Harvey and A. E. McClain farms. Seed from selected cold resistant strains were purchased recently and are available to farmers in the district from the Vocational Agriculture teachers and their FFA Chapters who serve as custodians of the districts' seed equipment. These teachers are: W. W. Gregory, Spur; Truman Gregory, Patton Springs; Forrest Keith, McAdoo; and Walter Theiford, Jayton.

Soil Conservation technicians suggests a few pointers for those not having had experience in its planting and use:

1. Plant at rate of one to one and one-fourth pounds per acre on a firm, well prepared seed bed in 36 to 42 inch rows about natural ground level.

2. Cover not over one-half inch. It may be planted with the districts' grass drill or in a regular planter using a four hole maize plate by mixing one pound Blue panic seed with four pounds well ground grain sorghum seed.

3. Control weeds and cultivate as needed the first growing season, withholding grazing until the plants' root system is well rooted down (which is usually about two months).



**Cattle Production In Texas Up In 1952**

Cattle slaughter commercially in Texas in 1952 amounted to 1,175,000 head, or a total live weight of 929,201,000 pounds, as compared with 989,000 head, or a live weight of 748,711,000 pounds, slaughtered in 1951, according to figures released by the Bureau of Agriculture Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Calf slaughter in Texas rose to 861,000 head in 1952, as compared with 731,000 thousand head in 1951. Commercial slaughter of hogs rose to 2,034,000 in 1952, from 1,941,000 head in 1951, while commercial slaughter of sheep and lambs here in 1952 was 676,000 head, as compared with 592,200 head in 1951.

Nationally, commercial meat production for the year 1952 was 21.4 billion pounds, 6 percent more than the 20.2 billion pounds produced in 1951. As compared with 1951, mutton and lamb production during 1952 was up 25 percent, veal production, 11 percent; beef production, 9 percent; and pork production, 1 percent.

During 1952 a total of 17.9 million head of cattle were slaughtered in the United States, an increase of 9 percent from the 16.4 million head slaughtered during 1951. A total of 8.9 million head of calves were slaughtered in 1952, an increase of 6 percent over the 8.4 million head killed during 1951.

Commercial hog slaughter during 1952 totaled 77.7 million head, 2 percent more than the 76.1 million head slaughtered in 1951. The number of sheep and lambs slaughtered totaled 14.0 million head, 26 percent more than in the previous year.

For 1953, meat production will probably not be much different from that of 1952. Beef supplies will be larger, but these may be about offset by a smaller pork production which will result from the 12 percent cut formers have made in 1952 fall farrowings and the 13 percent reduction which is expected in 1953 spring farrowings.

**NATURALIZATION PROCESS EXPLAINED**

Most of us accept with little thought our American citizenship and the rights and privileges it bestows. We might do well to reflect upon what it takes to become a citizen of the United States under our present laws. Many of us would probably be unable to pass at least two of the requirements if called upon to do so.

One of these requirements is that the applicant for citizenship may be able to demonstrate to the satisfaction of the court a knowledge of the Constitution of the United States and the principles which it affirms. In addition, he must show a fairly comprehensive knowledge of the working organization of the American government.

But that is only a small part of the process of becoming a naturalized citizen. To begin with, an applicant for citizenship (if he is an ordinary case) must have been lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence. Then he must be entered on the registry of the Commissioner of Immigration Department.

Some time later he will receive a letter from the government telling him where he must file a

declaration to become a citizen - commonly known as "first papers." He may file this declaration shortly after he arrives in this country but not before he is 18 years of age.

After he has lived in the United States five years, and his first paper is at least two years old, the future citizen may file a petition for naturalization, known as "second papers." He must have lived in the state in which he filed for at least six months.

He will then be called for two hearings - one before the immigration authorities, and the second in federal court. At this time he must be able to speak and understand the English language, and he will be questioned regarding the Constitution, history of the United States and the government organization.

After 30 days the applicant will be notified to appear at the court for a final hearing of his petition. When the court grants a petition for naturalization, the applicant takes the oath of renunciation and allegiance - he renounces allegiance to the foreign state of which he is a subject or citizen, and promises to bear allegiance to the United States.

The court may deny the application. The laws relating to the granting of citizenship are strictly observed. Omission, oversight, mistake - all doubts in relation to the application are decided in favor of the government.

Some classes of applicants are exempted from several of the usual naturalization requirements. Certain requirements are waived for aliens married to citizens of the United States; for certain veterans of the armed forces; for former citizens who lost their citizenship by serving in Allied

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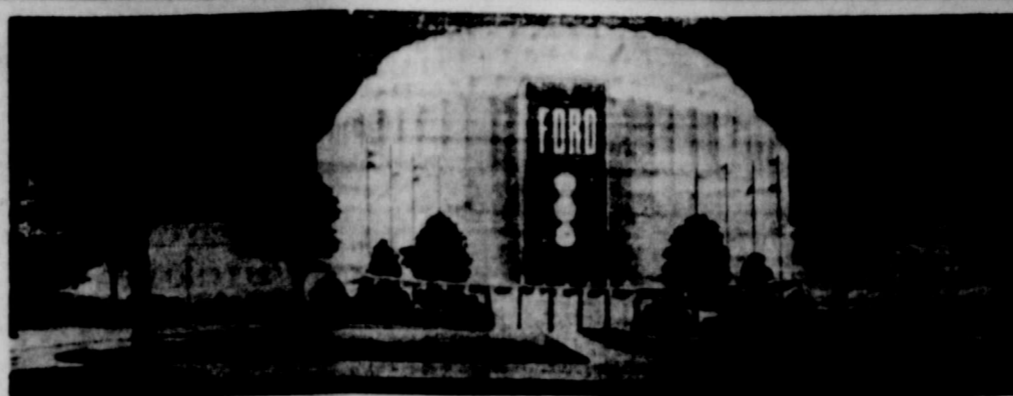


